School Out At 2:50 Wednesday

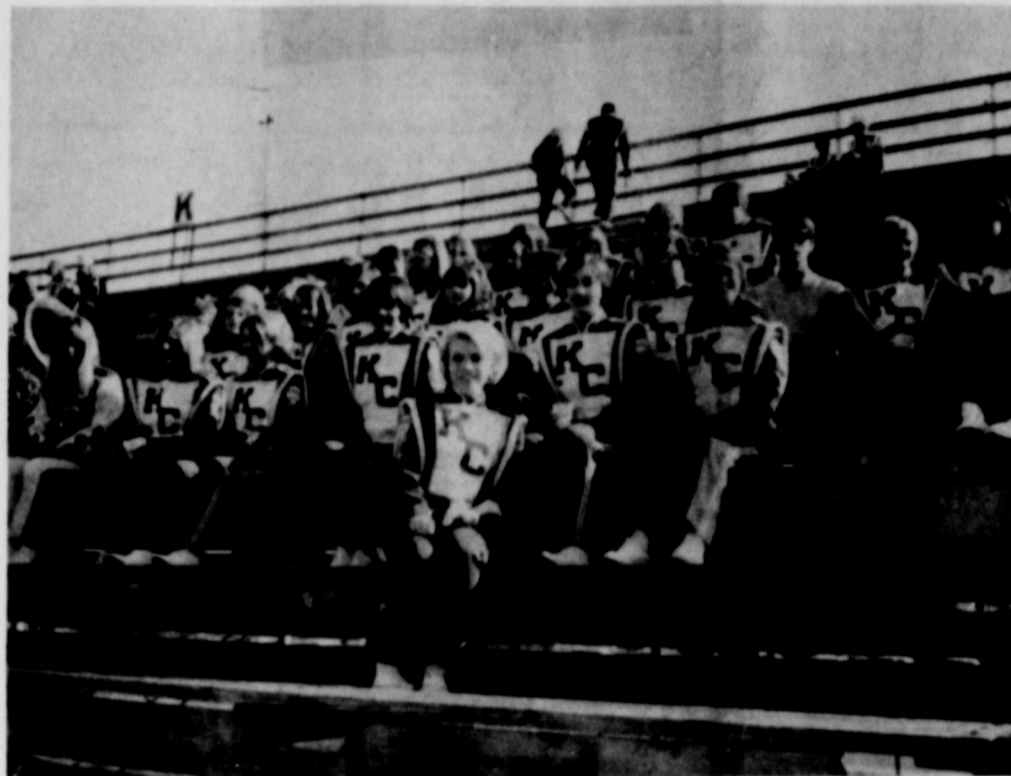

Division II Rating Awarded KCHS Marching Band Nov. 12

The Knox City High School Marching Band executed a very fine performance last Wednesday morning at Rose Park Stadium in Abilene and was awarded the Division II (excellent) rating by University Interscholastic League contest judges James Mallow of Brady High, Everett Maxwell of Lubbock Christian College and Dan Gibbs of Monahans High.

More than 1,500 junior and senior high school bandmen and twirlers were on hand to compete in the Region II (south Zone) UIL contest with 25 local and area bands participating. No band, ensemble, or soloist competes against another as ratings are awarded according to judging standards. Ratings are based on the excellence of the performance as follows:

Division I (Superior) The best conceivable performance for the event and the class of participants being judged; worthy of the distinction of being recognized as a first place winner.

Division II (Excellent) An unusual performance in many respects but not worthy of the highest rating due to minor defects in performance or ineffective interpretation. A performance of distinctive quality.

Sweetheart candidates circled the football field riding in 1970 Plymouths, courtesy of Egenbacher Motors. The two cars were decorated with glittered musical notes bearing the initials of each candidate.

A ribbon of red carpet greeted the royalty as they stepped from the cars and walked to the stands.

The Knox City High School Band played softly in the background while drum major Teresa White presented a gift to Kenny Lawson announcing his position as Band Beau.

Little Miss Melinda Hays, daughter of Band Director and Mrs. Wes Hays held the Sweetheart's crown and her gift while the new Band Beau made the presentation to Miss Thompson, whose identity as Sweetheart remained unknown until the moment of the coronation.

Division III (Average) An average performance, but not outstanding. Showing accomplishment and marked promise, but lacking in one or more essential qualities.

Division IV (Below Average) A below average performance not worthy of higher rating because of basic weaknesses in most of the fundamental factors.

Division V (Poor) Much room for improvement. The director should check his methods, instrumentation, etc., with those of more mature organizations.

The Knox City band received constructive comments such as, "Beautiful colors, good fanfare. This is an impressive small band. Everybody seems to be carrying his share of the load. Your band shows a fine spirit, everything was done in good taste, but naturally, when you have so few persons, the load becomes heavy. Wish I could go a little higher, I'm sure it will be up there next year."

'Hounds Close Grid Season With 59-0 Victory Here Fri.

The Knox City Greyhounds here last Friday night completely dominating the game to end the season with a 59-0 victory.

Scoring for the 'Hounds began early in the first quarter on a 59 yard run by fullback Charlie Lieb. The try for extra point was no good but the

170 pound sophomore quickly trampled the Paducah Dragons and scampered 13 yards for another KC touchdown. Ivan Logsdon kicked the extra point and the score was 13-0 at the end of the first quarter.

Early in the second quarter Greyhound quarterback Mike Newton hit end Bobby Lewis with a 10 yard TD pass,

the kick for PAT by Logsdon was good, and the score read 20-0.

Logsdon chalked up 7 more points for the 'Hounds just before half-time when he ran 9 yards for a touchdown and made his kick for PAT good.

Early in the third quarter KC tailback Alan Orr took a scoring toss of 12 yards from Newton, the try for PAT failed, and the score board read 33-0.

It was in the third quarter that KC's "B" team made a nice showing when Brent Rallsback went over on a keeper from the one yard line to set the home score up to 39.

Early in the fourth quarter leaping Charlie Lieb scored 6 points on a 34 yard pass and two points on an extra point pass from fireballing Newton. The "B" team's Leslie Fitzgerald came through with another touchdown and Orr made a 12 yard run to score on a

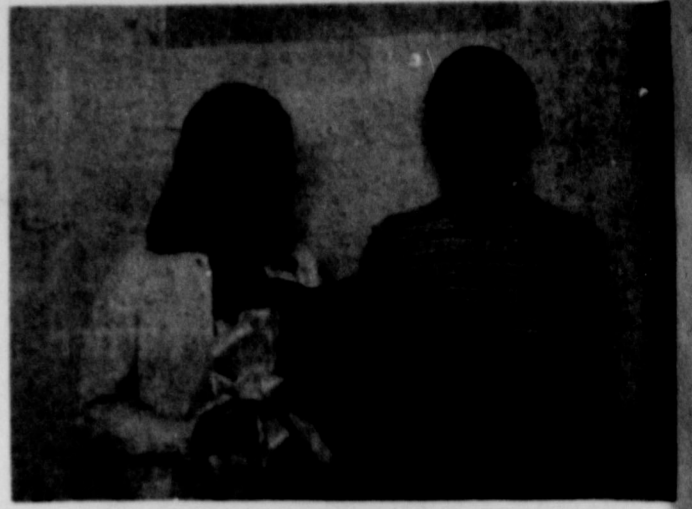
