## Knox City Voters May Register At City Hall

All voters must register this year, and even though registration is free, everyone, regardless of age, must register under the new state law.

For the convenience of Knox City residents, registration may be done at the City Hall, as well as the County Tax Assessor-Collector's office in the Courthouse at Benjamin.

Voter registration ends at midnight January 31, 1968, and only those persons who have registered may vote in state, county, local, special, and the presidential elections from March 1, 1968, to February 28, 1969.

All persons 21 years of age and over who have been a resident of Texas for one year and of Knox County for six months are eligible to register. Persons 60 and older residing in towns under 10,000 population or rural areas also must register under the new state law. Those who are not 21 but will be during 1968 may register, if not 21 when applying for first certificate, birthday must be shown along with date registrant will be entitled to vote. They may also register during 1968 up to 30 days before an election.

New residents who have not

resided in Texas one year or the county six months will show date registrant will be entitled to vote. They may register during 1968 up to 30 days before an election.

John A. Smith, county tax assessor-collector urges all citizens of Knox County to register in order to be eligible to vote in all elections.

Facts will be published in many area papers, including the Herald, to show the public how the program will benefit the veterans as well as our businesses.

Since its inception in 1949, the Veterans Land Program has stood on its own as one of the soundest state endeavors in modern times. It has been most successful and throughout the years has not cost the taxpayers for its operation and the purchase of land. On the contrary, it has made it a profit for the people of Texas over and above its cost of operation.

On December 1, 1965, the last purchase of land was made under prior amendments per-

mitting 35,300 veterans to buy approximately 3,000,000 acres of land. The purchase of land not only helps the veterans of Texas, but the economy as a whole derives great benefits from such an endeavor. From the sale of the first \$200,000,000 in bonds, there has been over \$242,000,000 spent for the purchase of land. This includes the profit made by the program and also the 5 percent down-payment and the difference money paid by the veteran purchasers. Since each dollar spent turns over at least eight times, the spending of \$242,000,000 is equivalent to placing over one and a half billion dollars into the economy of the state. This is in addition to the benefits derived by the public as a whole from the improvements made on the various places and the money spent by each veteran purchaser in the community where the land is located. Attorneys, abstractors, title insurance companies, fire insurance companies, surveyors, real estate brokers, lumber yards, and all tradesmen directly feel the effect of the increased business derived from the purchase of land by the 35,000 or more veteran purchasers.

Mr. Ray is in Abilene this week attending a water school sponsored by the Texas State Department of Health.



## Greyhounds Lose To Moguls, 28-6



## Knox City Receives \$20,000 Airport Grant

Knox City received a share of the \$467,260 allocated to 23 Texas cities and counties recently by the Texas Aeronautics Commission for expansion and improvement of their airports.

The \$20,000 grant has been confirmed and is a matching grant in goods, services and money, and according to the spokesman, must be a joint community effort.

The project will include the acquisition of land and clear-

zones, the paving of a 50-foot by 3,200-foot runway and apron, marking and lighting.

The proposed improvement would be for an airport comparable to Seymour's and would be the most modern within a four-county area.

## Area Representatives Hold Meeting Thursday To Discuss Research Center

We believe it would be well to inform the people of what a Research Center actually consists of, because there is the danger of confusion in the minds of some, that the Center would be just another burden of work and money spent with the benefits going to only a few. Actually, as we understand it, the Research Center, or Laboratory, if you choose, is designed to help in any way possible, all phases of work that will prove profitable to the Rolling Plains Area. Soil Analysis, crop, range land, marketing and many other factors will fall within the work of the Research.

At a meeting held last Thursday in the High School lunchroom in Munday with representatives from neighboring counties of Hardeman, Haskell, Baylor, Mitchell, Throckmorton, Jones and from various towns in Knox County, the bid for the Research Center to be placed in Munday was stressed.

We, of the Munday area, believe this is an ideal site for the Research Center, as there is in the immediate vicinity, almost every type soil needed for study. There is both irrigated and dry farm land, range land and cattle; vegetables of many varieties are grown here on a commercial basis, and as can be noted, from the map which was displayed at the meeting, Munday is well within the perimeter of being centrally located.

There was quite a discussion on our potentials of acquiring the Center and the necessary steps needed to follow up our bid for the location site. One remark was pointed out that there are several ways to acquire assistance, but primarily, the best way to get help is help ourselves.

The factor of cooperation within the entire area of the Rolling Plains, of which the Research Center will serve, should be emphasized. A remark was made at the meeting that reflected the lack of communities working together

on past issues. We hope our stumbling blocks of the past can be stepping stones for future development of our territory with neighbors working together.

Representatives from other Counties were very cooperative and interested. It was decided to organize a committee, composed of two members from each county, to represent the area. At least six, of the above mentioned, did organize with the promise of consideration from others.

Another meeting date was de-

ecided upon in the near future to further study our plans for the placement of the Research Center in Munday, and to complete formation of this steering Committee and formulate a plan of work for them to follow. It will certainly be an asset to the town that can locate it and we know our leaders are well aware of this fact. Much time and effort will be necessary even for the "groundwork" and the best way we can express our gratitude to those that are working is to give sincere support.



What a nice feeling it's going to be Saturday night to turn the clock back an hour! One hour's extra sleep will be ours!


## Fire Damages Two Trucks

## Farm and Ranch News

By Herman Collier

### COTTON GRADES GOOD IN COUNTY

Cotton harvest has been moving at a fast rate in Knox County at the time of this writing. Many producers are harvesting clean cotton with a fair percent being classed as white, and on down to low middling. Micronaire reports are showing up quite well according to the expectations from the various varieties. Staple lengths are running well ahead of last year's crop. Some so called short staple cottons such as Lankare 57, are turning out many 31/32" up to 1-1/32" staples.

The longer staple cottons of course are showing above the Lankare 57 in staple lengths and also average higher in micronaire readings.

A wide variation of selling prices are being noticed in the county ranging from 150 points to 1250 points over loan price. Lankare 57 and other short staple cottons are generally bringing \$18.00 to \$21.00 depending upon grades. Sonville 7A in most cases runs from \$23.00 to \$26.00. Varieties of both Acala and Coker have been in the higher brackets, bring \$32.00 to \$34.00.

Some of the higher premium cottons are being held with the expectation of these even bringing higher price.

Another ten days of harvesting weather would get a large percent of the county crop in.

**WHEAT NEEDS MOISTURE**  
Much of the Knox County wheat has been seeded with stands ranging from good to spotted. Seeding on the remaining fields has been slowed by some producers waiting for moisture. Moisture is also needed to aid in getting better stands on many fields and to establish a better root system on the wheat.

Many fields would be ready for grazing soon if a good general rain were to fall. Where as cotton producers will welcome several days of clear dry weather, wheat producers would welcome moisture.

Army worms have continued to be a problem in small grains in large areas of Texas. White Grubs and Cutworms have also done some damage in various areas with a few noticed in Knox County.

White Grubs are hard to control except by complete soil treatment, while several pesticides are listed for control of Armyworms or Cutworms. Some of these listed are Parathion, Endrin, Toxaphene and DDT. MP-339 Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Grain and Forage Crops may be obtained at the Extension Office.

### 4-H HORSE CLUBS GROW BY LEAPS AND BOUNDS

It looks as though the horse is up-staging the automobile and boat in the American family recreation scene. While no accurate count is available, the number of pleasure horses from Maine to California has been estimated from 5 to 7 million.

The last U. S. horse census made in 1959 showed nearly 3 million horses and mules — mostly on farms. The greatest increase today is around the major population centers.

The 4-H Clubs have been one of the most enthusiastic boosters of the pleasure horse. Recent horse shows and fairs have featured 4-H owners and riders who have claimed their share of honors and trophies.

The national 4-H Horse program last year headed the list for enrollment increase in 32 major 4-H award programs su-




