DON'T GO WILD OVER COTTON SAYS MR. COIT

Henry Coit, one of Dallas County's largest farmers, advises against increased cotton acreage as follows:

"You see what a little patriotic cooperation did this year, 1921. All thinking farmers, friendly business men, and bankers are agreed that the same program for 1922 is the only safe course. Then don't go wild over cotton. What did those who hoped for low prices for cotton say last year? They said that the fool farmers would be crooked enough to try to take advantage of their neighbors who increased their food and feed crop acreage and cut out some of their cotton, and that we would have more cotton than ever. We did not do it did we? Let's fool them again and thus serve notice on them that we will not grow cotton at a price that will enrich them though it pauperizes the producers of it."

PEOPLE ASKED TO ADDRESS PACKAGES PLAINLY

Washington, Nov. 23.—An appeal to American women to address their Christmas cards and packages in plain writing is made by postmaster General Hays in a circular issued containing instructions for the handling of Christmas mail. Fancy writing only serves to clog the Mail and increase the burdens of the postal clerks, the circular says.

The use of regular size cards and envelopes instead of those of small size is also urged, attention being called to the fact that the envelopes of regular size may be run through a canceling machine at the rate of 50,000 an hour, whereas those of odd size must be canceled by hand.

Speech and Character

Corsicana Sun: Get your mind on (Better Speech Week) and note carefully, the manner in which each spoken sentence is framed. If you have been in the habit of using bad grammar, slang or not correctly pronouncing your words, set about now to make your speech free from those blemishes, for blemishes they are. Help to make "Better Speech Week" a success. In that effort you will make of yourself a better American.

Few there are who realize what effect correct speech has upon personal character. Did you ever see a criminal who habitually used grammatical language? Did you ever see a hoodlum, a burglar, a pickpocket whose converse was not loaded with slang when not putrid with profanity? To teach the young one to speak the mother tongue with ease and clarity, without resort to the lesson of the illiterate or mis-educated, is to do much toward starting him or her into the path of moral rectitude. To indulge constantly in the use of slang is to be guilty of an immorality. Untidy words from a pretty mouth are disillusioning and may easily become disgusting. Girls with the instinctive refinement of the best of their sex avoid slang as if it were the insignia of coarse-mindedness. This doesn't mean that the occasional ejaculation of a slang word is reprehensible. It does mean that the use of slang as a habit of speech is to classify oneself with those who do not know or do not care for the niceties of manners which proclaim good quality.

We should all think of these things continually, for they are vital to our best interests of our family, friends and neighbors. There is always argument on both sides of the question, but the basic facts remain just the same and we should not lose sight of those basic facts. As a rule goods can be purchased in the home town as cheap as in other towns or cities; not all things but the majority of the commodities which we use. Some articles may be a bit higher once in a while, but it is equally true that some are often a bit lower, and the whole monthly account will balance pretty well, take it up one side and down another.

But even if it did cost a trifle more to trade at home than to send money away to the cities, still it would be cheaper in the long run to buy at home and let the money circulate around the town, each dollar doing a hundred dollar's worth of business before it finally slips away.

If we do not build up our home town there will not be any home town and all our investments in it, for homes or anything else, will fall flat, and we all lose out. Any way you want to look at this trading away from home business, it figures out a loss in the long run for everybody who engages in it in a regular way.

This, you know, applies to the home printer as well as to the home merchant. Home merchants please take notice. — (Cal.) Record.
