## CREAM AND MILK SALES INCREASE

C. Addison, our local Produce man and owner of one of the pickup stations for the Rule Creamery stated the milk and cream business was on a steady gain every week. Last Saturday fifty gallons of sweet milk and eighteen cans of cream were picked up from his place.

The Rule Creamery, management stated Knox City was contributing more milk and cream to the plant than any other station on the route, including the home town.

From observations, from every angle, we do not see why this country should not be an ideal county for the milk and cream business.

Using two sudan pastures and one native pasture, and planting plenty of maize and cane, to be used when grass was short, we see no reason why a number of real dairy cows would not beat the one crop all to pieces.

We would like to see more dairy cows imported into this territory.

We can give the name of a small town in Eastern New Mexico that shipped 100 ten gallon cans of cream last Saturday. Think of the cash that little town had for that one day. It's worth thinking about. It's worth doing too.

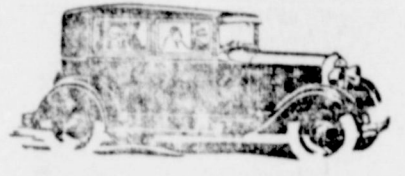

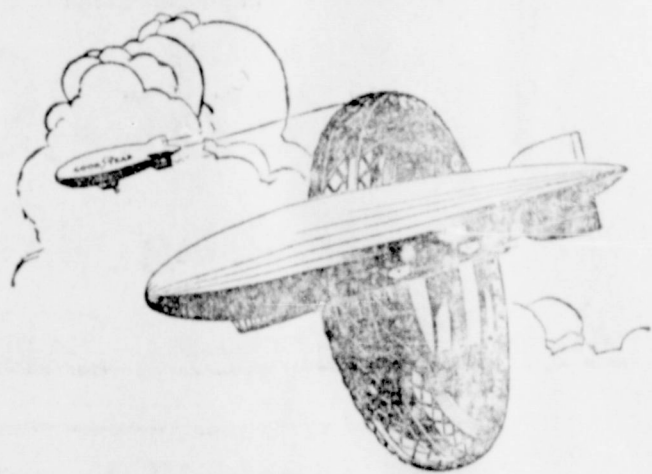

**Cop Serves One Man**

A traffic cop who serves one man is stationed in Washington, says the St. Louis Post-Dispatch. On a driveway leading to the office of the secretary of agriculture there is a crossing. It is in what is known as the Mall, the parkway extending from the Capitol to the Lincoln Memorial. Every morning about 8:30 the guardian of the crossing appears, turns four signs reading "No left turn" and waits until the automobile of Secretary Jardine comes along. Then up goes the copper's hand, and traffic stops to let the secretary pass. As soon as he has gone by, the signs are reversed, and the policeman departs. About 4:20 in the afternoon the policeman shows up again and repeats the performance as the secretary passes on his homeward way.

We have had to wait for the centenary of Schubert's death to learn that his genius was only an inferiority complex. The celebration in Vienna was slightly marred by the statement of a learned professor that Schubert was "a self-satisfied, humdrum individual, a harmless little schoolmaster conscious of the inferior value of his soul," and that it was "only when he began to suffer and to realize his inferiority that his music became lofty," says the Springfield Republican. From the stupendous quantity of work which he did, however, in the short adult function of his 31 years, we may doubt whether he had much leisure to indulge an inferiority complex.

Count Franz Larisch voiced a professional complaint after his arrival in New York aboard the Thuringia. He is an oceanographer of standing and made the trip to gather data on winds and waves, says the Baltimore Sun. But the storms of the last few days, which treated the 40,000-ton Olympic very roughly and messed up a number of other vessels, simply refused to go near the 11,000-ton Thuringia. And that, when a scientist is waiting for them, is very provoking to the scientist. There is no way of including in exact calculation such remarks as that "the race is not always to the swift nor the battle to the strong," even though they are true.

Few literary stocks have jumped in value as have the Pickwick Papers, according to John Eckel, an American authority on Dickens. Eckel estimates that the value on the original copies of the "Posthumous Papers of the Pickwick Club" has increased \$500 a year for the last 32 years. The last copy of the original was disposed of for \$16,300 in New York, says the London News. Richard Gimbel, Philadelphia, owns Parts II and III, regarded the most valuable of the set. He paid \$2,300 for a corrected Part II and \$1,000 for a Part III, reasonably priced in comparison to later sales.

There are now fewer insane patients in Alaska than at any time since the Klondike gold rush, says the San Francisco Chronicle. Insanity generally was described as caused by the long winters and isolation from human society. Miners, trappers and reindeer herders were its victims. Radio and airplanes have reduced this malady, physicians at Juneau declare. Practically all the distant camps have radios to tell of events around the world and diffuse entertainment. Almost daily airplanes may be seen in every section of the territory, bringing letters, newspapers and supplies to the most isolated settlements.

A postcard, mailed at Philadelphia in the summer of 1909, was delivered in New York November 30, 1928. The card contained the message, "Having a good time; wish you were here!" The sender, having died in the meantime, the greeting was slightly startling until the postmark was noted. 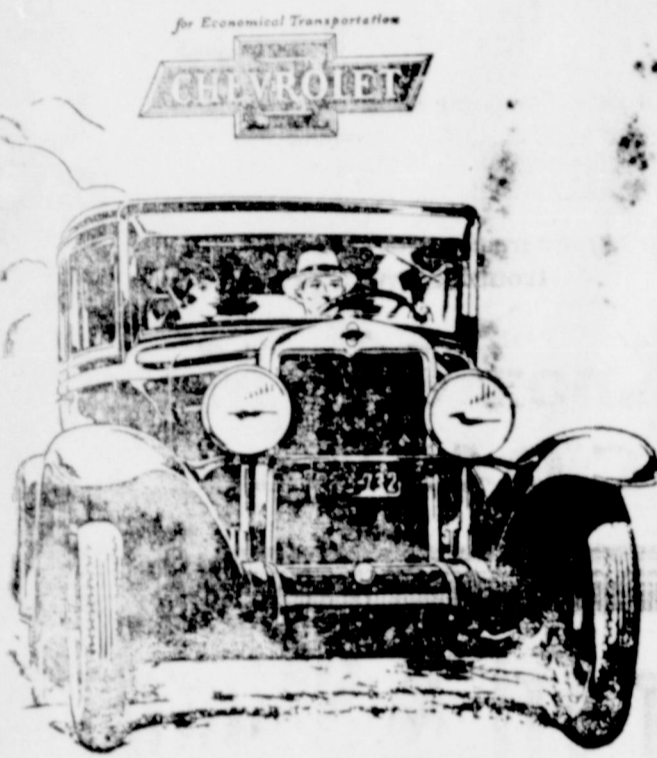
