today we will be in Stamford, Thursday, about 6 o'clock. We hope to have the pleasure of meeting many of your people upon this occasion.

I might add that in each town we visited we were received in the most cordial spirit and we are highly pleased with the results. We traveled through seven counties, twenty odd towns, covering a distance of more than four hundred miles.


