THE TURNOUT WAS GOOD for Saturday's primary election — over 2,700 voters in Callahan County. This includes 2,599 who used Democratic ballots and 121 Republicans.

The lull between primaries will be short, however, with the second primaries now less than a month away.

But with short ballots looming on both sides of the fence, we hope the coming campaign will not be quite as bitterly fought. We became a little impatient with two or three of the statewide candidates who seemed to be running on their opponent's merits rather than their own merits.

WE FEEL THE CALLAHAN candidates are to be congratulated for the campaigns they conducted.

With four names on the ballot and a write-in effort going, it would have been easy for the sheriff's race to have degenerated into a name-calling contest.

But, on the contrary, we heard of no such mudslinging. Instead, the campaign remained on a high level.

For this, we are grateful.

FOR MEMBERS OF the Baird High senior class, this is a memorable week — one which they may remember in detail longer than they do graduation or other end-of-school activities. The senior trip is, indeed, something the class looks forward to for months and even years.

In some communities, such trips are surrounded by controversy. Some schools encourage them, others merely permit the trip, and some schools have stopped them completely.

It is difficult — or perhaps impossible — to say which is wisest.

HISTORIANS TELL US that 60 years ago, horsedrawn vehicles plodded through midtown New York City traffic at an average speed of 11.5 miles per hour.

Today, however, the highpowered automobiles whiz along those same streets at an average of 6 m.p.h.

EARLIER THIS WEEK a group of first graders from Stephen F. Austin Elementary School in Abilene rode the Texas and Pacific train to Baird.

New FM Road Okayed For Callahan County

The Texas Highway Commission Wednesday approved the expenditure of \$51,000 for construction of new Farm to Market Road mileage in Callahan County as part of the 1964 FM Road Program, announced District Engineer J. C. Roberts of Abilene.

It is from U. S. 283 west to five miles east of Oplln.

The district engineer said 3.8 miles in this county will be involved. The work will be under the supervision of E. L. Harris, Resident Engineer, Abilene.

The work authorized for this county is part of the new \$23.0 million FM Road Construction Program just announced by the Texas Highway Commission.

GOP Goes For Morgan, Cox

Callahan County republicans favored Dr. Clyde Morgan and Jack Cox in contested primary races Saturday, and gave heavy support to Sen. Barry Goldwater as their presidential preference. A total of 121 GOP ballots were cast at the three county voting boxes.

For U. S. Senator, Cox received 44 votes at Cross Plains, 29 at Clyde and 12 at Baird; Morris polled six at Cross Plains, four at Clyde and one at Baird; and Davis polled two at Cross Plains and four at Clyde.

In the race to become the Republican nominee for Congress from the 17th District, Phil Bridges polled 29 at Cross Plains, 13 at Clyde and five at Baird, while Dr. Morgan had 26 at Cross Plains, 29 at Clyde and nine at Baird.

All other races on the GOP ballot were unopposed.

In the presidential preference poll, Goldwater was far out front with 50 at Cross Plains, 37 at Clyde and 14 at Baird. Sen. Margaret Chase Smith received only two — both at Clyde — and Harold Stassen had the same number, one at Cross Plains and one at Clyde.

Ambassador Lodge got three votes at Cross Plains and one at Baird, while Richard Nixon received two each at Cross Plains and Clyde, plus one at Baird.

Beef Cattle Shortcourse Slated May 11-14 For Adult Farmers

A beef cattle shortcourse for adult farmers will be held May 11-14 under the sponsorship of the Baird High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to L. B. Howard, superintendent, and Dick Vestal, teacher of vocational agriculture.

James Thornton, beef production specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Husbandry at Texas A&M College with headquarters at A&M College, will be the instructor in the course.

Thornton is a graduate of

Texas Technological College, where much of his college work in technical agriculture was in the field of animal husbandry with major emphasis on beef cattle. After graduation he worked as herdsman at C. E. Yoakum Ranch at Cherokee, and taught VA ten years.

The shortcourse at Baird is scheduled to begin May 11 at 7:30 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. During the dates the shortcourse is in progress, Thornton will be available to assist cattlemen with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction according to Vestal.

Cattlemen interested in attending the shortcourse should write or call Howard or Dick Vestal. An entry fee of \$2.00 will be charged.

Beef cattle shortcourse certificates will be presented to each cattleman who attends all the training sessions.

Fabulous Chocolate Pastry Cake



You'll love this four-layered beauty with its pastry layers and its delicious creamy chocolate filling. Chocolate also gives a flavor bonus to the pastry layers. Make this "conversation piece" dessert on a day that's not busy... freeze it... serve it later to very special, very important guests.

Chocolate Pastry Cake

2 packages (4 oz. each) Baker's German's Sweet Chocolate
 1/2 cup granulated sugar
 1/2 cup water

1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
 2 teaspoons vanilla
 1 package (10 ounces) pie crust mix
 2 cups heavy cream

Remove wrapper from one end of a bar of chocolate. Using a vegetable peeler, dipped in hot water frequently, shave 3 squares of chocolate into curls or shavings. Set aside to use as garnish.

Break up remaining chocolate and combine with sugar, water, and cinnamon in small saucepan. Cook and stir over low heat until sauce is smooth. Remove from heat; add vanilla. Cool to room temperature.

Then blend 3/4 cup of the chocolate sauce into the dry pie crust mix; divide into 4 parts. Press or spread each part over the bottom of inverted 8- or 9-inch square pans to within 1/4 inch or more of the edge. Bake in hot oven (425°F.) 6 to 8 minutes, or until pastry is almost firm. Remove from oven. If pastry has spread over edge of pan, trim with a sharp knife. Cool pastry layers just until firm—about 5 minutes. Then carefully run knife under layers to loosen from pans. Place on racks to cool thoroughly.

Whip the cream just until soft peaks will form. Fold in the remaining chocolate sauce. Spread between and over the top of layers. Garnish with the shaved chocolate. Chill at least 8 hours or overnight, or store in freezer. Makes 12 to 16 servings. Note: To freeze cake, place in freezer uncovered until firm; then cover and store in freezer. A few hours before serving, place cake in refrigerator to thaw.

Screwworms Show Increase

Screwworm infestations are on the increase again with eight cases being reported in Texas the week ending April 30, 1964.

All cases are in South Texas with the nearest case being in Edwards County. However, stockmen here should be on the alert for possible screwworm cases and should exercise all precautionary measures in handling livestock.

Wounds in stock should be treated and cattle should be inspected regularly.

The screwworm eradication program is certainly effective as is shown by the fact that in

1962 there were 973 cases, 1963 there were 80 cases, and 1964 only 8 cases in Texas at this same time period.

However, an untreated case that is allowed to complete its life cycle could seriously hamper the effects on all the good work that has been done.

The screwworm problem is something that we can not forget about. We must continually stay on the alert for possible cases in this area.

In time Texas will be free of this costly menace but the time is not now. Ranchers should stay on the alert and send any worms they find to Mission, and contact the County Extension Office.

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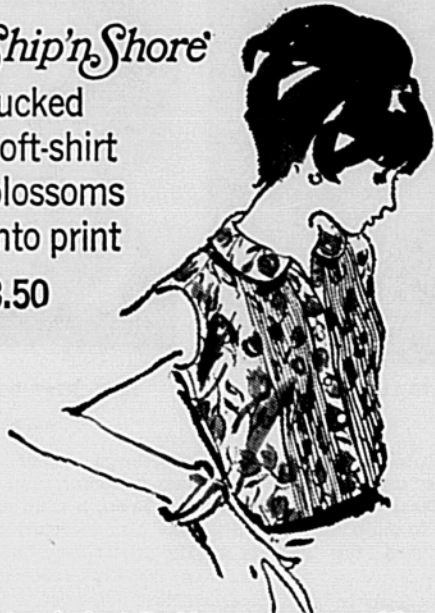

Officers were elected and installed Wednesday evening.

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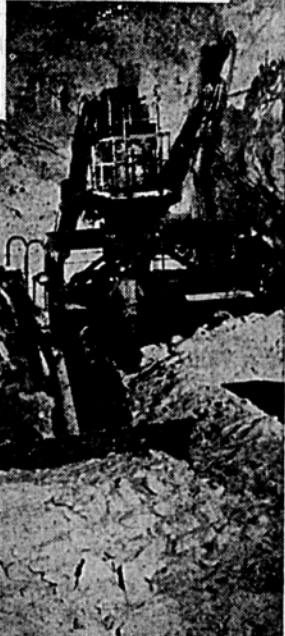

County Gains 2 Wildcat Sites

Callahan County has gained sites for two wildcats to be carried in the regular field.

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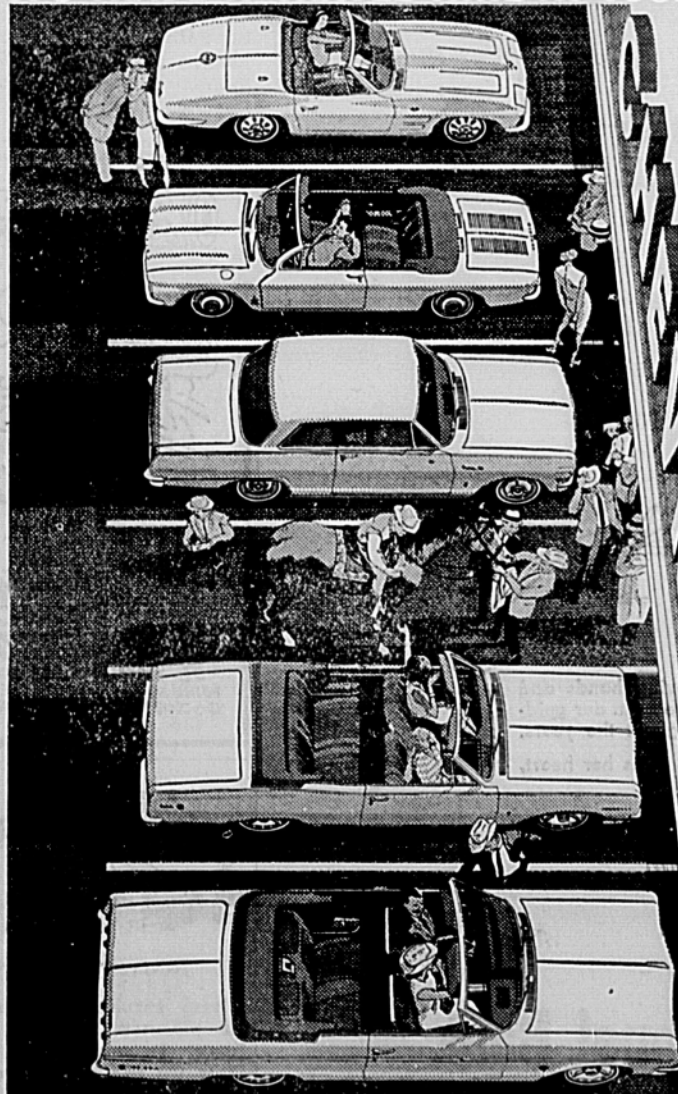

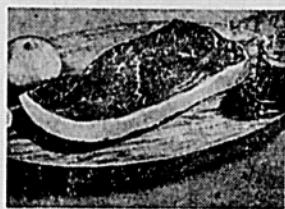

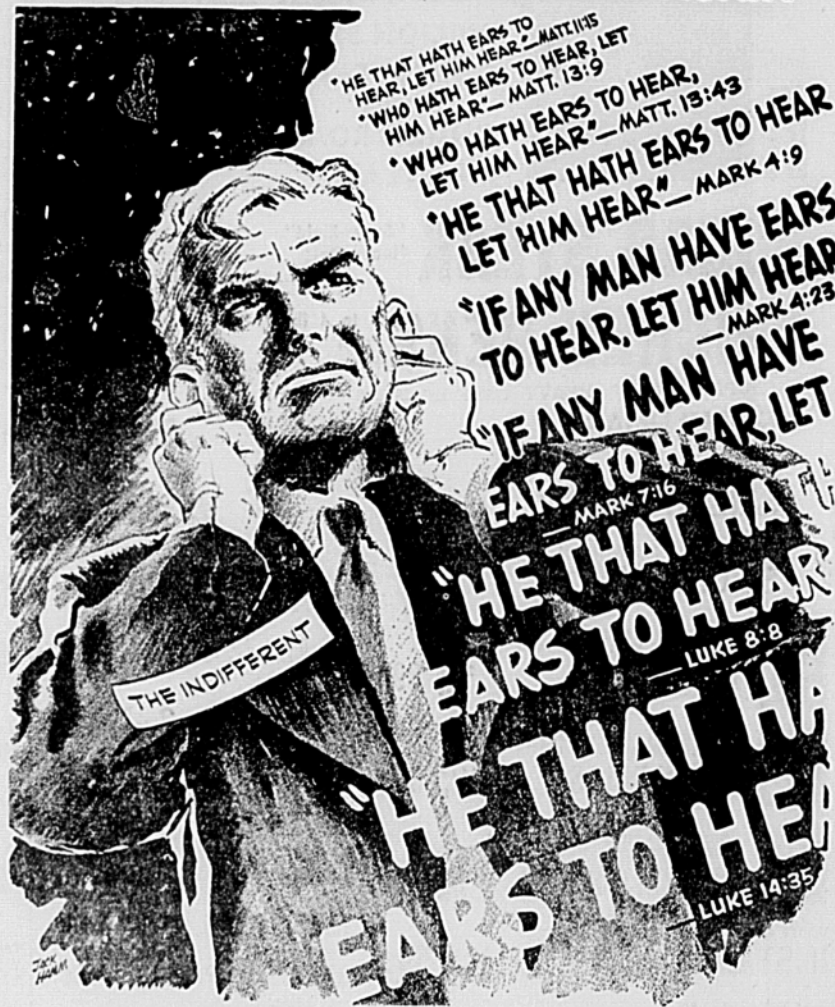

Down in that rugged, hilly country of Texas north of San Antonio, around Boerne and Bandera, there ranges a strange kind of animal. Scant few humans ever have seen one of these elusive critters. Indeed, many find it difficult to believe that they exist at all.

But they do exist, all right, and you can take the word of Bob Snow for that. Bob has killed more than 100 of the wild creatures and in the process has had some hair-raising experiences.

This animal of which we speak with awe is the Russian wild hog, a lean and muscular animal with the speed of a race horse, unbelievable stamina and a viciousness when cornered that has left many pursuing dogs bloodied and dead.

Despite man's best efforts to eradicate the Russian hog, its numbers continue to rise. According to Bob, there are more

today than ever before. So many, in fact, that landowners openly are soliciting hunters to come to their ranches to hunt the hogs.

Snow, who is from Kerrville, is a hunter of wide and varied experience. For many years he was with the Texas Game and Fish Commission. But today he is retired to a life of hunting.

He has traveled to Mexico after jaguar and mountain lion. He has hunted about everything Texas has to offer. But he states unequivocally that the Russian hog is the meanest, most vicious critter on four feet.

And coming from Bob Snow, that's saying something.

Snow recalls a vivid incident which gives an inkling as to the character of the Russian boar. His pack of dogs cornered this large and mean specimen and Bob got in close enough to blast the hog in the head with a .45 automatic.

The boar only shook its head brushed the dogs aside and took off again. Sometime later the dogs bayed the hog once more and the scene was repeated. Again the hog shook off the effects of the .45 slug and continued to fight.

Five times Snow brought the hog to bay and five times shot it with the .45. The boar never did go down and soon escaped into the brush when Snow ran out of ammunition. Later, some deer hunters found where the hog had crawled under a brushpile and died. In all, the hog ran for something like 10 miles and killed a couple of Snow's

prized hounds in the process. Yes sir, that Russian hog is a tough one, all right.

This hog got an inglorious start in Texas. Legend has it that many years ago a man with a traveling exhibit came to San Antonio. He was down on his luck and wished to get rid of his animals. Included in the lot were several Russian hogs.

A rancher bought the hogs and transported them to his ranch in the Bandera area. He hoped to crossbreed them with domestic stock. But soon thereafter the Russian hogs escaped and vanished into the underbrush. They all but disappeared for several years. Then ranchers started seeing the elusive hogs. Their numbers had increased appreciably.

Hunters like Bob Snow have found the Russian hog to be a sporting big-game animal. A few are slain each year by deer hunters. But in most instances the hogs have to be pursued by trained dogs which trail them in the dense oak and cedar brush characteristic of this part of the state.

There are no special dogs used in hunting the Russian hogs. Just about every kind of breed imaginable might be represented in a typical pack. Snow usually carries a new dog along on a hunt and if it shows any aptitude for hog hunting, it becomes an official member of the pack.

Bob follows along on horseback as the dogs take off into the underbrush, noses laid against the ground, trying to pick up the fresh scent of a hog. The porkers leave telltale evidence of feeding by ground burrows where they're rooted along the side of draws or along ridges.

Sometimes they even kill young goats and sheep. This is one reason they are causing some concern among ranchers. Another is that they tear up fences.

The Russian hog has a long snout for digging. It also carries two imposing tusks rising from the corners of its lower jaw. When engaged in a close fight, the hog will sling its head back and forth, swishing these tusks through the air like sabers.

A Russian hog might bay immediately. Or it may take off and run for miles. Snow says it isn't unusual to trail one an entire day. One thing for sure . . . when it does come to bay, it is spilling for a fight.

As Bob puts it, this is no place for the timid. An angered Russian hog will attack with the slightest provocation, and when it comes a-running, it means business.
