That kind of tie is mighty convenient, all right. Most of the time.

A PESSIMIST FRIEND of ours reminds us that the futility of riches is stated very plainly in two places — The Bible and the income tax form.

CALLAHAN COUNTY'S highway accident rate is running well ahead of last year — a pace which has been held in each of 1964's five months which have passed.

Through May, the county has recorded 69 accidents on its highways which have killed six persons and injured 43, resulting in property damage which has reached \$56,420.

Only in the fatality area is this record better than 1963. Last year's first five months showed 51 accidents with eight persons killed and 17 injured, with property damage at \$42,890.

Virtually every county in this 12-county district of the Texas Department of Public Safety has a worse rural traffic accident this year than last, however.

Only Eastland, Nolan and Scurry counties show more property damage in 1963 than 1964, although only one county — Mitchell — has had fewer accidents this year.

ALTHOUGH SOME MAY have already noticed, the current edition of the Readers Digest cites The Baird Star in its July edition.

Under its "Quotable Quotes" heading, the magazine credits The Star, as quoted in The National Observer, with saying "As you go along, the first things you reach are the bridges you weren't going to cross until you came to them."

## TRUCK ACCIDENT KILLS KENNETH OLEN SIMMONS

Kenneth Olen Simmons, 32, apparently died instantly about 5 a.m. Thursday when the loaded wheat truck he was driving hit a car, then plowed into the rear of a parked truck.

No one else was injured in the accident, which occurred on Highway 80 at Gordon Junction, about 13 miles east of Strawn in Palo Pinto County.

Funeral services are pending.

Simmons, a native of Coleman County, was driving a truck for Callahan County Farmer's Co-Operative which was heavily loaded with wheat.

Although the accident was still under investigation Thursday morning, the truck apparently ran into the rear

of the car, driven by Norman Dickerson of Gordon, then swerved off the pavement to run under the rear of a parked truck belonging to Merchants Motor Lines.

The Merchants truck was parked in front of the C&R Truck Stop, which is at Gordon Junction. No one was in the truck.

Simmons apparently died from a crushed chest. He was pinned between the truck's steering wheel and the rear of the cab by the impact.

Investigating the accident are Justice of the Peace Leslie Weaver of Strawn and Highway Patrolman Neal Blinford.

The body was taken to Edwards Funeral Home at Strawn following the accident.

## Teens Capture First Half Victory

Baird's high-scoring teenage baseball team wound up the season's first half Tuesday night in perfect style, blasting Eastland by a 14-3 count. It was the eighth straight district win of the year for the team.

The Tuesday night win, coupled with a decision last Friday over arch-rival Cisco, gave Baird undisputed first place at the season's halfway point. Cisco wound up with a 7-1 mark for second place.

Bruce Bell and Richard Windham led Baird's nine hit attack against Eastland Tuesday, with each belting two safeties. Bell scored four runs for the night, including one on a first-inning home run which put Baird out front to stay.

Wally Harris, Bell and Windham shared mound duties in the romp.

Baird's defense featured three double plays, coming in the first, second and fifth frames.

Windham started the first one when he snagged a fly ball, then threw to first to double off the runner. The second started with a ground-er to Richie Crow at second for one, followed by his relay to Tommy Barton at first for the second out.

The third double play went from Bell, who was pitching at the time, to Catcher Stanley McGowen to Pat McKennon at first.

Windham went all the way in the crucial game against Cisco last Friday, giving up only one hit and fanning 14. He didn't issue a single walk, although one batter was hit by a pitch.

So strong was his hurling that Cisco had only two base runners all night — one of which was erased for the third out in the third frame. Windham faced only 22 batters, one more than regulation for seven innings.

Harris' fourmaster in the second inning put Baird ahead, with the winners adding two more in the fourth including Barton's round-tripper.

The other two runs came home in the fifth.

Baird will open the second go-round Monday night at Albany, a team the locals have already tamed by a 9-4 count. Next home game for the league-leaders will be next Thursday night against Gorman.

Isadore Grimes, a fourth grade teacher in Baird Elementary School is attending a new math workshop at Hardin-Simmons University from June 22 until July 10.

## Insecticide Use Requires Care

Insecticides for use around the home come in many different formulations, each with specific uses and better suited for certain jobs than the other, says Callahan County Agent Pat C. Garner.

Insecticides may be used in several different ways, depending on the type of job to be done. Some of the more popular ways to use insecticides are as dusts, wettable powders, soluble powders, emulsifiable concentrates, oil solutions, granulated materials and aerosols and spray bombs.

Special types of insecticide formulations may include baits, insecticide-herbicide mixtures, insecticide-fertilizer mixtures, and moth-proofing agents says Garner.

The county agent emphasizes that directions for use of all insecticides be followed closely. Such things as dosage, time and rate of application, crops or livestock which are to be treated and waiting periods between treatment and harvest should be completely understood and followed, stresses Garner. Insecticides are essential in today's agriculture, but they can be hazardous if used carelessly.

For more detailed information on use of insecticides for specific insects, the county agent's office, located in the courthouse, has bulletins and guides which are free for the asking.

## Monahans Sandhills Park Holds Rugged Attraction to Tourists

If you are traveling through West Texas on U. S. Highway 80, you will find unique recreational opportunities at Monahans Sandhills State Park, located five miles east of Monahans.

Monahans can be reached by State Highway 18. The primary attraction of the park is the 3,940 acres of wind-sculptured sandhills. Seventy-foot mountains of pure sand enjoyed by young and old, beckon visitors from afar.

Sculptured dunes, constantly changing with the wind, cover 15 square miles. The park is a fascinating duplicate of Sahara dunes, where you can ride "sand buggies" roller coaster style.

Plant and animal life in the park have adapted to the peculiar environment of the sandhills. Miniature oak trees that seldom reach a height over three feet struggle to maintain roots in the shifting sands, while wild flowers that grow at the edge of the sand dunes would do justice to the finest cultivated flower beds.

Because of the abundance of water in the sandhills, the Indians lived in the area for thousands of years. Amateur archeologists continue to find many artifacts that were covered by the shifting sands. Visitors occasionally find fossils and bones of prehistoric animals and there are rumors of buried gold from a wagon train massacre in frontier days.

The Section House Saloon lends a "Western touch" to the area. It is located 1.6 miles north of the park entrance. Here one may obtain soft

drinks, snacks and curios behind the swinging barroom doors.

The park is open daily throughout the year.

The Sandhills Museum, a modern stone and glass building that spans two sand dunes, is located just inside the entrance to the park. There you will find displays of art, science, nature, crafts and antiques.

For those who like to picnic there are shelters to provide shade, barbecue grills, and tables. Campers are also invited to spend the night in the sandhills.

## Counselors For Youth Needed

W. A. Hazelwood, office manager of the Abilene office of the Texas Employment Commission, urges Texans of both sexes with college degrees and an interest in youth, to apply at the TEC office for one of the 250 counseling positions to be filled in preparation for a concerted state-federal effort to upgrade the work skills and employability of disadvantaged youth.

"The success of this intensive effort to motivate and to rehabilitate thousands of Texas youth who are unskilled and unemployed will depend to a great extent upon the caliber of the counselors we are able to recruit to work with them," Hazelwood said.

In pilot projects it has been discovered that young counselors in their early twenties often do a superior job of working with school drop-outs and other troubled youth. For this reason, Hazelwood urges recent college graduates who enjoy working with youth to apply for one of these challenging positions. Applicants of all ages are needed and are urged to apply, however.

"No experience is required, and your degree can be in any field," Hazelwood stated, adding that selection will be based on interviews, personal and professional references, and a written examination to be given at the Abilene office on June 27.

## Penetrating Spray Is Required To Protect Cattle Against Flies

For effective control of flies in the beef cattle herd, Pat C. Garner, Callahan County agent, says to use a spray rig that will "blast" the chemical under the cattle's hair.

"A light, misting spray won't do the job," Garner said. "Much of the spray will evaporate after it lands on the cattle and, more important, there is only slight penetration down to the skin."

To get good results, Garner says to use spraying equipment that will give 200 pounds of pressure. A high-volume piston pump is the best, he said. The higher pressure pumps will force the spray to the skin of the cattle, killing insects that feed on blood.

Garner recommends moving the cattle around in the pen to get more of them into the high-pressure range of the nozzle. Because greater amounts of spray are used in this "pour-it-on" spraying, there will appear to be excessive waste. However, the county agent believes the method is more effective than misting the cattle.

For herds too small to justify good spraying equipment, dusting with five percent Malathion or 10 percent Methoxychlor

can give low-cost, easy control. Apply about one tablespoon on each animal back and rub it lightly over the hair, he said.

Most of the spray compounds available are effective, Garner said. But he suggests that purchases be made from reliable dealers. To get the best value, he suggests buying on the basis of chemical contents rather than for brand names.

As with all chemicals, the county agent emphasizes that the directions for use should be followed carefully. He cautions against careless handling of the chemicals and reminds stockmen that use of many insecticides must be discontinued a specific number of days before slaughter.

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A booklet, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry" (MP-691) is available at the county agricultural extension office, Garner said.
