There was a set-up meeting last Thursday morning at Mitchell's Restaurant at Seymour for District 11-A basketball. Superintendent E. A. Youngblood was re-elected chairman of the Dist. and W. S. Thomas of Holliday was re-elected District Secretary.

District 11-A is again divided into two zones, east and west. Rules and regulations were set-up by the group and schedules were advanced for the coming basketball season.

Jr. High zone tournaments for girls and boys in both east and west zones will be played the first week in February. The west zone tournament will be played at Crowell. There will be a one-game

play-off between the east and west zones, and this is slated for the second week in February.
