## Farmers, Civic Leaders Plan Cover Crop Campaign

### County Judge Speaks At Local Lions Club

County Judge L. A. Parker of Benjamin spoke at the Knox City Lions Club meeting Wednesday on "What Goes With Your Tax Money."

Judge Parker said the costs of operating a county government are in direct proportion to the population of the county, hence another county with the same tax evaluation, but with less population, might be less than the cost of operating Knox County.

He cited law enforcement, salaries of courthouse workers, and charity cases as among the biggest items of expense, giving the example that last year, the county paid more than \$6,000 in hospital bills for charity cases. In addition, he said, doctor bills, drug bills and food for charity cases possibly cost another \$1,500.

Despite the fact that tax renditions in the county increased about \$1,000,000 last year because of oil development, Parker said, the county commissioners "are hard put to stay within the income of the county."

The judge said the county's finances and expenditures are open to inspection by the public, and issued an invitation to Lions and others to visit the courthouse and examine the records.

Visitors at the club today were W. P. White, new owner of White Auto Store in Knox City, Tom Bullington, Knox County Attorney, Coaches David Slaughter and Norman Hickok, and Dickey Cross and Monroe Thomas, co-captains of the Knox City football team.

Lion President Jeff Graham announced that Tail Twister Otis Harbert is in charge of the program for next Wednesday. Harbert said he had obtained an outstanding program, but refused to divulge any details.

## Possible Change in Rural Routes Draws Strong Protests From Patrons

Knox Citizens living on Rural Route No. 1 were protesting loudly this week over the possibility that the two Knox City routes might be combined and a number of patrons of Route 1 transferred to a route out of another postoffice.

According to reports, a postal inspector last week investigated the advisability of eliminating Route 1, where a vacancy now exists. Thirty-five families would be transferred to a Monday route, while the remainder would be combined with Route 2, giving Rural Carrier Chad Wilson a 75-mile route.

A vacancy exists on Route 1 since the resignation of Ben-ton Anderson. C. E. Williams is serving as carrier on a temporary basis, and an examination has been called to fill the vacancy.

Among those who would be transferred from the Knox City route are M. S. Lowrey, Cleve Angle, Morris Denton, Eli Williamson and J. L. Stephens.

Mr. Williamson strongly objected to the change, saying he had been getting his mail on Knox City Route 1 since 1916, and doesn't want to change now.

Main objection to the change is the prospect that some patrons on the Knox City route would not get their mail until about 3:30 in the afternoon. "We haven't had service that poor," one patron said, "since the carriers used horses and carts."

The boys have been in high spirits during work-outs this week, the coaches said, and are in good shape for their first home game tonight (Thursday) when they play the Stamford I team on the local field.

Although they lost to Rochester last Thursday night, 27-18 Coach Slaughter believes the Stamford Pups may be one of the strongest teams the Greyhounds will face this season. He urged fans to turn out and give the local lads their support.

**Farm & Ranch Notes**

By W. J. BRYAN  
Knox County Agent

I was called the other day by Welton Leflar, of Munday, to look at some cotton he had that was shedding all its leaves. Mr. Leflar has an irrigated farm about a mile and a half south-east of Munday.

I had never seen any cotton affected like his was, but according to information I had, it looked like Verticillium Wilt.

In order to be sure of what it was, I took some samples and sent them to L. S. Bird, Plant Pathologist of A & M College. Mr. Bird said that it was definitely Verticillium Wilt.

Verticillium Wilt is caused by a soil-borne fungus which can persist in the soil over long periods of time. It has been found in all the cotton-growing states. Although it is a relatively new cotton disease, it is now considered one of the most serious, particularly in the irrigated areas of the Southwest.

Verticillium affects the cotton plant in all stages, from seedling to maturity. The most outstanding symptom of the disease is the development of chlorotic and brown areas on the leaves, which gives them a distinctive mottled appearance. When young plants are attacked they are often killed outright, but older plants may survive the entire season, shedding their leaves and sending up new growth near the base of the plants. The woody part of the roots and stalk turns brown as the disease progresses up-

ward through the entire plant. When Verticillium Wilt is spotted, you should pull up all the infested stalks and burn them. This has definitely been proven effective in confining the disease to a small area.

The disease does not develop if the soil temperature is 78 degrees F. or above. Mid-season irrigation reduces the soil temperature, and that is why it is worse on irrigated land than on dry land.

Planting cotton in high beds has helped keep the soil temperature up and reduced the severity of the disease.

It seems that is about all the control we have until a resistant variety is developed. Intensive breeding programs are now underway and considerable progress has been made in obtaining varieties tolerant to this disease.

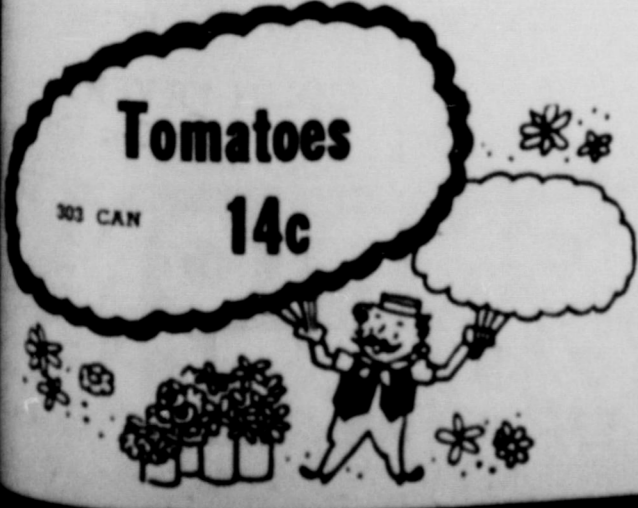

**Legumes Should Be Planted Now, County Agent Says**

Now that wheat controls are in effect, it is a good time for Knox County farmers to build up their soil and increase their per acre income. County Agent W. J. Bryan said this week.

Legumes used in combination with other good farming practices, he said, can boost yields and put extra dollars in farmers' pockets.

"Legumes, when properly inoculated, can add nitrogen to your soil, as well as improve texture and increase organic matter in the soil. Research workers of the Texas Experiment Station in an 11 year study have found that the top growth of Hairy Vetch contains an average of 102 pounds of nitrogen an acre. Legumes are the only plants which have the ability to take nitrogen from the air and store it in the plant, but must be inoculated with the proper nitrogen-fixing bacteria before they can do this.

"Legumes, like other crops, require proper fertilization for maximum growth. A soil analysis should be used to determine fertilizer needed, but for most soils in Knox County, 200-300 pounds of super-phosphate should be used."

"Hairy Vetch and Austrian Winter Peas, the county agent added, are two legumes that will do a good job in the county this winter. They should be planted from September 15 to Nov. 15. Proper planting is about 15 pounds of vetch per acre, and about 30 pounds of Austrian Winter Peas.
