

August 29 has been designated as Trades Day for Brownsville by the Retail Merchants' Association.

Cotton picking is now general throughout Washington County and both grade and staple compare well with the product of the past two years.

Jefferson county commissioners bave Increased taxes & cents on the \$100 valuation. To take care of the \$2,000, 000 road bond issue the total state and county taxes will be \$1,630,000 on a valuation of \$92,000,000.

Plans are being perfected for the Jackson County fair to be held at Edna on November 10 and 11. The various committees are hard at work and before long the plan for the entire twodays' fair will be mapped out.

The contract for rebuilding the portion of the bridge over the Brazos on the Hempstead Belville road, which was washed away by the May flood has been let for \$16,000, of which amount Waller County is to pay \$6,000. Austin County \$6,000, and the sta e \$4,

The railroad commission has authorized a rate of 18c per 100 pounds, minimum weight 3,600 pounds per car, on east fron pipe and connections from Lufkin to Beaumon. Chalson, Orange, Port Arthur, West Port Arthur, Port Neches, Houston and Galveston, effective Sept. 5.

Grain exports through Galveston and Journal. Texas City for the first fifteen days of August totaled 2,294,506 bushels, almost twice as much as was exported from these ports during the entire month of July, according to figures compiled from clearance statements at the custom house. The July total from both ports was 1,447,417 bushels.

The state board of control has rejected all bids for coal and fuel oil, believing the prices quoted too high and that with the settlement of the coal strike lower quotations will be had. The board will purchase emergency fuel where necessary, but expects to open new bids in about two weeks at a date yet to be fixed.

RAIL AGREEMENT IS ABOUT EFFECTED

EXECUTIVES AND BROTHERHOOD CHIEFS UNDERSTOOD TO HAVE COMPROMISED.

NEW PLANS FOR SENIORITY

Strikers Will Take Rights Behind Men Who Stayed on Job, Ahead of New Empoyes.

New York-Railroad executives and chiefs of the big five brotherhoods have agreed on a compromise proposal for settling the strike of shop-men, it was indicated after an ali-day session Friday. The conference adjourned to meet at an unfixed date naxt week.

Meanwhile, the brotherhood chiefs will discuss with the shopmen the proposals on seniority that were put forward, and the committee of executives will confer with the other rail-road heads. It was intimated that a vote of the complete membership of the Association of Railway Execu-tives would be required.

After a session Friday morning the brotherhood chiefs, who are acting as mediators, conferred with beads of the shop crafts unions. Another session was held during the

The nature of the proposals on seniority was not revealed. They are understood, however, to call for the return of the shopmen with seniority rights behind men who remained on the job, but ahead of new men em-ployed. This would be a concession from each side. The executives have insisted that the new men should have first rights in seniority, and that returning strikers should go back as new men. Shopmen have held out for full retention of their seniority rights.

All parties to the conference are carefully refraining from discussion. Bert M. Jewell, leader of the shop-men, said that the situation is a delicate" one, and declined to comment. Spokesmen for the executives would go so further than intimating guardedly that they were optimistic

Paris.-The reparations commission is to send to Herlin delegates to confer directly in the German capital with Chancellor Wirth and other officials on the reparations problem. The delegation will consist of Sir John Bradkury, British member of the reparations commission, and Eugene Manciere, president of the allied commission on guaranties, and two experts. The party will leave Parts for

Morlin at once.





Boil and seal in bottles. Blackberries, loganberries, or any fruit may be thus treated.
