Cotton Classing Report

Excellent harvesting weather has helped put the USDA Cotton Classing Office at Munday about 5 days behind. According to John E. Williams, Officer-in-Charge, 6,632 samples were classed during the week ending November 6, 1970. The season's total now stands at 10,750 samples. Most of the sample receipts continue to be from Haskell County.

The predominant grades were as follows: 41 with 23 per cent; 32 with 37 per cent; and 42 with 31 per cent. Staple lengths stayed about the same with 29's making up 28 per cent of the total. Forty-four per cent was 30's, 8 per cent was 31's, and 16 per cent was one-inch or longer.

Micronaire readings continue to be high but show a slight decrease over last week. Fifty-five per cent of the cotton miked 3.5 through 4.9, 37 per cent was 5.0 through 5.2, and 8 per cent was 5.3 and higher.

Buyer demand is still strong especially in the lower grades and staples. Producers received from 250 to 400 points above CCC loan prices for the predominant qualities.

ABILENE OFFICE
Sample receipts continue to pour in at the USDA Cotton Classing Office Abilene, Texas. Officer-in-Charge B. B. Manly Jr., reports that 29,000 samples were classed for the week ending November 6, 1970 compared to 1,200 for the same period last season. The season's total is now 55,800 samples classed compared to 24,200 for a season's total a year ago.

Sixteen per cent of the cotton classed was in the white category, 81 per cent was light spotted and 3 per cent was spotted. The predominant grade was 32 at 48 per cent.

Predominant staple lengths were 30, 47 per cent and 29, 29 per cent.

Micronaire readings showed 75 per cent in the premium range.

Pressley or strength readings showed 83 per cent reading 80,000 PSI (pounds per square inch) and better.

The Consumer and Marketing Service, Abilene reports average gross prices for some predominant qualities are: 3229 brought 20.70¢; 3230 brought 21.05¢; 4229 brought 20.20¢; 4230 brought 20.50¢.
