A number of state, county, and local officials were elected or re-elected to their respective offices in last Tuesday's general election, but due to our Tuesday afternoon deadline and the lack of space on the chart which was run in last week's paper, non-contested races were omitted.

The Knox County totals were as follows: Ramsey, 1550; Pope, 1518; Walker, 1507; Denton, 1512; Onion, 1514; Roberts, 1507; Hightower, 1482; and McCloud, 1454.

Sam E. Cloots was re-elected as County Judge with 1504 votes, Zena Waldron as County-District Clerk with 1514, and J. T. Cypt as County Treasurer with 1484.

Guy Bradley was elected Justice of the Peace, Precinct No. 5 with 247 votes while incumbent Ken Crownover received nine write-ins.

In general, he explained, the

family must lack decent, safe and sanitary housing, must be unable to obtain credit from other sources and must have sufficient income to repay the loan, pay taxes and insurance, maintain the house and meet other living expenses. Family income, however, may not exceed limits established by FHA.

The county supervisor said loans may be made to farm-owners, nonfarm tract owners, rural residents or nonrural residents with low to moderate incomes who work in a rural area. The home may be on a farm, in open country or in towns under 5,000 population that are rural in character and not adjacent to an urban area.

"From now on, builders, developers and others in the home building and financing fields can work directly with prospective borrowers to 'package' applications for rural housing loans," Boone said.

"Participation in the packaging program," he added, "will be limited to those who can provide all the necessary information about the home, assure its delivery at a specified price, and can work directly with the applicant family."

He explained that the packager will assemble reliable information on the applicant and the home he wants to buy, build or improve. They will submit the data on forms supplied through the local Farmers Home Administration office at Knox City. When the information about the building and applicant is complete, the loan can be approved and funds made available by the FHA.

Families residing in communities of 5,500 population or under are eligible to apply for FHA loans. They must be unable to obtain adequate credit from private sources. Approved borrowers receive direct financing through FHA.

"The first step for prospective packager is to meet with the FHA county supervisor to obtain detailed information about eligibility requirements for a loan and the type and cost of homes the agency can appropriately finance," Boone said.

Science Dept. News

Students in Advanced Biology had their last frog lab on Thursday.

The lab involved the study of nerve tissue.

Nerve tissue they found, is composed of specialized cells called neurons and their function is to transmit impulses from one part of the body to another.

The neuron can be divided into three general areas which are the central cell body, this is the broad expanded part of the cell. Next are the dendrites, these are short branched fibers that extend from the central body. Last are the axons, these are unbranched fibers and usually much longer than the dendrites.

There were two slides made of the nerve tissue. The first slide was made of nerve tissue obtained from the spinal cord and was stained with silver nitrate so that the cells could appear black or dark gray. The students made a second slide and obtained the nerve tissue from the brain. This slide was also stained with silver nitrate.

From the slides, the students made a close comparison of the cell shape and size of the nerve tissue.
