Mr. Wilham Jennings Bryan has announced his candidacy for the U. S. Senate from Florida. His great, sober mind should have a fine influence in our national senate. His thinking capacity and ripe experience will fit him, as perhaps no other American citizen for that important position. He will find no trouble in taking first rank in the deliberations of his colleagues.

About one half inch of rain fell over Knox City territory Saturday night which halted cotton picking for a short time but was a great benefit to wheat and fall. Considerable wheat is being sown on account of the fine seasons and in order to keep up the diversification plan that is now well organized and which is recognized as the only system that will keep the price of cotton above the cost of production.

Roscoe Ady, industrial commissioner of the chamber of commerce of Forth Worth recently made a trip through the East and on his return states that a chain of cotton mills is a business possibility. He asserts that Eastern capitalists will make a thorough investigation of conditions in Texas this winter with the intention of establishing such mills if the outlook is favorable. Manufacturing industries are gradually coming to the end and soon shall put an end the long haul of raw material and the accompanying high commissions for handling this raw material as well as the finished product. There is no sensible reason why we should send our cotton to England or even the New England States of America to have it made into cloth and sewed into garments. The south is the logical place for the mills and some day we will have them and will have no more dull seasons.

The building of churches and pastors' homes is a mighty fine thing and we should never stop until all denominations are represented and every pastor comfortably housed. But along with this splendid program we should not neglect the building of private homes to the end that all who care to may make their homes with us. There has been a scarcity of dwellings in Knox City for the past three years and there is still a scarcity. Knox City could now enjoy a substantial growth if sufficient quarters could be arranged to accommodate the incomers. Someone may ask why not each one build his own home. But that never has been done and perhaps never will be done. If the towns which have enjoyed rapid growth had waited for such building they would never have received their growth. It is the ambition of everyone to assist in making his town a bigger better, cleaner one in which to live and in order to do this some farsighted individuals must provide for this growth by building homes for those who would stop in our midst.

DOWN WORN BY JOHN WESLEY

English Wesleyan Body Receives Gift of Robe That Belonged to Founder of Methodism.

The Wesleyan Methodist Connection has just received from one of its leading laymen a gown that belonged to the founder of Methodism, according to the London Daily News. John Wesley died in 1791, so that the garment is more than 130 years old.

Time has, of course, left its marks upon the gown. Some parts are discolored and others are worn and patched. The material is heavy, and upon it, worked in black, are flowers and prancing horses. As the great preacher was a little man, the gown must have hung about his heels.

It is claimed that the gown was a preaching gown, but it is very dissimilar to the ecclesiastical garment that, according to authentic records, John Wesley wore in the pulpit. This one possesses an ordinary sleeve, and, generally speaking, it seems to accord with the style of a black study-gown. The donor of the gown has also presented a pair of slippers belonging to Wesley. These are in good condition, and are of the kind that he would wear in his study.

Wesley, of course, traveled throughout Great Britain and Ireland in all weathers on his preaching tours, and it was suggested that he wore this heavy gown as a protection against atmospheric conditions.

The Wesley museum contains a large number of interesting relics of John and Charles Wesley. It possesses the study chair of John, and, presently, as a gift from the donor of the gown, Charles Wesley's study chair will be placed there.

A large proportion of the visitors to the museum come from the overseas dominions and the United States where the interest in all that relates to the early history of Methodism is very keen.

MODELS SABER-TOOTH TIGER

Los Angeles Man Has Fashioned a Reproduction of Most Terrible Prehistoric Beast.

Gone from the earth before the contract was let for the Pyramids, the ferocious and all-devouring saber-toothed tiger that ruled the animal kingdom 200,000 years ago has no secrets from the scientists of today, and a Los Angeles man even has gone so far as to sculpture in concrete what he considers to be a perfect reproduction of the terrible monster with the sabered mouth.

The scientist, William Spalding, has the sculptured piece in the workshop at his residence. He was president of the Southern California Academy of Science for four terms, and in that capacity he had occasion to learn as much about the saber-toothed tiger as men of today are permitted to know.

He was instrumental in opening the famous fossil beds at Brea, where the remains of the tigers were found in good enough preservation to reconstruct the skeletons.

From the relics of the skeletons, uncovered in the Brea pits, he has concluded that the tigers of 200,000 years ago were similar in size to the Bengals of today, differing essentially from them in their outstanding feature—the long saber teeth from which no enemy could be safe.

With the skeleton remains of the tigers sufficiently reproduced to outline the forms and physical characteristics of the tigers, Mr. Spalding found little difficulty in making a likeness of the animal. In his art work he has reproduced the skeleton proportions and added the external characteristics of the cat family, whereby he believes a perfect copy has been accomplished of the fire-eyed feline demon that roamed supreme in the days before man was.—Los Angeles Express.

BLACKBIRD IN THRUSH'S NEST

Correspondent of Scottish Newspaper Calls Attention to Remarkable Incident He Has Observed.

Last week I discovered in the ivy on a sunk-wall in my garden a nest which had all the characteristics of a thrush's nest, with plastered lining only, and which contained two eggs, pale blue with small black spots—the eggs of a song thrush, writes a correspondent. Later on I noticed a bird sitting on the nest. Only the head was visible, but it appeared to me that the bird was a hen blackbird and not a thrush. It was some days before I found the bird of the nest, when on looking in, I discovered that the plastered lining of the nest had been slightly covered with dried grasses, and that the nest contained four blackbird's eggs—bluish green with mottled ends. The two thrush's eggs had disappeared. They could not be found at the foot of the wall below the nest, but there was found on a green above the wall the broken egg of a song thrush. When I discovered the nest part of its outer wall was slightly torn, as if a cat had climbed up the ivy and endeavored to claw out the bird then sitting. Is it possible that the thrush may have been scared away and the nest taken over by a blackbird and adapted to her requirements? None of my friends, versed in the habits of birds, ever heard of a similar case.—Edinburgh Scotsman.

Seeing Without Eyes.

That the blind can perceive light and darkness is asserted by Dr. A. Cantonnnet in Medicine (Paris) Doctor Cantonnnet tested eyeless seeing machinery by bandaging his eyes light proof and concentrating his attention for 50 hours on perception of light. He found that he could then perceive not merely light and darkness but also large and shining objects.

Testing many blind persons, he found the same ability. He attributes the vision without eyes to Roemer's sensory cells, which have a nerve connection with the brain centers.

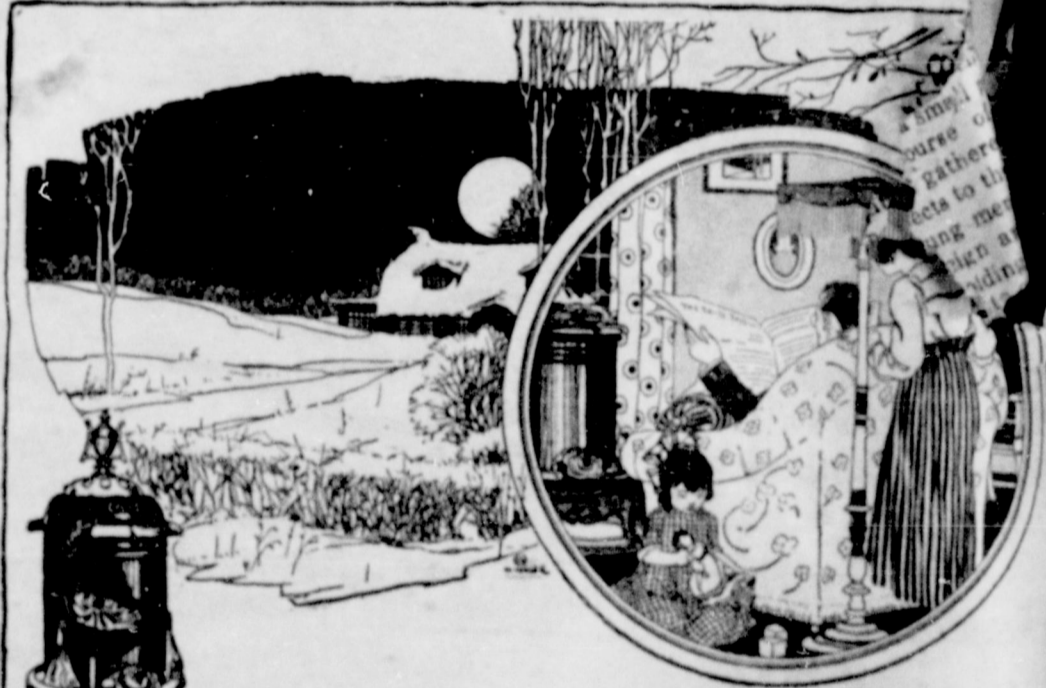

High School Tag Day

The High School students met last week to consider plans for putting Athletic Association on a sound financial basis. Some suggested that money be borrowed, others suggested that a credit basis be used until gate receipts would meet the expenses. It was finally decided to raise money by having a Tag Day, in which the classes in three divisions would sell the tags. There will be three colors, one for the Seventh grade, one for the Eighth and Eleventh and a third for the Ninth and Tenth. The representative from each of these divisions will start at 8 o'clock Saturday morning and will be relieved by a second set at 12 o'clock. There will be no set price for the tags, the buyer paying any price he cares to pay.

The money raised in this way, along with money paid by the students themselves toward their equipment, will be used in outfitting the football, basketball, baseball and track teams. The students are planning a minstrel for the near future the proceeds of which will go to the Athletic Association.

The Association fund will buy equipment that will be the permanent property of the school, so that next year's teams will find the equipment ready for play. Any surplus from gate receipts will go to this fund, to be called the permanent Athletic fund, to keep the association on a steady cash basis.
