Noted Archeologist To Give Lectures At Methodist Church



That archeological discoveries in Palestine and Egypt in recent years will prove the truthfulness and accuracy of the Bible will be revealed in a series of lectures at the Knox City Methodist Church January 9-16. Rev. Walter Driver, pastor, has announced. Dr. J. O. Kinnaman, Ph.D., D.D., Presbyterian minister and researcher, will give nightly lectures on Holy Land archeology, and will show film slides of the work of excavators and the artifacts brought up. "Dr. Kinnaman spent 40 years as a field archeologist in the Holy Lands," Rev. Driver said. "He is the author of four books on Holy Land archeological discoveries, and is in the process of writing three more." Dr. Kinnaman is also editor and publisher of the Bible Archeological Digest, issued quarterly, which gives a minute and up to date account of the latest archeological findings in the Holy Land. The series of lectures will be open to the public of the entire Knox City area, Rev. Driver said. Week-day services will be at 7:30 p. m., Sunday services at 11 a. m. and 7 p. m.

School Board Makes Plans for Collection of Delinquent Taxes

The resignation of Mrs. R. A. Young as fourth grade teacher was accepted during the regular meeting of the Knox City School Board Tuesday night. Mrs. Young's resignation will become effective January 14. The resignation of H. C. Lusk as custodian was also accepted and the board appointed W. H. Waggoner to replace him. During the meeting, members of the board authorized the school tax assessor-collector, John A. Smith, to place an advertisement in the Knox County Herald notifying citizens that current taxes are due Feb. 1. On and after that date penalty and interest will be assessed, it was reported by Supt. Charles E. Silk. The board also approved a delinquent tax roll as worked up and presented by the assessor-collector, and machinery was set up for the collection of about \$7,000 in delinquent taxes.

lytic polio," Mr. O'Connor stated that "this factor, plus the large number of patients still needing help, means that fighting polio is a bigger job now."

"I know that parents are anxiously waiting for the answer," Mr. O'Connor said. "The scientific evaluation job of the vaccine developed by Dr. Jonas E. Salk is a time-consuming and precise job involving detailed records on 1,830,000 children who either were vaccinated or are acting as controls."

The Poliovirus Vaccine Evaluation Center at the University of Michigan is now studying data on children in 14,000 schools in the 217 study areas.

Twenty-seven laboratories are processing and testing some 40,000 blood samples taken from participating children to determine the amount of protective antibodies against polio present in their bloodstreams.

Before the evaluation can put the jigsaw pieces of information together and give an answer, all data must be entered on the children's record cards, then analyzed. This process cannot be hurried, Mr. O'Connor said.

What if the evaluation report proves the vaccine to be effective? If the vaccine evaluation report is negative or inconclusive, March of Dimes-financed vaccine research will be intensified. The National Foundation research program has not been halted during the evaluation.

"Fear thou not; For I am with thee; be not dismayed; for I am thy God: I will strengthen thee; yea, I will help thee; yea, I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness." (Isa. 41:10).
