

Ed Shaver Enters Race for County Commissioner

Politics in Knox City's local county precinct was given a shot in the arm Wednesday, when Ed Shaver, well-known resident of this community for the past 31 years, announced his candidacy for the office of County Commissioner, Precinct No. 1, subject to the action of the Democratic primary in July.

While presently serving as a city commissioner for Knox City, this is Mr. Shaver's first announcement for an elective county office. He has been president of the local school board in past years, and active in all community and civic affairs. In making his announcement, Mr. Shaver said he did so only after careful consideration of the responsibilities and duties connected with the office he seeks.

"I firmly believe I can make the people of this precinct a good commissioner, with the best interest of the precinct and the county always at heart. Having lived here most of my life and reared my family here, I am well acquainted with what constitutes the office I am running for. I believe I have the experience and business ability to properly and impartially perform these duties," Mr. Shaver said.

At one time in the ginning business here, Mr. Shaver presently operates farming interest. He said he would make an active campaign and attempt to see all precinct voters before the July primary.

City Faces Acute Water Shortage

Dry weather effects everybody and everything, it seems. In view of the water shortage staring Knox City in the face, Mayor Roy Baker and city commissioners have made the following statement:

Knox City is experiencing its first water shortage since the installation of the present system, due to an increasing demand and a diminishing supply. The two city wells are as strong as ever, except that the water level has dropped four feet due to the prolonged dry weather. This condition is not unusual, and has occurred before when the rainfall has been light over extended periods.

Then, why the shortage? It seems that Knox City has had growing pains for the past two years, with more and more people wanting to buy water. More than 100 new water customers have been added during the past 18 months. All customers are trying to keep alive their parched gardens and lawns.

Coupled with the heavy demand here, is the demand of our good neighbor on the north. Benjamin has been completely out of water for several months and Knox City, following the good neighbor policy, has been endeavoring to supply them with water loaded in tank cars and shipped by rail.

The general public is urged to conserve their water and not waste it. Use the water sparingly and make every bit count.

Efforts have already been made to obtain an additional supply locally. Engineers have been employed and are now working on plans for a new and larger well that will take care of a much larger populace. Until construction can be made and a new system put in operation, your city government pleads for your indulgence and co-operation.

Benjamin C of C Report Shows Big Gain In Utilities

Twenty-seven members of the Benjamin Chamber of Commerce met in the District court room last Tuesday, April 9, at 7:30 p. m.

F. A. Robinette, district manager of the Southwestern Associated Telephone Company in Seymour, told the group that extension of telephone lines in the city of Benjamin would be made as soon as material was available, and that a few new telephones had been added recently. Mr. Robinette stated that Benjamin would be placed on the dial system some time in the future.

Mayor A. E. Ball gave a report as to the prospective water supply for Benjamin, and stated that all activity would be resumed when a report is received from the State Health Department as to the quality and hardness of the water. Mr. Ball also stated that efforts were being made to enforce the stock law and that all loose stock would be placed in the city pound when found.

A report was also given that delinquent tax bills were coming in very satisfactory, and that the financial condition of the city is improving.

Legion Rodeo Saturday Will Attract Hundreds To All-Day Program

Working like a hive of bees, officials of the rodeo association have pronounced the last detail worked out and everything set for the opening gun. Crews have installed a modern and ample lighting system at the grounds and plenty of light will be provided for the most meticulous cow-poke who likes to see what he is doing out there.

There will not be a shortage of contestants, judging from entries already received. Business houses have agreed to close for two hours during the afternoon show. They will shut their doors from 2 to 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Meals will be ready at the chuck wagon, and plenty of good western food has been provided.

A parade at 1:30, with all contestants participating, will inaugurate the big show starting at 2 o'clock. Ample parking space has been provided and everyone will have a chance to see the whole thing from beginning to end. The grounds are located just north of the Munday highway, in the east part of town.

Proceeds of the affair will go toward helping the Legion on its building fund. It is a community-minded affair and your patronage will evidence your civic pride.

As an extra attraction, a big prize has been offered for any bronc buster who will successfully ride the Palomino outlaw, "P-38." This famous horse, a product of Knox County, has bested the top riders wherever he has been put in a chute. At Fort Worth recently, he busted some of the top hands and was acclaimed the star of the bucking horse remuda there. Maybe some lucky rider will stay on him—but he had better be a good one before he gets on.

Good and fast calves have been secured for the roping events, and it will take a fast horse and a quick roper to hang one of them for best time. 

200 MILES TERRACING NOW IN USE IN LOCAL WICHITA-BRAZOS DISTRICT

A great deal of interest has been shown the last three months in terracing. During this time, close to 200 miles of terrace lines have been run by the Soil Conservation Service, assisting farmers and ranchers in the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District in carrying out its conservation program.

Approximately 175 of the 200 miles of terraces have been constructed and work will begin again after it rains.

Most of the terraces have been built by contractors with whirlwind terracers; a number of farmers have bought these machines and are doing their own work. This type of equipment is also good to maintain old terraces.

Terracing is only the first step in the district's coordinated plan for conservation and is no more important than any other practice the district has to offer. If other good soil improvement practices are not used, terraces alone will not improve the soil, but serves to hold the land in place and conserve moisture.

FARMERS ASKED TO CUT GRAIN FED TO LIVESTOCK

With dire need for more grain for human food abroad, farmers have been asked to cut down on feeding grain to livestock.

Survey reveal that hogs put on the market recently have averaged 20 pounds heavier than a year ago, and heavier than any other year of record. A bigger share of the cattle are coming to market highly finished. Milk cows are being fed grain and concentrates at record or near record rates. Hens are laying more eggs per hen than ever before.

HIGHWAY ENGINEER ASKS MOTORIST TO OBSERVE ROAD SIGNS, MARKINGS

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer today made a strong plea to motorists, urging them to more strictly observe the highway signs and markings to help reduce a mounting highway accident toll which threatens to take more lives than war.

"There are many physical hazards on our highway system and thousands of miles of our roads are obsolete and unable to adequately and safely accommodate the growing traffic burden," he said. "These deficiencies can only be remedied by redesigning and reconstructing which entails expenditure of large sums of money."

"Unfortunately, the funds are not available, and will not be available for many years, to make our highways as safe as they can be made from an engineering standpoint," he pointed out.

"Many collisions also may be attributed to mechanical defects in the vehicle, but despite these defects and the physical hazards of the road, a cautious driver can usually avoid trouble regardless of the condition of the vehicle or the highway."

"Head-on collisions and side-swiping accidents on our highways would be virtually eliminated by observance of our center stripe system," he said.

This system of marking prohibits a motorist from passing another when the auxiliary dashed line is on his side. The continuous center stripe should not be crossed except when one vehicle is passing another.

HEALTH LETTER

By proclamation of President Harry S. Truman, the month of April is Cancer Control Month throughout the nation. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, is asking each citizen to consider the danger signals and secure medical advice at the first appearance of any suspicious symptom. There are many causes of cancer; the most common form of which is chronic or prolonged irritation.

One of the questions often asked is whether or not cancer is hereditary in human beings. Tendencies to form cancer may possibly be inherited; however, since the method of inheriting such tendencies is obscure, the presence of cancer in one or both parents should be merely a cause of greater alertness in looking for and recognizing suspicious symptoms on the part of family members. There is no need of a fatalistic attitude. The facts concerning heredity do not justify them.

At the first warning signs recognized, consult your physician. The early symptoms are any sore that does not heal, particularly about the tongue, mouth or lips; a painless lump or thickening, especially in the breast, lip, or tongue; irregular bleeding or discharge from any natural body opening; progressive change in the size or color of a wart, mole, or birthmark; persistent indigestion; persistent hoarseness or difficulty in swallowing; and any change in normal bowel habits. See your doctor about any of these signals.

Early recognition of cancer symptoms will lead to early diagnosis and treatment, and in many cases the victim can be entirely cured and live out a normal life span.

COTTON GROWERS LOSE MILLIONS ANNUALLY IN THROWING AWAY BURS

Between ten and fifteen million dollars worth of cotton burs which could be processed into commercial products are being thrown away or burned each year in Texas, according to C. G. Rook, associate director of the chemical and textile phases of the Cotton Research Committee of Texas, located at Texas Technological College.

Commercial material economically procurable from cotton burs, research has shown, are a boiler water treating mixture which acts as a scale inhibitor in hard water; furfural, an important chemical compound; a building board substance; plastic filler; and fertilizer.

Furfural, one of the most important products obtainable from the cotton burs, has many various uses, including use in the synthesis of plastics, in fixing motor oils, in making aniline dyes, as a fungicide, and in the synthetic rubber industry in the recovery of butadiene. One Texas rubber plant alone uses approximately \$2500 worth of furfural daily.

ACCIDENTS KILL MORE THAN BIGGEST BATTLE

"The Battle of the Bulge in Europe in December, 1944, cost the Americans 60,000 casualties, killed, wounded and missing. For this nation that was the costliest engagement in World War II, yet in the long run, measured by the total dead or maimed in the battle was a mere scrimmage compared to the 'Battle of the Bumpers' here at home," stated Pierce Brooks, director of the State Safety Council recently.

"Automobiles will shortly be killing 60,000 persons a year. That would be 50 percent more than lost their lives in the last pre-war year. Never has it been more important for Texans to arm themselves with every knowledge at their command in order that accidents may be reduced, and remember that accident prevention starts at home and follows us to our office."

In seven out of ten fatal motor vehicle accidents, one or both drivers were violating a traffic law.



BETTER GRADE LINTS
IMPROVING SALES OF
SURPLUS COTTON

Fear of a cotton surplus, long haunting Cotton Belt farmers, is vanishing as the so-called surplus rapidly disappears, with many better grades of lint already scarce, according to A. L. Ward, of the National Cottonseed Products Association.

"Combined with the highest prices in two decades, the cotton supply situation offers our farmers in 1946 the strongest encouragement for increased production that they have had in many years," he pointed out. "Farmers, who recall the way, in which so-called surpluses of corn, wheat and other crops became shortages, can easily foresee the possibility that cotton supplies may soon be insufficient to meet the demand. "Cottonseed products, especially oil and feed products, are critically scarce and have been for a number of years, and the need is acute for increased production to meet American and foreign requirements for meats and fats."

Ward stated that value per acre of cotton was far above the average for other crops in most Cotton States last season, when yields were very low and prices less favorable than today; and that on the average, cotton is both the most dependable and valuable crop that most farmers can grow.

1500 SERVICEMEN AND WOMEN RECEIVING TECH CORRESPONDENCE COURSE

Over 1500 servicemen and women have received instruction by correspondence from the Division of Extension at Texas Technological College in cooperation with the United States Armed Forces Institute, according to J. H. Millikin, director.
