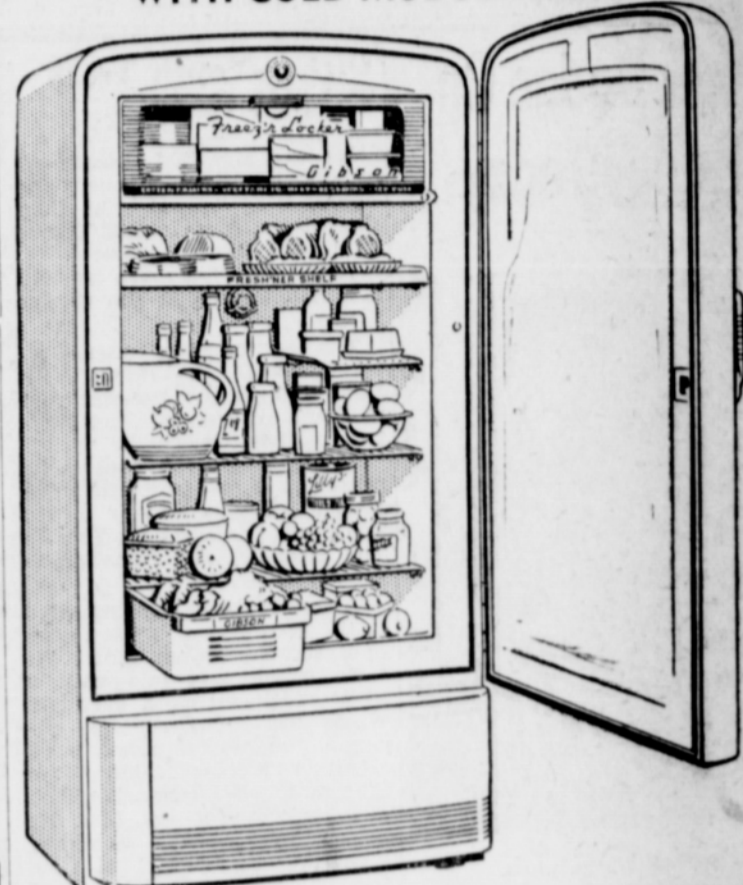

**SMALL TOWNS HAVE CHANCE OF SECURING INDUSTRY**

College Station — If your town is in the 1700 to 7500 population bracket or thereabout, chances of securing an industry are good. The 1700-7500 bracket is pointed out as one of the most sought-after by the industry of the United States.

Important industrial location factors will soon be available to the industry. Forms have been prepared and are being sent to the towns by the Management Engineering Department and through the Engineering Experiment Station, Texas A&M College.

When the forms have been filled in and returned to the Management Engineering Department they will reveal to industry the available locating factors to be found in the towns. This information will be made

available to inquiring industries. "However, it has been found that most industries are interested in such factors as nearness to market for the materials and the produce," says W. R. Downward of the Management Engineering Department. "Power cost, availability of labor, labor conditions and rates, climate, transportation facilities, water and sewer facilities, housing facilities, building and warehouse facilities, taxes, banking facilities, social facilities such as churches, schools and places of recreation are other important factors." Downward points out.

"These forms will be of much assistance to cities in evaluating local conditions and determining whether or not they are in a position to attract new industries," Downward says. "This is an opportunity for the cities to make their local advantages known to industry, since many inquiries are being received. The assistance of all chambers of commerce in preparing the forms was sought and given the Management Engineering Department."

"The past several years have witnessed a gradual realization of the part of communities that movements in industry are not regulated entirely by chance." Downward points out. "Communities have discovered that industry chooses locations according to certain very definite

location factors, and that those far-sighted enough to make data on these location factors available to industry have developed industrially more rapidly than the others."

**HEALTH FACTS**

Austin — As a safeguard against the serious and disabling disease known as undulant fever or Malta fever, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises Texans to drink milk only from approved sources. Undulant fever is usually acquired by human beings as a result of consuming raw milk or raw milk products from cows infected with Bang's disease.

Raw milk or milk products can be consumed with safety only when they are known to be produced by cows tested and found to be free of Bang's disease. Pasteurization, of course, will kill the germs if present.

To assist in lowering the incidence of undulant fever all dairymen should remove cattle infected with Bang's disease from their herds as soon as the disease is discovered. Even if the milk is made safe for human consumption by pasteurization, infected cows are still a menace to health since they can transmit the disease to healthy animals and to their owner and other persons who handle them.

"Undulant fever from cattle," Dr. Cox said, "is one health hazard we can eradicate in our State through absolutely safe milk supplies from dairy herds free from Bang's disease."

"Unless a herd is known to be free from this infection, only pasteurized milk should be used so that the disease cannot be passed on to the consumer of milk and dairy products."

**"SMART GIRLS" TAPPED-WIRE STORY, OPENS**

The Mayo-Bennett combo is new and proves interesting while Hutton emerges as the young doctor in a role bound to please his legion of fans. The drama is richly dressed and mounted, with the polished performances dominating the entire picture. Put "Smart Girls Don't Talk" down as something special in the way of exciting film fare.

Abilene — Ninety-two per cent of the student body, including every member of the Church of Christ, has contributed to the Development Fund at Abilene Christian College.

"Ninety-two per cent is an A grade in any college," said Don H. Morris, president of the college. "I believe our students have made some sort of record with this generous expression of their loyalty."

The gifts of 1,459 students totaled \$8,296.

By showing greatest degree of support of the fund, the Freshman class made good the challenge to upper classes by the Freshman president Paul Faulkner of Fort Worth. Faulkner was 1948 national schoolboy pole vaulting champion.

The college faculty already had contributed 100 per cent for a total of more than \$22,000.

Bill Decker, Abilene, student president, presented the student's gift to co-chairmen of the Development Fund at daily student assembly Feb. 1. F. O. Masten of Wellington and Sudan and B. Sherrod of Lubbock are the co-chairmen.

The 1949 objective of the Development Fund organization is \$1,037,000 including \$800,000 for endowment. The program calls for \$8,450,000 by 1969.

**GIRLS TO SHOW BEST OUTFITS IN DRESS REVUE**

Well, Texas 4-H Club girls won't be all dressed up in "but-ton and bows" when they model a costume of their own making in the forthcoming 1949 annual 4-H Dress Revue, but they will be wearing the most becoming styles in work, school and party clothes. Texas' acceptance of the program has been announced by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work. This activity is conducted under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service.

All the fun, excitement and accomplishment afforded by the Dress Revue -- to say nothing of the economy -- has made it one of the most popular contests among 4-H girls, according to reports of State Club leaders and the girls themselves. Based on a five-point plan, objectives of the 1949 program are, namely: (1) find out just what sort of clothes are needed; (2) acquire the know-how to plan, assemble and care for clothes; (3) learn what to wear and when -- all

within the family budget; (4) select costumes with an eye to individuality; (5) last, but not least, develop poise and habits of good grooming.

Again this year Simplicity Pattern Co. will provide all awards in the National 4-H Dress Revue program totaling \$11,180. They include silver medals for county winner and an all-expense trip to the 1949 National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago for state winner. All state winners modeling outfits in the Dress Revue presentation at the 4-H Club Congress will receive a handsome leather-cased scissors set.

Last year more than 7,300 girls throughout the state participated in the Dress Revue contest.

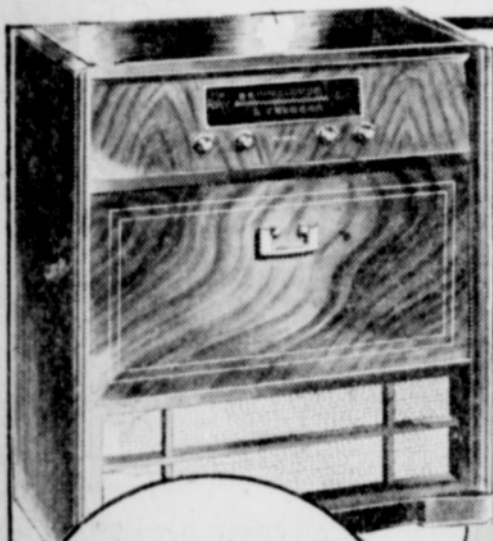

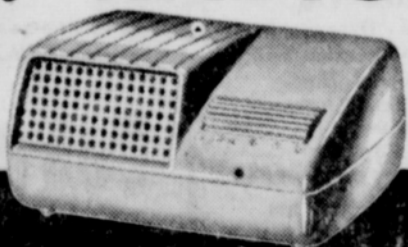

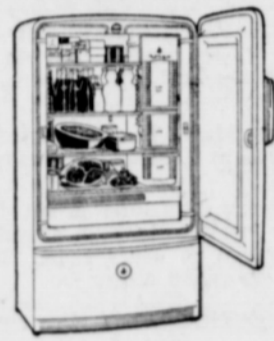
