Cotton Barnes passed 15 yards to Taber Bearden to climax an 80-yard drive for the Bears' first score. Halfback Mike Odom went 15 yards and he ran over the extra points for Baird's other touchdown in the second quarter.

Defensively, Bobby Ross, Don McBride, Johnny Rodriguez and Johnny Garcia were standouts for Baird while John Kinsey and Curtis Higginbotham led the Steers.

Baird made 14 first downs, attempted 5 passes and completed three, one for a touchdown. Robert Lee racked up 9 first downs, attempted 8 passes and completed 4.

"Your pharmacist keeps a supply of 2,500 lifesaving drugs in his prescription department for you. Each year, 400 new drugs are introduced for your family's health. Seventy per cent of drugs prescribed today were unknown only 10 years ago."

National Pharmacy Week is the outgrowth of a recommendation made in 1924 by the late Dr. Robert J. Ruth, who was at that time chairman of the APhA's Section of Practical Pharmacy.
