City To Apply For Street Paving Grant

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met Tuesday, May 28, in special session at the Munday City Hall.

Members present were Mayor Doris Dickerson and Aldermen Jessie Andrade, Richard Albus and Jessie Tucker. Garon Tidwell and Von Marr were not present.

Mayor Dickerson called the meeting to order. Minutes of the May 23, 1985 meeting were read. Albus moved minutes be approved as written. Andrade seconded; all voted in favor.

Mayor Dickerson stated the purpose of the meeting was to conduct a public hearing. An application will be made to the Texas Department of Community Affairs as set out below:

1. Amount of funds requested: \$400,000.00.

2. Amount of local funds to be provided: \$5,000.00.

3. Amount of other grant funds provided: None.

4. Project description: 30 blocks of paved streets with curb and gutter, including drainage improvements.

5. Area in which activities will take place: Scattered throughout the city.

6. The public was asked to comment at this point. No one came. The City Council expressed approval as outlined above and said it conforms with Public Hearing No. 1 comments.

7. Albus moved the City Council approve an application to the Texas Department of Community Affairs and Mayor Dickerson be authorized to sign the following resolution:

RESOLUTION

A resolution of the City Council

of the City of Munday, Texas authorizing the filing of an application with the Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA) for a Community Development Program grant.

Whereas, the City of Munday duly advertised, gave notice, and held two public hearings, as required, for the filing of the application for the FY '85 Community Development Program Grant; and

Whereas, the application grant funds, if approved, will be used for the project described as: 30 blocks of paved streets with curb and gutter including drainage improvements.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Munday, Texas:

Part 1: That the CDP application shall be submitted to the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

Part 2: That the Mayor is hereby authorized to submit the application and sign all necessary forms pertaining to said application.

Part 3: That the City of Munday is committing the following funds for the proposed project: Local, \$5,000.00; other, none; total, \$5,000.00.

Part 4: That this resolution shall take effect immediately from and after its passage.

Andrade seconded the motion to adopt the resolution. All members voted in favor; motion carried.

Andrade next moved that swimming pool tickets be raised to \$1.00 each and the pool operator be paid \$462.00 per month and the lifeguard be paid \$3.52 per hour. Tucker seconded; all members voted in favor.

Albus moved to adjourn. Andrade seconded. Meeting adjourned.

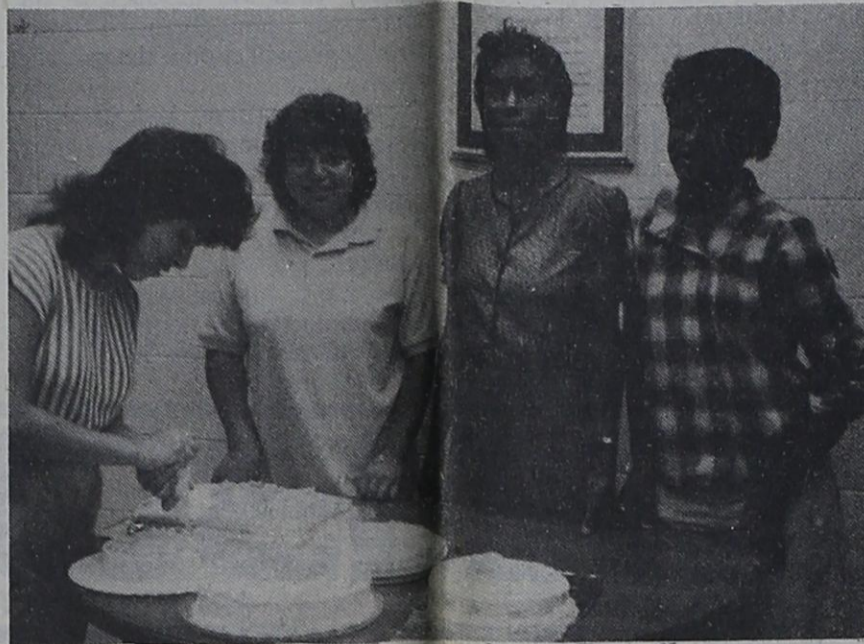

Record Wheat Crop Harvested In Area

A banner wheat crop in Knox County is virtually all out of the fields, and records were broken not only in the size of the crop but in the speed with which it was harvested.

Many of the harvest crews have left the area, and local combiners are left with the task of cutting the few remaining acres of wheat, most of which are still in muddy ground. Spokesmen for both elevators in Munday say it will be several days before all the mudholes are dry enough to bear the weight of a combine, and some of the wheat that received large quantities of rain this spring is not quite ripe.

The price for wheat was low this year, and big yields were a saving factor for most producers. At press time, local elevators were paying \$3 a bushel for grain. The moisture content in most of the area wheat was very low, with only a few

truckloads being docked for being too wet.

At Knox Prairie Seeds, Inc., most of the yields were running from the high 20's to low 30's, but Sonny Moore at Farmers Grain Co-op said he estimated an average of 37 to 45 bushels to the acre of wheat he received. Some yields reached as high as 50 bushels per acre.

Moore called 1985 a "record year" for wheat at his elevator - they received 54 million pounds, or 900,000 bushels of wheat. "One day we unloaded 234 trucks," he stated. "That's one every three and one-half minutes."

He also said he couldn't remember another wheat harvest in which such a large crop was harvested without a break caused by rain. The first loads of wheat were received in mid-May, but the bulk of the harvest began just before Memorial Day and has continued uninterrupted until this week.

At press time Tuesday, it had not been confirmed that the two incidents were related, but Abilene police expected to file car theft charges against the couple in Taylor County Monday. Police said the man is also suspected in recent Abilene robberies.

A black man and woman are being sought by local officers in connection with the robbery of the Goree Allsup's store Friday morning, and it is believed the pair may be charged with a car theft in Abilene and a shooting incident in Wichita Falls.

A woman described as being a black female, between 5'6" and 5'8" and weighing 160-180 pounds walked into the Goree convenience store at approximately 5:10 a.m. Friday, drew a gun on the attendant, Mrs. Glenda Decker, and ordered her into the restroom. After locking the door, the woman ransacked both registers, taking approximately \$182 in cash, some blank money orders and Mrs. Decker's purse, which contained a small amount of cash and her payroll check.

Mrs. Decker said she saw a black man outside when the woman came in, and it is believed he was an accomplice. The two were thought to have fled the scene on foot in an easterly direction. She described the gun as being a small chrome-plated automatic with brown handles.

Knox County Sheriff Gene Nix and Chief Deputy Greg Covey investigated the robbery.

A white 1967 Chevrolet was found later in the day by the sheriff, who was told by a Goree man that he had bought the car from a black couple for \$40. After running license checks on the vehicle, it was learned the car was stolen about 1 a.m. Friday in Abilene.

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Officers from Abilene, Wichita Falls and Knox County were working earlier this week to locate the couple.

Basil Amujiogu, a Midwestern State University exchange student from New Guinea, was shot about 10 p.m. Friday after he gave a black couple a ride in downtown Wichita Falls. He was listed in good condition at Bethania Hospital with a gunshot wound to the shoulder. Amujiogu told police he became suspicious after the couple said they did not want to be let out at the destination they had previously requested. He jumped from the car, then struggled with the woman in an attempt to get the keys, and the male suspect took the gun from the woman's purse and fired at Amujiogu. He described his assailants as a black male in his mid-twenties, 5'5", and a black female 5'8" and 160 pounds.

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Area Churches To Receive New Pastor

Pastoral appointments for the Northwest Texas Conference of the First United Methodist Church were announced Tuesday at the group's annual meeting in Midland. Changes and assignments were made by Bishop Louis W. Schowen-gerdt.

Seymour district superintendent H. Weldon McCormick was assigned to the Conference office in Lubbock as area treasurer. He had served as superintendent four years. Replacing him will be Rev. Carlton H. Thomson, who had been pastor of Lubbock's St. Luke's United Methodist Church the past six years.

Rev. William E. Perkins is the new pastor for Knox City and Benjamin United Methodist Churches, moving from Fair Park UMC in Abilene, where he served four years. He succeeds Rev. Douglas J. Stenberg, who was at the churches four years and will become the pastor of Trinity UMC in Plainview.

Rev. Russ Byard, who has pastored the Munday and Goree churches the past year, will remain at his present position.

Farming Families To Be Honored In Heritage Program

In a recent letter to Knox County Judge David N. Perdue, the State Commissioner of Agriculture, Jim Hightower, has requested information for the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Heritage Program.

The Family Land Heritage Program heralds the monumental achievements of families whose land has been in continuous agricultural production for at least 100 years. Since the program's inception, some 12 years now, 1,821 Texas farms and ranches have been added to the formal registry. In fulfillment of program guidelines, families must present supporting documents to the County Judge's office for certification. Registration for this year's program will run from June 10 through August 30, 1985.

Landowners whose property meets program requirements will receive official certifications at a ceremony in Austin this fall. Sometime after the presentation, a copy of the 1985 Family Land Heritage Registry will be forwarded to the honorees.

Do you think you grow the world's best vegetables? Then you need to enter your vegetables in the Vegetable Exhibits at the Knox County Vegetable Festival on Saturday, June 22. Entries will be accepted between 8 and 9 a.m. at the firemen's meeting room in the Munday fire station. Jim Dillon, chairman of the Knox County Horticulture Committee, invites all Knox County gardeners to enter.

Federal Beef Grading

Today about half the beef produced in the United States is federally graded, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Federal grading standards require that meat be inspected under a federal or approved state inspection system before it can be graded. Since packers pay the cost, they usually have graders examine only high quality carcasses. In most cases, these high quality carcasses are graded USDA Choice and, today, about 90 percent of the beef that is federally graded falls into that category. Some loss of confidence in federal grades has developed in recent years as demonstrated by the increased use of house brands by retailers. Some have their grades or use packer rather than government grades.

JUNE - NATIONAL DAIRY MONTH

Although Knox County is not dairy cattle country, the importance of dairy products in the diet cannot be over-emphasized.

Dairy products come in a variety of forms - milk, buttermilk, yogurt, ice cream, cheese. Milk is a high nutritious food containing protein to build, repair, and maintain body tissues; calcium which functions in the development and maintenance of bones and teeth; and riboflavin which aids in energy utilization in the body. Adults and youth alike need dairy products in their diet.

Children under 9 - 2-3 servings daily, children 9-12 - 3 servings daily, teenagers - 4 servings daily, adults - 2 servings daily, pregnant women - 3 servings daily.

What is a serving? An 8-ounce cup of milk is considered a serving. Common portions of some dairy products and their milk equivalents in calcium are:

1 cup plain yogurt, 1 cup milk; 1 oz. Cheddar or Swiss Cheese, 3/4 cup milk; 1 inch cube Cheddar or Swiss Cheese, 1/2 cup milk; 1 oz. process cheese food, 1/2 cup milk; 1/2 cup ice cream or ice milk, 1/3 cup milk; 1/2 cup cottage cheese, 1/4 cup milk.

There is the same amount of calcium in each of these portions, but varying amounts of calories.

Milk used in cooked foods, such as cream soups, sauces, puddings, count towards the daily requirement.

Dairy products easily fit into everyone's diet.

What's 100 pounds of milk doing in your refrigerator? How could it possibly fit? If you have 3 lbs. of butter, a gallon of ice cream, a gallon of milk, and as much as 3 lbs. of cheese in the cooler at any one time, they represent 113 lbs. of milk.

Did you know that - it takes 21.2 lbs. of whole milk to make 1 lb. of butter.

- a gallon of ice cream, which weighs 4 1/2 lbs. is made from 12 lbs. of milk.

- Each pound of cheese requires about 10 lbs. of milk.

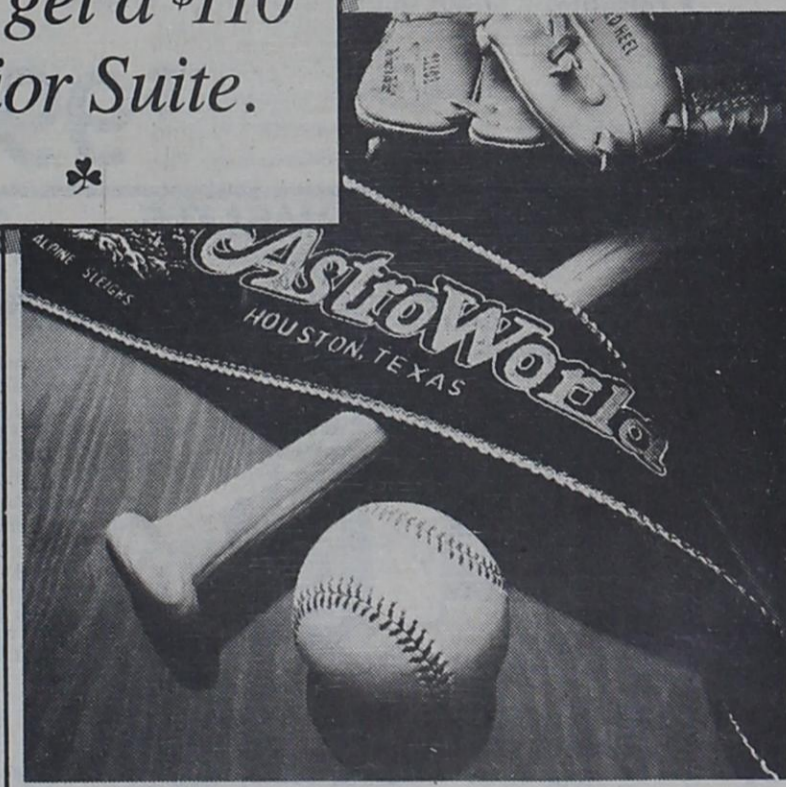
