## City Hall Demolition Is Near Completion

"And the walls came tumbling down" on Munday City Hall on Tuesday, October 23. As a large crowd of interested townspeople watched, a winch truck tied to a motor grader tackled the immense task of toppling the building.

Daniel Ramirez of Home Building Center was in charge of demoli-

tion and clean-up of the old building.

One man traveled all the way from Wichita Falls to witness the destruction. Squibb Parrish, an accountant for over 35 years in the Wichita Falls area, read of the upcoming plans in the Wichita Falls Record News. During the fall of 1917 when the City Hall was being built, Mr. Parrish camped on the square while working as "chief water boy" on the job. He was eleven years old at the time. He said he put a penny between two bricks as they were being laid. Mr. Parrish didn't find his penny, but he did find many memories of his stay on Munday.

The cornerstone was placed on October 17, 1917. The inscription read:

C. H. Heinbach - Architect

J. C. Ray - Contractor

This cornerstone placed by Knox Lodge #851, A.F. & A.M.

During the demolition process, three articles were found in the old cornerstone. There was a Bible, a penny dated 1915 and a notice which read: "Knox Lodge #851 will lay the cornerstone of the new City Hall Thursday evening, October 18th, at 1:30 p.m. Everybody invited. The Honourable Charles E. Combs will deliver the address."

And so, a little over 67 years later, as the siren sounded, the Munday City Hall slowly turned to ruins as the demolition squad did its job. But soon, a new and modern City Hall will take its place on the downtown square.

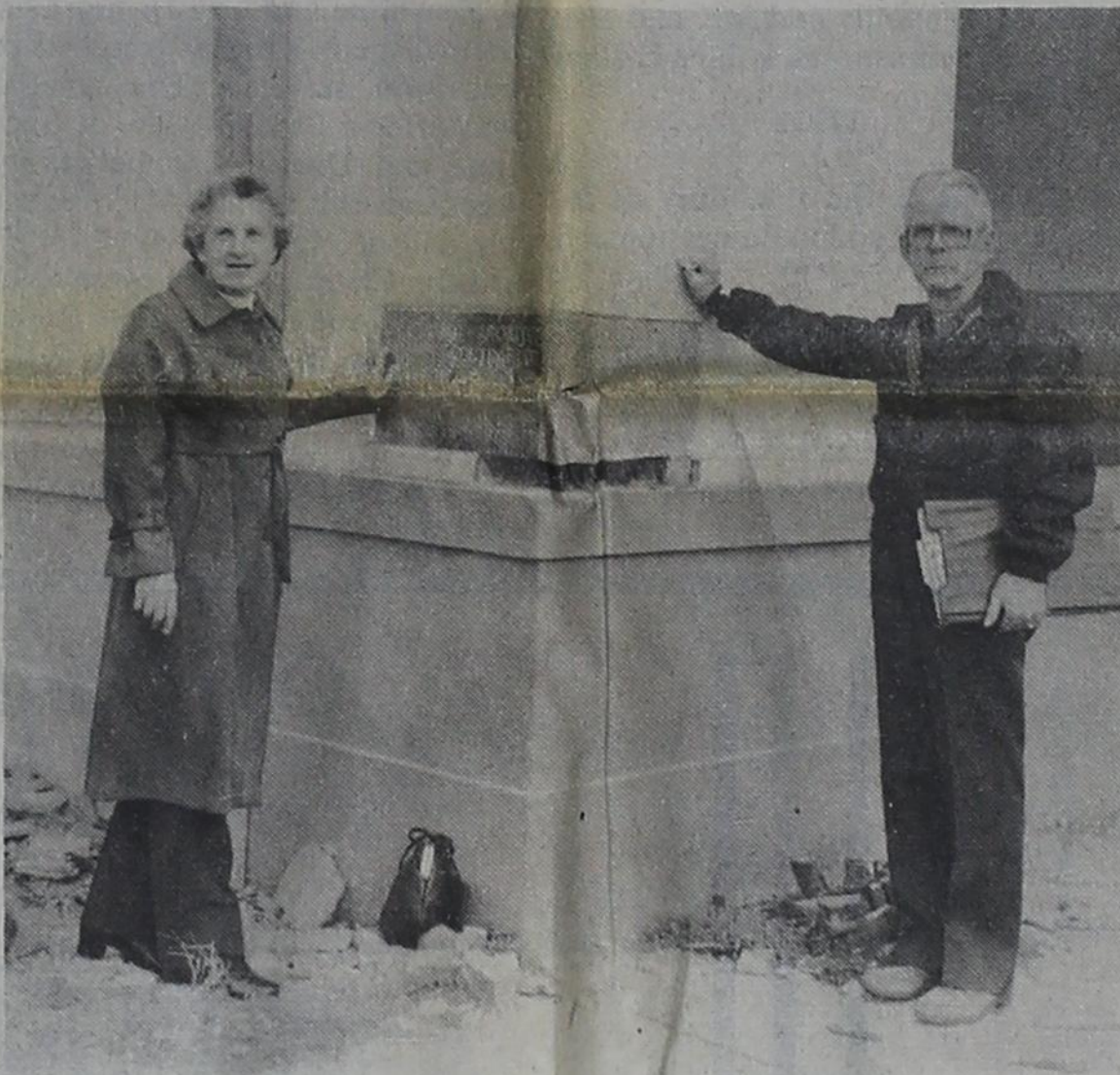
There were 383 lambs in the market lamb show. The Knox County 4-H'ers did very well as the following results show:

folk - Trey Thompson 1st; Hampshire crosses - Kent Latham 23rd, Missy Reneau 24th; lightweight hampshire - Bryan Latham 8th, Robin Reneau 9th, Trey Thompson 12th; heavyweight hampshire - Tyler Thompson 7th; southdown - Kent Latham 10th.

After the shift only 49 hereford steers remained in the show of 92 that had been entered. SuLynn Oxford placed 10th in the lightweight hereford class and Stacia Ryder placed 6th in the middleweight hereford class.

## Congressman Jack Hightower Speaks To Lions Club

Congressman and Mrs. Jack Hightower were the guests of the Munday Lions Club Tuesday, October 30. Mr. Hightower began his speech stating how happy he was to be in Munday again for two reasons, because he enjoys speaking at the Lions Club meetings and "they always have good food".

Congressman Hightower has been in office for ten years and says he has been able to buy seniority. He explained that the congress is there to make decisions about priorities, what we can afford and what we can't afford. This is a very important job to have because we cannot afford everything we think we should have.

He spoke on the agricultural economy, saying that the economy will continue to decline if changes are not made. "We're not getting what we need for our agricultural products to have a strong agricultural economy," he stated. There will be a new farm bill in 1985 with changes that will hopefully help our agricultural economy.

Also, he spoke about a strong national defense. "We have to have a strong national defense to keep America strong," he stated. "We have to have new missiles and such to keep up with the Russians so we will have the ability to strike back if they come after us. Hopefully, we won't need them."

The program was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone in attendance.

## Moguls Over Eagles In District Win

Munday's Moguls amassed 56 points, to the Chillicothe Eagles 0, in their third win of the season in district play.

A tough Mogul defense allowed their opponents 29 yards rushing and two first downs in the contest.

Tim Collier started off the scoring in the first quarter on a 7-yard run around left end completing a 63-yard drive in nine plays. Ronnie Lowrance kicked the PAT, one of the six he put through the uprights for a successful night.

With 6:34 on the clock in the second quarter, Munday struck again off right guard in the form of Ronnie Lowrance. This 3-yard TD ennie Lowrance. This 3-yard TD ended an 83 yard drive bringing the score to 14-0; after Lowrance added a PAT. Todd Thompson scored from 21 yards out over right end bringing the score to 20-0. Lowrance again kicked the PAT. A 23-yard pass from Dent Offutt to Frankie Stinnett set up Thompson's run. Offutt completed the Moguls' first half scoring on a quarterback sneak of one yard. Seven plays, 42 yards and a fourth Lowrance PAT brought the halftime score to 20 to 0.

Collier again scored first in the second half on a 29-yard run around right end. Lowrance carried for 12 yards, Offutt on a keeper for 12 and Collier for 8 to set up this 4 play, 61 yard drive. PAT by Lowrance good.

Munday's defensive player, Greg Urbanczyk, blocked an Eagle punt and added a two point safety bringing the score to 37-0 in favor of the Moguls.

posed constitutional amendments  
on the ballot:

1. The constitutional amendment  
to provide state banks the same  
rights and privileges as national  
banks;

2. The constitutional amendment  
to create from general revenue a  
special higher education assistance  
fund for construction and related  
activities, to restructure the Perma-  
nent University Fund, and to in-  
crease the number of institutions eli-  
gible to benefit from the Permanent  
University Fund;

3. The constitutional amendment  
authorizing the legislature to pro-  
vide for payment of assistance to  
the surviving dependent parents, broth-  
ers, and sisters of certain public ser-  
vants killed while on duty;

4. The constitutional amendment  
to abolish the office of county treas-  
urer in Bexar and Collin counties;

5. The constitutional amendment  
authorizing the state senate to fill a  
vacancy in the office of lieutenant  
governor;

6. The constitutional amendment  
to permit use of public funds and  
credit for payment of premiums on  
certain insurance contracts of  
mutual insurance companies auth-  
orized to do business in Texas;

7. The constitutional amendment  
relating to the membership of the  
State Commission on Judicial Con-  
duct and the authority and proced-  
ure to discipline active judges, cer-  
tain retired and former judges, and

certain masters and magistrates of  
the courts;

8. The Constitutional amendment  
to provide a per diem for members  
of the legislature equal to the maxi-  
mum daily amount allowed by fed-  
eral law as a deduction for ordinary  
and necessary business expenses in-  
curred by a state legislator.

Our forefathers fought long and  
hard to obtain this basic freedom of  
voting and many lives have been lost  
in these intervening years to assure  
the continuation of this freedom so

Tuesday, November 6. Your vote

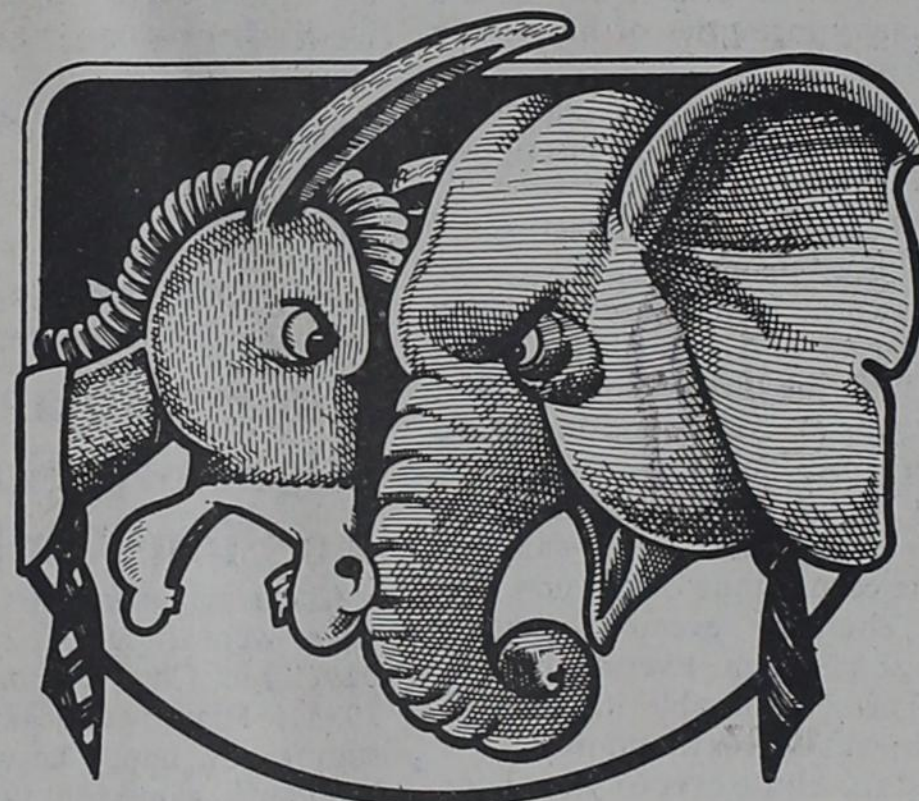

### Three Days To Cool Off

The three day cooling off period still works! If you have just had a salesperson convince you to buy a new set of pots and pans that you don't need, you may be able to cancel the deal.

A Federal Trade Commission (FTC) regulation and Texas statute allows you to cancel a door-to-door sales agreement until midnight of the third business day after signing

the contract. To cancel an agreement, first notify the company in writing. Then notify your bank by phone and in writing that you want payment on your check stopped. Banks usually charge a small fee for this service.

The three-day rule applies to any sale, lease or rental of goods and services costing more than \$25.00, whenever the sales pitch and the agreement to buy are both made at any place other than the seller's place of business. You're protected even if you requested that the salesperson come to your home.

Most door-to-door sales are successful because customers are impulsive buyers. So an easier way to solve the problem of unneeded merchandise is to control impulsive spending in the first place.

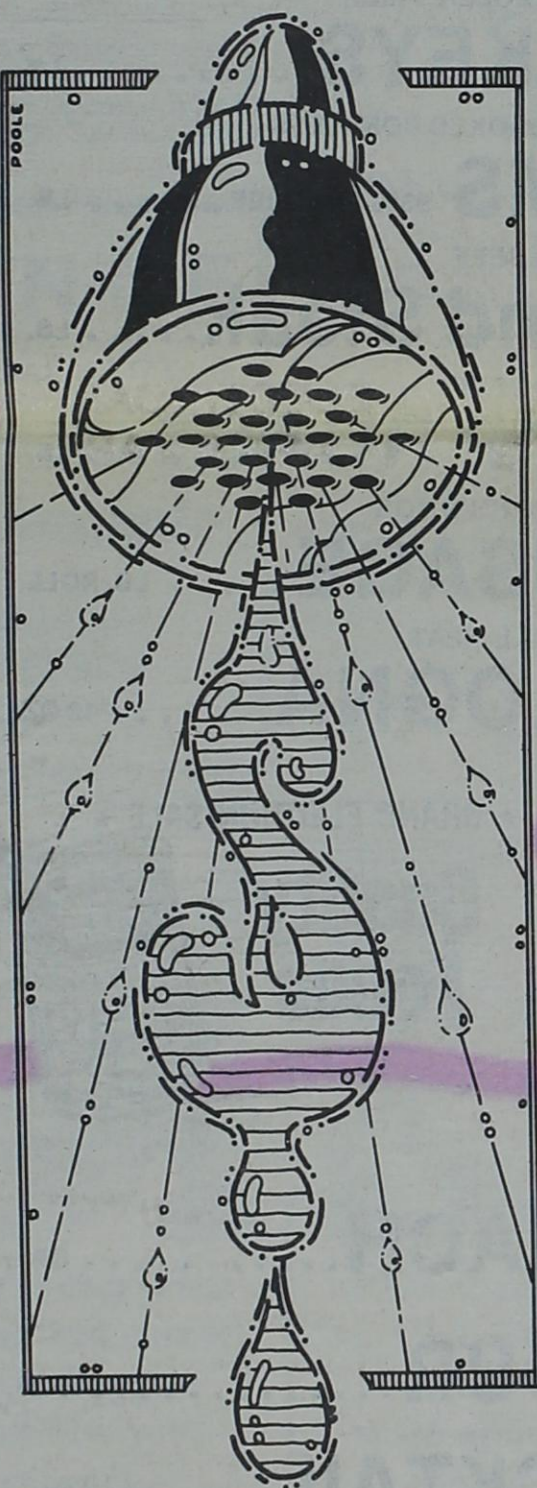

## WTU Customers Paying Less For Electricity This Fall

West Texas Utilities Company residential customers are paying slightly less than the state average for their electricity this fall, according to surveys reported by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

In September and October, WTU's standard residential rate for 1,000 kilowatt-hours was \$74.74, while the state average was over \$76, the PUC report shows. For 500 kilowatt-hours, WTU charged \$41, while the state average was \$40.41 in September and \$40.25 in October. Average monthly usage for WTU residential customers was 1,020 kWh in September 1983 and 701 kWh in October 1983.

The survey included 19 utilities,

among which were 10 investor-owned companies. Highest rates in the state were those of El Paso Electric Company which charged \$98.37 for 1,000 kWh. Lowest rates reported were by the Lower Colorado River Authority, which charged \$53.09 for 1,000 kWh.

WTU currently is awaiting the outcome of a rate case pending before the PUC. A settlement agreement presented to a PUC hearing examiner would raise WTU's base rates but lower the fuel cost recovery, resulting in only slight changes in the various rates now in effect. A final decision by the three PUC commissioners is expected in November.

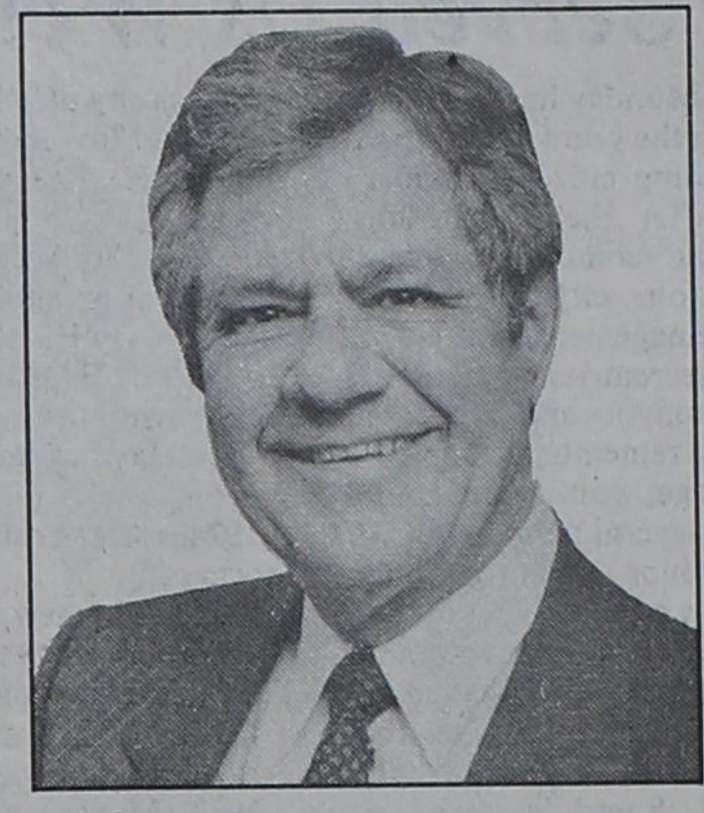

1934 - Mayor was E. E. Akers;

1936 - Mayor was D. C. Osborne;

1939 - Mayor was H. P. Hill;

1940 - Mayor was J. M. Terry;

1942 - Mayor was C. R. Elliott through 1945;

1944 - City secretary changed to Harvey Lee through 1956;

1946 - Mayor was W. R. Moore;

1952 - Mayor was M. F. Billingsley;

1957 - City secretary changed to E. W. Harrell through 1968;

1958 - Mayor was Varney Moore who retained that position until 1964 when J. E. Reeves took over as mayor;

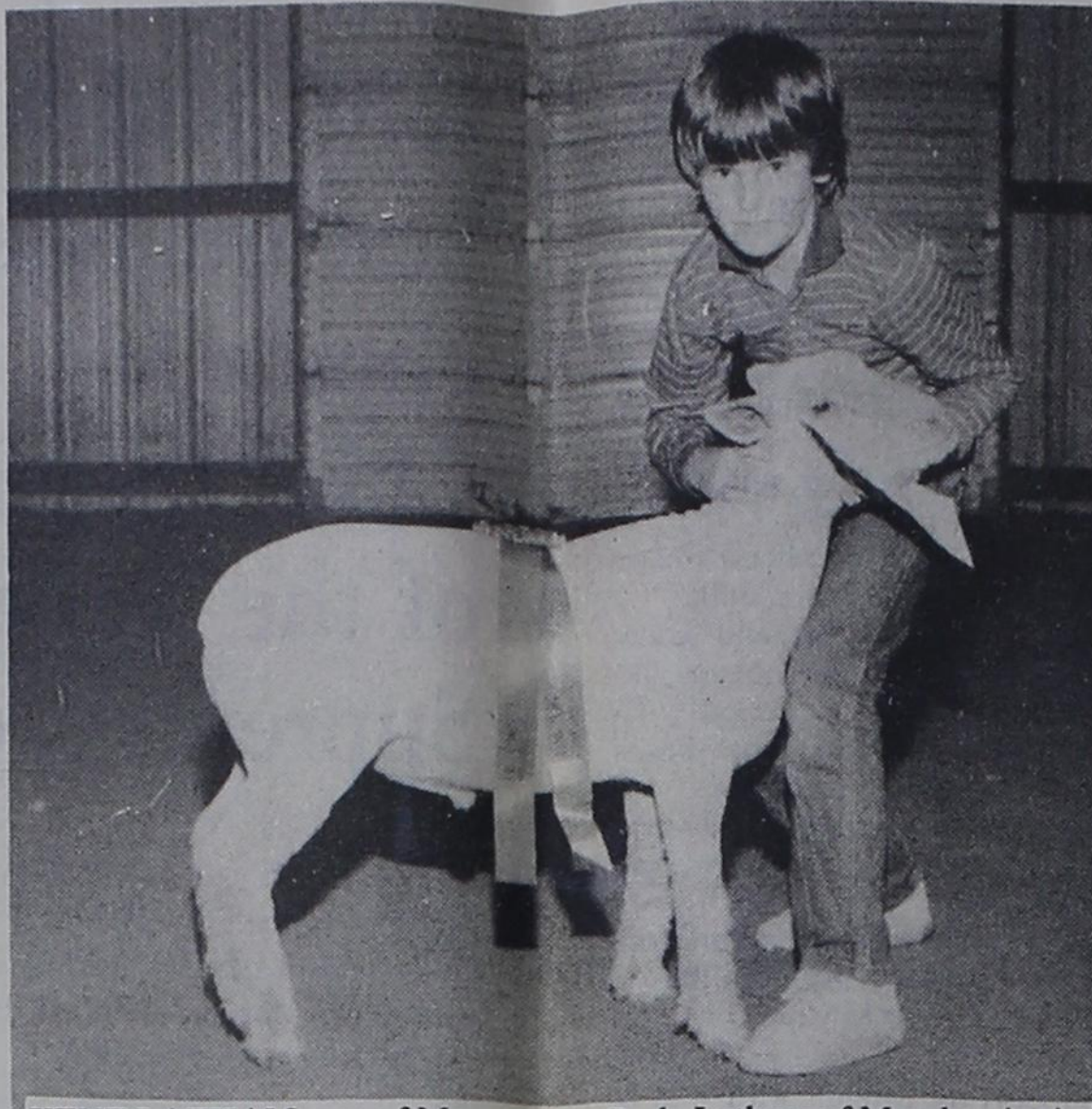
1969 - City secretary changed to Walter Hertel who still serves in that capacity;

1976 - Clint Norman replaced J. E. Reeves as mayor;

1978 - Mayor was Dr. A. Dale Selzer, D.D.S.;

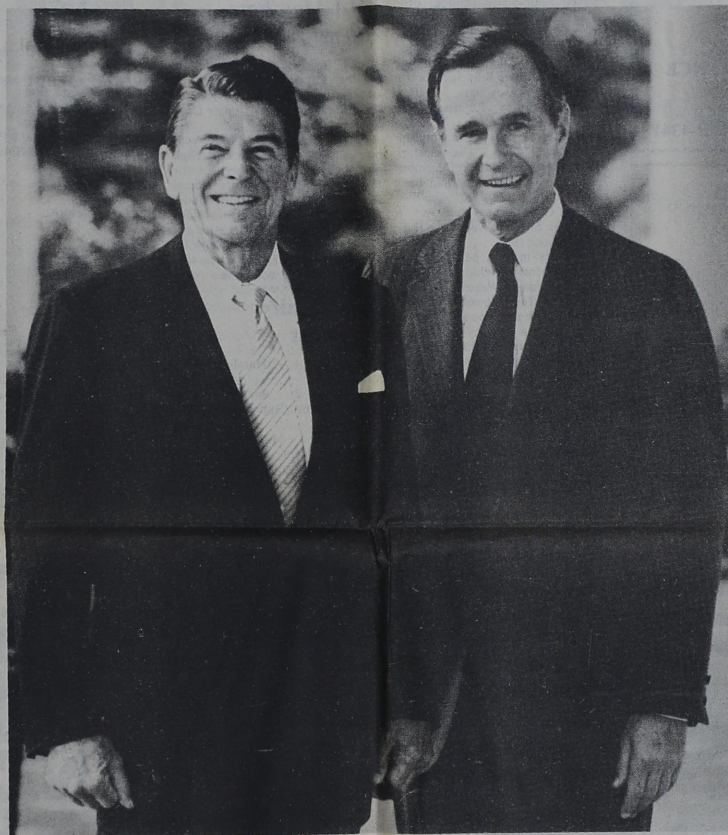

# Stories From The Past

★ May, 1930 ★

The following articles were taken from the 1930 issues of the Munday Times.

## I. E. DAY GETS POETIC WITH APPROACH OF SPRINGTIME

The other day I. E. Day sat down on a sack of cotton seed at the end of a row and gathered a sheet of paper as it blew by, and with a short pencil which happened to be in his overalls pocket, jotted down his thoughts in poetry, and here they are:

The sun rose in the morning dawn  
Down by the bootlegger's den,  
We'll get twenty cents for cotton  
The Lord knows only when.  
The little bee sucks the blossoms,  
The big bee makes the honey;  
The farmer makes the cotton  
And the banker makes the money.  
The Farm Board tells us how to do it;  
The speculator says, "Go ahead",  
We'll cut the cotton acreage  
When the farmers are all dead.  
The old hen cackles in the barnyard,  
The hogs grunt in bed,  
Wait until we can borrow money  
Then you'll all get fed.  
The merchant says, "I can't trust you,  
I've got to have the spot,"  
The poor, dear old farmer,  
They've got him on the trot.  
His pants are patched in places,  
His toes are in the sand;  
Come on all you old rascals,  
Let's join the happy band,  
And march right to the White House;  
Tell the Farm Board of our need.

Then right back home to suffer  
And plant half-and-half cotton seed.

## ONCE UPON A TIME

Everybody drank from the same glass in the railway coach.

## Cotton Classing Office Reports 7500 Samples To Date

B. B. Manly, Jr., area director of the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Abilene, reported that 7500 cotton samples from the 1984-85 cotton harvest had been classed in Abilene by October 26. The cotton harvest was underway in Concho, Glasscock, Runnels, and Tom Green Counties; and was about to be started in several other counties before being delayed by rain this past week. The full week of wet weather has been general throughout most of the classing territory and has abruptly stopped all harvesting.

Cotton production will be extremely low again this season. Drought conditions have resulted in crop failure throughout most of Howard, Jones, Mitchell and Nolan Counties. About 25 percent of the acreage usually planted to cotton has been idled in compliance with the 1984 farm program. Mr. Manly estimates that about 225,000 running bales will be produced in the Abilene classing territory this season; which compares to 292,000 bales produced last season.

Cotton prices were mostly steady at 56 to 58 cents per pound for most qualities during the past week. Trading on the local market was inactive, as harvesting has not yet advanced sufficiently to supply a significant volume of new-crop cotton. Demand was moderate to good for low quality cotton, and was light for high quality cotton. Cottonseed prices paid producers ranged from 90 to 100 dollars per ton, at mostly

95 dollars per ton.

The quality of early harvested cotton has been high in terms of all quality factors. Grades were 37 percent grade 32, 34 percent grade 31, 16 percent grade 41, and 7 percent grade 42. Fiber length was 20 percent staple 34, 18 percent staple 33, 18 percent staple 31, 17 percent

staple 32, and 13 percent staple 30. The average mike reading was 38; with 90 percent within the 35 to 49 range, and 8 percent within the 33 to 34 range. The average strength was 25 grams per tex, with 89 percent testing 22 or higher. Less than two percent was reduced in grade because of bark or grass content.

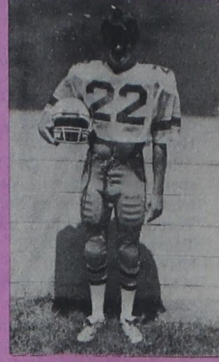

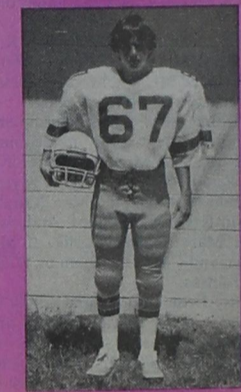

## Federal Land Bank To Increase Variable Interest Rate Nov. 1

The Federal Land Bank of Texas' variable interest rate will increase from 11.00 percent to 11.50 percent on farm loans and from 11.50 percent to 12.00 percent on rural residence and farm related business loans, effective November 1, 1984, said Dale E. Bullinger, president of the Federal Land Bank Association of Haskell.

The increase comes as an effort to narrow the widening gap between what the Land Bank pays for money on the financial market and what it charges borrowers under the variable interest rate plan. Over the last three years, the bank's average cost of funds outstanding has been in the 12 percent range, exceeding the loan rate to borrowers.

At the bank's annual stockholders meeting in March, directors from the Federal Land Bank Association of Haskell joined other association directors and voted to forego compensation for their local association in 1984, enabling the bank to postpone an interest rate increase at that time.

"It is imperative that the bank continue to post adequate earnings to ensure that our bonds can be sold in the financial markets at the lowest possible costs, which results in lower interest rate loans for our borrowers," said James A. Rogers, president of the Federal Land Bank of Texas.

The Federal Land Bank Association of Haskell makes long-term real estate loans on farm and rural residence property in the counties of Haskell, Jones, Knox and Baylor.
