We became tired of waiting for Good Friday!

First thought was to skip the "bean deal" next time, but we've never been one to quit entirely at the first complaint. Otherwise, we'd never survived all these years in the newspaper business!

We were heartened by receiving a letter from our brother, Tommie, who with his wife, Irene, hosted last year's get-together. He stated the event this year would be on Memorial Day weekend, also.

The weather was still unsettled, and we had debated jumping the gun on Good Friday.

As Worth Gafford was doing his "tonorial art" on this rim around our bald spot, he remarked that the noon weather report said possibility of showers during the evening.

We had already laid out the rows ahead of time, so we rushed home, put the pinto seed in place and covered them with dirt.

Time was an important element, and we couldn't run the risk of not being permitted to plant on Good Friday—or for several days thereafter—and the product of our labors not being fully matured by Memorial Day.

So our planting activity was completed, so far as beans are concerned, on "Good Wednesday" instead of Good Friday.

Some 36 hours early, we thought, might not be as disastrous as several days too late.

We didn't add water that evening, but went inside to await that predicted moisture. None came! Next day we added a sprinkler to our hose and watered down our planting. We have nothing to do, now, but let our plants emerge, grow and produce.

We also hope for rain in the meantime. Another hope prevalent with us is that we don't have a repeat of last year, when we drove a major part of the way to Dallas in a heavy downpour.

Our brother said he wasn't expecting that this year—and he knows that Dallas weather a lot better than we do!

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## TDH Confirms Munday Is Closer To Approval

Joe Dixon and Bob Harrison, sanitarians with Texas Health Department in Abilene, were in Munday on Monday, April 12, for the annual inspection of the City of Munday's water system.

The two men informed Walter Hertel, city administrator, that with all the recent water valve replacements, they felt that Munday has eighty to eighty-five percent of the state requirements completed for state approved water service. New valves in Munday have accomplished a requirement of the state of being able to isolate portions of the main lines which develop trouble without causing a large number of citizens to be without water service. "Of course this is very beneficial also to the fire service," inserted Mr. Hertel. "It just happens the Health Department people aren't the ones concerned about this."

In order to keep an ample supply of water for use in time of need, the supply tank is filled at all times. This water is expelled from the tank weekly so fresh water will be available. A chart is kept on chlorine residual prior to the tank water entering the distribution system.

"The confirmation of the chlorine residual satisfying state requirements and the disconnecting of existing wells from the distribution system are two items that will need to be accomplished before state approval is requested," stated Mr. Harrison. If these representatives agree that the City of Munday has completed the requirements, in their opinion, they will in turn recommend that the Commissioner of Health award approval. However, it must be noted that the Commissioner of Health will make the final decision.

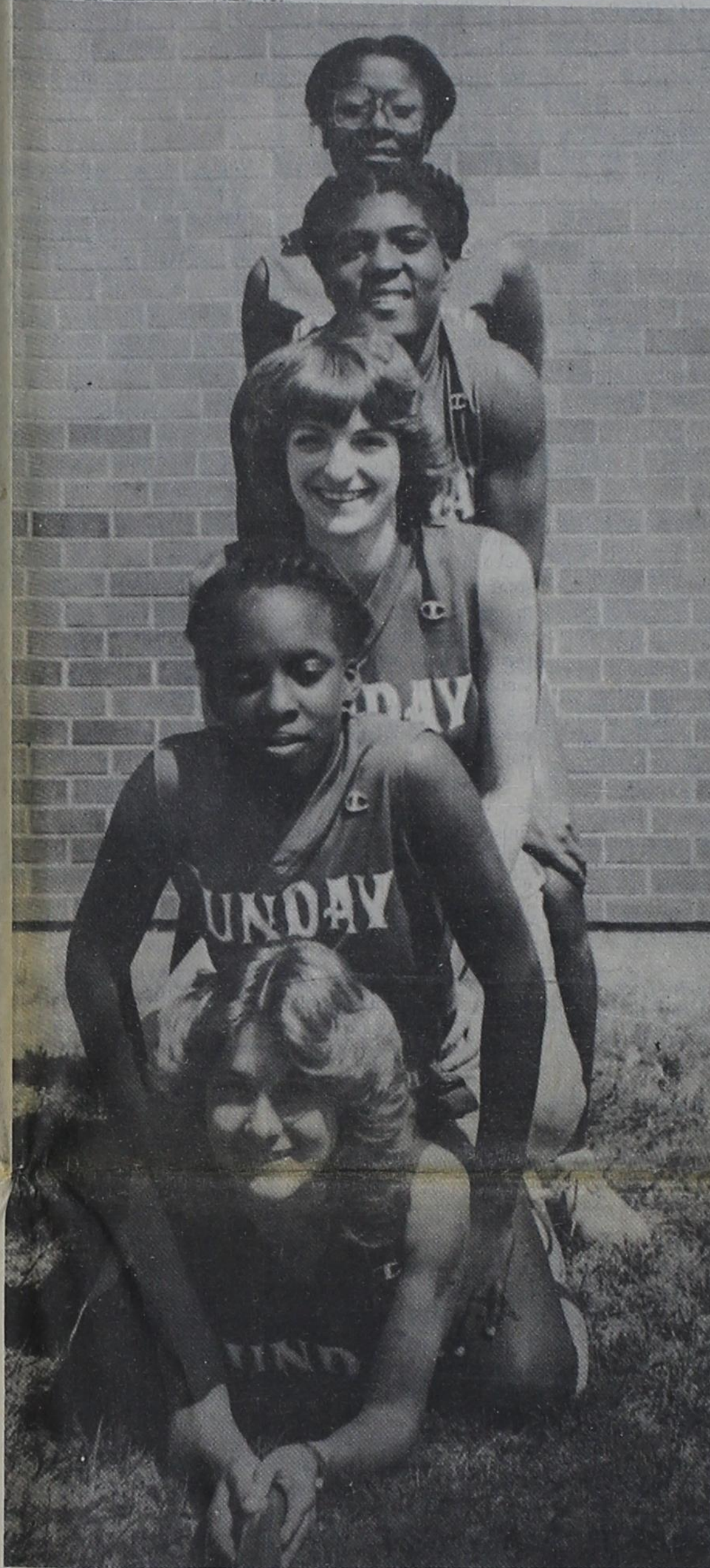

## Absentee Voting Started

It's time to vote in the Democratic Primary Election--provided you want to vote absentee, that is!

Absentee voting officially got underway on Monday of this week, and the county clerk's office is the only place in Knox County that you may vote absentee, except under certain conditions outlined by the county clerk, such as:

1. If you are 65 years of age or older, you may certify this by mail and receive a ballot by return mail.

2. If you are ill, or physically unable to get to the polls, you may receive a ballot from the county clerk's office and vote absentee.

3. If you are presently living out of the county, but are qualified to vote in the primary election, you may write the county clerk for a ballot.

Absentee ballots may be received on election day, and may be counted. This is a change from prior years, when ballots had to be received four days prior to the election.

Whether you vote absentee, or in person, the time for casting your ballot is approaching. Saturday, May 1, is election day, you know!

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## Physical Therapy Team To Practice At Knox Hospital

Randy Abernathy, administrator for the Knox County Hospital, announced Tuesday that a physical therapy group will start practice in the hospital in about sixty days. The team will be composed of a registered physical therapist, an assistant therapist and two technicians.

The group will offer both in-patient and out-patient service, and will be using such equipment as ultrafilm, walkers, mirrors, whirlpool baths, tru-trac machines, parallel bars and hot and cold pack treatments.

The department will be open five days a week at the beginning, and will offer 7-day coverage within 90 days, Abernathy said.

Dr. W. F. Thompson said, "This will be a most valuable tool for helping people recover from strokes and fractures."

This service is being offered through Tinsley Physical Therapy, Inc., of Houston.

## First Baptist Church Building "Ready" For Sunday Services

Services will be held in Munday First Baptist Church on Sunday morning, April 18. Auditorium facilities will be completed by this date. Sunday school classes will be held one more Sunday in various members' homes as they have been in recent months during the renovation

of the church building. In mid-year of 1979, serious discussion began by members of the local Baptist Church for needed repairs and changes to be made on the building. After naming a building committee consisting of chairman Clint Norman, James Smith, Gaye

Yost, Linda Smith, Marshall Benner and Frances Cypert, the necessary spark began to ignite larger flames of interest. Plans began to materialize and the decision was made to completely renovate the building, adding no square footage. An existing building

fund which had been into being for a number of years began to get fatter with donations. A program theme of "Together We Build" took shape, and by February, 1981, over \$190,000.00 in pledges was a reality. These pledges will be paid over a three year period.

John Sanders of Hurst, a very capable architect specializing in church buildings, was contacted. With his work complete, Larry Dennis or Rule was employed on a cost plus basis, and the wheels were in motion.

It was agreed that local

members would do a large portion of the chores of tearing out before the construction company began. The work was there and with the assistance of Spike Bryan and Ronnie Stewart, two men selected to set up times

for the workers, etc., the job was accomplished.

Mr. Norman named some of the work completed by members. "All interior ceilings were taken out, floor coverings removed, old air conditioner systems removed, fixtures and furniture removed and stored, plus sanded and refinished, and interior cement block wall calked to prepare for sheet rock and paneling. These are some of the things I know members did, and they worked on some of it before the contractor arrived on the scene and some was done as the work progressed. Members are also re-landscaping the yard area."

As one enters the foyer, after walking up a freshly finished walk, a glistening off-white ceramic tile floor accented with a beautiful table and benches with royal blue upholstery is in sight.

As the doors to the auditorium are opened, the first step is on beautiful pale blue carpet. The pews are upholstered in the same rich royal blue velvet fabric that adorned the foyer benches. The overall atmosphere is very pleasing to the eye and a lovely interior indeed.

The choir area has been changed to a rear center location, instead of at the side of the pulpit area. Choir chairs are also in royal blue.

The baptistry has been completely re-worked with a new fiberglass material. A new lighting system and new sound system have been installed. Complete new units for air conditioning and heating are ready for the enjoyment of the members. Separate units will be used for the auditorium and the educational area so only the ones needed may be used.

New carpets throughout the educational area will be laid next week. Many rooms are already accented with the pleasing brown-tone plush carpet, and soon all the hallways and other areas will be. Drop ceilings have been constructed in the educational area.

A tour will cause one to see changes at every step. The kitchen has new cabinets and a complete "facelift".

Members will appreciate the location of the pastor's study and other offices. They are just inside the north entrance, very accessible.

With only finishing touches needing to be applied, members should be delighted with the changes. They will know how to appreciate the facilities, no doubt, since so many had a part in its completion.

Mr. Norman stated, "We have been privileged to meet in the Munday High School auditorium during construction. We express our thanks for the use of the school facilities. Prayer meetings and choir practice were held in the Munday Community Center, and we thank the ones in charge of this building for their kindness."

The music director's office and an added feature, a choir practice room, has been accessible for use the last several weeks. Even though it was not completely finished, they were able to make use of the area.

The First Baptist Church is in the same location, and from the outside appears pretty much the same as when the building was dedicated in 1950. Beyond that, however, there are very few items that appear the same, once inside.

Mr. Norman concluded, "We feel with the renovation, we should, except for regular maintenance and upkeep, be able to enjoy our premises for at least thirty years without major repairs needing to be done."

**Changes April 19**

The Railroad Commission has allowed new gas rates for customers of Lone Star Gas Company in the unincorporated areas around Munday, Clarksville, Gatesville and Somerville. New rates will go into effect April 19.

The new environs rates are identical to those already approved by the respective nearby cities for customers within their corporate limits.

In the environs of Munday, an average monthly residential bill for six Mcf of gas will increase by \$2.88 in winter for the 78 customers.

The Railroad Commission has the authority to approve rates for gas service in unincorporated areas of Texas. Proposed gas rates for these areas are examined in light of the company's operating efficiency and the rates that have been approved by the nearby city governments.

**Newly Elected City Aldermen Take Office In Special Session**

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met at 8 p.m. April 6, at the Munday City Hall in special session.

Present were Mayor James W. Reid and Aldermen A. Dale Selzer, M. M. Booe and Donald Hobert; also Aldermen elect Bob Therwhanger and Von Marr. Larry Smith and Ray Lynn Hardin were absent.

Mayor Reid called the meeting to order. Minutes of the March 9, 1982 regular meeting; also record of a public hearing on the Gary and Leslie Tidwell Annexation on March 22, 1982, were read. No alterations. Mayor Reid stated minutes be approved as written.

Mayor Reid next stated the meeting open for public hearing on use of Revenue Sharing Funds for the fiscal year April 1, 1982 to March 31, 1983. Funds expected to be available are \$15,884.00. No one appeared except those listed above. Mayor Reid said those funds would be incorporated with other funds and designated as a separate item in the regular budget on April 13, 1982.

Next business was recommendations

of outgoing aldermen. Recent recommendations in regard to Police Department operation by Larry Smith (who had to be absent) were read. No other recommendations were made. No official action taken.

Next business was examination of April 3, 1982 election returns. Official results were as follows: for Mayor, James W. Reid, 270; Larry Smith, 1 (write-in); Ray Ford, 1 (write-in); for aldermen, Maurice Jennings, 17; Herman Martin, 10; Von Marr, 223; Bob Therwhanger, 260; C. D. Killian, 16; and M. L. Wiggins, 146.

Booe moved that James W. Reid be declared elected mayor and Bob Therwhanger and Von Marr be declared elected as aldermen. Selzer seconded the motion. Voting for were Booe, Selzer and Hobert, Noes, none. Carried.

Mayor Reid read oaths of office to Bob Therwhanger and Von Marr, duly swearing them into office. Walter Hertel, City Secretary, read the oath of office to James Reid with Mayor Reid repeating and being duly sworn in by

City Secretary. Alderman Marr moved the meeting be adjourned. Therwhanger seconded. All in favor.

**UNIFORM PLANTING DATE TO BE SET**

**Knox County Farm And Ranch News**

Each year cotton producers discuss the pros and cons of a uniform planting date for cotton in Knox County. Arguments against a uniform planting date are: 1. delaying planting thereby delaying cotton production, and 2. reducing the acceptable time period to plant cotton. The positive side is to reduce the boll weevil population, thereby reducing the infestation rate of this year's cotton crop.

Boll weevils general overwinter in the turn rows and shelter belt leaf litter. Overwintered weevil emergence begins during early spring and usually peaks during late May and early June. Weevil infestation in cotton is closely related to the fruiting of cotton, with the greatest numbers of overwintered weevils entering cotton fields after squares are present. Therefore, the rate of overwintered weevil infestation depends on the size of the emerging weevil population and on how close together peak overwintered weevil emergence and squaring of the cotton occur. Early planted cotton fields are much more likely to be infested with significant numbers of weevils than cotton planted later in the season.

In weevil infested areas, uniform planting of cotton on a county basis after mid-May can significantly reduce weevil infestations.

Early sampling for overwintered weevil populations were conducted in mid-March. These samples were taken from the shelter belts and brush areas located throughout Knox County. Ninety-three weevils were collected, representing a resident population of 4800 weevils per acre of shelter belt, brush patches and turn rows. With a population as large as this we can expect a very heavy infestation of boll weevils in our cotton of 1982. However, by using a uniform planting date, a large portion of this weevil population could be reduced by extending the time period of when weevil leaves its hibernation site and the availability of cotton squares and bolls, its food source. With this procedure in mind, the Knox County Boll Weevil association is striving to achieve a 100% participation in the 1982 uniform planting date to be set at their meeting in late April.

The fish are also guaranteed to be healthy and free of parasites and disease.

The District is sponsoring this program because the Texas Parks and Wildlife no longer provides fish for stocking to landowners in Texas. The District can obtain and provide the fish for you at a considerable savings from what it would cost you to travel and purchase them from a commercial fishery. In addition to the low discount prices available, large orders of 1,000 fish or more will get an additional five cents per fish discount.

According to Knox County Sheriff Gene Nix, the youth lost control of his late model pickup as he was traveling between Munday and Goree, and the vehicle overturned.



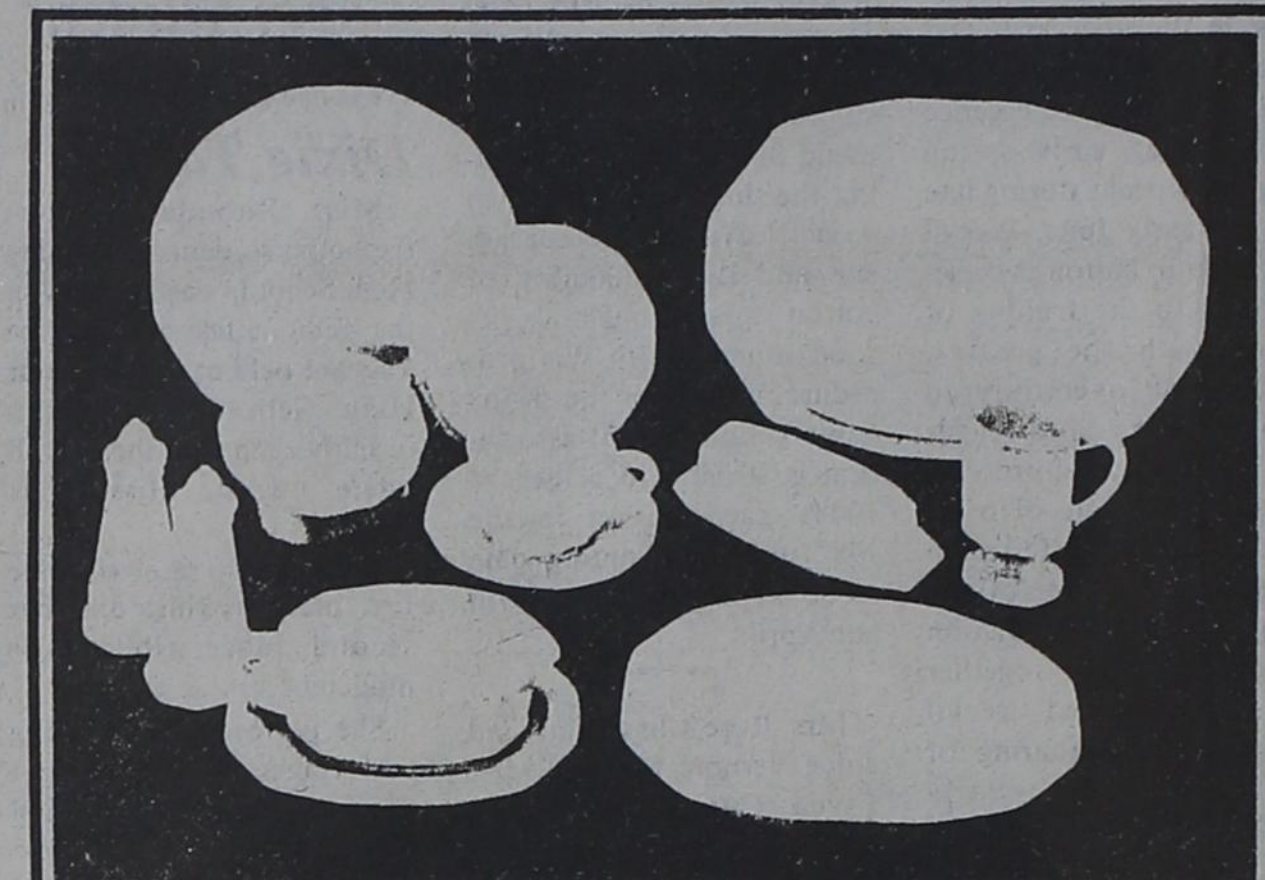

Team members were Mindy Stewart, Karen Kuehler, Amy Parker and Karen Munoz.



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
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## Helen McClure, Member Of Pioneer Area Family, Dies
