Promotion Day for the festival is Saturday, June 21, just over a week away. More details about the Promotion Day activities are outlined in another article in this issue of the Courier.

A host of activities are planned for the following day. Judging of canned, preserved and baked items and home-grown fruits and vegetables will take place during the morning, and the public will be able

to view the judges' decisions during the afternoon. Arts and crafts will also be judged and displayed, and such items will be for sale in a different section. A collection of antiques relating to the history of Knox County will be shown, and musical entertainment is planned throughout the day.

Runners will compete in various divisions of the Munday Marathon, and other contests and races of all kinds will feature youngsters, vegetables and "veg-o-mobiles" in every kind of costume imaginable.

The stew cookoff will decide not only who makes the best stew around but also who has the best pitching arm - for horseshoes, that is. Some imaginative styles of dress should be found there, too. A flower show, dance and various booths of food and drink round out the festival entertainment.

Mystery lovers will want to join in the Green Onion Hunt, which begins June 23. A green onion will be hidden in Munday, Goree, Knox City and Benjamin the week before the festival, and another will be slipped into a hiding place the day of the festival. Clues will be posted in each town and at the festival site, and cash prizes will be awarded to those who find the hidden onions.

Cotton Scouting Workshop Planned

An early season cotton scouting workshop is scheduled for 8 a.m. Wednesday, June 18, at the Rhineland Co-op Gin. Participants in the session, which is sponsored by the Knox County Crops Committee, will move from the gin to fields for "hands-on" experience.

Emory Boring, an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will discuss pests and boll weevil control during the early growing season. The problem of controlling perennial weeds and production practices will be the topic of Extension agronomist Al Alexander.

All area cotton prouers are invited to participate in the workshop.

District 4-H Fashion Show Set Here Tuesday

Approximately 200 4-H'ers from 21 counties will compete for honors in the Rolling Plains District 4-H fashion show set for Tuesday, June 17, in the Munday High School auditorium. Registration begins at 8:30 a.m. with judging at 9, and contestants will model their creations at 1:15 p.m. Awards presentation will follow.

The event is themed "On the Trail with Fashion," and it is being sponsored by West Texas Utilities Company, which provides the awards and meal for the young seamstresses. Jane Locknane, Knox County Extension Agent, is chairman of the planning committee.

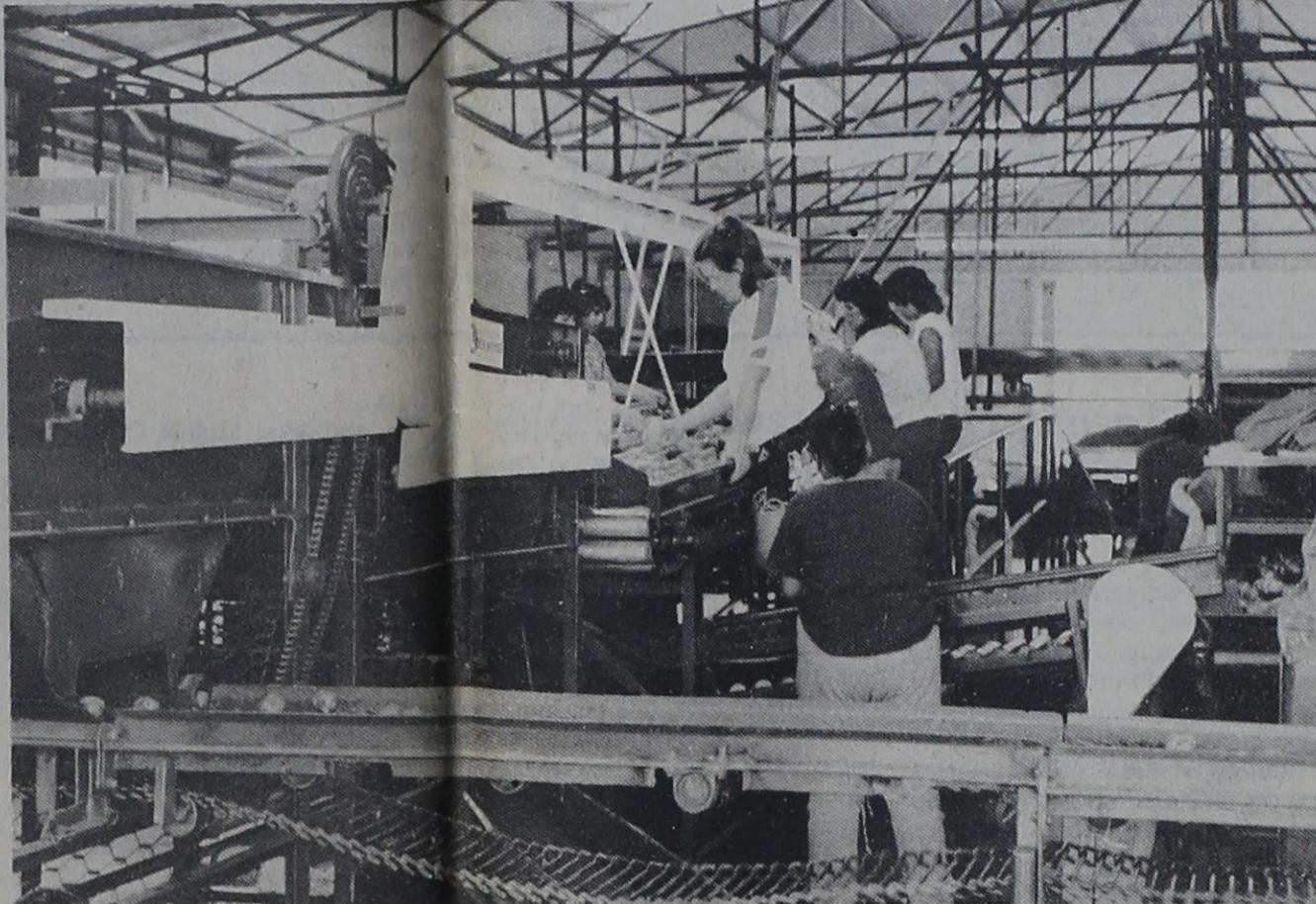
Contestants will compete in four categories. The top three winners in each junior and intermediate category will be recognized. First place winner in each senior category will be eligible for the state fashion show, to be held July 14-16 in Austin. Special awards will be presented to participants exhibiting the best cotton garment or ensemble, modeling the best wool or mohair outfit and the best model in each age division.

The entrants, who have already won in county contests, will be judged on their sewing and construction skills as well as on overall appearance. One junior, one intermediate and one senior entry in each of the four categories are allowed per county.

Big Tomatoes Grow In Munday Garden

Roe Allred of Munday knows how to grow tomatoes! He proved this by bringing a big stalk holding a tight cluster of 16 green tomatoes by our office early this week. This particular type is called patio tomatoes, but Allred planted them in his garden, and they are growing abundantly.

Allred says the way to plant tomatoes is to dig a hole about eight inches around and sixteen inches deep. After the winter's rain and snow has deposited the right amounts of oxygen and nutrients into the soil, you can plant the tomatoes (when the time is right, of course) in the hole and they will be protected from spring winds. By the time they have grown out of the hole, the worst of the wind will have (hopefully) stopped, and the plant will make a healthy stalk.

This gardener says he doesn't pay any attention to the Farmers Almanac signs when he plants, and a little Miracle Gro, lots of water (he has a four-inch irrigation pipe under his plants) and some special TLC is all he needs to produce beautiful tomatoes. He's already taken at least 12 pounds of produce from his 18 vines this year, he said, and "they're the best tomatoes I've ever eaten."

"This," he added, "shows what the Knox Prairie can produce."

Roberson Re-Elected

Bobby Roberson was elected to another term as commissioner by voters in Knox County's Precinct 2. Roberson received 174 votes to 130 cast for Wayne Sutton of Vera. Roberson led the three-man field in the Democratic primary, then won re-election in Saturday's runoff.

Most of the approximately 300 ballots cast in Knox County were in Precinct 2, which has voters in Benjamin, Vera, Knox City and Munday. Other races were for statewide races. The results look like this:

Tax Rebate Checks Reflect Decrease

Munday's 1986 tax rebate total is beginning to slip below the amount received by this time last year, according to statistics recently released by State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office. Munday has now received \$23,564.91 in six rebate checks this year. The total for the first six months of 1985 was slightly higher.

The city's June check was for \$2,035.44, compared to \$2,818.30 received last June.

Knox City received a check for \$4,417.95, compared to \$4,850.69 this month last year. Their 1986 total amounts to \$41,018.37, which is just over five percent more than the combined rebates for the first six months of 1985.

Benjamin, Goree and Weinert received no checks this month.

Overdue Book Fines Increased At Library

According to the City-County Library board, the policy making body of the local library, fines for overdue books will be increased to 10 cents per day effective immediately. This action was taken in a board meeting held Monday, June 9.

The new policy will be strictly enforced, so all library patrons are urged to return borrowed books on time.

The library will be a busy place this summer, with many children participating in the state summer reading program. There are a number of new adult fiction books on the shelves, too, and local readers are urged to take advantage of the entertainment and services the library has to offer.

County And Cities Receive Bank Taxes

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$57.4 million from the second year's collection of the state's franchise tax on banks to 2,022 local taxing jurisdictions. Knox County entities received over \$21,000.

The Munday Independent School District got a check for \$6,723.58 as the largest portion of the refund. The Knox City-O'Brien school district received \$4,167.59. City governments in Munday and Knox City received \$2,950.20 and \$2,453.50, respectively.

Other portions of the total tax collection went to Knox County, \$3,296.43; Knox County Drainage District No. 1, \$389.34; and the Knox County Hospital District, \$1,742.01.

The State Legislature brought banks under the franchise tax for the first time in 1984 and allocated receipts from the tax to cities, counties, school district and other local taxing units where the banks are located.

Banks are taxed at the same rate as other Texas corporations. Previously, bank stocks were subject to local property taxes. The Legislature exempted the stocks from property taxes, substituting the new bank franchise tax. Collections are prorated among local taxing units based on their tax rates.

Munday Ambulance Report For May

Twenty-two calls were made by the Munday Ambulance Service during the month of May, according to ambulance coordinator Bobby Hutchinson. This brings the number of calls made this year to 96.

An interesting fact relating to the number of calls made this year is that 23 of them, approximately 24 percent, were calls that would normally have been handled by the Knox City ambulance service. Between three and six Knox City calls have been answered each month in 1986 by the Munday ambulance. In some of these instances, the physician handling the case has requested that the Munday ambulance be used, in others the patient or his family has requested the local ambulance, and in around half of these calls, the Knox City ambulance was unable for some reason to respond when needed. The City of Munday has received no compensation for the service of our ambulance in Knox City.

Charges for the first five months have amounted to \$7,852.50, 48 percent of which has been paid.

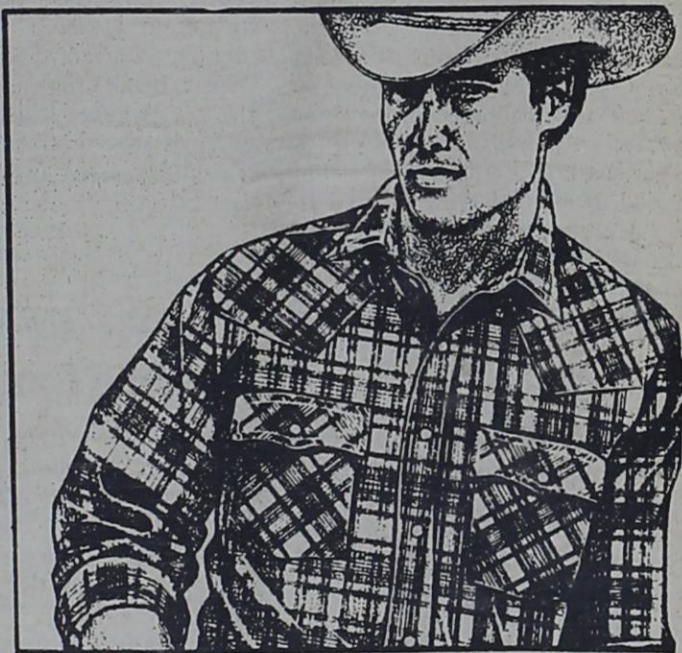

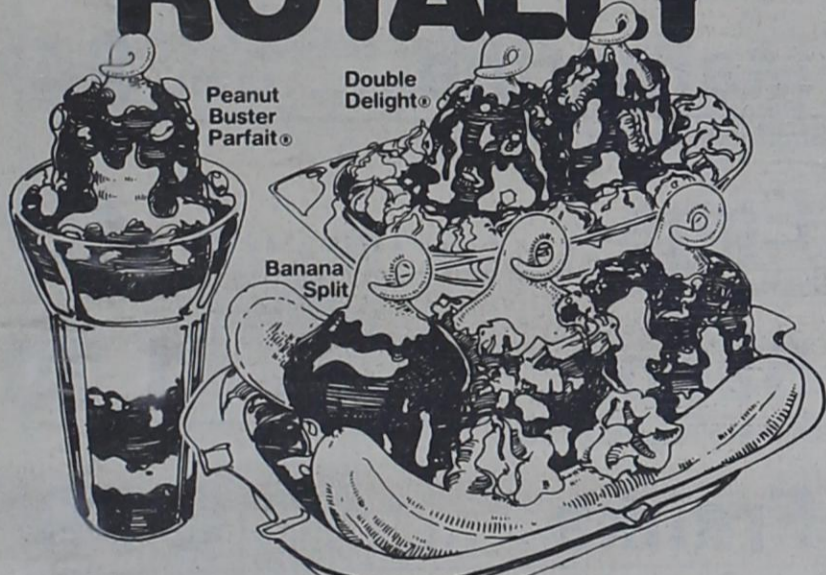

A Food Phobia

As if there weren't enough phobias to go around already, a British physiologist has named another. It's called "trophophobia," the fear of nutritious foods. This fear may be developed from the constant media barrage that makes people believe modern foods are poisonous, allergy producing, or lacking nutrition. Trophophobia may be grouped with other eating disorders like anorexia or bulimia.

Instead of barbecue sauce, use fresh or dried herbs to add flavor to food without extra fat or salt.

USE SAFE CANNING METHODS

If you're counting on canning some of the extra produce from your garden this summer, plan now to do it the safe way. Some canning methods, equipment and procedures are not safe and can result in food spoilage and even serious illness or death.

Canning in a microwave oven, for example, is dangerous. Microwave ovens do not allow even heat penetration in the closed canning jar and the metal lids interfere with heat distribution. The use of metals in a microwave can also damage the oven's magnetron tube, requiring costly repairs.

Canning in a conventional oven is not advisable, because oven temperatures vary as the heat goes off and comes on again. The dry heat may not penetrate the food thoroughly either.

Trying to can in a conventional oven is also a safety hazard. Pressure can built up in jars, causing them to explode, or jars may break as drafts of cooler air hit them when the oven door is open.

The "open kettle" canning method which was popular years ago, may not kill spoilage organisms. In the open kettle method, foods are simply heated

and put into sterile jars. Spoilage organisms can enter the jar when the food is transferred from kettle to jar. Also, the initial heat treatment may not be sufficient to destroy spoilage organisms and even if the jar seals, it may be only temporary.

Steam canners are also not fool-proof for canning. The U.S. Department of Agriculture does not recommend the use of steam canners when the process time is based on boiling water bath times.

SLIME MOLD APPEARING IN HOME LAWNS

Last week Walter Rauch of Knox City and Gary Howry of Munday called me reporting a black soot appearing on their bermudagrass. The soot didn't cover the yard, just small patches. What they were observing on their bermudagrass was slime mold.

Slime mold is a dark gray to black crust-like material that forms on the leaves and stems of bermudagrass. This soot-type material easily rubs off.

The slime mold does not feed on the green grass. It derives nourishment from decaying organic matter splashed up on the leaves and stems by rain or sprinklers.

The daily rain some areas in the county have been receiving has created ideal living conditions for

slime mold. Ordinarily it remains too dry for slime mold to develop so visibly as this year.

The only damage to bermudagrass resulting from slime mold is from shading. The mold keeps the grass from getting sunlight. It can be removed by water under pressure with a water hose or by brushing with a broom.

BOLL WEEVIL TRAPS STILL AVAILABLE

Knox County cotton producers still have time to put out boll weevil traps to be used to indicate need for early season control. Traps and pheromone may be picked up at Farmers Grain Co-op in Munday during business hours.

Dr. D.R. Rummell, professor of entomology at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock,

has developed a boll weevil trap index to indicate a need for early season control. The index is based on the number of boll weevils captured the week prior to first 1/3

grown square. Details on the use of the index are included with the traps.

The traps and pheromone are being sponsored by the Knox Coun-

ty Boll Weevil Association in conjunction with the Knox County Crops Committee.
