

Mayor Doris Dickerson of Munday has expressed support for Amendment 17 on the Novem general election ballot. The mayor said that Amendment 17 must pass if Texas cities are to successfully face the liability insurance crisis which has plagued municipal

School Officials Support Elected Board Of Education

The November amendment ballot will contain a referendum proposition that is very important to the educational system of Texas. Proposition One refers to the appointment or election of the State Board of Education.

In 1984, House Bill 72 temporarily did away with the 27-member elected board and instituted a 15member appointed board. However, the bill provided for this entity to revert back to the elected board in 1988. Voter approval of Proposition One could halt the return of an elected board and ensure that selection to the State Board of Education would be by appointment only.

A "yes" vote on Proposition One will maintain the 15-member appointed board, while a "no" vote will allow the voters of Texas to elect the 15 members. Those who vote in this statewide referendum will make the decision as to whether Texas has an appointed or elected State Board of Education.

The Texas Association of School Administrators and the Texas Association of School Boards are both supportive of the elected board. Currently, Munday Independent School District is part of District 14, represented on the board by Katherine Raines of Cleburne.

The Benjamin Mustangs - Goree Wildcat football game lived up to its advance billing as one of the hottest games in the area Friday night. Playing almost neck and neck through four quarters with the lead changing hands four times, the Mustangs finally took a hard-fought Jeff Pierce's 30-yard pass to Kemp Jones was the winning play, and Pierce added the extra points.

Ironically, the difference in the scores - 8 points - could have been made up if Goree had connected on all their extra points. Instead, Benjamin made good on all its bonus points, while Goree missed on all

but one score. Pierce was Benjamin's leading rusher with 130 yards on 29 carries and scored one running touchdown and on the final pass to Jones. Cotton Ginned

A total of 87 bales of cotton had been ginned in Munday as of Tuesday afternoon, and the prognosis among workers was "fair." No grades had been received yet. More cotton was being stripped at press time, and the gins were operating.

The first load of 1987 cotton was brought to Knox Prairie Co-op Friday afternoon by Floyd Reed. According to a co-op spokesman, the cotton is still pretty green and may not grade as well as they would like. However, it did appear better than cotton ginned here during the last couple of years.

Reports of a bumper cotton crop this year are cropping up in newspapers every day, and producers say if the weather cooperates with some more warm, dry days to make the bolls open, this prediction may hold true. The price is not high at the moment, but much of the area crop has already been contracted and a good bit of the remaining cotsults will be printed in next week's ton is expected to go into the loan



government for several years.

Amendment 17 would empower the state legislature, and not the courts, to determine how much liability a city has for each of its activities. Some municipal activities, known as "governmental" activities, are subject to limits of liability. For other activities, known as "proprietary" activities, the city faces unlimited liability.

"This amendment will finally bring some predictability to the municipal insurance marketplace," the mayor said, "because it will allow the legislature to specifically determine which activities are governmental and which are proprietary. I believe that with predictability will come stabilized insurance costs."

Historically in Texas, the courts Munday twirlers Alicia Cook and have decided whether a municipal Angie Offutt received first division function was governmental or proprietary. "Each court decision changed the playing field," the mayor said, "and insurance premiums continued to climb, if coverage

believe that over the long term, Amendment 17 will help hold costs down," the Mayor said.

"Amendment 17 will not allow any city to avoid liability lawsuits,"

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines

1. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over -An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors

should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

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Get Social Security Numbers For Income Tax Dependents

People who intend to list dependents age 5 and older on their 1987 Federal tax returns must show ocial Security numbers for those dependents," Frances Braden, Social Security representative in Vernon said. This is required by the Tax Reform Act of 1986.

"We urge people to apply now for these numbers while there is more than ample time," Braden said. "If they wait until 1988, they may find that the process takes longer due to heavier workloads, and they would be unable to file their tax returns early."

A person can apply for a Social Security number at any Social Security office. Persons 18 or older must apply for a Social Security number in person.

"But, parents applying for children can do so by mail," Braden said. "In fact, they can start the ap-

CAPITOL **JOURNAL**

STEVEN A. CARRIKER House of Representatives

This is the last in a series of informational columns on the constitutional amendments and referendum proposals which Texas voters will consider on November 3. This column highlights the two referendum issues which will appear at the end of the ballot. Be sure to exercise your right to vote on these important issues November 3.

Referendum No. 1: "The State Board of Education shall be composed of members who are appointed from districts instead of elected. with equal representation from throughout the State of Texas."

Well, H. Ross Perot is back again, telling us common folks how we should run our public schools. The State Board of Education, as part of HB 72, is scheduled to become an elected board with the 1988 elections. H. Ross thinks an elected board is a mistake, because he can pick a better Board of Education than you can.

This referendum proposition will cancel the scheduled election of the board next year, making the appointed board permanent. The current elected system would have the voters choose 15 SBOE members for staggered four-year terms which would begin in 1989. The Legislature never intended to install a permanent appointed board. HB 72 explicitly said that the appointed panel was a temporary measure to coincide with other school reforms. If you defeat this referendum proposal, the elected board will occur as scheduled with the 1988 elections.

Referendum No. 2: "The legalization of pari-mutuel wagering under the Texas Racing Act on a county-by-county local option basis."

This is your choice to decide this controversial issue directly at the ballot box. As you know, this proposition would allow gambling on horse and greyhound racing in Texas. Racing permits would be issued only after approval by local voters in the county where the track would be located.

The racing law would allow no more than three greyhound tracks. If approved by local voters, these would be located in Galveston, Corpus Christi, and Brownsville. For horse racing, three levels of tracks would be authorized by the Texas Racing Act. There would be no more than four "Class-1" tracks in the state. These major racetracks would be located in Dallas, Houston, San Antonio, and Fort Worth-Arlington. The secondary "Class-2" tracks are restricted to 44 race days each year, except for Class-2 tracks located in a national historic district (no limit on race days). The "Class-3" tracks would be operated by a county or nonprofit fair, and could not have more than 16 race days each year. There is no limit on the number of Class-2 and Class-3 horseracing tracks.

Supporters say horse racing would boost the economic development of the state and provide badly needed revenue to the state. Supporters assert that more than 20,000 Texas jobs will be created by this new industry. Opponents say that legalized gambling will lure organized crime to Texas. The opponents fear that the long-term harm of increased criminal activity far outweighs any benefits which might be derived from legalized racing.

You know where you stand on this topic. The fate of this controversial issue will be decided by you, the voter.


