Look To The East

In newspapering, there are many versions as to the origin of the term "30."

In the days of the linotype and "hot" metal printing, we used the 30 dash to denote the end, or "that's all, folks, there ain't no more." It was about 6 picas long, as opposed to the 2½-pica "gem" dash used to separate the headline from the story proper.

There are ten such claims to the origin of "30", published in an earlier edition of the Texas Press Messenger. Here they are:

1. At one place the deadline for copy was 2:30 a.m. Time is precious to a newspaperman, and 2:30 a. m. took some time to say. To shorten it by a few seconds, the term "30" was used — and still is.

2. In the days before typewriters, XXX (Roman for 30) on manuscript copy indicated the end of a story.

3. "Thirty" was used to label the last dispatch when the Associated Press was established.

4. Early telegraph operators developed a code in which various numbers stood for different phrases. "Thirty" meant "end of item."

5. The end of the "thirty tyrants" appointed by the Spartans at the close of the Peloponnesian War to rule Athens, who were finally overthrown and caused a general rejoicing. When copywriters finish the end of the story, they supposedly rejoiced similarly.

6. Before the newspapers had direct telegraph wires, the operator would write at the bottom of the last sheet "3 o'clock," which was shortened to "3 o'c" and then "30."

7. "Thirty" was the number of a telegraph operator who remained at his post sending messages during a major disaster. He met his death.

8. "Thirty pica ems" was the maximum length line used in early typesetting machines. Thus "30" was the end of the line.

9. "Eighty" means farewell in Bengali. An English officer used the figures at the end of a letter to the East India Company in 1758. Adopting the figures for brevity in dealings, the company mistakenly made them "30."

10. The First messages sent to the central press office during the Civil War totalled 30 words. The thirty, together with the words "good night" and the signature of the ender, were placed at the bottom of the sheet by the telegrapher.

At the end of our typewritten copy, we used to put —30— like this.

When a newspaperman expired, we'd say "he signed '30' to his life."

With all this knowledge of the term, it would be tragic if you went out, pointed a gun at your forehead and yelled: "Hey, this is '30' for me" before pulling the trigger!

You may use this as a forerunner and a reminder that very soon we as a nation will be writing "30" to a Democratic administration that lasted only four years this time. Very short in comparison to the one Franklin D. Roosevelt started in the early 1930s and continued on into this great man's fourth term. This was possibly the longest tenure for any administration.

Party control in our nation, and the Capitol, changes ever now and then. During the political campaigns and transition periods, there is much raving and ranting about what a

Heatly Is Cited For His Service In Legislature

Rep. Bill Heatly, who begins a new term in the Texas Legislature as representative of the 101st District, was honored by friends at a reception in Austin on January 8, just ahead of the opening of this session.

On this occasion, Speaker of the House Bill Clayton read a "proclamation" in which Mr. Heatly was cited for his years of service to the people of his district. Rep. Heatly begins his 26th year and 14th term as a member of the House.

Born in Limestone County, near Mart, in 1912, the citation stated that Heatly was quarterback of his high school team to 15 consecutive victories in 1929. After graduation, he attended Decatur Baptist College, and Baylor University, where he received his bachelor of arts degree, and a law degree from the University of Texas.

He practiced law in Dallas, Beaumont, Wichita Falls and Paducah. Moving to Paducah in 1948 he became active in many areas of service. In 1953, Gov. Allan Shivers appointed him to the Texas Commission on Alcoholism, when the commission was first organized.

He was first elected to the House in 1954, and has held numerous influential positions, such as: State Affairs Commission, House Appropriation Committee since 1956, the Legislative Council, Legislative Budget Board, and many other posts.

Always boosting education, he has given meritorious service to Baylor University and other institutions of higher learning, and in 1968, Howard Payne College conferred an honorary doctor of laws degree on him.

"The superior political leadership exercised by this eminent lawmaker over the past two and one-half decades has contributed greatly to the growth and progress of this state," the citation reads, "and it is appropriate that he be recognized for his exceptional work."

Munday Ambulance Service Completed 172 Calls During The Year

At the close of December 1980, the Munday Ambulance Service had completed 172 calls for the 1980 calendar year, according to Bobby Hutchinson, director of Munday Ambulance Service. Total charges made for the year were \$8,591.00.

Area Cotton Harvest Nearing Completion

The 1980-81 cotton harvest was almost completed before being delayed by light rain on Thursday, B.B. Manly reported that cotton producers made substantial progress with the harvest during the past two weeks, but several thousand bales of seed cotton remain on gin yards waiting to be ginned. About 37,000 cotton samples were classed at the USDA Cotton Marketing Services Office in Abilene during the week ending January 8, which brought the seasonal total to 156,000. An additional 9600 samples were classed at Munday, which brought the seasonal total to 29,000 at that office. The combined

City Council Minutes

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met December 29, 1980, at the Munday City Hall at 7:30 p. m. in Special Session.

Members present: Mayor James W. Reid and Aldermen M. M. Booe, Ray Lynn Hardin, A. Dale Selzer, Larry Smith, and Donald Hobert.

Members absent: None. Mayor Reid called the meeting to order. Minutes of the December 18, 1980 special meeting were read. Hardin moved for approval. Hobert seconded. All in favor.

Purpose of this meeting was to hold a public hearing to secure public input as to community needs.

Those in attendance and registering were: Jessie Tucker, Horace Spells, Mrs. Horace Spells, Ida Jo Stinnett, Ira Shields, and Robert L. Thomas.

Mayor Reid explained that the City of Munday will file a pre-application for approximately \$400,000, in Housing and Urban Development Discretionary Funds. There is no guarantee we will be funded, he said, however, we will try again this year with an updated application. Those present expressed dire need for paving, curbing and drainage on Fir Street and adjacent areas. This and a small amount of paving on North 13th Street is what we have in our pre-application Mayor Reid said.

Those present expressed agreement with the pre-application priorities.

M. M. Booe moved the Mayor be authorized to sign a pre-application which requests \$400,000 from H.U.D. Discretionary Funds for street paving, curbs, water-sewer relocations as needed etc. on Fir Avenue and Adjacent streets and on North 13th. Street more fully described in the City H.U.D. file of 1980. Smith moved for adjournment. Hardin seconded. Carried.

Pecan Harvest
Down; Citrus
Crop Up 14%

AUSTIN—Fewer pecans
this year means bad news for
pecan lovers in Texas.
Agriculture Commissioner
Reagan V. Brown has
reported.

After last year's bountiful
91-million pound harvest,
Texas pecan growers will only
pick around 22 million
pounds of the crop.

Brown said the huge drop is
due to several factors
including the drought and the
pecan trees' natural
inclination to produce a small
crop after a banner year.

According to Texas Crop
and Livestock Reporting
Service, the decline is even
greater than anticipated in
October when 25 million
pounds were projected for
harvest.

All is not lost, however.
Citrus fruit, another winter
favorite, is of good quality
and size. Brown reports
around 9 million boxes of
grapefruit are expected to be
picked by season's end, 14
percent more than last year's
crop.

Orange production is
estimated at 5,600,000 boxes,
a 39 percent increase over
last year when the citrus crop
was recovering from freeze
damage suffered the previous
winter.

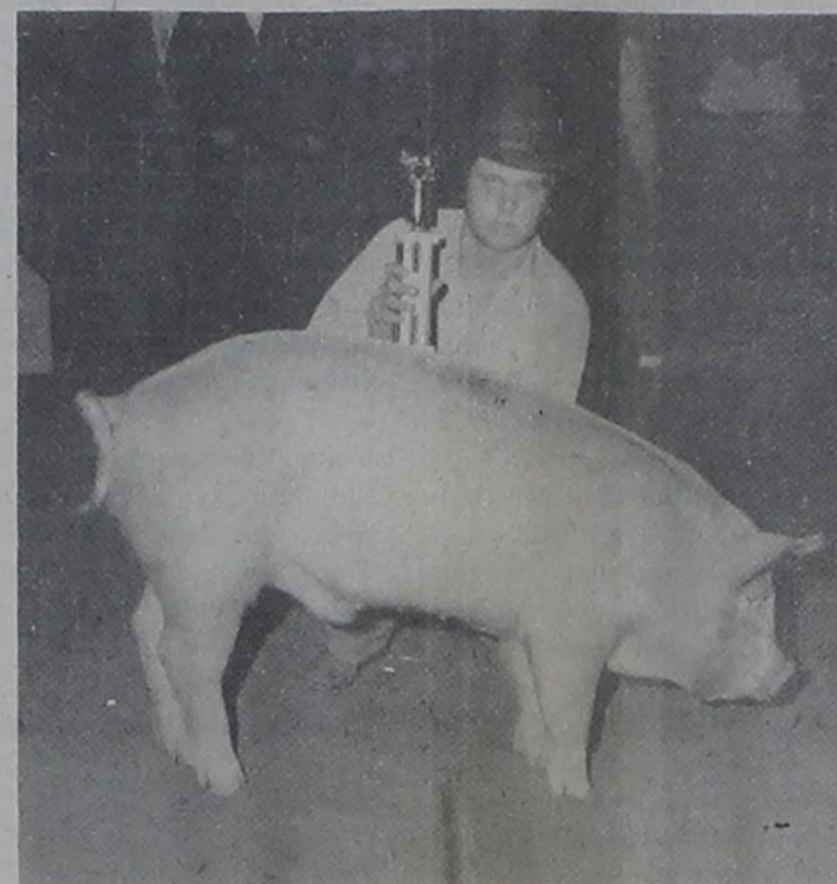

"UNITY OF FAITH"

There is much confusion and disagreement in our religious world today. Yet Jesus prayed for UNITY, and Paul admonished us to teach the same thing.

Ephesians 4:13-15 - "Until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining the full measure of perfection found in Christ. Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching (doctrine) and by the cunning and craftiness of men in their deceitful scheming. Instead speaking the truth in love, we will in all things grow up into him who is the Head, that is, Christ."

Denominationalism is what Jesus prayed against in John 17. The word itself expresses a division, or to divide. It is solid Bible teaching to advocate unity. Jesus taught us to build upon the foundation of the apostles (Eph. 2:20) and that every man should take heed, for no one can ever lay another foundation, which is Jesus Christ. Today, some do, thus their spiritual house is built upon sand rather than rock, (Mt. 7:24-27) and our house will fall if it was not built upon the Truth or Solid Foundation. Examine your faith, your doctrine, your teachings about salvation (II Cor. 13:5) and see if they parallel with the truths of the Bible. Why? (1) To

have unity of the Faith, (2) To not be tossed to and fro with every wind of doctrine, (3) To have our foundation built upon truth, lest our spiritual house fall.

It doesn't matter how good we are morally, how religious we are, or even how much we feel and think that we are saved, if we haven't built upon the solid foundation. It is our concern that we preach all the message or none. (Rev. 22:18-19) Our purpose will be served by viewing the rudiments of the gospel, or the first principles which is the foundation of truth, that Jesus died for.

Please read and study these scriptures, to see if your house is built on the "Solid Foundation." In Mt. 28:18-20 and Mk. 16:15-16 is known as the Great Commission or the Great Command. If we haven't obeyed these scriptures, we haven't built

upon the Rock. Many denominations obey and teach some of these, but nearly all leave the last command, to be baptized, and if they teach baptism, it is not to be saved as the Bible teaches but for some other reason. The Bible is an open Book. Please develop your own Faith from your own study.

It was the command of Jesus to obey His words that we might have Eternal Life. (Jh. 6:68) Build your Faith on these First Principle Teachings: With the commands, are also given the alternatives to not obeying - (1) To Believe, Jh. 3:16-Jh. 8:24 (2) To Repent (to change) Acts 2:38 - Lk. 13:3-5 (3) To Confess, Rom. 10:9,10 - Mt. 10:32,33 (4) To be baptized, Acts 2:38, (Note: For Forgiveness of Sins New International Version) Mk. 16:15,16 - Jh. 3:3.

He was born January 1, 1909, in Moran, and was a member of the Assembly of God Church in Munday. His wife is the former Priscilla Chavez.

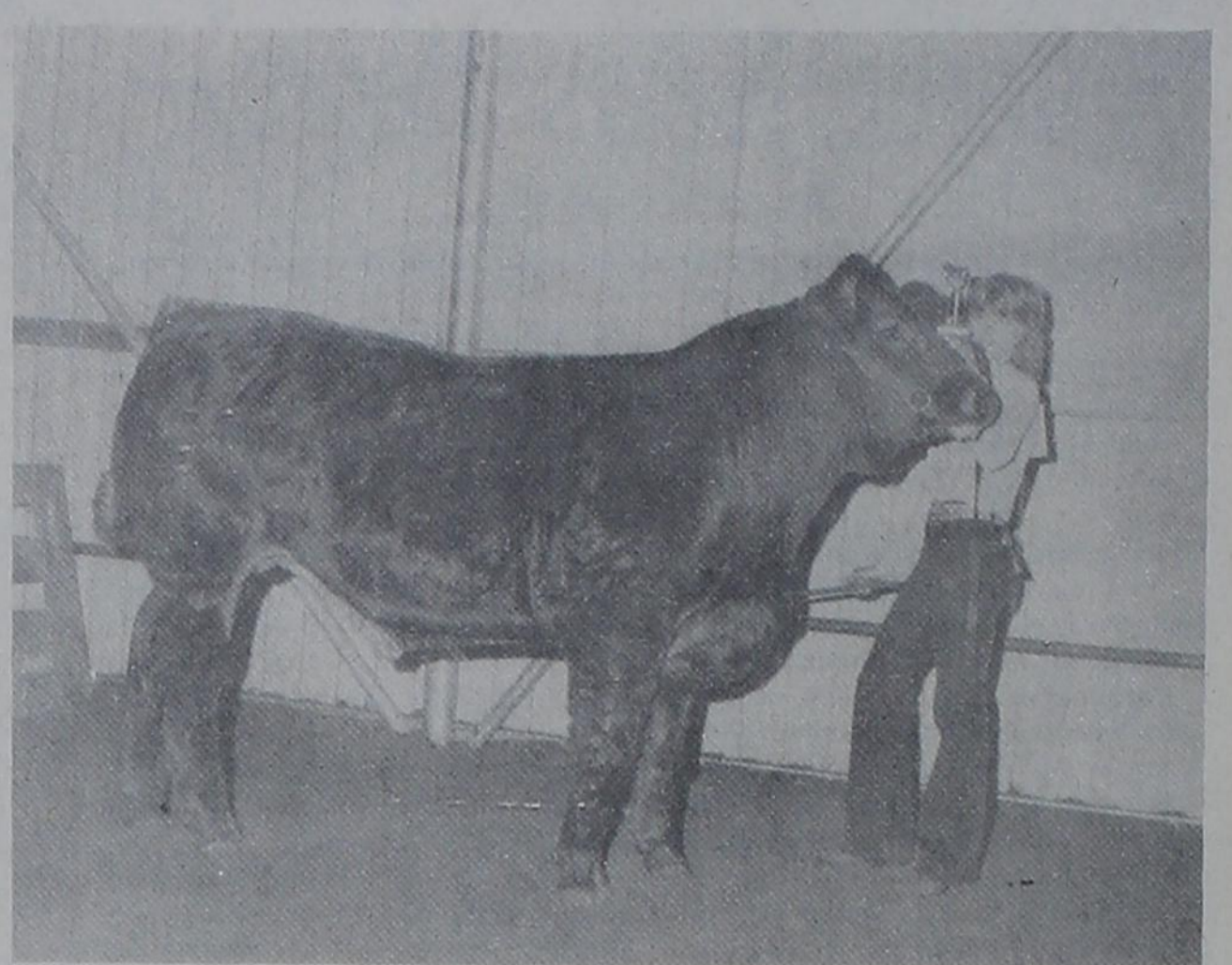

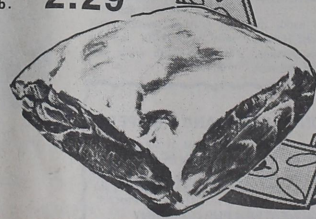
