

Long Term Agreements Meet Needs

Long Term Agreements are used in Knox County to provide enough cost shared assistance over a three to five year period to help farmers or ranchers carry out needed conservation measures. The LTA program is used on a farm or part of a farm or ranch to provide cost share assistance of up to \$3,500 per year. This amount includes all cost share assistance a

producer receives in all counties and states.

The LTA program can help producers carry out large projects on their land by providing a steady inflow of cost share money. LTA's also allow a producer the chance to carry out a series of conservation measures without having to depend on getting ACP money each year. When an LTA contract is approved, the total cost share is set aside for that contract. This guarantees the amount of money the producer receives. The LTA must meet the minimum conservation requirements of the land under the agreement, but several county land-owners and operators have been very happy with their contract.

If you are thinking about an LTA program come by the SCS and ASCS offices in Knox City for more details. One point to remember is that the total allocation for the LTA program varies from year to year so the number of people who can enter the program will be limited. Sign-ups for Long Term Agreements will be announced in 1984.

The nature of blood is such that it must be transfused in its whole state within 35 days after being drawn and the blood given to a patient must be compatible with its own blood group and type. The Blood Banks of Texas will need approximately one million units of blood in 1984. The giving of blood is safe and harmless and someday your life may depend upon its availability.

Therefore, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate January, 1984, as Volunteer Blood Donor Month in Texas, and urge all citizens to participate in this life-saving program.

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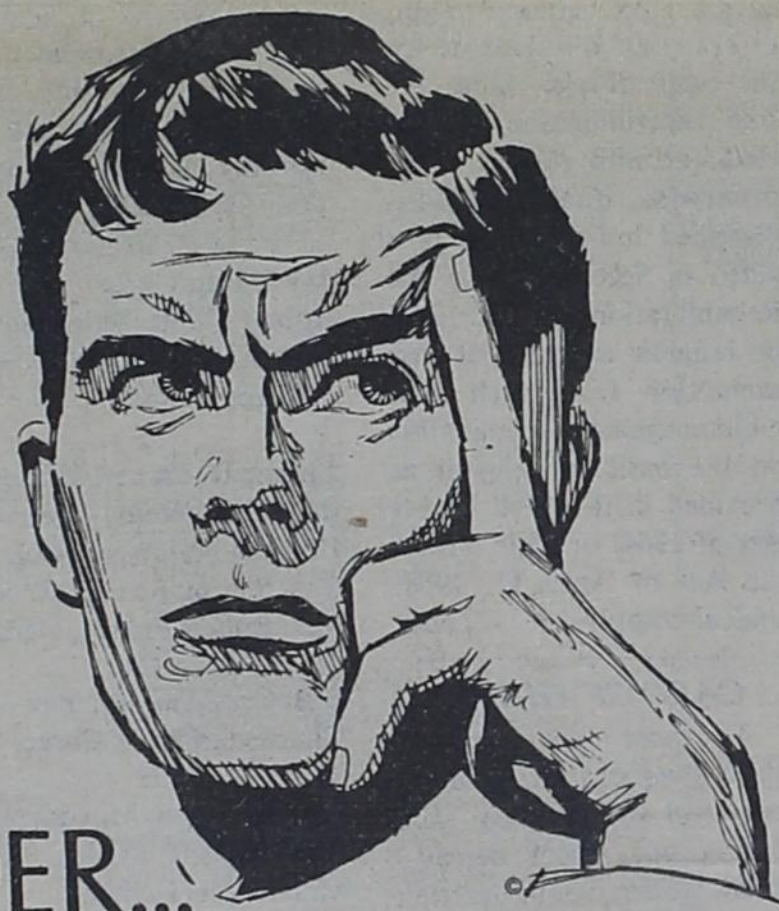
