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

## Area Recovering From Winter Storm

Blue skies and sunshine this week are beautiful sights to Munday residents who have suffered through more than two weeks of cold, icy winter weather.

Snow began falling during the afternoon on Thursday, December 15, and accumulated rapidly. The really cold weather started on Saturday, after a high temperature of 34 degrees. For the next nine days - 216 hours - the temperature stayed below freezing. On Monday, December 26, we reached a high of 39, but the "warming trend" didn't last

. . . of times we'd gather coal from the railway right-of-way to have fuel for warmth and cooking . . . of gathering cowships in towsacks and using them for fuel . . . of trying to better ourselves as Papa made the transition from barber to farmer . . . of Mother saying "I don't feel very hungry" at night when she knew there wasn't quite enough food to go 'round . . . of vaccinations for smallpox, battles with measles, mumps, scarlet fever and other childhood diseases.

We could go on and on at some length, but this little poem we ran across recently entitled "Not For Me" tells the remainder of the story perhaps better than we could:

When we were living those good old

They didn't seem so good; We read by the light of a kerosene

And heated our homes with wood. We carried water up the hill To wash with, cook and scrub, And we took our baths behind the

In a galvanized laundry tub. I can still smell the lye soap And feel the sting and hurt When some of it got in my eyes But it really got the dirt.

We slept on cornhusk mattresses.

Sometimes three in a bed, If you were late you got the foot, The early ones got the head. We waded snow and ice and mud To get to the 'seat of learning' With a potbellied stove that Froze our backs while our fronts Were nearly burning.

We drank from a cup by a water pail On a bench where the teacher put it, And whatever ailment any kid had The rest were sure to get it. In winter you milked in a drafty barn

And the swirling snow while you were inside

Piled up your fresh-made tracks. A little house at the end of a patch Half-hidden with brush and weeds In summer's heat and winter's cold Served other family needs.

## Munday Cagers To Begin District Play

Munday varsity basketball teams returned to action after a much-needed holiday break, and won their final games of 1983. Scheduled games with Stamford were cancelled on Thursday, December 29, but several Weinert fans made the short trip to Munday the next night to watch their teams lose hardfought games to the home squads.

The Mogulettes upped their record to 11-4 with a 38-31 victory over the Lady Bulldogs. Laura Myers was the top scorer with 10 points, and the rest of the scoring was very balanced, with Holly Hutchinson and Beverly Brown contributing 7 each and Janet Myers and Kelli Smith adding 6 more.

The Moguls got back on the winning track with a 54-43 win against Weinert. Johnny Collier canned 20 points to lead the team.

Varsity and junior varsity teams traveled to Throckmorton on Tuesday, January 3 for their last non-district games. Conference play will begin Friday, January 6, when the Moguls and Mogulettes will host Paducah for four games beginning at 4 p.m. On Tuesday, January 10, the Seymour Panthers and Pantherettes will be in Munday, then the local teams will go on the road against Haskell and Rotan.

Both the Moguls and Mogulettes are rated third in this district by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches. State-ranked Seymour is picked to win the girls' bracket, followed by Paducah. The boys' division is predicted to finish the same way it did in 1983, with Haskell and Hamlin advancing to the playoffs.



The show will be held this year at the old Dunbar gym near Munday. The Brazos Valley Young Farmers are in charge of the show and are working with county extension agents and vocational agriculture teachers.

Judging of lambs, chickens and rabbits will be on Friday, and hogs and cattle will be shown the next day. Don Ballard, a Rule agriculture teacher, will judge the livestock.

## **Local TV Cable** System Expands

Sammy Decker of CenTex Cablevision has announced that the current cable system in Munday, Haskell and Stamford will undergo a facelift early in 1984. Rebuilding of the system will begin in Munday in mid to late January.

Construction will entail replacement of all current electric components in the system and a portion of the cable itself. The results will be a higher quality service and an expanded channel capacity that will enable CenTex to offer more cable channels in the future.

During the construction work, Decker said, there will be short periods of time in which service may be interrupted due to the switchover to the new system. Customers may also expect a slight delay in response to regular service calls because of the extra workload.

## Long Term Agreements Meet Needs

Long Term Agreements are used in Knox County to provide enough cost shared assistance over a three to five year period to help farmers or ranchers carry out needed conservation measures. The LTA program is used on a farm or part of a farm or ranch to provide cost share assistance of up to \$3,500 per year. This amount includes all cost share assistance a

producer receives in all coun. ties and states.

The LTA program can help producers carry out large projects on their land by providing a steady inflow of cost share money. LTA's also allow a producer the chance to carry out a series of conservation measures without having to depend on getting ACP money each year. When an LTA contract is approved. the total cost share is set aside for that contract. This guarantees the amount of money the producer receives. The LTA must meet the minimum conservation requirements of the land under the agreement, but several county land-owners and operators have been very happy with their contract.

If you are thinking about an LTA program come by the SCS and ASCS offices in Knox City for more details. One point to remember is that the total allocation for the LTA program varies from year to year so the number of people who can enter the program will be limited. Sign-ups for Long Term Agreements will be announced in 1984.





### ORDINANCE An ordinance by the City

Council of the City of Munday, Texas, providing for the disposal of unclaimed property providing for a hold harmless provision, and declaring an emergency.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Munday, Texas. Section 1

All abandoned, stolen or recovered property of every kind, which shall remain unclaimed with the City of Munday for a period of thirty days, without being claimed or reclaimed by the owner, whether known or not may be sold or disposed of as provided for in Section 2. Section 2

All unclaimed property as heretofore described in Section I shall be sold by sealed bids. The City Administrator shall be authorized to set a minimum amount for each item to be sold for expenses incurred for storage of said items. A list of all items shall be made available to the public and inspection of the items shall be permitted. In the event a minimum bid is not received for any item to be sold, the items shall be disposed of in such manner as the City Administrator shall prescribe.

Section 3 The City of Munday, Texas, and their respective agents, servants and employees, shall be held harmless and indemnified, from and against any and all claims for damage or injuries to persons or property of whatsoever kind or character, whether real or asserted, arising out of or incident to the selling of said unclaimed property and other operations arising under or otherwise incident to the provisions of this ordinance. Section 4

The importance of this ordinance creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the rule requiring ordinances to be read at three several meetings be suspended, and this rule is hereby suspended, and the ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its adoption.
