# Foster Parents Badly Needed In Munday Area

A critical need for foster parents in the local area is being brought to our attention by the Texas Department of Human Services. An orientation meeting for prospective foster parents will be held at 7 p.m. Tuesday, July 7, at the First United Methodist Church in Seymour.

The TDHS Children's Protective Services receives calls from concerned citizens when a child is observed being abused or neglected. Such calls are investigated by a child welfare worker to determine the extent and seriousness of the referral.

If the welfare worker finds the situation life threatening, in that the child's welfare cannot be guaranteed in their home, a court order is secured to remove the child from the home and put him or her into protective foster care while the family is being rehabilitated or while a permanent plan is being developed for the child.

It is at this point that foster homes become critically important. Individuals or families who are willing to be licensed by TDHA to become foster homes take these children, nurture them and help them cope with the trauma suffered from the abuse that has caused them to be removed from their family. These children must also learn to cope with the confusion of having to

be separated from their biological families. Foster parents are needed to help children who are going through a difficult time in their

TDHS is interested in working with many different kinds of families. Single people and working mothers can be foster parents. Minority families are certainly needed and can play a valuable role working toward the best interests of children. Grandparents often have special skills and time to offer children.

Foster parents are reimbursed for their expenses at the rate of \$8 a day for new borns through children nine

years of age and \$9 a day for those ages 10-17. All medical expenses are

Knox County residents willing to become foster parents or who are incrested in learning more about the program should contact Debby Vaughn at the TDHS office in Seymour, 888-2552, or attend the orienation program.

Citizens are also reminded of their responsibility for reporting possible child abuse if they suspect a child is in danger of physical or scaual abuse or severe neglect. Local residents should call 658-3524 to oport suspected child abuse, and the calls will be kept strictly con-





REDUCED TILLAGE WHEAT Reduced tillage wheat is nothing

new but it has gained renewed interest as equipment operation costs have risen and chemical costs have leveled off. Randal Kinnibrugh of Vera is presently comparing reduced tillage to standard tillage practices for wheat production.

On March 4, Kinnibrugh had 1/3 ounce per acre of Glean and 4 ounces per acre of 2,4-D flown on a 63 acre wheat field. A thirty foot When you subtract the \$7.70 addistrip on the west side of the field was left untreated. Kinnibrugh had planned to make all chemical applications himself but wet conditions in March made this impossible. The total cost for chemical and application was \$7.70 per acre.

SUMMERTIME FOOD SAFETY Summer is a time for taking food out to the porch, the park and the lake. Not remembering food safety

on these outings can lead to food

poisoning, which is no picnic. Food safety begins at the grocery store. Pick up poultry and meat last, and get them home and stored in the

refrigerator as soon as possible. If leaving home for a cookout, pack wisely. Make sure the cooler is well insulated and has enough ice to

keep the food cold. Before barbequing, make sure everything is clean, from hands to cooking utensils to preparation surfaces. A quick wash with hot soapy water will do. Use separate cutting boards and utensils for raw and

cooked foods, or wash them thoroughly between uses. Make sure and wash hands often to avoid "cross contamination."

Never use the same plate for cooked meat or poultry that once had raw meat or poultry on it, unless it has been thoroughly washed in hot, soapy water.

The flu like symptoms of food poisoning are unwelcome picnic guests. Food-borne illnesses can be prevented by handling food wisely.

WHO'S ON A DIET? Are you going on a diet? If so, you're not alone. More than one in three Americans are on some sort of diet, according to a 1986 survey by the Marketing Research Corporation of America.

Almost two out of three dieters are women, 34 percent of whom are between the ages of 18 and 44. Women over 45 represent another 29 percent, and male dieters comorise another 32 percent.

The reason for dieting varied. Forty percent of the dieters said they were dieting to lose weight, 19 percent were dieting to maintain weight, 39 percent dieted for

medical or health reasons. Others were on low-salt, low-fat, and lowcholesterol plans.

DEALING WITH CHILDREN AND SUMMER

The hot temperature of summer often reflects the "hot temperatures" of children. "Free" time and increased interaction during summer holidays provide many opportunities for youngsters to find themselves at odds with friends, brothers and sisters, and parents.

Instead of giving up or losing patience with children, try following these suggestions from the National Institute of Mental Health:

\*Find children's positive behavior and praise it.

\*Provide physical outlets for children's abundance of energy.

\*Plan surroundings and situations so undesired behaviors are less likely to occur.

\*Help children understand the cause of stressful situations so they can learn to respond properly.

\*Use physical restraint when necessary, but explain the reasons behind it.

\*Set as few limits as possible, in terms children understand.

\*Accept children's angry feelings and offer appropriate ways for them

to express their anger. \*Encourage children to see themselves as valued people.

\*Express affection and help children understand your love and con-

\*Set good examples because adult actions are powerful influences.

Parents may find the summer season offers more opportunities than desired to teach children how to deal with anger and frustration. Hopefully, with understanding and patience, parents and children can benefit from their increased interactions and gain on self-control.




