The Munday Mogul coaching staff has been hired, and are preparing for the 1994-95 season.

Four of the five coaches are new to Munday Independent School District. They include head football coach Steve Gideon, who comes to us from Groesbeck, east of Waco. Coach Gideon and his wife, Ralene, have two children, Quincee, their 7 year old daughter, and a son, Blake, who is 5 years old.

Coaching the offensive and defensive line will be Ross Austin. Coach Austin is originally from Winters, but his most recent position was at Kirby High School in Memphis, Tennessee. His wife's name is Crystal, and they have two children, Rayna who is a 5th grader, and Tatiana, a 3rd grader.

Lance Campbell will be the head boys' basketball coach. He will also coach linebackers and receivers during the football season. Coach Campbell comes to Munday from Wylie High School outside of Plano. He and his wife, Kobi, have a 2 year old daughter, Brittany.

Last but not least is Coach Leaverton who will start his third year on the Mogul coaching staff. He is defensive coordinator, and will be helping with the offensive and defensive line.

Coach Gideon invites all the local athletes to the football stadium from 8 p.m. to 10 p.m. each Tuesday and Thursday evenings for games of pass-tag. This will be a good time to get to know the new coaches and have a little fun before the two-a-days start.

If you did not receive a medical form in the mail, they are available at the Munday Clinic, but they must be signed by the parent or guardian before the doctor will perform the exam.

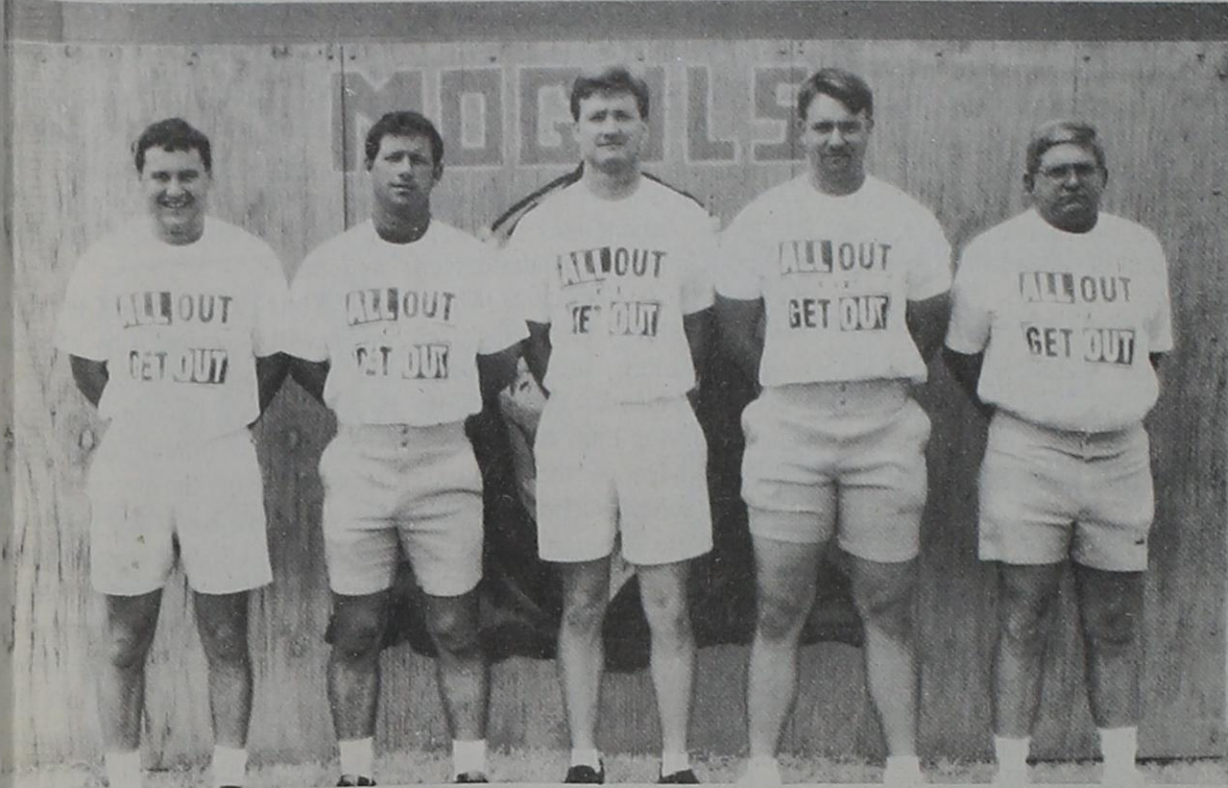

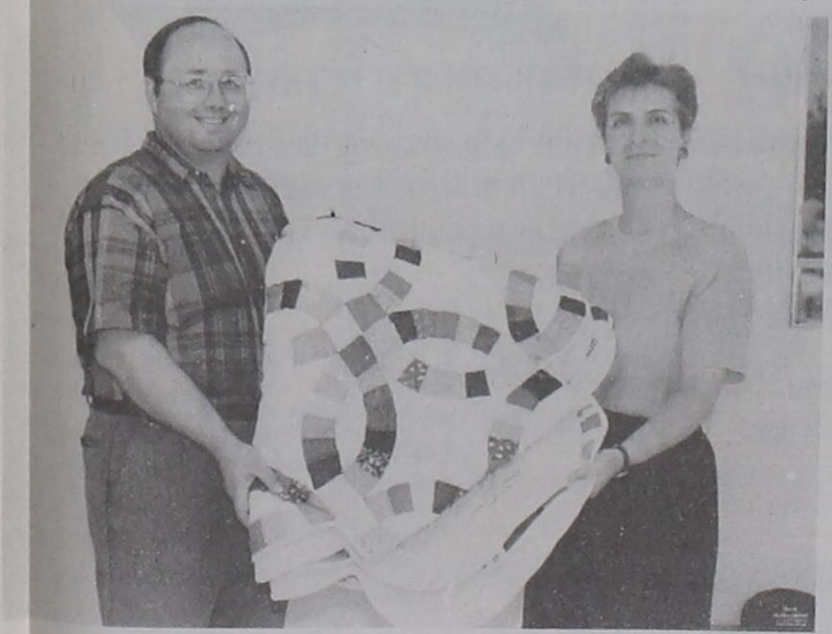
will present a program of gospel and sacred songs that will be inspirational and educational.

TAAS results received from Munday ISD spring testing

The Munday ISD have received the results of the spring 1994 TAAS test. The results show that students in all grades that took the test made significant gains as compared to 1993. The results also show that Munday students scored higher than the statewide averages.

On the reading section of the test, 82.3% of the students in grades 4, 8 and 10 passed the test. This compares with 63.6% on the spring 1993 test. On the mathematics section of the test, 77.2% of all students in grades 4, 8 and 10 passed the test compared to 44.2% on the spring 1993 test. Passing the writing section was 86.1% of the same grades, up 3% from spring 1993.

The results also show gains in each grade and group that was tested. For example in reading this year's fifth graders improved from 39.3% passing in 1993 to 71.0% passing in 1994. In math 39.3% in 1993 to 74.2% this year.

Statewide results show gains but not as great as in the Munday ISD. Most groups showed a five to ten

percent increase whereas the Munday students in most cases showed a 20% increase or more. The major exception was in writing which showed only a small increase because the scores were already high. This was also the trend statewide.

This year's schools are accredited on the results of all students taking the tests. Next year schools will be accredited according to how well individual groups do on all sections of the test. All minority groups as well as economically disadvantaged students must score above 35% passing all sections of the test.

Jerome Hall, superintendent of the Munday schools, would like to commend all students and teachers on the gains made on the TAAS test that were taken this spring.

Schools will be receiving their accountability rating no later than August 2. The rating will include the district's accreditation status, and campus ratings for all campuses. It is expected that Munday ISD will be fully accredited.

The following cases were tried on Wednesday, July 6, in the 50th Judicial District Court of Knox County in Benjamin.

Travis Jearold Scott, 61, of Lubbock was sentenced to 30 months probation and assessed a \$1,000 fine on a felony DWI charge.

Dalinda Mangis, 31, of Knox City, was given 2 years deferred adjudication on a felony theft charge.

Eddie Russell Jr., 66, of Goree, was sentenced to 5 years probation and assessed a \$1,500 fine.

District Attorney Bill Neal represented the State, and District Judge David Hajek was presiding judge.

Approval to Hay and Graze CRP Acres

Knox County has been approved to hay and graze CRP acres. However, please read carefully - the haying and grazing is not free and it has other stipulations attached as follows:

1. Your 1995 annual CRP payment will be reduced by 25% on the acres hayed or grazed.
2. You must have approval before haying or grazing CRP acres. If you are using the hay or grazing for your own livestock you must file form CCC-653 to determine that you have suffered at least a 40% loss of hay and pasture.
3. If you sell the hay to another livestock producer, he must file form CCC-653 and be determined to have suffered at least a 40% loss of hay and pasture before baling or grazing CRP.
4. You must leave at least 25% of each CRP field unharmed or ungrazed for wildlife cover.
5. You must agree to re-establish at your own expense any cover damaged by the grazing or baling.
6. Only 1 cutting of hay may be made and must be completed by September 30, 1994. All bales or stacks must be removed from the field by December 31, 1994.
7. The final date to graze is September 30, 1994. The animal unit stocking rate determined by SCS and approved on the Forage Inventory and Annual Grazing Plan, shall not be exceeded.
8. This authority applies only to the CRP acreage physically located in Knox County, regardless of where the headquarters county for the farm is located.
9. CRP acres can be hayed or grazed; however, haying and grazing on the same acres is not permitted.
10. Violation of any of the haying and grazing rules can result in severe penalties and/or termination of your contract. Also, you cannot harvest the hay for your own livestock and then sell it to somebody else at a later date. All persons receiving hay or grazing from the CRP must be approved in advance by the Knox County ASCS office.

The program is under a new name this year "Texas Country Clean Up". It will offer collection of used tires (25" or less in rim diameter), batteries, used oil and oil filter recycling along with the container collection. Recyclers for these added items will be present

during the event and will supply personnel and trailers for their operation.

The collection will begin at 8:00 a.m. and end at 12:00 p.m. (noon). Personnel from the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be present and conducting the collections.

My folks recently returned from a mission trip to Russia. They were gone for 16 days to build farm houses and conduct a Vacation Bible School for Russian children. The other day I was at Lion's Club when Bob McWhorter gave a great presentation of his trip to Estonia, where they helped construct a new seminary.

Recently, I myself have been invited to take an eleven day mission to Quetzalango, Guatemala, to assist physicians in medical care for the native people.

Last year at this time I was co-leading a youth mission trip to Anadarko, OK, to work at a homeless shelter.

"Why is it that we always find it

necessary to travel to far off places to help people, when we have problems right here in Munday?" - I hear this comment again and again, with increasing frequency as the days pass. This attitude is a rising national sentiment; "Why do we send money to foreign countries?", "Why do we protect them with our troops?", and "Let them take care of themselves!"

It would be easy for us to retreat back into our shells, and let everyone else "take care of themselves." It is true that a lot of our so called "solutions" for other people's problems tend to create brand new problems; nobody ever said that serving God was easy or simple. I have to wonder where we would be

today if God had said, "Let them take care of themselves."

I guess the point that I'm trying to make is that we go overseas and send money to foreign countries because they need our help, and because we are able to help them. There are ministries in place, missionaries at work, and they have asked us to help them in their service to Christ. I have to believe that it is God's will for us to help those who ask us. If God didn't want us to help, they would have asked someone else.

We need to be responsible to our brothers and sisters who live next door, but we must not turn our backs on our brothers and sisters around the world, either. The test of whether we should help or not, should be if we are asked, and if we are able. If these two criteria are met, then we can trust that we will be following God's will, both here and abroad.

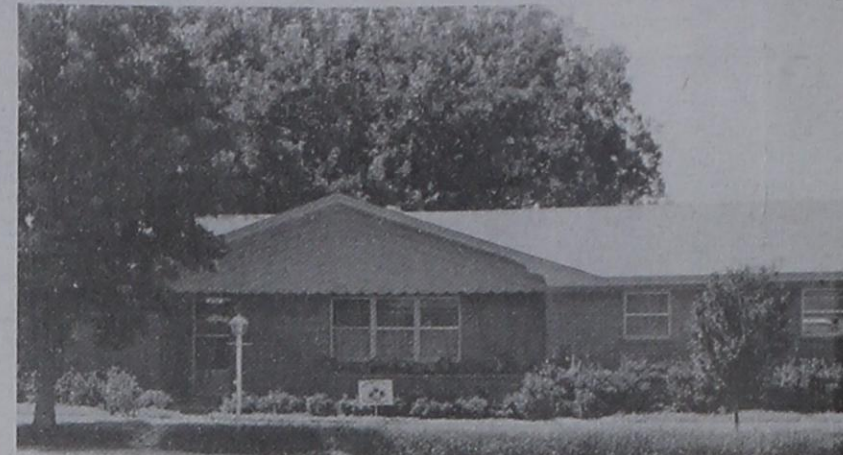

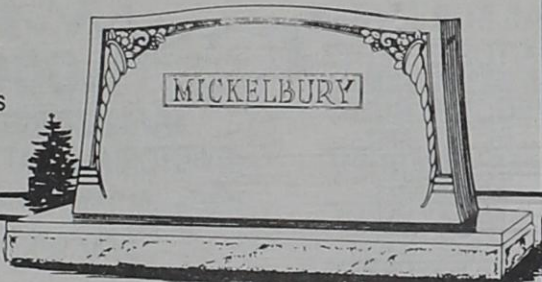

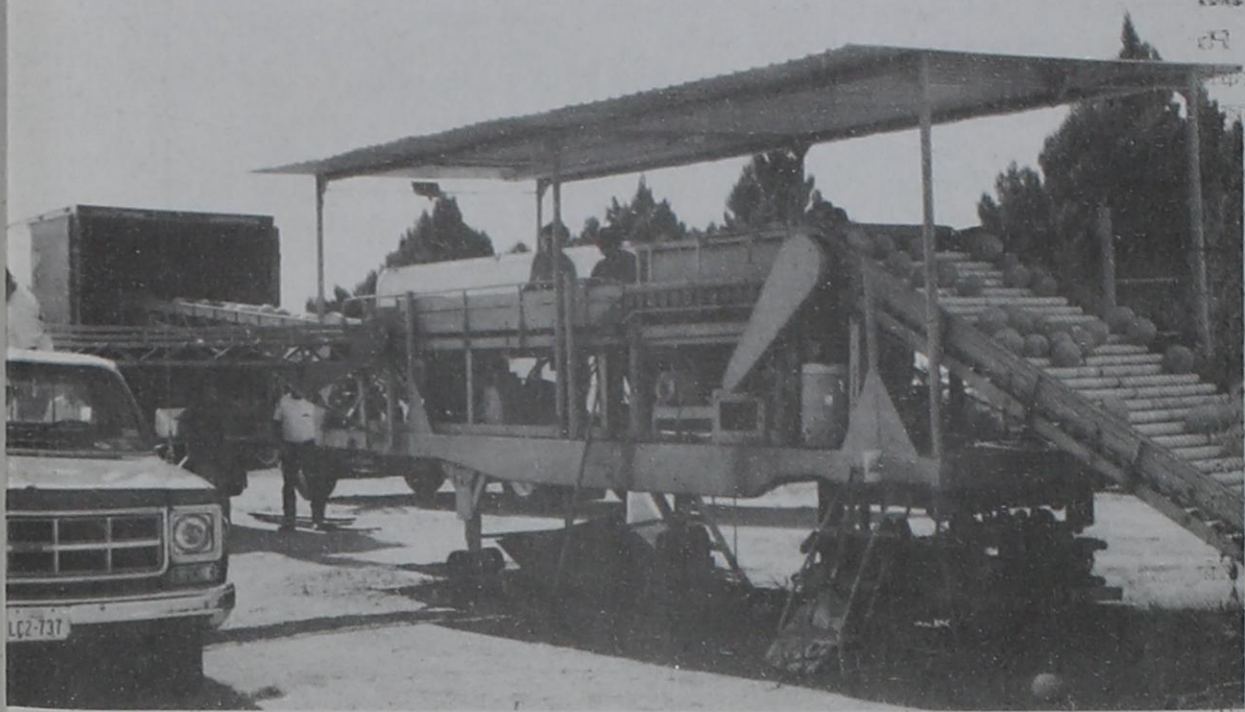

"On A Wizer Note"

By Paul Weiser, Knox County Extension Agent - Agriculture

The boll weevil situation is looking rather good. Total weevils in eight traps on July 6 was seven - that is 0.88 per trap. There were 39 weevils in the eight traps on July 13 - 4.9 weevils per trap.

Several dryland cotton fields have suffered from the boll weevils while many irrigated cotton fields have been sprayed and show no considerable amounts of damage. First generation weevils from the fields not treated could cause an increase in boll weevil activity in the next week or two.

Bollworm moths are also being spotted in fields. Very few eggs have been found, but this will be on the increase.

When scouting a field, do not mistake the bollworm moth with the mesquite cutworm moth. The mesquite cutworm moth is in the cotton fields in large amounts and will not cause any damage. These moths will lay their eggs at the base of mesquite tree. The larvae feeds on mesquite leaves only.

Identifying these two moths is rather easy. The bollworm moth is a tan color with one or two darker spots on the wings. The mesquite cutworm moth is a dark brown with orange markings on the wings.

If the bollworm moths are found in a field, it will not be beneficial to spray until the larvae have hatched and begin to feed.

Many farmers and ranchers

have noticed a slight increase in the public's awareness of environmental issues. Such things include the labelling - or loss of label - on certain chemicals.

There will be a public forum, Thursday, July 21, in the Abilene Civic Center for organizations and individuals to express their views on "Agriculture and the Environment".

The forum is scheduled to start at 9 a.m. It will continue through the afternoon, with a break for lunch. An informal registration begins at 8:15 a.m. There is no cost for participating in the forum.

Heat Units - Indicators of Cotton Growth and Development

Robert Lemon, Extension Agronomist, Vernon,

The growth and development of the cotton plant follows a well defined and consistent order of events. With respect to moisture, temperature is the over-riding factor governing the development of the plant. One of the most useful ways to assess cotton development is the degree day or heat unit concept, commonly known as DD-60's.

The heat unit approach uses temperature rather than calendar days as an indicator of plant development. The concept is based on a developmental threshold of 60° F

-- above 60° the crop grows and below 60° little growth occurs. Temperatures above 100° are considered as 100°.

The basic formula for calculating heat units involves adding the maximum and minimum temperatures for each day, dividing by 2 and subtracting 60 (threshold temperature). Calculation of the accumulated heat units and information on heat unit requirement to attain a particular stage of growth can be used as a tool to help producers better manage their crop.
