The City Council of the City of Munday met on November 12, 1996 in regular session. Members present were Mayor Gary Tidwell and Council members Winters Matthews, Danny Owens, Jesse Andrade and Robert Bowen. Jay White was absent. Mayor Tidwell ordered the reading of minutes from the previous meetings. Minutes were read from the October 8, 1996 regular meeting and the October 18 special meeting. Matthews motioned the

minutes be approved as read and Bowen seconded. All were for. The City Council read a resolution directing publication of notice of intention to issue combination tax and revenue Certificates of Obligation, Series 1996. Bowen moved the resolution be passed. Matthews seconded. All voted for and the resolution was adopted. The monthly financial report was studied. There was discussion of long term, high cost equipment items, such as fire trucks. Information concerning current fleet's life expectancy, affect on insurance rates, and other applicable data to be gathered.

Fire destroys Martinez' home - fund set up at FNB

A fire on Thursday, December 12, charred the holiday season for Clara Martinez and her family when her home was destroyed and she sustained third degree burns.

The blaze started around 1:30 p.m. and was discovered by passer-by who alerted authorities and assisted in removing two small children and two young adults from the burning home. The blaze had apparently begun in the front of the home but Mrs. Martinez was in the rear of the structure and was unable to reach safety before falling and becoming a victim to the smoke and flames.

She was rushed to Knox County Hospital by the Munday Rescue Unit and was quickly taken by helicopter to University Medical Center in Lubbock. She is being treated for burns to her face, left arm and shoulder, and both legs above the knees. At press time she was listed in critical condition at UMC.

Knox County Deputy Johnny Andrade was among those trying to rescue Mrs. Martinez and remove her from the fire. He was overcome by smoke at the scene and was rushed to Knox County Hospital. Once there Officer Andrade was flown to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene where he was treated for smoke inhalation. He was released on Thursday evening and was back on duty Monday, December 16.

The State Fire Marshall is currently conducting an investigation into the blaze but no formal statements have been released. Findings will be published when they are made public.

A fund to aide the Martinez family has been established at First National Bank in Munday. The family will be in need of expenses incurred for medical reasons and also to replace household items. The home and it's contents were completely gutted by the inferno. Anyone wishing to donate to the cause can do so by seeing any teller at the First National Bank in Munday. Your contribution will be appreciated.

## Public meeting of Commissioners' Court held in December

A regular meeting of the Commissioners' Court of Knox County was held at the Courthouse in Benjamin of December 9, 1996.

In attendance was Treasurer Judie Whitten, Deputy Sheriff Johnny Andrade, Jack Whitten, Jimmy Urbanczyk and County Attorney Bobby D. Burnett along with the County Judge and Commissioners from Precincts 1, 2, 3, and 4, and the County Clerk. Commissioner Birkenfeld moved that the minutes of November 11, 1996 be approved.

Commissioner Skiles moved that the minutes of August 1, 8, 9, 12, 16, 26, 27, 28 and September 3, 10, 23, and 30, 1996 be approved.

Judge Perdue informed the Court of a letter from Attorney Suzan R. Sanders to Sheriff Carlson pertaining to November 5, 1996 Sheriff's sale. Bobby D. Burnett is to respond to the letter. No action taken.

Upon motion by Commissioner Skiles, the Sheriff's request for North Texas Drug Task Agreement and Texas Department of Correction's Justice Hearing payment agreement was tabled.

Commissioner Skiles moved that the Court appoint J.E. Hunter as Election Judge for Precinct 8 following the resignation of Charles Smith.

Judge Perdue informed the Court that he would talk to the District Judge concerning advertising for bids for the 1995-1996 Fiscal Year Audit. No action taken.

Judge Perdue informed the Court that he had received word that the Mh-Mr had decided to relocate to Graham. For information

only - no action needed.

Commissioner Skiles moved that Judge Perdue and Commissioner Birkenfeld meet with Donald King at 911 to set price for county maps for sale to the public. The motion carried.

Judge Perdue moved that the Commissioners Court exempt the County from paying Court Cost for the Writ of Mandamus that was filed in the District Clerk's office. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Parker and carried unanimously.

Judge Perdue moved to request the District Judge to dismiss the Writ of Mandamus. The motion carried unanimously.

Upon motion by Commissioner Parker, the attorney fees incurred by the County Treasurer involved in the Writ of Mandamus was tabled.

Upon motion by Commissioner Birkenfeld, the County Claims were approved as presented by the County Treasurer Judie Whitten.

There being no further business to come before the Court, upon motion by Commissioner Homer, the meeting recessed.

The foregoing minutes have not been approved or accepted by the Knox County Commissioners Court.

There was a great number of people who volunteered their time, both adults and students, to a very good cause. I would also like to thank those who dropped extra money into the fund - we

appreciate you tremendously." Taylor was scheduled for surgery on Monday, December 16. The procedure to correct the injuries on his knee and shoulder would take seven to eight hours to complete and would require at least a four day hospital stay.

The fund will continue after these hospital expenses are met to meet the necessities of any future problem other students may face.

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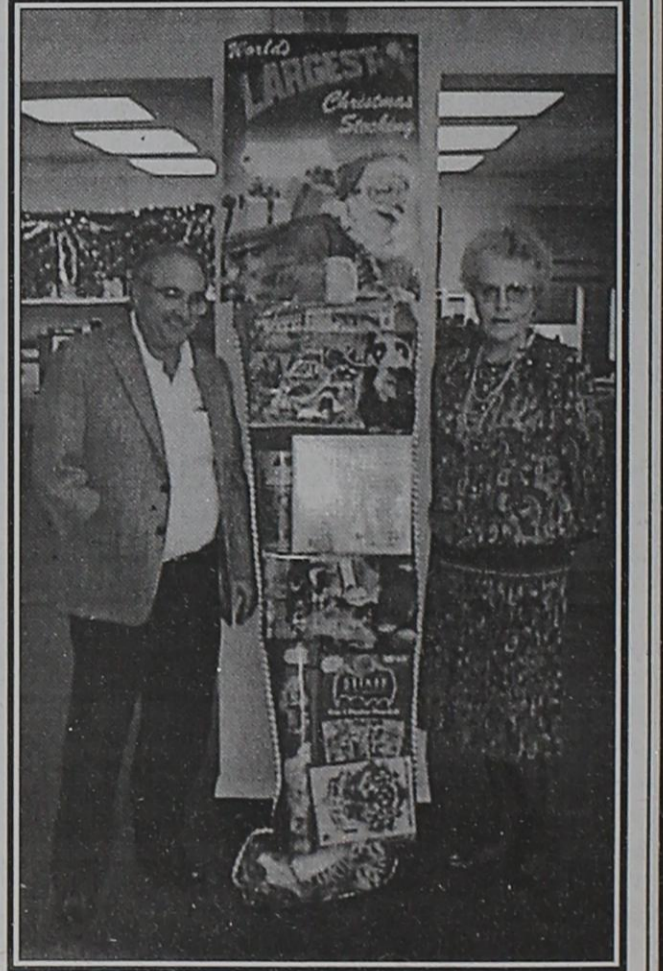
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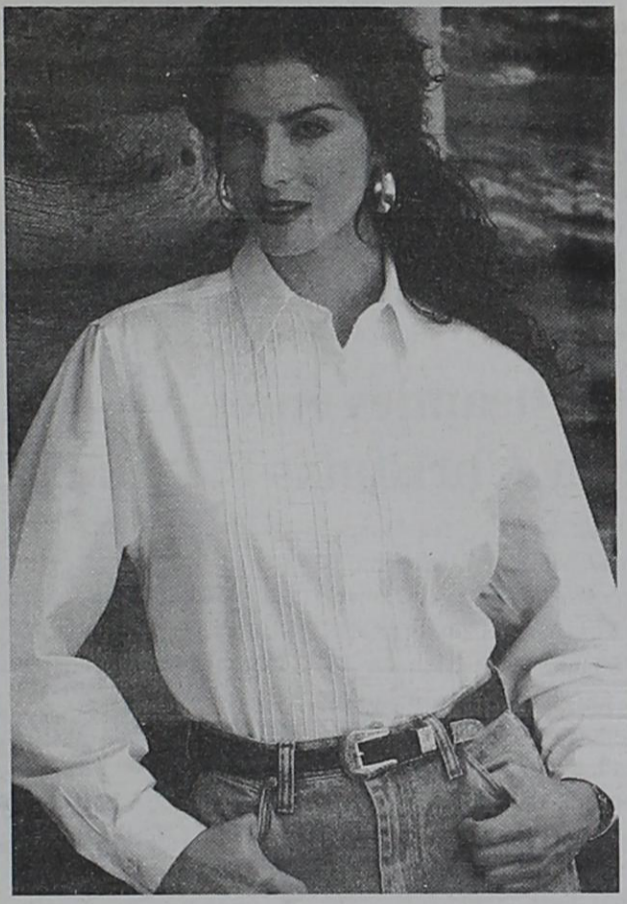
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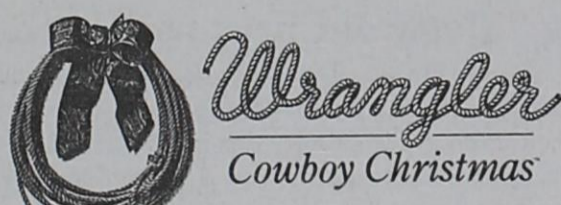
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# Moguls from 1930 still making the news

The Munday Courier ran a story about the 1930's football team from Munday High School in our August 28, 1996 edition. In that story we interviewed and quoted Mr. Nolan Phillips who had played on the teams from the 1930's and who still resides in Munday.

This week we received a delightful letter from Mr. Phillips' teammate, Gilbert Myers. He is now living in Austin, Texas but had received a clipping of the story from his aunt, Elizabeth Myers Bowden, a retired teacher from Munday High who now resides in San Angelo.

The following is comprised of the letter from Mr. Myers:

A month or two ago, I received some clippings from your paper. Among them was a picture of the 1930 Munday football team. You said that Nolan Phillips and I were the only two players who are still living. Tell old Nolan that he better take care of himself, because I am still going to be around when there is just one!

1930 was sixty-six years ago. I think that about half of the football team were Seniors. We did win most of the games the last two years. Roby has been in the news lately, because a group pooled their money and won the lottery. The only other time that Roby had

a big influx of money was about 1928 or 29 when they struck oil.

The Roby football team was made up of the sons of the oilfield roughnecks as some said the adult roughnecks were on the team. We shouldn't have ever been matched against them, but we were winning our games and they were winning all of theirs. They kept challenging us until we went up there to take a beating.

Roby had a line that we couldn't penetrate and we couldn't go around the end or complete a pass. They didn't skunk us however. We pulled our famous "Hidden Ball" play - a play that we used only once a game. It may have been ineligible, but I don't know that even the officials caught on. Roby kicked off the first play of the game. Our line quickly fell into place, but Paul Pruitt (the quarterback and the fastest man in Knox county, who always won the 100-yard dash in county track meets) got in right guard position and the center, Cecil Parker, passed the ball around his heels to Paul who squatted down on it until the by players all were allowed to run through our line and chase me backward down the field. I had gotten down behind the center as if to receive the ball and put my old leather helmet partially under my arm and ran backwards down the field as if to make a long pass.

When the field cleared, Pruitt jumped up and ran for our 6 points. I don't know how many points that made, but it seemed that they would kick off to us and then come down the field and take the ball away from us and go for another 7 points. To tell you how bad it was, one of the toughest players, near the end of the game, was begging Coach Palmer to pull him out, but the Coach didn't have anyone left to put in his place.

Yes, Crowell beat us. The last game that the 1930 team played. It was a revenge game for them.

## Moguls top off opponents 3-1 last week

The Moguls defeated Vernon Northside last Tuesday by the score of 59 to 21. Jonathan Reagins led the team with 18 points. Robby Vaughn had 11 and Ricky Serrato and Eric Beaty each scored 10.

Thursday Munday traveled to the Seymour Tournament and won against Seymour in the opening round 50 to 46. Reagins stashed away 20 while Beaty followed with 16.

On Friday the Moguls pulled a squeaker away from the Stamford Bulldogs in the second round 43 to 41. Munday led by 5 at the half, 30 to 25. Stamford pulled within two at the end of the third, but the Moguls held them off in the fourth matching the Bulldogs point for point. Scoring: Reagins - 21, Beaty - 8, Cody Perry - 7, Donald King - 5, Vaughn - 2.

Munday placed second at the tournament after a 39 to 32 loss to the Albany Lions in the Championship game.

## Drug addicts and alcoholics face cutoff in January

Under legislation that was effective on March 29, 1996, payment of benefits under Social Security Disability Insurance and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) programs to persons whose disability is based on drug addiction or alcoholism will stop January 1, 1997. In order to be eligible for benefits under the new law, an individual must have a disabling impairment other than drug addiction or alcoholism.

At one time feelings got so bad between Munday and Knox City. They were saying that the players were trying to kill each other. I know that Coach Palmer would have side-lined any Munday player whom he saw playing "dirty" and I suppose that the Knox City coach would have done the same.

The two school boards got together and stopped play for several years.

Now here is the story that has never been public all these sixty-six years. They were playing at

Munday and I was backing up the line and Knox City pulled a right-end run. I quickly circled the end and was waiting to make the tackle. There wasn't a blocker in front of the runner. He was running hard and seemed to be falling forward. I would have tackled him in three more steps when Paul Pruitt (the fastest player in the county) shot the gap between our tackle and end. He was running hard when he seemed to trip on our tackle's foot and became air born. His knee hit the Knox City player behind the left ear and it popped like a gun.

They called time out and separated the teams. It was said that "if Dr. Farrington hadn't been on the sideline, the boy would have died." It did take what seemed to be a long-time before the doctor brought him

around. Dr. Farrington told me the next day that the reason it took so long was that the lick had caused the boy to swallow his tongue and that he wasn't breathing. He had to get the boys tongue out of his throat before he could get him to breathing. Now - this was all the proof the public needed to start the gossip that the two teams were trying to kill each other. I know that Pruitt was really sorry that he had injured the boy. Not many people knew it but I know that Paul went to the Knox City hospital to visit the injured player.

So, folks - there you have it. Thanks to Gilbert for filling us in on the exciting details of some of the Moguls experiences from the past. Now we know where the winning spirit originated.

### Water to be key issue at High Plains Vegetable Conference

Water, a vital element for any crop but especially critical for vegetable production, will be the focus January 21 in Hereford at the 27th annual High Plains Vegetable Conference.

"Water is our highest priority for the future of the High Plains vegetable industry," said Dr. Roland Roberts, vegetable specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and conference coordinator. Speakers will be professionals representing all aspects of water resources and management in crop production, he said.

The conference begins at 8:30 a.m. at the Hereford Community Center, 100 Avenue C at Park Avenue. It is sponsored by the Extension Service, High Plains Vegetable Growers and Shippers Council, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Tech University, Deaf Smith County Extension Vegetable Development Committee, Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce and Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA).

The program has been approved by TDA for continuing education units to maintain certification of applicators of rodenticides. The \$25 registration fee includes lunch.

This year's conference will examine the status of water sources, water requirements, irrigation scheduling, water purity, conservation, low energy precision application (LEPA) and drip irrigation systems, large scale mulching, use of heat units and the potential evapotranspiration (PET) network, and development of whole-farm water conservation plans that meet state and federal requirements.

Some 25 exhibits and educational displays will be presented by agribusiness professionals serving the vegetable industry.

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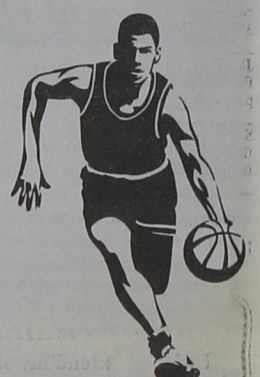
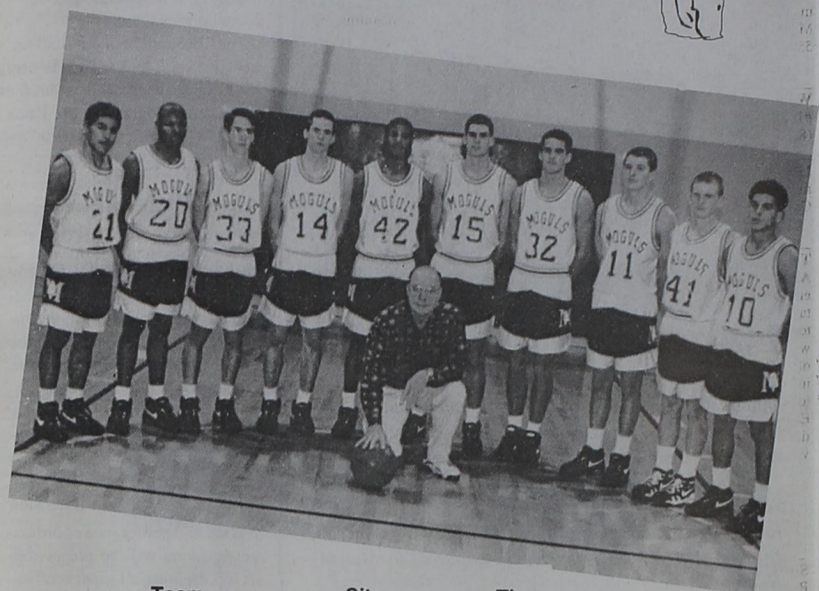
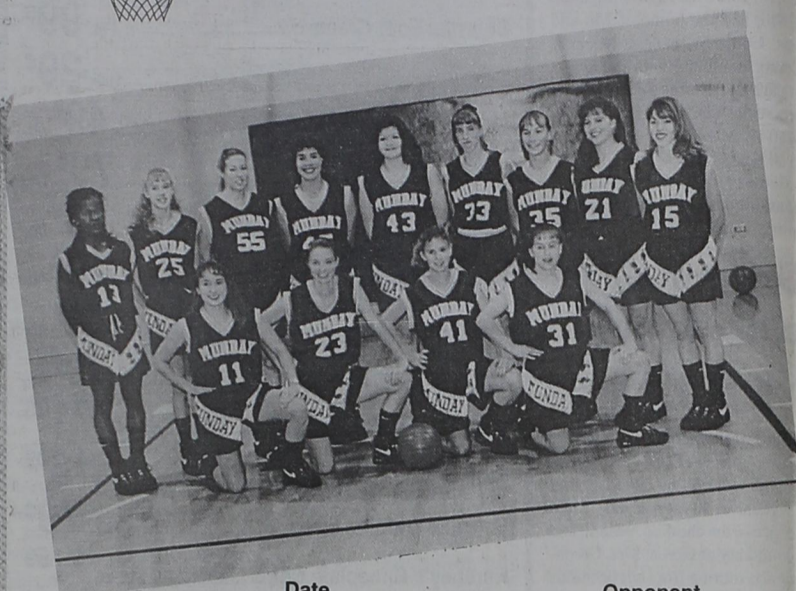

### Jane's News Notes

This time of year can sabotage even the most strong-willed. Will you stick to a strict diet through New Years?  
If you're like most people, probably not. It's not what you eat from Thanksgiving to Christmas, but what you eat from Christmas to Thanksgiving (meaning the other 11 months of the year) really makes the difference in long term weight control.

That doesn't mean that we should indulge beyond reason during the holidays. But it's probably not the best time of year to lose weight either.

However, the holidays can be a good time to begin practicing the kind of behavior toward food which can help maintain a healthier weight all year. Try these healthy eating strategies.

Commit to regular meals despite the hurried nature of holidays. Increase activity level by taking a walk after a hearty dinner. Take advantage of low fat and fat free products.

Avoid visiting with friends around the food table.

This time of year people seem to be more generous. They give more to charity. But be careful which charity you give money to. Extension family economics specialist Dr. Joyce Cavanagh says not all organizations that call themselves charities really are. She says ask for the charity's annual report and its tax returns so you can see how much money goes for administration and fundraising. She says you may be surprised how little money actually reaches those in need. Cavanagh also says never be pressured into making a donation right then and there. Legitimate charities will give you the information and the time you need to make a decision. You can check out charities through the Better Business Bureau, the National Charities Information Bureau and the American Institute of Philanthropy. If you encounter a bogus operation, call the consumer protection division of the state Attorney General's office at 800-337-3928. Filing a complaint could help keep others from being taken for having a kind

heart.  
Newspapers and television news reports have been filled with information on air bag and children. Increased public awareness is crucial in preventing serious injury or even death as a result of air bags. The most important and immediate message is that children age 12 and under should always ride in the back seat, buckled up either in an appropriate child restraint or the lap/shoulder restraint system in the vehicle.

Drivers, particularly those who are short-statured, should wear safety belts with their seats pushed as far back as practical to still safely operate the vehicle. Short-statured drivers may find that pedal extenders are a viable option. The pedal extenders allow the driver to sit farther back.

The National Mobility Equipment Dealers Association can provide additional information on pedal extenders. The association represents members throughout the nation and Canada, as well as internationally, that provide the pedal extensions and may be reached at (800) 833-0427 Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. EST.

The Passenger Safety Project with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reminds all of us that it is critical that the public understands that improved technology is only part of the air bag solution.

The most important actions will always be those taken by the individual such as making sure that all passengers are correctly buckled up, seats are pushed back and kids are buckled up in the back seat. For more information contact Passenger Safety Project, telephone (409) 845-3850.
