Lessons from Corporate Annual Reports

For more than a decade I've been reading the annual sales of \$35.9 billion, Sears came in at \$41 billion and analysis and a little reading between the lines you can with sales exceeding \$165 billion. learn a lot about business operation, corporate culture and management philosophy.

This year as the statements started to come in, I was in two of the annual reports. Floyd Hall of Kmart and David Glass of Wal-Mart took very different approaches to communicating the past year's success to shareholders. a half times the size of Kmart? However, you must read between the lines to grasp the contrast. On the surface, both men's comments sound positive and upbeat. Both used the terms "continuous improvement," "innovation" and "change." Both executives discussed their company's success and lauded the commitment of their management teams.

So where is the contrast you ask? The contrast is in the execution. Many are good at talking about success; few are truly talented at getting the job done.



If a farmer chooses 50/100 Federal Crop Insurance, the government will guarantee the farmer half of the average annual yield on their crop. If a farmer gets a yield that is below 50% of the average annual yield, the government will pay \$3.15 per bushel up to the amount guaranteed. This varies with the percentage of insurance the farmer buys. In the cas of 65/100 insurance, the farmer is guaranteed 65% of the average annual yield.

There are several variables that have an effect on a wheat crop. When the crop was planted, at what stage the crop received rain, and when the cattle were taken off are just a few. Farmers who grazed their cattle early tended to have a better crop, according to Chris Moore. The cut off day for grazing cattle is March 15. The closer
