





KABUL, Afghanistan-For those thousands of you who have just recently enjoyed spring break, let me tell you that, no matter where you went, it could not have compared with the fun that we have had here in sunny Afghanistan. Whether it was Cancun, Florida, South Padre Island, or the mountains of Colorado-you haven't begun to experience the thrill of meeting new people and of experiencing new events until you have been here.

For instance, the al-Qaeda and the Taliban are absolutely unparalleled when it comes to having fun. You think drinking and flirting with the opposite sex is exciting? Wrong! Nothing can beat what we have been doing here in and around Kabul.

### TDA honors Texas' agricultural heritage

Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs will honor 114 Texas farms and ranches that have been in continuous agricultural production for 100 years or more during the 127th annual Family Land Heritage ceremony Friday, March 15 in Austin.

The ceremony begins at 2 p.m. in the Lyndon Baines Johnson Auditorium on the University of Texas campus.

This marks the second year that the Texas Department of Agriculture will honor farms and ranches in the 150- and 200-year categories. Seven properties will be recognized for agricultural production of at least 150 years and two will be recognized for reaching the 200year milestone.

"These agricultural pioneers wrote the early history of Texas and set the foundation of a proud heritage that their ancestors have honorably carried on," Combs said. "As a result, agriculture is the second-largest industry in Texas. We're thrilled to be able to continue honoring the 150- and 200-year ranches because these categories show just how far back agriculture's legacy goes in this great state."

Ranches being honored for 200 years are Agua Nueva Ranch and Noriecitas Ranch, both in Jim Hogg County.

Ranches being honored for 150 years are Vornkahl Ranch in Austin County; Calame-Yeldell Ranch and Yeldell Ranch in Freestone County; Sallie B. Ranch in Grayson County; Young Ranch 1825 and Young Ranch 1831 in Liberty County; and Rocking D Ranch in Robertson County.

Ron Stone, a well-know Texas broadcaster and historian, will be serving as master of ceremonies. Red Steagall, noted Texas cowboy poet and songwriter, will perform following the certificate presentation.

The Family Land Heritage Program has honored 3. 580 properties through 2000.

Knox County has two 100-year honorees: B.R. Black Farm, 1899 which is now owned by Mike and Trenna (Cash) Carlson and the Charles E. Haskin Farm, 1901 which is now owned by Don and Andrea (Haskin) Estes.





# **Capitol Highlights**

King lost head over election -- literally

Editor's Note: Because the deadline for this column falls before Tuesday each week, the results of the primaries obviously were not available for discussion in this week's Highlights.

AUSTIN - Did Tuesday's election results come out the way you wanted?

And by the way, did you vote in your party primary?

If you didn't, it made a difference and potentially, a huge difference.

Years ago, someone enamored of the beauty of the electoral process and mindful of the danger to Democracy incumbent in not voting, started looking for examples of how just one ballot changed an election. Such changes, of course, A list of close calls at the polls tends to pop up around election time every few years. But now, thanks to the Internet, it is more easily accessible. It's also easier to update.

The first example on the list is that in 1645, one vote gave Oliver Cromwell control of England.

Four years later, in an even better example of the power of the ballot, one vote cost King Charles I his head. The vote to behead him was 67 against and 68 for. The king may have been the first politician to lament a poor voter turnout.

Sticking with English electoral history, one vote in 1714 put King George I on the thrown and restored the monarchy.

Meanwhile, across the North Atlantic, one vote in 1776 determined that English would be the official language of the soon-to-be-rebellious colonies. German got the second highest number of votes.

By 1800, of course, the United States was electing presidents, not kings. When the nation's third presidential election ended up in the House of Representatives because of a tie in the number of votes in the electoral college, one vote made Tho-

mas Jefferson our third president.

The same problem cropped up again in 1824. With a four-way contest left up to the members of the House, Andrew Jackson by one vote became the sixth president.

Those who enjoy Texas' status as a state of the Union can thank Sen. Edward A. Hannigan of Indiana. Hannigan's vote was the crucial one in the measure that provided for annexation of the Republic of Texas.

Hannigan, by the way, was no stranger to the concept of the importance of a single ballot. That's how he became a member of Congress, by one vote.

In another crucial contest with a significant impact on Texas, the Senate approved President James K. Polk's declaration of war against Mexico in 1846 by one vote. That war, of course, was what actually solidified Texas' disconnect from Mexico.

A century and two years later, the Texas Democratic convention voted for Lyndon Johnson over ex-Gov. Coke Stevenson in the party's contested election. The margin was one vote in favor of LBJ.

#### The list goes on.

One person not likely to ever miss an election in Texas is Judge Jan Patterson of the 3rd Court of Appeals.

"I admire early voters," she said, "but I always wait until election day."

Her reason goes back to childhood.

"When I was a little girl, my dad was an election judge and I can remember my mother dressing up and us walking from home to Highland Park Elementary, where the polls were. I love the ritual of voting on election day."

If an election in Texas is ever again decided by one vote, it could be Judge Patterson's.

from there."

Homstad is hopeful that county inmates may be used in some of the clean-up and also invites any other civic minded organizations to help. "We could use any help from outside sources that we could get," says Homstad. "We will really have to take our time as we don't want to disturb markers and grave."

The clean-up will be labor intensive since the location would make it difficult to utilize heavy equipment. "Most of the work will have to be done with wheelbarrows, rakes, and hoes," says Homstad. "The overgrowth will have to be the first thing cleaned up."

### "Buy and Hold" Beats Market Timing

"Buy low and sell high" may sound like an exciting way to invest. Just imagine it: You get in on a stock when its price is way down, you stay with it until it peaks, you sell your shares — and you make a big profit. There's just one problem with this picture: It's not realistic.

Why is that? Because nobody — not even the most astute market experts — can consistently predict when a market has "peaked" or when it has reached its bottom. That's why the "buy low, sell high" investment strategy — also known as "market timing" — is so difficult to practice successfully.

You can find a better way to invest than constantly looking for market peaks and valleys. This alternative method is no glamorous. It's not exciting. It doesn't even have a jazzy name.

This strategy is known as "buy and hold." If you're a buy-and-hold investor, you start out by picking high-quality stocks that meet your individual goals and your need for diversification. Then, you simply leave these stocks alone — sometimes for years. You pay no attention to short-term price fluctuations. You pay no attention to market trends or "fads." You just stick with your stocks.

Of course, "buy and hold" doesn't mean "buy and forget." It's important to periodically review your stock holdings to determine if they still meet your changing investment needs. You'll also need to ascertain whether a stock's fundamentals have changed. Perhaps a new management team is taking the company in a direction you don't like. Or maybe the company belongs to an industry that is beginning to fade. In any case, you'll want to stay up-to-date on the stocks that you own, but you should make a change only if you have a long-term reason for doing so.

Want proof that "buy and hold" is more effective than market timing? According to an in-depth study by 1990 Nobel prize- winning economist William F. Sharpe, a market timer would have to be right at least §2 percent of the time to do as well as an investor who simply bought and held stocks. In another study, Kenneth Fisher, author of The Wall Street Waltz, estimates that an investor with an initial stake of \$25,000 and the ability to perfectly time the market would earn a place on the Forbes list of ``400 Richest Americans" after 21 years. The absence of such stock traders on the Forbes list is one proof that market timing can't be perfected.

Even if you're an active investor, do you really want to spend all that time and effort trying to figure out which way the market is going? By following a buy-and-hold strategy, you don't have to constantly check up on stock prices, and you'll save on expensive commissions from frequent trading. In short, you look for quality, you buy quality, and you stay with quality.

So, the next time you read or hear anything about the "right time" to buy or sell, turn the page or turn down the volume. You'll be making a smart move.

"Spring weather and the cold and flu season often play havoc with the blood supply," says Daren Coats, Red Cross blood drive consultant. "That's why blood donors are particularly needed now."

Coats points out that the need for blood is increasing every day, with new advancements in medical technologies, greater numbers of organ transplants and new discoveries in pharmaceuticals that require blood products.

The Red Cross is developing a strong and faithful donor base in Munday, but more first time donors are needed. Those who donate once or twice a year are urged to increase their commitment to three or four times a year in order to maintain a healthy blood supply, Coats says.

To be eligible to donate, one must be at least 17 years old and weight 110 pounds or more. It is advised to drink plenty of water the day before and the day of the donation, and also have a full meal at least three hours before donating.



### **Knox County Commissioners' Court Minutes**

orable Commissioners' Court of Knox County, Texas was held on the 11th day of February 2002, at the Courthouse in the City of Benjamin, Texas.

Judge David N. Perdue called the regular meeting of the Commissioners' Court to order at the Courthouse in Benjamin, Texas. Also present were Commissioners Weldon Skiles, Jerry Parker, Jimmy Urbanczyk, and Johnny Birkenfeld, County Attorney Bobby D. Burnett, Sheriff Dean Homstad, and Clerk Ronnie Verhalen.

The Court considered the following matters as posted and filed for Record in the office of the County Clerk on February 6, 2002 at 3:40 p.m.

Upon motion by Commissioner Skiles and seconded by Commissioner Parker, the Court unanimously voted to approve the Minutes of the Regular Meeting of January 14, 2002.

Judge Perdue informed the Court that the Texas Department of Transportation had notified the County that Knox County officially has 394 miles of county roads (dirt roads), down from 420 miles two years ago. These roads are the basis of the lateral road fund.

County Attorney Bobby D. Burnett presented to the Court his proposal that the County purchase an available computer program to speed up the check collection process. More bad checks are coming in all the time, he informed the Court, and the software would enable the County to eliminate several time-consuming steps and bring in more money to the County. In the past, the Check Collection Fund has been used to buy computers for the Department of Public Safety and the Sheriff's Department, as well as other useful items. To buy and install the program would cost about \$3,000, but the County would be paid back in a short while. Upon motion by Commissioner Urbanczyk and seconded by Commissioner Parker, the Court voted unanimously to approve the purchase. County/District Clerk Ronnie Verhalen recommended to the Court the purchase or a new digital copier. The present machine was bought in 1995, and, while good, has over 650,000 copies under its belt and has of late been requiring steady maintenance. Upon motion by Commissioner Parker and seconded by Commissioner Birkenfeld, the Court voted unanimously for Verhalen to draw up a list of specifications for a copier so that it can be sent out for bids.

A regular meeting of the Hon- travel schedule for the month; the agenda for the Appraisal District's meeting on Tuesday, February 12; the tax collections for January by Tax Assessor-Collector Stanton Brown; and the Treasurer's Report for January 2002 by Treasurer Penny Goodwin.

After study and consideration by the judge, commissioners, and sheriff, upon motion by Commissioner Birkenfeld and seconded by Commissioner Skiles, the Court voted unanimously to approve the paying of bills for the month.

There being no further business at this time, upon motion by Commissioner Parker, seconded Commissioner Urbanczyk, by and carried unanimously, the meeting was adjourned.

The 11th day of March, 2002 was approved for the next meeting.

### Local's grandson earns pilots license at the age of 17

Haskin flies joyfully into the wild blue yonder and sums it up in one statement: "This is just too cool!" Haskin is among the rare pilots who earned his pilot's license from the Federal Aviation Administration at the minimum age of 17.

"He is Mr. Captain," his instructor, Sabrehna Wyche, said of the youth who is a junior at Lee High School in Midland.

"He's in charge," she said. "He just grabs that check-list, and there he goes---right by the book, right by the numbers. He flies that airplane like he's been doing it all his life."

Haskin is from a family of pilots, including his father Mark Haskin, of Midland and his grandfathers, the late Calbert Haskin, former resident of Goree, and Goree resident, Martin Bowman. Dean soloed on September 22, 2001 after getting 11.5 hours of dual instruction from Ms. Wyche in her single-engine, low-wing Piper Cherokee 140 airplane.

By late January 2002, with 49 hours logged in the Cherokee 140, Haskin had won his private pilot's license after a 1.4 hour flight with FAA pilot-examiner, Don Wilkins of Midland.

"He's good," Wilkins said. "He even amazed himself--amazed both of us by how proficiently he piloted the airplane and especially so on those challenging crosswind short-field and crosswind softfield landings and the normal forward slip to a landing."

"Those are high performance kind of maneuvers," Ms. Wyche said of the crosswind landings, especially when the crosswinds were at 15 knots. He is very calm. He pays attention. His landings were absolutely perfect."

also included stalls, S turns, turns about a point, 45 degree-banked circular (360 degree) turns without losing altitude, slow flight and emergency procedures.

A licensed pilot at age 17, Dean his flying lessons as an afterschool sacker at H-E-B Grocery. Citing his calmness under pressure, Wyche termed Haskin "Chuck Yeager, Jr." after the World War II ace who, at age 24 in 1947, became the first person to break the sound-barrier in a rocket-powered airplane.

> Yeager, now 77, and Haskin's senior by 60 years, is legendary for his calmness in critical situations and for his knowledge of aerodynamics and aircraft flight systems.

Already, Haskin has begun work on his advanced ratings, including multi-engine, toward eventually winning his air-transport pilot (ATP) license by the minimum age of 23 to become an airline pilot.

Haskin plans to become an airline pilot, meanwhile he plans to fly the Cherokee 140 this July to the 2002 Experimental Aircraft Association's AirVenture in Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

"He just strictly wants to fly," said his father, Mark Haskin, of his 6-foot tall son who appears as lanky as the young Charles Lindbergh. "It has been his dream since he was a little boy."

"We're excited about it," said his mother, Michelle Bowman Haskin, of her son's earning his pilot's license. "We're proud of him. He's worked very hard for it."

In giving him flight instructions, Ms. Wyche said she reminds Haskin--and all her students--to "Do whatever it takes to ensure a safe flight from take-off to landing."

"Flying is serious," she added. "It is fun, but you step up to the next level when you get into that airplane. The responsibilities and everything just go up a notch. Dean is not a kamikaze. He Haskin's check-ride maneuvers doesn't do crazy stuff. When he's flying, he wants it to be just right.

"You can't be afraid of it," said his father. "But you have to respect it. If you're afraid of it, you don't have any business being up there."




