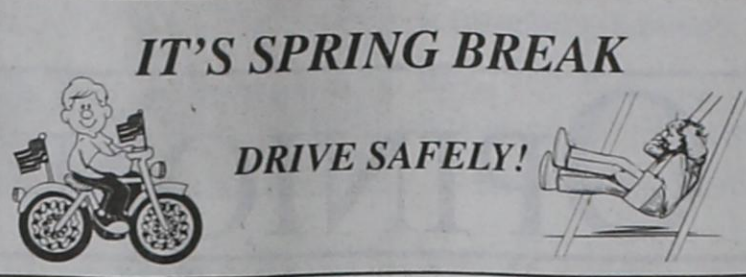

A push to help the ailing cemetery recover has begun but work will be slow due to the remote location and extensive vegetation that covers the burial grounds.

Remote country cemetery needs help to become peaceful resting place once again

The Old Goree Cemetery is nestled in the quiet spaces of Knox County where only the occasional hum of an airplane, whirr of a tractor, or purr of a passing vehicle breaks the stillness.

Families once gathered here as

a final tribute to fallen loved ones. But years have passed since the cemetery has been the scene of mourning friends and family members lovingly laying their deceased to rest. Now only the wind howls a tune and animals scurry through the ever-rising weeds and grasses that cover the area. Many burrows now house critters in the corner space and clumps of Iris are the only markers left behind by families.

The Old Goree Cemetery was never plotted out and in years past grieving families would simply pick out a space for interment rites. No known maps exist and weather and time have disseminated many boundaries of the graves. Fallen markers and crumpled stones make some resting spots unrecognizable.

However a recent interest in

helping to revive and restore the dignity of the cemetery has emerged.

On a recent visit to the area Vernon resident and former Munday resident Theda Jackson happened past the area. She alerted The Munday Courier and the Knox County Sheriff's office to the plight of the location. Knox County Sheriff Dean Homstad has since begun an endeavor to assist in the clean-up.

"This will be a major project and will definitely not be an overnight thing," said Homstad. "With no maps to work from we will have to pick out a grave and work

Urbanczyk ties regional bench record at meet - advances to State

The Munday Mogul powerlifting team competed this past weekend at the Regional Powerlifting meet in Floydada. Outstanding efforts were turned in by the five Mogul lifters.

Brandon Urbanczyk finished 2nd in the 148 pound class with a career best 1220 total. Brandon had a 465 (PR), a 285 bench press (PR), and a 470 dead lift (PR). Urbanczyk tied the regional bench record of 285 pounds with Gilberto Rameriz of Childress. He also received the Outstanding Bench Press award for the meet in the light platforms. He will compete at the State meet in Ft. Worth at T.C.U. on March 23.

Joe Rivera finished 3rd out of 11 lifters in the 148 pound class. He had a 445 squat, 265 bench press (PR) and a 455 dead lift for a 1165 total (PR). Joe will also serve as the alternate to the state meet for the 148 pound class.

Trey Taylor finished 6th out of 11 lifters in the 132 pound class. He had a 320 squat, 185 bench press (PR) and a 375 dead lift for a 880 total.

Micah Yates finished 8th out of 11 lifters in the 148 pound class with a 960 total. He had a 370

squat, 210 bench press (PR), and a 380 dead lift.

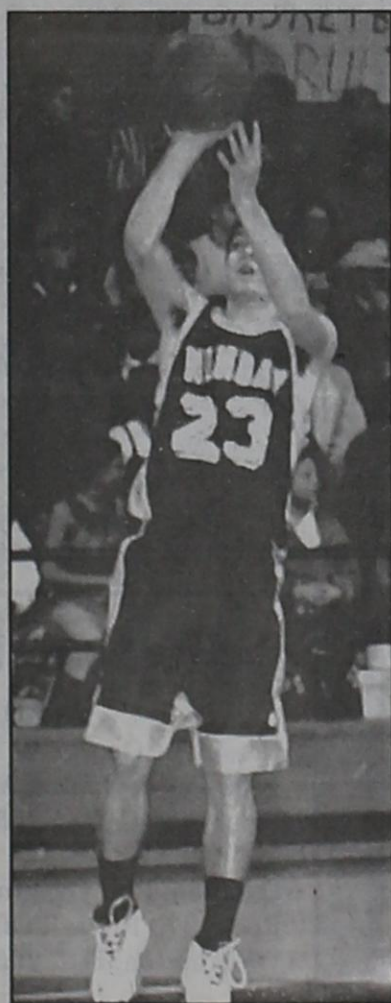
Miguel Nunez finished 8th out of 12 lifters in the 165 pound class with a career best 1065 total. He had a 435 squat (PR), 210 bench press, and a 420 dead lift.

The coaching staff at Munday High School is very proud of the efforts of these young men. It is very difficult just to qualify for regional much less place at the regional meet or even advance to the state meet. Each weight class in our region has between 30 to 40 lifters and to make it in the top 10 and go to the regional meet is a great accomplishment. On a special note - of the 132 lifters at the regional meet, only 18 Class A lifters were present. Munday High School was very proud to have 5 of those 18.

The team members were well supported by parents who also supplied snacks and breakfast burritos for the lifters.

Cody West and Edward Martinez of Munday High School were also present to help wrap the athletes and also made themselves available for other helpful jobs.

The filing deadline of March 20th is nearing for candidates who wish to run for City and School Board elections.

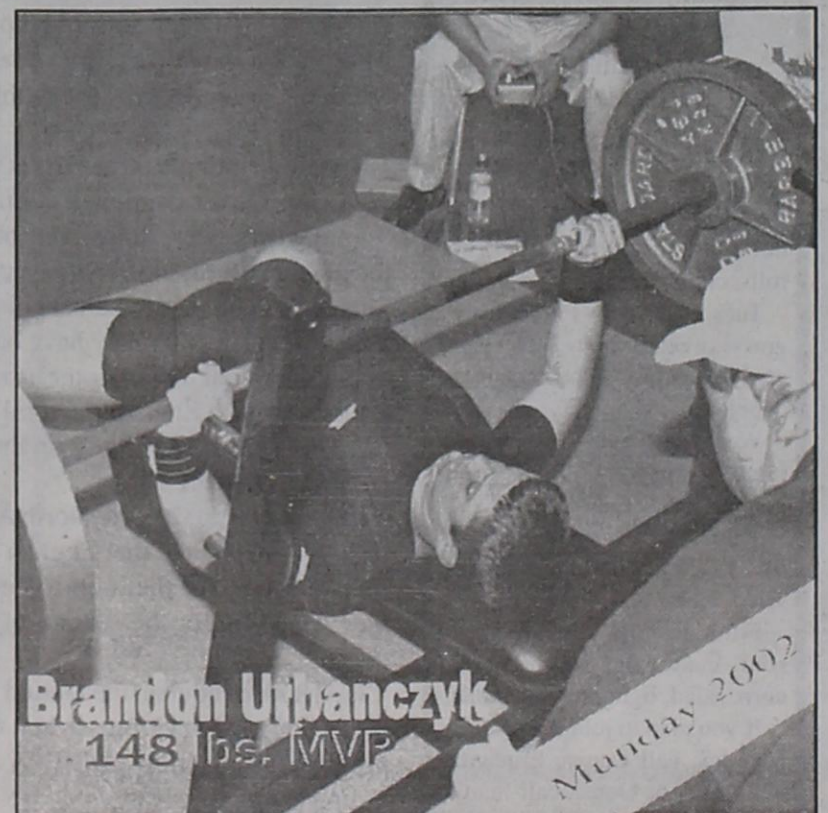

KABUL, Afghanistan—For those thousands of you who have just recently enjoyed spring break, let me tell you that, no matter where you went, it could not have compared with the fun that we have had here in sunny Afghanistan. Whether it was Cancun, Florida, South Padre Island, or the mountains of Colorado—you haven't begun to experience the thrill of meeting new people and of experiencing new events until you have been here.

For instance, the al-Qaeda and the Taliban are absolutely unparalleled when it comes to having fun. You think drinking and flirting with the opposite sex is exciting? Wrong! Nothing can beat what we have been doing here in and around Kabul.

We've had the opportunity, for instance, to take part in the largest assault in history against the al-Qaeda and the Taliban. (They're sort of like college fraternities). They tend to stick together and oppose anyone who tries to change their way of life.

As a matter of fact, officials here tell us that they have been gathering for weeks in the region outside Gardez in eastern Afghanistan just to enjoy their brotherhood and have some fun. The problem is that they become rather destructive unless someone watches over them and limits their activities. So, that's what we have been attempting.

It's really fun to watch the locals driving around in their twenty year old Toyotas and Nissans trying to catch up with the fraternities. It seems as if they haven't been able to do it by themselves, so we are here to give them a hand.

For instance, after weeks of preparation, 1,500 of us have led an attack on the bad guys. It is believed to be the largest joint U.S. and Afghan operation of our vacation here. It appears as if the al-Qaeda and the Taliban have holed up in the fun spots here in the mountains. The price of admission is quite expensive—so much, in fact, that several of our group have lost their lives just trying to get in.

As you might guess, it's really up to us to weed out the bad guys since the Europeans have basically decided to sit on the sidelines and get drunk instead of helping us achieve our goals. Even some of our political "friends" back home have been critical about the way we have been going about our business. Oh well, maybe they just don't know any better, and they'll probably never graduate to the level of understanding real life.

Anyway, wish you could be here. The weather is freezing, the views are breathtaking and the danger is overwhelming (it even beats binge drinking). We are going to stay longer than the normal one week of spring break, because it is becoming obvious that it will take longer than most of us anticipated to clean up these cave fraternities.

Do us a favor, though, while you are enjoying your fun. Think about us for just one minute every day—just one minute. Lisa Beamer, widow of Todd Beamer who lost his life on September 11 defending against terrorists on United Flight 93, sent us the following letter to read while we are enjoying ourselves here in Afghanistan. In part, she reminds us to remember who we were on September 10 and the event that changed all that. She reminds us to use our darkness to become people of deeper character, faith and love. This will thwart our enemies and honor our lost loved ones in a way no memorial or tribute ever could.

Who knows, maybe in the future we will be able to enjoy spring break together.

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Capitol Highlights

King lost head over election -- literally

Editor's Note: Because the deadline for this column falls before Tuesday each week, the results of the primaries obviously were not available for discussion in this week's Highlights.

AUSTIN – Did Tuesday's election results come out the way you wanted?

And by the way, did you vote in your party primary?

If you didn't, it made a difference and potentially, a huge difference.

Years ago, someone enamored of the beauty of the electoral process and mindful of the danger to Democracy incumbent in not voting, started looking for examples of how just one ballot changed an election. Such changes, of course, A list of close calls at the polls tends to pop up around election time every few years. But now, thanks to the Internet, it is more easily accessible. It's also easier to update.

The first example on the list is that in 1645, one vote gave Oliver Cromwell control of England.

Four years later, in an even better example of the power of the ballot, one vote cost King Charles I his head. The vote to behead him was 67 against and 68 for. The king may have been the first politician to lament a poor voter turnout.

Sticking with English electoral history, one vote in 1714 put King George I on the throne and restored the monarchy.

Meanwhile, across the North Atlantic, one vote in 1776 determined that English would be the official language of the soon-to-be-rebellious colonies. German got the second highest number of votes.

By 1800, of course, the United States was electing presidents, not kings. When the nation's third presidential election ended up in the House of Representatives because of a tie in the number of votes in the electoral college, one vote made Tho-

mas Jefferson our third president.

The same problem cropped up again in 1824. With a four-way contest left up to the members of the House, Andrew Jackson by one vote became the sixth president.

Those who enjoy Texas' status as a state of the Union can thank Sen. Edward A. Hannigan of Indiana. Hannigan's vote was the crucial one in the measure that provided for annexation of the Republic of Texas.

Hannigan, by the way, was no stranger to the concept of the importance of a single ballot. That's how he became a member of Congress, by one vote.

In another crucial contest with a significant impact on Texas, the Senate approved President James K. Polk's declaration of war against Mexico in 1846 by one vote. That war, of course, was what actually solidified Texas' disconnect from Mexico.

A century and two years later, the Texas Democratic convention voted for Lyndon Johnson over ex-Gov. Coke Stevenson in the party's contested election. The margin was one vote in favor of LBJ.

The list goes on.

One person not likely to ever miss an election in Texas is Judge Jan Patterson of the 3rd Court of Appeals.

"I admire early voters," she said, "but I always wait until election day."

Her reason goes back to childhood.

"When I was a little girl, my dad was an election judge and I can remember my mother dressing up and us walking from home to Highland Park Elementary, where the polls were. I love the ritual of voting on election day."

If an election in Texas is ever again decided by one vote, it could be Judge Patterson's.

TDA honors Texas' agricultural heritage

Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs will honor 114 Texas farms and ranches that have been in continuous agricultural production for 100 years or more during the 127th annual Family Land Heritage ceremony Friday, March 15 in Austin.

The ceremony begins at 2 p.m. in the Lyndon Baines Johnson Auditorium on the University of Texas campus.

This marks the second year that the Texas Department of Agriculture will honor farms and ranches in the 150- and 200-year categories. Seven properties will be recognized for agricultural production of at least 150 years and two will be recognized for reaching the 200-year milestone.

"These agricultural pioneers wrote the early history of Texas and set the foundation of a proud heritage that their ancestors have honorably carried on," Combs said. "As a result, agriculture is the second-largest industry in Texas. We're thrilled to be able to continue honoring the 150- and 200-year ranches because these categories show just how far back agriculture's legacy goes in this great state."

Ranches being honored for 200 years are Agua Nueva Ranch and Noriecitah Ranch, both in Jim Hogg County.

Ranches being honored for 150 years are Vornkahl Ranch in Austin County; Calame-Yeldell Ranch and Yeldell Ranch in Freestone County; Sallie B. Ranch in Grayson County; Young Ranch 1825 and Young Ranch 1831 in Liberty County; and Rocking D Ranch in Robertson County.

Ron Stone, a well-known Texas broadcaster and historian, will be serving as master of ceremonies. Red Steagall, noted Texas cowboy poet and songwriter, will perform following the certificate presentation.

The Family Land Heritage Program has honored 3,580 properties through 2000.

Knox County has two 100-year honorees: *B.R. Black Farm, 1899* which is now owned by Mike and Tenna (Cash) Carlson and the *Charles E. Haskin Farm, 1901* which is now owned by Don and Andrea (Haskin) Estes.

American Red Cross asks Munday donors to "Warm a heart"

The American Red Cross is urging blood donors of all types to "warm a heart and save a life" by donating blood at the upcoming blood drive on Monday, March 25, 2002 in the Patton Community Center from 2:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. All those present to donate blood will receive a "Help the Healing" T-shirt.

"Spring weather and the cold and flu season often play havoc with the blood supply," says Daren Coats, Red Cross blood drive consultant. "That's why blood donors are particularly needed now."

Coats points out that the need for blood is increasing every day, with new advancements in medical technologies, greater numbers of organ transplants and new discoveries in pharmaceuticals that require blood products.

The Red Cross is developing a strong and faithful donor base in Munday, but more first time donors are needed. Those who donate once or twice a year are urged to increase their commitment to three or four times a year in order to maintain a healthy blood supply, Coats says.

To be eligible to donate, one must be at least 17 years old and weight 110 pounds or more. It is advised to drink plenty of water the day before and the day of the donation, and also have a full meal at least three hours before donating.

Anyone who wishes to make an appointment to donate blood on March 15th at the Patton Community Center from 2:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. may call 422-4701 or 1-800-GIVE LIFE (1-800-448-3543) to schedule an appointment.

Moore children host 50th Anniversary party for parents

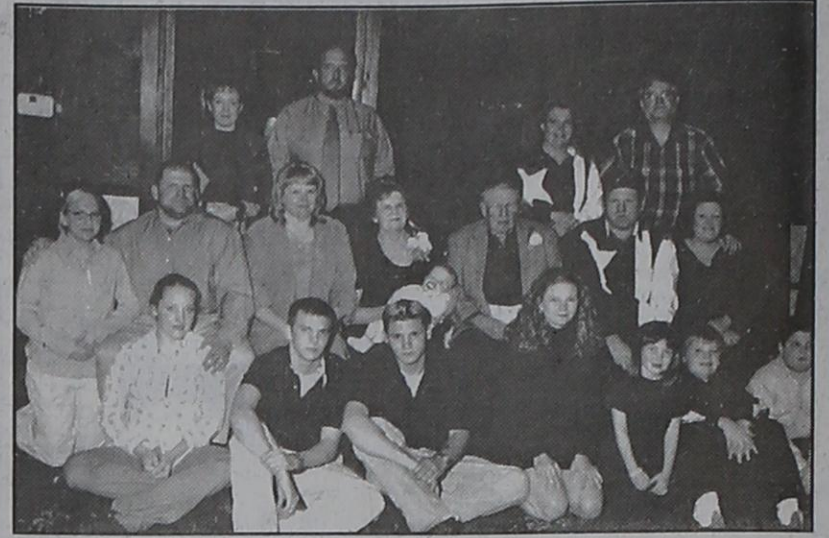

"This was given to me by a friend several years ago and has been a family favorite ever since," says this week's cook Nancy Tolleson. Her Pork Chop Casserole is a great way to provide a full meal for a hungry family without much fuss!

Pork Chop Casserole

8 Pork Chops
1 Onion
4 Potatoes
2 Cans Cream of Mushroom Soup
2 can whole kernel corn
Grated Cheddar cheese

Line 13 X 9 pan with pork chops. (I use boneless or cut bone off). Season chops with your favorite seasoning blends. Layer sliced potatoes over onions, season these also. Drain corn and pour over potatoes. Spread 2 cans mushroom soup over corn. Bake at 400 degrees for 1 1/2 hours or until chops and potatoes are done. 5 minutes prior to removing from oven, sprinkle top with grated cheese and return to over until cheese melts.

"If your family is smaller you can cut back to 4 chops and use one can of soup and corn and 2 potatoes," explains Tolleson. "You can experiment with this recipe until the amount suits your own individual family," she says.

Knox County Commissioners' Court Minutes

A regular meeting of the Honorable Commissioners' Court of Knox County, Texas was held on the 11th day of February 2002, at the Courthouse in the City of Benjamin, Texas.

Judge David N. Perdue called the regular meeting of the Commissioners' Court to order at the Courthouse in Benjamin, Texas. Also present were Commissioners Weldon Skiles, Jerry Parker, Jimmy Urbanczyk, and Johnny Birkenfeld, County Attorney Bobby D. Burnett, Sheriff Dean Homstad, and Clerk Ronnie Verhalen.

The Court considered the following matters as posted and filed for Record in the office of the County Clerk on February 6, 2002 at 3:40 p.m.

Upon motion by Commissioner Skiles and seconded by Commissioner Parker, the Court unanimously voted to approve the Minutes of the Regular Meeting of January 14, 2002.

Judge Perdue informed the Court that the Texas Department of Transportation had notified the County that Knox County officially has 394 miles of county roads (dirt roads), down from 420 miles two years ago. These roads are the basis of the lateral road fund.

County Attorney Bobby D. Burnett presented to the Court his proposal that the County purchase an available computer program to speed up the check collection process. More bad checks are coming in all the time, he informed the Court, and the software would enable the County to eliminate several time-consuming steps and bring in more money to the County. In the past, the Check Collection Fund has been used to buy computers for the Department of Public Safety and the Sheriff's Department, as well as other useful items. To buy and install the program would cost about \$3,000, but the County would be paid back in a short while. Upon motion by Commissioner Urbanczyk and seconded by Commissioner Parker, the Court voted unanimously to approve the purchase.

County/District Clerk Ronnie Verhalen recommended to the Court the purchase of a new digital copier. The present machine was bought in 1995, and, while good, has over 650,000 copies under its belt and has of late been requiring steady maintenance. Upon motion by Commissioner Parker and seconded by Commissioner Birkenfeld, the Court voted unanimously for Verhalen to draw up a list of specifications for a copier so that it can be sent out for bids.

Sheriff Homstad informed the court that Axle, Knox County's K-9 canine, has been sold for \$1500. He was no use to the County at this time as we no longer have a handler for him.

The sheriff also introduced new Deputy Jesse Johnson to the Court.

The Court chose three more names of citizens from the past year's Grand Jury lists as possible members or alternates for the Salary Grievance Committee for 2002. The names picked at random from the box are Juana Ethridge, Linda Wagner, and Joy Hord. Mr. Verhalen will send letters to those chosen.

The Court considered a trust sale of Lots 8 and the west half of Lot 9, Block 254, Davis Addition, Knox City. Jerry Byrd submitted a bid of \$750. Commissioner Parker moved to accept the bid, Commissioner Skiles seconded, and all approved.

Judge Perdue presented to the Court several items for information only: the Extension Office

travel schedule for the month; the agenda for the Appraisal District's meeting on Tuesday, February 12; the tax collections for January by Tax Assessor-Collector Stanton Brown; and the Treasurer's Report for January 2002 by Treasurer Penny Goodwin.

The Court considered an appeal to support the United States House of Representative's Joint Resolution 81 to put prayer back into schools. Commissioner Urbanczyk moved to support it, Commissioner Birkenfeld seconded the motion, and all approved.

Judge Perdue gave the Court an audit status, saying that representatives of Stovall, Grandey, & Whatley were in the courthouse at this time and that the results of the yearly audit would be made known at a later time.

Treasurer Goodwin was not present, but she left folders for each department with the month's bills. After study and consideration by the judge, commissioners, and sheriff, upon motion by Commissioner Birkenfeld and seconded by Commissioner Skiles, the Court voted unanimously to approve the paying of bills for the month.

There being no further business at this time, upon motion by Commissioner Parker, seconded by Commissioner Urbanczyk, and carried unanimously, the meeting was adjourned.

The 11th day of March, 2002 was approved for the next meeting.

Local's grandson earns pilots license at the age of 17

A licensed pilot at age 17, Dean Haskin flies joyfully into the wild blue yonder and sums it up in one statement: "This is just too cool!"

Haskin is among the rare pilots who earned his pilot's license from the Federal Aviation Administration at the minimum age of 17.

"He is Mr. Captain," his instructor, Sabrehna Wyche, said of the youth who is a junior at Lee High School in Midland.

"He's in charge," she said. "He just grabs that check-list, and there he goes--right by the book, right by the numbers. He flies that airplane like he's been doing it all his life."

Haskin is from a family of pilots, including his father Mark Haskin, of Midland and his grandfathers, the late Calbert Haskin, former resident of Goree, and Goree resident, Martin Bowman. Dean soloed on September 22, 2001 after getting 11.5 hours of dual instruction from Ms. Wyche in her single-engine, low-wing Piper Cherokee 140 airplane.

By late January 2002, with 49 hours logged in the Cherokee 140, Haskin had won his private pilot's license after a 1.4 hour flight with FAA pilot-examiner, Don Wilkins of Midland.

"He's good," Wilkins said. "He even amazed himself--amazed both of us by how proficiently he piloted the airplane and especially so on those challenging crosswind short-field and crosswind soft-field landings and the normal forward slip to a landing."

"Those are high performance kind of maneuvers," Ms. Wyche said of the crosswind landings, especially when the crosswinds were at 15 knots. He is very calm. He pays attention. His landings were absolutely perfect."

Haskin's check-ride maneuvers also included stalls, S turns, turns about a point, 45 degree-banked circular (360 degree) turns without losing altitude, slow flight and emergency procedures.

"That kid really did a good job," Wilkins commented. "He really did."

Wilkins stated that it is "pretty uncommon" for a 17 year old youth to get his pilot's license. Also uncommon, is the fact that he earned much of the money for

his flying lessons as an after-school sacker at H-E-B Grocery.

Citing his calmness under pressure, Wyche termed Haskin "Chuck Yeager, Jr." after the World War II ace who, at age 24 in 1947, became the first person to break the sound-barrier in a rocket-powered airplane.

Yeager, now 77, and Haskin's senior by 60 years, is legendary for his calmness in critical situations and for his knowledge of aerodynamics and aircraft flight systems.

Already, Haskin has begun work on his advanced ratings, including multi-engine, toward eventually winning his air-transport pilot (ATP) license by the minimum age of 23 to become an airline pilot.

Haskin plans to become an airline pilot, meanwhile he plans to fly the Cherokee 140 this July to the 2002 Experimental Aircraft Association's AirVenture in Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

"He just strictly wants to fly," said his father, Mark Haskin, of his 6-foot tall son who appears as lanky as the young Charles Lindbergh. "It has been his dream since he was a little boy."

"We're excited about it," said his mother, Michelle Bowman Haskin, of her son's earning his pilot's license. "We're proud of him. He's worked very hard for it."

In giving him flight instructions, Ms. Wyche said she reminds Haskin--and all her students--to "Do whatever it takes to ensure a safe flight from take-off to landing."

"Flying is serious," she added. "It is fun, but you step up to the next level when you get into that airplane. The responsibilities and everything just go up a notch. Dean is not a kamikaze. He doesn't do crazy stuff. When he's flying, he wants it to be just right."

"You can't be afraid of it," said his father. "But you have to respect it. If you're afraid of it, you don't have any business being up there."

Dean's parents, Mark and Michelle Haskin, are former Goree residents. His grandparents are the late Calbert Haskin and Nell Haskin of Lipan, formerly of Goree; and Martin and Barbara Bowman of Goree.

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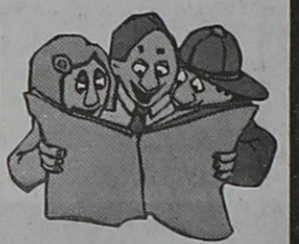
