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## \* \* \* \* \* LISTEN FOLKS \* \* \* \* \*

There are many things going on around Austin and more talked of. From the National Capital to the State Capital the wires are being used to obtain information about W.P.A. projects in the Austin sector, and of equal interest to get a set up of the special election called to elect a successor to Honorable James P. Buchanan, Congressman, who died last week. His wife declined to run for the un-expired term of her husband, and as a result a baker's dozen have announced and may announce for the position.

I have been strongly urged to enter the contest, and I appreciate the friendly interest of my friends who would like to see me go to Washington, but as I view the situation, I could not afford the financial sacrifice which the campaign would entail, and I am getting to that age in life where I do not relish the controversies incident to political campaigns.

This election, however, will be watched with National interest because of the National issue involved. The Supreme Court issue which is uppermost now in the minds of the whole nation will be viewed with much interest in the first congressional election since the President's message on the Supreme Court was announced. It is stated that Governor Allred will favor the election of one of his friends in the hope that it will increase his prestige with the National administration. It is even stated that Senator Connally's advent into the district at this time and making a speech in the capital has some unseen connection with the congressional race. In any event, it appears that the campaign between Governor Allred and Senator Connally, though three years away, becomes a reality, and the people have begun to watch the beginning of the show.

The House voted a six cent oil tax last week, and allocated one-half of same to the payment of the pensions, one-fourth to general revenue and one-fourth to the schools. This raises the tax on oil from 2 3/4 cents to 6 cents, but at the same time the new law allows one-half of the revenues instead of three-fourths under the present law. This already is causing considerable discussion and no doubt it will be one of the issues when the matter reaches the Senate.

Governor Allred has announced he is opposed to any increase or liberalization of the present pension law, and if he has his way over half the people that are eligible for the pension under the Constitution which the people voted will never get their names on the pension rolls. In any event the row over pensions and natural resource taxes will grow higher during the next two weeks.

Among the many bright young men in the House who have become especially prominent in the fight for the old age pensions is Ross Hardin of the Limestone County district. As a matter of ironical burlesque he introduced a resolution declaring that it was the sense of the House that no taxes should be levied on anybody until the pension was liberalized. This caused a state of uneasiness on the part of the Governor and he visited the House and strongly condemned the resolution and Mr. Hardin. While the Governor finally defeated the resolution, he was temporarily in a state of official apprehension.

Jap Lucas from Henderson

County is also another young man who has been on the firing line for the old age people, and he has made quite a reputation as a rough and tumble fighter in legislative contests. I might add also that Earl Huddleston of Coryell County has been quite prominent in his efforts for the old age pension people and he has received considerable recognition this session.

It looks like at this writing, though, that the burden of the deficit in the state treasury is bothering the Governor and his friends no little, and they will likely use the part of the new taxes, which the Governor last summer said they did not need, to pay or reduce the deficit, now ranging around \$15,000,000.

Members of the Legislature as well as the Governor, no doubt would like to sidestep the necessity of levying higher taxes on anybody, and it may be that this Legislature will not do much with the proposition, and submit the question to an election sometime this summer. A constitutional amendment has already been introduced in both houses providing for an election to determine whether a sales tax of two per cent should be voted to pay the old age pension to all persons over 65 years of age without any red tape or personal disqualification. The members of the Legislature could then vote the sentiments of their constituents no matter which way the election went. To say the least, the whole question is perplexing, and at this writing it is clearly a case of scrambled eggs and political eggs at that.

## \* \* \* \* \* County Agent's Column \* \* \* \* \*

In keeping with a movement started recently to preserve the wild-life in Callahan county the county agent would like to call attention to a movement started in Dallas county in which wild life preservation by the landowners is being stressed. The movement fits well into the Federal Soil Conservation Program.

Quoting from the Dallas Semi Weekly News of March 5, "This movement will in general result in a substantial increase in the amount of game which may then be sold at a profit to sportsmen; when this happens, the farmer should have full control over the territory covered by the hunter, and over the number of birds taken. Only such close control will insure perpetration of adequate breeding stock."

"But of far greater effect will the good resulting from the interrelated and inevitable protection of certain nongame species of birds whose economic value to agriculture has been proved beyond dispute through intensive investigation by competent biologists covering the food habits of birds. These indirect benefits are somewhat tangible in that it may be hard to calculate these benefits in terms of dollars and cents. In many cases where conditions were sufficiently well known to permit estimates authorities have calculated that the value of proper game management to farm crops and agricul-

ture in general has exceeded the cash profits derived solely from the sale of game birds.

"The results ultimately to be gained by game protective work on farms cannot be obtained in a few days. There is no magic wand that can be waved over a farm to produce an increased supply of desirable wild life, either game or insectivorous birds. Each farm must be studied carefully and, if possible, advice obtained from competent biologists well versed in game management. This assistance will be given by the Texas Cooperative Wild Life Service under direction of Dr. Walter P. Taylor, and with headquarters at College Station, to the extent permitted by available funds—which even now are greatly inadequate to cover all the work that must be done before final answer can be given to many local and Statewide problems affecting wild life."

The Extension Service now has the first wild life specialist in the United States and he is preparing information that will be of help to any ranchman or farmer who wishes to conserve his birds.

### Clean Fence Rows Hinder Birds

Although every farmer would like to see his fence rows clean yet a fence row that is grown up in weeds and grasses and undisturbed is always a nesting place for the quail. The county agent would like to suggest that each farmer plant such grains, which right now would be oats, along his fence rows and let it grow up to maturity without cutting or in anyway destroying the straw or grain. This could be done by merely scattering the grains along the fence rows and letting it come up voluntarily. If it did not come up for this Spring's crop it would come up this Fall and mature next year. A little thoughtfulness on the part of each farmer and then by banking together in groups of farmers we may soon make areas large enough of voluntary extension wild life preservation areas to soon increase our birds even though no protective law is given to the county.

Anyone interested in putting his farm into a wild life preserve will receive immediate attention if his name is left with the county agent. The committee is working on a plan to be submitted soon to the whole county.

### Ranchers and Farmers Signing 1937 AAA Work Sheets

More farmers are showing an interest this year than ever before in the new AAA Program for 1937. One reason is because it includes ranchers, orchardists and truck growers along with cotton, peanut, small grain and grain sorghum along with corn. "Any farmer is eligible to sign his farm if he has planted a commercial crop on the land since 1930. Even peanut or cotton farm-ers who grew that crop only in 1936 since 1930 are eligible to sign the work sheet. Callahan county has 1623 farms and ranches combined and it is the hope of the county agent that the greater majority of these men participate this year because the greater the participation the greater the allowance that will be given the county and therefore the greater returns in cash to our needy farm population.

A new ruling allows all pasture land to set up an allowance of 50 cents an acre in excess of one half of the cultivated land. It originally was 25 cents for this payment but the recent ruling increases this allowance 25 cents. Idle lands may be terraced and come within the provisions of the act. All farms that are totally terraced will receive credit for having 1/3 of the entire farm in conservation crops and this is a great help to those doing terracing or planning to terrace this year.

**Recruits For C. C. C. Camps**

According to C. J. Sweeney, Administrator for the Texas Relief Commission in Abilene, word has been received that there will be an enrollment the first part of April for youths for C.C.C. Camps. "The same requirements of eligibility as formerly are in force, i.e., the applicant must be from a family receiving assistance from some government agency, and between the ages of 17 and 29, and able to pass a physical examination." Mr. Sweeney further stated, "Actual quotas have not been established, and will not be until an accurate estimate can be made of the number of boys available. Consequently, all those who desire to go at the next enrollment should immediately call at their county welfare office and make application."

The present session of Congress has appropriated funds for continuing the C.C.C. program for several months, and there is no doubt that it will remain one of President Roosevelt's major programs. Those boys who apply themselves will receive promotions and increases in pay that will be more than they would be able to earn in private employment.

**Mrs. Ella McBride**  
**Member of Resettlement Adm. Ass'n.**

Recognition of the important part the home supervisor is playing in the advancement of home economics in rural life has just come from the Texas State Home Economics Association through an invitation to Ella R. McBride, county home supervisor for the Resettlement Administration, to join the association.

Invitation to join the association indicates recognition of a professional standard of work in a program which contributes definitely to a better understanding of home problems and the part home economics can play in creating a more ideal family life.

Mrs. McBride confines her activities to work with home-makers in families who have borrowed money from the Resettlement Administration under the supervised loan plan. She works with the women in planning their annual home budget, in executing this budget, and in carrying their share of the burden of repayment. Their "share" is the raising and conserving of every possible item of food, the making of clothing and bedding, and the planning of inexpensive recreation so that cash income from crops may be applied against family indebtedness.

The success of this plan has been so pronounced that many wives are conserving quantities of food valued at more than the total income the husbands make from cash crops. The greatest value of these products is not in the raw product as it comes from the garden, chicken pen, hog and cow lots, but in the finished products—butter, cured meat, canned poultry, canned and dried vegetables, and mattresses.

The home supervisor helps these women grow a bushel of tomatoes on a few feet of ground and then convert the bushel of tomatoes into an average of \$2.30 worth of canned tomatoes and tomato juice or fifty pounds of raw cotton and nine yards of ticking into a \$15 or \$20 mattress; or tame and wild fruits into the family's supply of fruit juices and jellies.

While she is teaching the home maker and the girls to do these things she is also teaching them the health-giving properties of various foods, of a balanced diet, and of plenty of fruit and tomato juices. In some counties where winter colds and malaria fever abound among these families, proper diet has eliminated much of the demand for tonics and patent medicines.

Mrs. Nelena Kirkland, district home supervisor for this county, has also been invited to join the Texas State Home Economics Association.

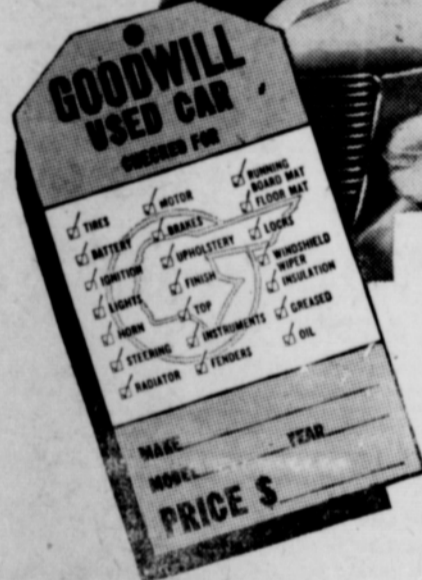
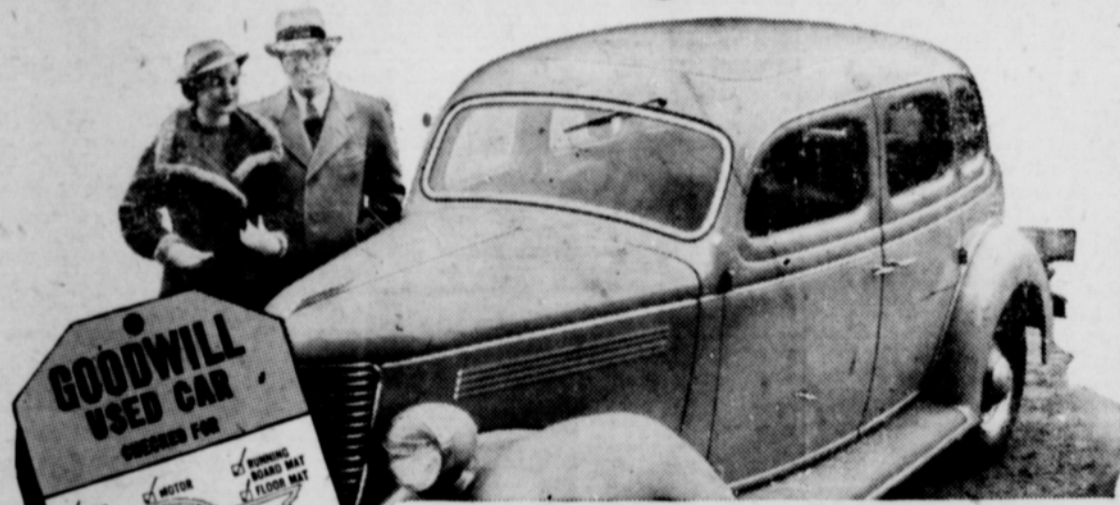

### Take Care of Your Social Security Card

Social Security account number cards, now in the hands of approximately one million workers in Texas, Louisiana and New Mexico, should be protected against damage or loss, Oscar M. Powell, regional director of the Social Security Board, said today.

"These cards, which indicate that the worker has established an old-age benefits account, should not be subjected to frequent handling and it is not necessary for employees to carry their cards with them at all times," Powell declared in response to inquiries from many workers.

"Employees should report their assigned account numbers to their employers as soon as they have received their cards. Immediately thereafter, the card may be put away in a safe place until such time as it is needed.

"Cards reported lost or destroyed will be replaced by the Social Security Board upon application; however, the time required to issue a duplicate card makes the preservation of the original card a matter of interest to the employee."

The Board has rejected suggestions that metallic plates be used in official assignment of account numbers, but employees may, if they so desire, register their account numbers on metal plates or fibrous material, Powell said.

### Historical Facts

Not long since there was an account of the founding of the first Episcopal mission in Texas at Matagorda by Bishop Leonidas Polk of Tennessee but not a word of his having been a Lieutenant General in the Confederate Army, killed in battle, and a graduate of West Point.

The people of the South to a man, clergy and laity of all denominations alike, regarded the invaders from the North as Vandals and still do, because they made war on their own flesh and blood in total disregard of the accepted rules of civilized warfare. Sherman's march to sea, and Sheridan's desolation of the Valley, both approved by Lincoln, were a disgrace to humanity.

Gen. R. E. Lee's chief artillery was an Episcopal Clergyman, and graduate of West Point.

Up to the time of the Civil War, the people of the South loved, revered and respected the constitution of the United States. They fought for it, bled for it and died for it, while people of the North cared little for it when it stood in their way. Their present howl for States' rights comes with poor grace from a people who destroyed States' rights.

Up to the Civil War the government of the United States rested upon the consent of the governed, not upon force. Each state, when it entered the union, understood that it could withdraw if it became dissatisfied. Several of the states expressly reserved the right in their own records. Property in slaves was fully recognized by all and indeed title to slaves, among the civilized races of the earth is older than that in land, and made the civilization which we have inherited possible. Under the doctrine of necessity, the tyrant's plea in all ages, Lincoln violated every principle of the constitution. He helped to precipitate the war by denouncing the Dred Scott decision as corrupt, when he must have known it was the law then as it is now. As a matter of fact, Lincoln was never President of the United States, military power could not make him such. At the time the States were wholly disunited, and held together by force of arms.

The civilization of the North and South was distinct and the two sections might have been peaceably separated, after the manner of Sweden and Norway to the advantage of both. As it is now, it is a nasty mixture.
