T-P Engineer And Conductor Killed In Wreck

Leonard J. Perry engineer and N. McNeely conductor on a Texas and Pacific Ry were killed near Weatherford Tuesday night when a special train bearing more than 100 Texas Christian university football fans to Los Angeles Calif. was wrecked.

J. B. Hammer fireman was injured and a number of others were slightly hurt. Among the injured were division superintendent A. E. Pistole and Master Mechanic J. E. Frenck.

The engine was practically demolished from a terrific blaze, throwing Perry's body 100 yards. It was found in a field by Larry Sprink and Monroe Bicknell, members of the Texas Christian university band.

The body of McNeely was discovered in the baggage car by John Hayes, also a band member. McNeely was crushed behind some pipes.

Stroke Fatal To Drew Beams

Drew Beams, 56, independent oil operator, died of a heart attack at 6:20 a. m. Monday at his home, 2234 Indewild, Abilene. Mr. Beams had been in excellent health and was up preparing to go to work when stricken. He died before a physician arrived.

Funeral services were held at the Laughter Chapel at 3:30 p. m. Wednesday with Dr. L. A. Long pastor of the St. Pauls Methodist Church of which deceased was a member conducting the rites. Burial was made in Cedar Hill cemetery with Masonic burial rites.

Mr. Beams was born September 14, 1883, in Barbourville, Ky. He married Lora Wilson March 22, 1916, in Rangoon, Burma, India, where he was engaged in the oil business. After leaving India the couple moved to Oklahoma, Okla., moving from there to Abilene seven year ago.

Mr. Beams was an independent oil operator, active in fields of this area. Survivors are his wife and four children, Drewsilla of Chicago; Bob, a student in the university of Oklahoma, Lora Belle and Bill, Abilene high school students.

Mr. Beams had been in the oil business since 15 years of age. He was interested in much of the oil development in Calahan county.

Fambro Draws 20-Year Term In Third Trial

Alex Fambro, Stephens county stock farmer was found guilty of murder by a 42nd district court jury and his punishment fixed at 20 years in the penitentiary at Abilene Friday.

He was convicted in the fatal shooting of Dave Wagley last Nov. 16. Wagley was slain in a dispute arising over land in the Wayland community, where both lived. The case was transferred to Abilene after a jury failed to agree at Breckenridge and illness of a witness halted a second trial here at the March term of district court.

Jurors reported their verdict to Judge Milburn S. Long at 9:30 o'clock Friday morning. Their agreement by that hour was so unexpected that Fambro did not reach the courthouse until several minutes later. The case was received by the jury at 5:25 Thursday afternoon, and it retired at 9:20 Thursday night.

Defense attorneys had filed a motion for mistrial, claiming death bed statements of Wagley had been introduced in testimony by state witnesses in a surprise move and that the defense had not been given sufficient time to prepare an answer. Judge Long, who had charged the jury to disregard portions of such testimony by Albert and Katie Wagley, father and sister of the shoot ing victim, overruled the motion. The defense then gave routine notice of appeal.

Courtroom observers attributed the verdict in part to Fambro's own testimony, in which he pleaded self defense. Other witnesses had said Wagley was unarmed. Fambro is 54 years old. Wagley was in his late 20's.

COTTON REFERENDUM

Faced with a tremendous cotton surplus 800,000 Texas cotton farmers are invited to go to the polls, December 9 to cast their votes in a South-wide referendum to decide whether cotton marketing quotas will be in effect for 1940.

In setting a national marketing 12 million bales during the marketing year beginning August 1, 1940, Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace pointed out the quota was total spillies reach 107 percent of the normal supply.

The supply of cotton on hand August 1, amounted to 25, 500, 000 according to the Department of Agriculture or 140 percent of the "normal" supply of 18, 200, 000 bales.

Unless the cotton farmers themselves vote for continuence of quotas, they will not be in effect next year, Wallace said. The quota for 1940 is the same as for 1939 which was approved by 84.1 percent of the producers in the referendum last year.

Regardless of the outcome of the referendum, conservation phrases of the Agriculture Conservation program will be continued. Of the producers voting, at least

75 percent must favor continuence of the marketing quota for it to remain in effect.

"Marketing quotas are meant to supplement the conservation program by assuring farmers planting within their acreage allotments their efforts to adjust suppleis will not nullified by non-co-operators" George Slaughter,

chairman of the State Agricultural pointed out.

If marketing quotas are in effect, a non-co-operator will be required to pay a penalty of 3 cents per pound on all cotton sold in excess of the marketing quota set for his farm, Slaughter explained. Farmers planting within their acreage allotments will be

able to market all their cotton without penalty.

In a recent opinion, Federal Judge James V. Allred of Houston declared marketing quotas were legal in the suit to reach court testing their legality.

F.F.A. NEWS

The F.F.A. Chapter, Baird's energetic Vocational Agriculture Organization, is getting under way with some projects which look like good investments. Supervisor E.E. Jones is stressing long time projects for the boys suited for carrying out such schemes. Jones believes that it is never too early for farmers and future farmers to look to the future! By starting with one calf, for example, a boy in the eighth grade, could multiply his stock so that by the time graduation throws him on his own he will have enough of a herd to either start his own herd or a good beginning of a college fund. Alexander is feeding skimmed milk and this method may become very popular if the results are as young Alexander hopes for Fred Alexander is saving a Poland China pig for production and Jesse Ridding is planning to use a gilt as his project. It seems through swine and its improvement is proving popular with the Chapter boys.

J.W. Faircloth is following the long time program with a good jersey cow and calf for a heard increased plan. J.W. has been a highly successful 4H culb boy and he is expected to turn out to be an A-1 F.F.A. member. Arrangements have been made to put twenty head of sheep on feed.

R.J. Wiley has contracted with the Fair Association to exhibit his calf. The Calf come from the blue bloods of the Herefords breed boasting among his ancestry Superior Auxiety and Momi-no.
