True, such downpours don't come very often. But if those streams are not cleared, the next one could cost Baird homeowners thousands of dollars in water damage -- for which there is no insurance.

BRUSH TOUR THIS FRIDAY

Callahan County Brush Control Tour has been rescheduled for this Friday. The tour will leave from the courthouse in Baird at 8:30 a. m.

Transportation will again be provided for those making the tour, and a barbecue lunch will be served.

Brush is a major problem in this county, and is annually taking over more grassland. This invasion is causing a reduced stocking rate, less pounds of beef produced per acre, increased winter feed bills, and more time, labor and equipment in working brushy pastures, according to County Agent Pat C. Garner.

Four or five ranches will be visited on which brush control practices have been carried out from a 10 to 20 year period. These ranches are all good practical operations, not "show" places, Garner said.

All the ranches are now producing more beef per acre than when their pastures were covered in brush. Feed costs have been reduced and gains on cattle have been increased. Stocking rates on most of the ranches have been increased, he said.

The brush control tour will be sponsored by the County ASC Committee and the County Program Building Committee.

Baird Youngsters In Junior Rodeo

Eighty-two students representing four Callahan County schools will compete for individual and team honors this weekend in the second annual Baird FFA rodeo.

Performances are scheduled for 8 p. m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights in the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse arena east of Baird.

Parade Thursday
A parade at 5 p. m. Thursday will open the three-night festivities.

The entry list includes 13 from Eula, 17 from Clyde, five from Cross Plains and 47 from Baird. Students in all Callahan County schools were invited to participate.

Besides individual honors, a team champion will be named at the show's end. Each school can have two entries in each

contest designated as team members, with their score counting toward the team title.

A traveling trophy will be awarded to this year's team champ, with three consecutive wins required for permanent possession.

The 82 students competing this year turned in more than 200 entries in the various events. Last year, the first such show produced in the county, drew 64 individuals with 120 entries.

Shetland Broncs
A new feature this year will be Shetland bronc riding in the junior division. Other junior events include calf riding, goat sacking and barrel racing for both boys and girls.

Senior events will include bull riding, barrel racing, goat sacking, red wagon race, rescue race and bronc riding.

The rodeo is produced by the Baird FFA chapter with area stockmen furnishing animals for the contests. Bill Seelig, chapter president, is rodeo chairman.

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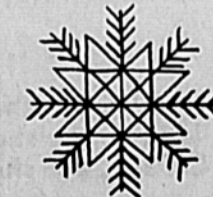

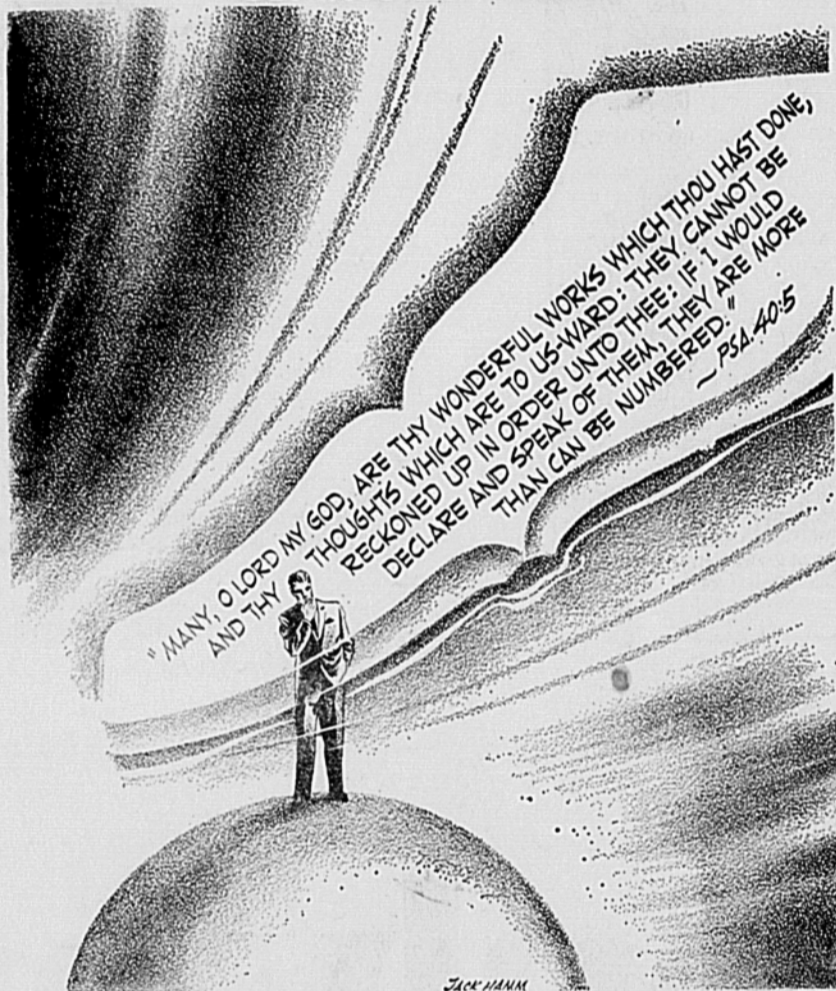

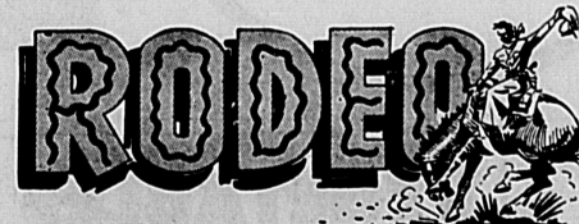
