Windham's Rape Trial Set May 20

Tommy Windham's trial on a charge of statutory rape of a 15-year-old Abilene girl was set Friday for May 20 in the district court of Lea County, N. M., at Lovington.

The action followed a preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace Green of Lovington. Green ruled there was sufficient testimony to hold Windham for trial but reduced his bond from \$10,000 to \$5,000.

Testifying at the preliminary hearing for the 20-year-old Callahan rancher's son were the girl, her father, and Bally Young, Federal Bureau of Investigation agent from Hobbs, N. M.

Windham, whose home is at Oplin, has been in jail in Abilene since his arrest March 13 on a charge of assault with intent to murder. He was arrested after the throat of Raymond Goza, 16, of 2311 South 23rd St., Abilene, was slashed March 12 at a residence on the Buffalo Gap Road.

March 16 he has been held in the jail to serve out \$200 in fines and six days jail time for twice violating a 42nd District Court order. The order forbids him to see or molest the 15-year-old girl whom he is charged in New Mexico with raping.

Windham pleaded guilty to violating the order first on Feb. 24 and again on March 12. Judge J. R. Black gave him the penalty of \$100 fine and three days in jail in each case. The jail terms were cumulative. The court order was such that the fine must be paid or served out at \$3 per day before he could begin serving the six days in jail. The fine has not been paid.

Windham is also charged in Abilene with kidnapping the 15-year-old girl and taking her to New Mexico. His first contempt conviction was in connection with this incident.

He was charged with contempt of court the second time for going to the girl's residence on the night of March 12. That was the night that Goza's throat was slashed.

When Windham was arrested March 13 on the assault to murder charge, he was free on \$5,000 bond on the kidnapping charge, \$1,000 on the first contempt of court charge, and on \$10,000 cash bond on the New Mexico statutory rape charge.

Windham was indicted by the 104th District grand jury last March on the assault to murder charge. When he was called to trial the indictment was found to be defective. He was re-indicted by the panel on the charge when it reconvened in April. The case has not come up for trial the second time.

Soil Conservation District News

Cooperators with the Central Colorado, Lower Clear Fork and Middle Clear Fork Soil Conservation Districts are finding that properly grazed land is directly related to good fishing in this area. Where the land is overgrazed it results in soil erosion from the pasture land, thus muddy water collects in farm and ranch ponds. Game fish, such as bluegill and bass feed by sight. If the water coming into the pond is muddy, fish can not feed.

Tanks in this section are constructed primarily for livestock water. These tanks are located so as to get better distribution of grazing. They can have the added value of fish production, provided the grasses are protected from overgrazing. Long periods of overgrazing our native ranges destroys the grasses. Grasses are the most valuable plants for holding the soil in place. Water will penetrate well into the soil when a good cover of grass is left on the land. This additional water produces more grass. The increase in grass production results in more feed for livestock. This also prevents the pond from filling with mud and allows for better fishing.

Overgrazing hurts the pasture in addition to filling up farm ponds with eroded soil. Weeds gradually replace grasses, gullies are formed on hillsides and the topsoil is washed away into farm or ranch ponds and creeks where it loses its value for grass production. This also results in the pond becoming muddy and destroying fish food.

There is a close connection between livestock and fish production. Where pasture land is properly grazed there can be good fishing in local ponds, but overgrazing destroys the fishing. A pond with one acre of surface area can produce as much as one hundred and fifty pounds of fish annually if it is properly managed.

Fish may be ordered through the Baird office of the Soil Conservation Service should they be needed for proper stocking of your pond.

Ranchers To Meet Thursday Night

The semi-annual membership meeting of the West Texas Ranchers Association will be held at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, May 5, at the high school auditorium in Eastland, it was reported here Saturday.

Sam Kimmell of Cisco is president of the association and will preside at the meeting. He reported that an outstanding educational program has been arranged and urged members and others interested in ranching and farming to attend.

Scheduled to appear on the program are C. E. Fisher, superintendent of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Spur; E. R. Eudaly, livestock director of Universal Mills in Ft. Worth and W. N. Sewell, organization director of the Texas Beef Council of Dallas.

Mr. Fisher will tell of modern methods of brush control and Mr. Eudaly will talk on the latest developments in feeding practices. Mr. Sewell will tell of the Texas Beef Council and its purpose and operation.

The West Texas Ranchers Association is composed of some 250 members, all ranchers and farmers in a five-county area including Eastland, Callahan, Stephens, Shackelford and Palo Pinto Counties. While its primary purpose is for the protection of its members, the association spends much time in education and in other programs designed to aid its members.

Savings Bonds Week Proclaimed

Governor Shivers today proclaimed the week of May 22-28 as "U. S. Defense Savings Bonds Week" in Texas, and called upon all Texans to do their part toward national defense by increasing their purchases of United States Savings Bonds.

"It is the earnest desire of every American," the Governor said, "that our country maintain an impregnable defense for the protection of our democratic ideals and free way of life. One way to insure this is through increased sale of Defense Savings Bonds. Therefore, I call upon every Texan to join wholeheartedly in this campaign."

More than 1200 volunteer workers representing every Texas county will devote their time and efforts to this drive during the week of May 22. Their goal will be: (1) to double the number of people buying bonds regularly on the Payroll Savings Plan and the Bond-a-Month Plan, and (2) to ask those already on the Plan to increase the amount of purchases each payday.

"Texas ranked only 38th in the nation in 1954 in the percentage of the state sales goal attained," the Governor said. "This is far short of Texas standards. I think we can lead the nation in 1955 if every Texan will give this matter serious thought and action!"

The 1955 Savings Bonds sales goal for Texas is \$201.9 million. The national goal is \$5.5 billion.

Two new wildcats were announced for Callahan County.

Deeper of the pair is Hooks Brothers, et al. of Abilene No. 1 Hooks Brothers, slated for 4,500 feet with rotary. Location is seven miles northwest of Clyde, 330 feet from the north and 2,310 feet from the west lines of Section 91, Block 13, T&P Survey.

The other test is Gene Workman & Louis Wilson, Dallas, No. 1 Bessie L. Hall, slated for 2,500 feet with rotary. It is 12 miles west of Cross Plains, 1,250 feet from the east and 1,900 feet from the north lines of J. I. McWhorter Survey 2.

Potential was taken at Johnson & Warren No. 4-A Josie W. Brown, Section 1, Block 2, SP Survey, regular field well eight miles southwest of Baird.

Daily gauge was 25.60 barrels of 38 gravity oil, pumping from six perforations per foot at 1,031-44 feet. Casing is on bottom at 1,079 feet.

Completed in the A. C. Scott (Cross Plains Sand) Field nine miles west of Cross Plains was Harding Brothers, Dallas, No. 7 J. P. McCord, T. H. Brown Survey 218.

THE FOOLISHNESS OF GOD

"For ye see your calling, brethren, how that not many wise men after the flesh, not many mighty, not many noble, are called: But God hath chosen the foolish things of the world to confound the wise; and God hath chosen the weak things of the world to confound the things which are mighty." (1 Corinthians 1:26-27)

As strange as it seems the law of God appears foolish to many people and therefore they reject it. In giving us a law God is testing our faith, and we can prove our faith only by accepting that law. Many people in the religious world today refuse to accept parts of the law on the grounds that it seems foolish. There are those who do not accept Jesus as God's son. Others refuse to believe in hell. And still others refuse to believe in the inspiration of certain parts of the Bible. To them it is foolishness. But our text says that God hath chosen foolish things (things that appear foolish) to confound the wise.

Faith, repentance and baptism for the remission of sins seems foolish to many and yet God requires it. (Mark 16:15-16 — Acts 2:38) Shall we reject it on the grounds that it seems foolish or because we can't understand WHY God arranged it this way? God also declares that when people are saved He adds them to the church. (Acts 2:47) But to many people the church is no more important than a fraternal organization, and church membership strictly optional.

How much of the Bible shall we accept? Will we dare cast any part of it aside because we deem it "foolish"? "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, saith the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts." (Isaiah 55:8-9)

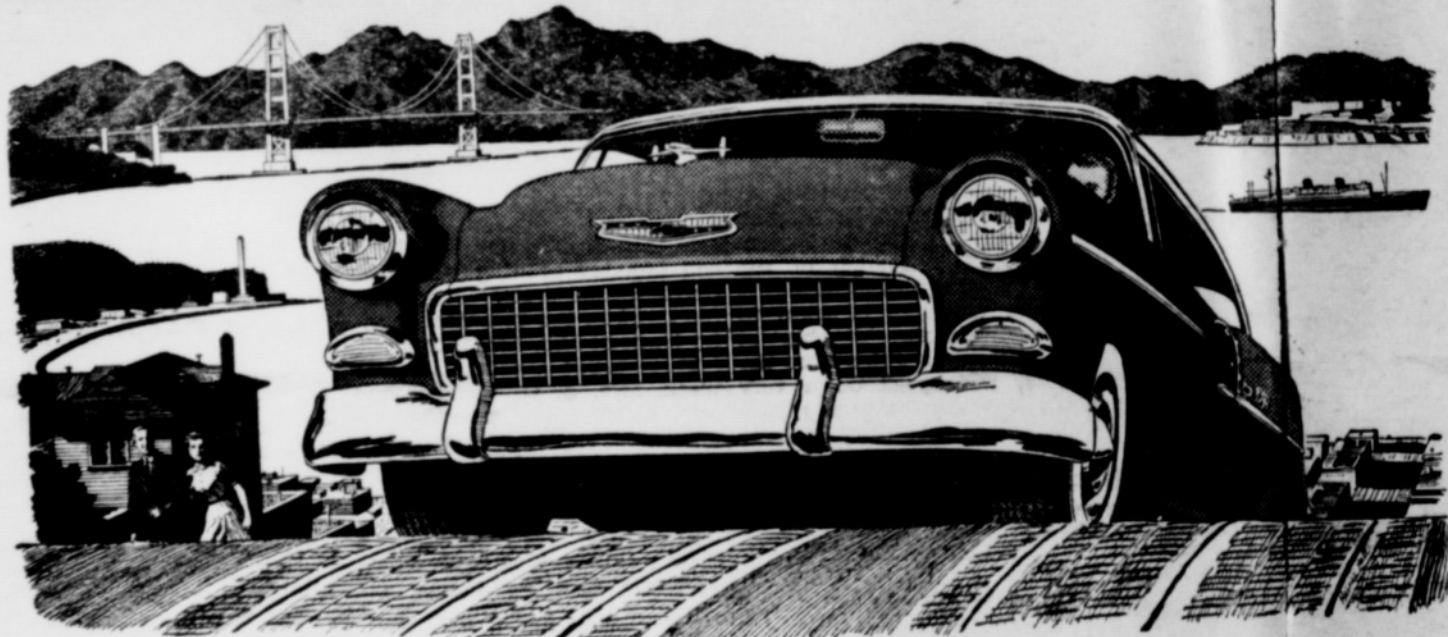

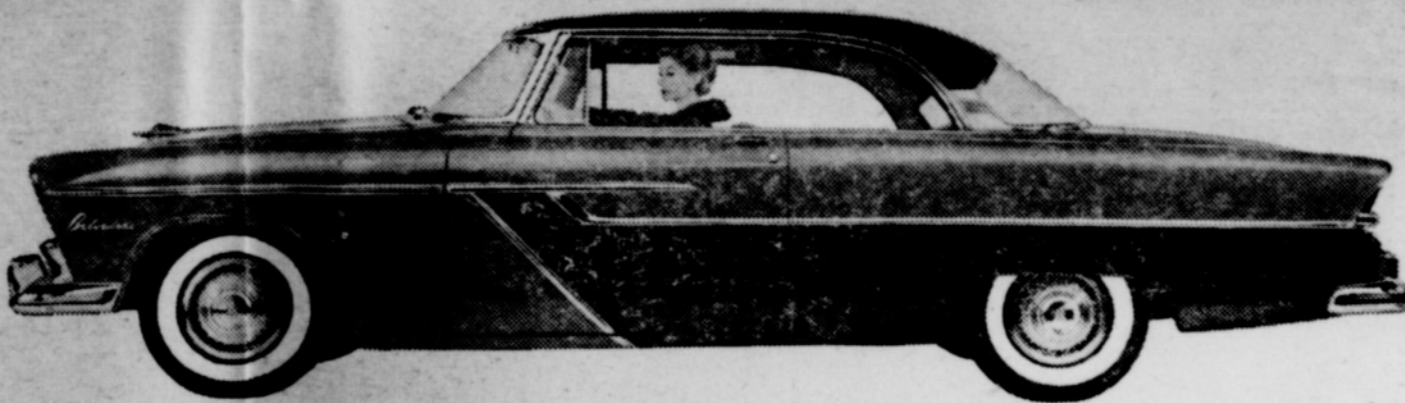

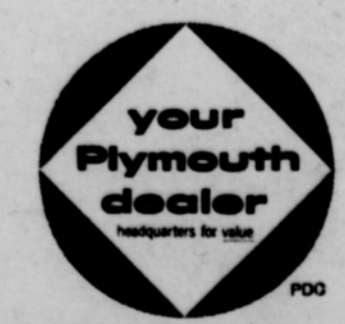

HISTORY HAS BEEN MADE

With 1955 still in its first half, we think it is perfectly safe to name Dr. Jonas E. Salk as the Man-of-the-Year.

With the reading in Ann Arbor on April 12th of his 113 page report, Dr. Thomas Francis, Jr., of the University of Michigan, who evaluated the most massive field trials in the history of medicine, the world learned that poliomyelitis can be, and will be, licked.

In essence, the detailed study of the 1954 trials, involving the vaccination of 440,000 children in the 44 states with three separate inoculations of the Salk vaccine, has established the effectiveness of the preventive treatment at 60 to 80 percent. New data presented subsequently by Dr. Salk on both the processing of the vaccine and the method of administering indicate increasing effectiveness from here on.

At the President's direction, machinery was swiftly set in motion to share the Salk discovery with the world and to formulate plans for proportional distribution throughout the US and the prevention of black marketing of the vaccine. While it is not expected that we can produce enough of this precious fluid to ship any quantity abroad before 1957, Secretary of State John Foster Dulles will send copies of the Ann Arbor report and full data on the Salk vaccine to our diplomatic headquarters in 75 foreign nations, including our embassies in Poland and Russia—whence the information will undoubtedly go to Red China.

But, amidst the rejoicing, we should bear in mind two important points. First, because Dr. Salk's great gift to humanity is not yet 100 percent effective, and because it will be a long time before all of our young people and expectant mothers can be inoculated, hundreds more are yet to be stricken down by this dread disease. And second, for thousands of those now suffering from polio, the battle can never be won.

Here, as with every epoch-marking advance, the suffering of those who were born too soon is etched all the sharper against this background of immunity for others.
