Willis D. Brown, 56, native of Clyde, was killed Monday near Whitesboro when a bulldozer he was driving overturned, crushing him.

Funeral was held Wednesday at 2 p. m. in the Clyde Baptist Church, of which he was a member. Officiating was Rev. Knox Waggoner, pastor of the Denton Valley Baptist Church, assisted by Rev. Harold Watson, Clyde pastor. Burial was in the Clyde Cemetery under direction of Bailey Funeral Home.

Mr. Brown was living at Lubbock and was employed by a heavy equipment company there working on a road construction project near Whitesboro when the accident happened about 11:15 a. m. Monday.

He was born at Clyde Aug. 13, 1905, the son of W. B. and Florence Mowles Brown. He attended Clyde schools and married Myrtle Conlee in 1926 at Clyde.

Rabid Animal Killed East of Town

Rabies in wild animals in the Baird area is apparently on the increase, and those living in the area were urged to vaccinate their pets in an effort to keep down the danger of infection.

This week, the pet dog on the Hatchett ranch was bitten by a skunk. The animal was killed and the head sent off for examination. Word was received from Bob Henthorne, of the Abilene-Taylor County Health Department that the skunk was rabid. The pet dog of the Hatchetts was destroyed.

Oil Development In Callahan County

Last week was an important one for Callahan County Oil Development as several wells were completed in both proven and previously unproven areas.

A lower Moran Sand discovery well completed 6 1/2 miles northeast of Baird was prorated in Callahan County regular field.

The strike is Sojourner Drilling Corp. of Abilene No. 1 R. D. Williams, Section 61, BAL Survey.

No. 1 Williams had a daily potential of 41 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus 20 per cent water. It is pumping from four perforations per foot at 2,384-86 feet. Casing is set at 2,439 feet, one foot of bottom.

Sojourner No. 2 R. D. Williams was staked 933 ft. northwest of No. 1 Williams. Having a proposed depth of 2,500 feet with rotary, it spots 1,650 feet from the north and 2,310 feet from the west lines of Section 61, BOA Survey.

Location for a proposed 1,999 foot rotary wildcat was staked 4 1/2 miles southwest of Clyde. It is A. H. Richardson Jr. of Longview No. 1 Sam DeSpain.

Drill site is 6,454 feet from the north and 150 feet from the east lines of Section 32, Block 8, SP Survey.

Another wildcat was staked 1 1/4 miles south of Admiral as H. V. McAllister, et al, of Abilene No. 1 H. L. Walker. Permit depth applied for is 900 feet with rotary.

Site for No. 1 Walker is 1,470 feet from the south and east lines of Section 48, Block 5, D&DAL Survey.

A proposed 1,800 foot rotary project was staked in the regular field 8 miles southwest of Cross Plains. It is the W. L. Pennington of Wichita Falls No. 1 Luddle Owen.

Site is 3,243 feet from the north and 2,682 feet from the east lines of J. P. Carson Survey, A-106.

Completed as a producer in Callahan Co. regular field eight miles southwest of Baird was L. A. Warren, et al, of Abilene No. 4 Harris-Barton, Section 8, BBB-&C Survey.

Daily potential was 22 barrels of 40.1 gravity oil. It is pumping from four perforations per foot at 1,170-72 1/2 feet Casing is set at 1,187 feet and the hole bottomed at 1,190 feet.

Dixon Drilling Co. of Abilene No. 1-A Oma Wagley, TE&L Survey 2996, wildcat re-entry 8 1/2 miles north of Putnam, was plugged at 2,640 feet.

Premier Oil Refining Company of Texas today announced the impending shut-down of its 30-year old Baird refinery. According to the statement released by company management, the refinery will close on Tuesday, March 20th.

Premier was previously permitted to operate as a small business and was allowed to negotiate for contracts on jet fuel at Dyess Air Force Base under the Small Business Set-Aside Program. However, the Small Business Administration in Washington decided that the Company was no longer entitled to such certificate.

The Set-Aside Program is the government's practice of assigning portions of its requirements in goods and services to be negotiated for by small businesses. This procurement method was established to enhance the ability of small businesses to compete with larger companies.

The Company plans to continue to use a small portion of the plant facilities as a distribution terminal. The reduced

operation will permit the Company to retain only a very small work force.

Company officials have expressed regret because of the reduction in work force and the economic loss this will mean to the area, but have stated that without a jet fuel contract the Company has no choice. Such a contract will be difficult to obtain as long as the Company is denied the bidding advantages accorded other small plants in the area.

There was no indication that the Baird plant's change of status will affect the Company's other operations, and the Company states that it will continue to supply automotive gasoline and other petroleum products in the West Central Texas area.

The Baird plant, originally called Octane Refining Company, has been in continuous operation since 1931. Constructed to process crude gathered from local fields, it is the nucleus from which Premier's system of refineries and pipelines developed.

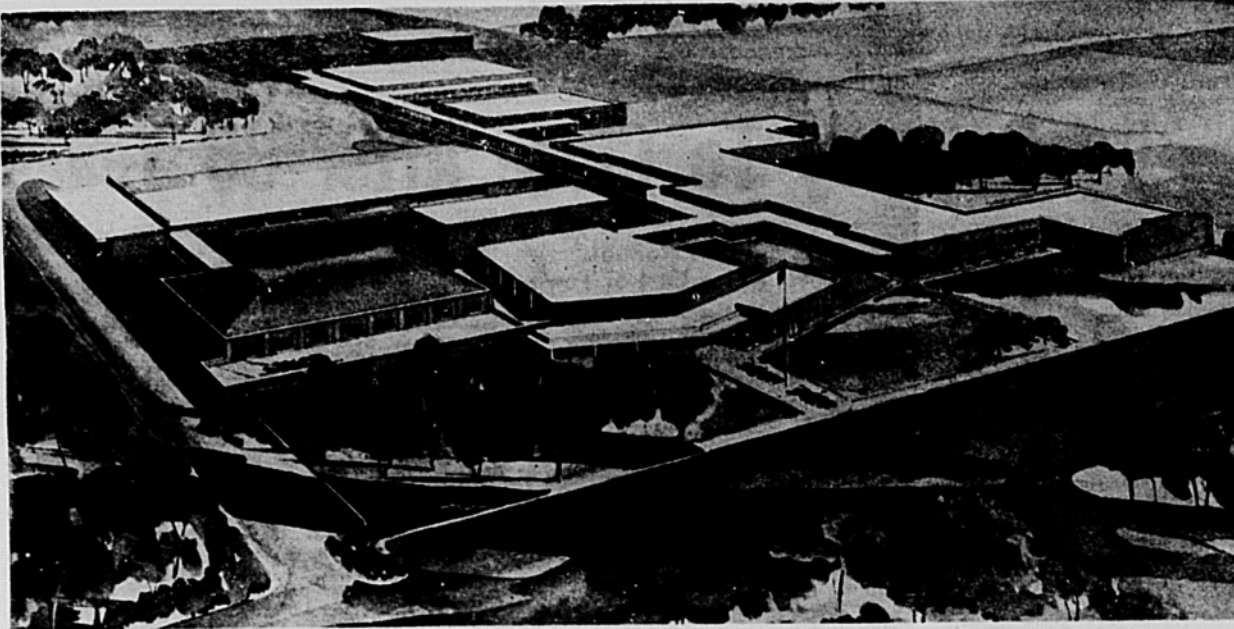

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NO WILL? WHO INHERITS PROPERTY?

What will happen if you should die without executing a legal and proper will? Who will inherit your property? Your husband, wife, mother, father, children, your wife's relatives? The best way you can say who will have it is to provide a will which will protect your rightful beneficiaries and dispose of your property in accordance with your wishes.

When a deceased has no will, or dies, "intestate," as the law calls it, the property of that person is distributed according to a detailed formula fixed by law. In some cases this may be the way you yourself would divide it -- but in many cases it is not. The provisions of the law concerning the distribution of the property of a person who dies without a will are rather complicated, and all of the possibilities cannot be covered by a general statement.

There are different rules for real estate and for personal property, for community property and for separate property, for homestead property, and for all of the many possible combinations of surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to determine the correct distribution of the property. For example, here is a general idea of how the Community Property, which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the property.

If, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of deceased children, they would divide one-half of the property, while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is deceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the portion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants.

An odd note, perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to this share where there are children surviving.

When there are only children and their descendants surviving, they divide the entire community estate between them.

Operation screwworm control is in full swing in Texas with millions of sterile flies released each week on the Texas-Mexico border. The screwworm fund in Texas is only a little over the half-way mark and the remaining funds are badly needed, it was reported.

Callahan County livestock owners are approximately \$2,400 short of the county quota and all those who have not donated or sent in their part were urged to do so at the earliest convenience, because the money is needed now if the program is to be a success, officials said.

The livestock owners in the county were urged to watch for screwworm cases, and anytime one is found or an infestation that looks like screwworms is found, to scrape ten worms from the bottom of the wound and take to the office of the County Agent, so they can be sent in and checked by the state lab. If

they are screwworms, then sterile flies will be released in the area promptly. All wounds are recommended to be treated with Korlan screwworm smear before any of the worms are removed.

Callahan 4-Hers are getting started on another year of feeding, with 13 baby club calves being selected and put on feed at the present time. The 4-H members with calves on feed are Jim and Byron Snyder, Tom and Dyer Windham, Murray Edwards, Vicky Finley and Jimmy Harris. About five more calves are being hunted to put on feed in the next few weeks.

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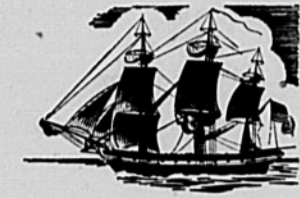

1962 Feed Grain Signup Under Way

Farmers in Callahan County are showing increased interest in the 1962 feed grain program, Tommie Harris, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said this week.

As of March 1, 1962, a total of 94 farmers in the county were lined up to take part in the 1962 program through the diversion of about 2,200 acres from corn and grain sorghum into soil-conserving uses.

From now on, Chairman Harris believes, the office will be increasingly busy explaining the program to farmers and helping them fill out the necessary forms indicating their "intention to participate" in the 1962 feed grain program. Under the program, diversion payments are available to farmers who shift a stated percentage of their acreage formerly planted to corn and grain sorghum into an approved soil-conserving practice. By cooperating in the program, growers also qualify for price supports on their 1962 crops of corn and grain sorghum.

The Chairman urged farmers to get in touch with the ASCS office without delay if they wish further information about the 1962 feed grain program. The signup period for the corn and grain sorghum program extends through March 30. The ASCS County Office is located at the County Courthouse.

Textbook Committee Reviews New Books

Members of the local textbook committee have completed reviews of new textbooks offered for State adoption and have recommended their selections for local distribution in September, 1962.

The following titles were selected from a State-approved multiple-choice list for use in the Baird school district: Geography, Grades 4, 5, and 6; Our Big World by Silver Burdette; The American Continent, Series; Old World Lands, Series. Vocal Music, Grades 7 and 8; Music for Young Americans. American History, Grade 8; Our United States, by Cordier. American Dictionaries, Grades 4 - 7; Webster, MacMillan Co. High School Science: You and Science, by Brandwein. High School American History: American History, by Craven. High School World History: Men and Nations, by Mazour. Members of the Baird Textbook Committee are: Mr. Town-

The State approved list is prepared by a 15-member State Textbook Committee, appointed by the State Board of Education. The committee and its advisors review all textbooks offered by publishers. The 1961 committee worked in cooperation with approximately 800 advisors, persons considered to be authorities in their fields.

The process of textbook selection, from request for bids from interested publishers to the delivery of the new book to the pupil, consumes annually about 15 months, May in one year until September in the year following.

To follow a typical calendar, using the period May, 1961, until September, 1962, as an example: Bids on books needed are requested in May and the State-appointed Textbook Committee and advisors review all books submitted.

Interested members of the public may also examine the books at the same time so that in September, twelve months before book delivery, the Committee meets to hear all objections to any books offered for adoption.

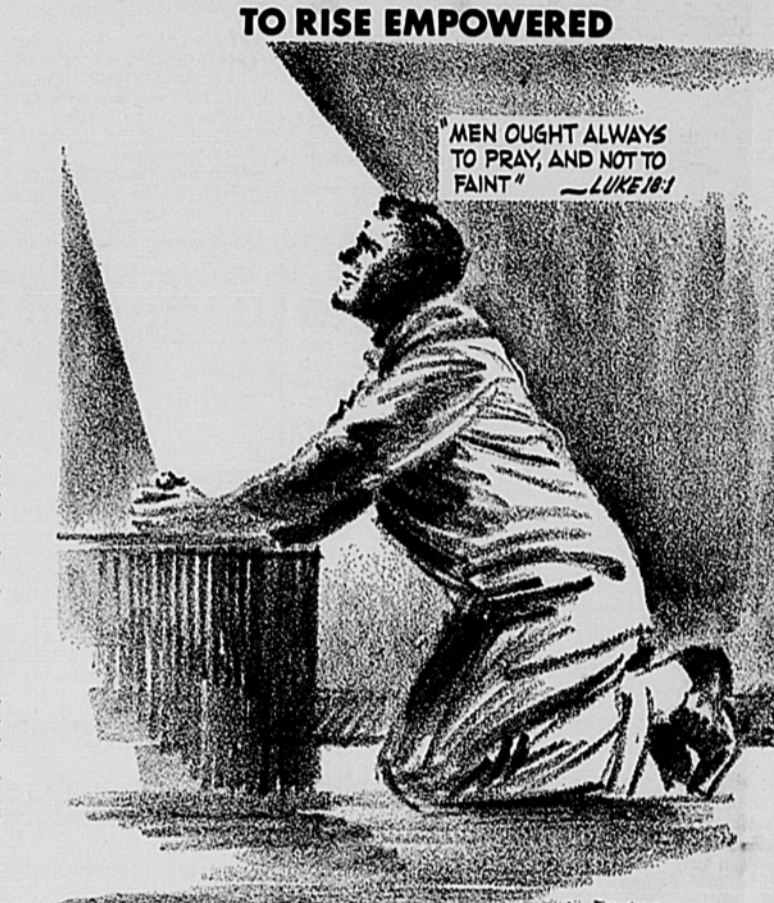
In October, the State Textbook Committee recommends titles of books from those offered. The number of titles selected may be not less than two nor more than five, a variation determined by quality and quantity of books offered. This committee then submits its report to the Commissioner of Education. The Commissioner may delete any title from the list, but he cannot add a new title or titles. Hearings with interested individuals or groups continue until November.

In November, the State Board of Education takes official action on the list of books recommended by the Commissioner who is guided in his actions by the recommendations of the State Textbook Committee and its advisors.

Local textbook committees may now adopt one or all of the titles offered in each subject and new textbooks will be printed in accordance with their selections.



County Agent

The Screwworm program is moving at a fast clip; at present 10 million sterile flies are being dropped each week in 30 counties in South Texas. A control

line has been set up across the southern part of the state from Del Rio, through San Antonio, Columbus to Bay City. Inspectors will man key points along the line and inspect all animals crossing the line in an effort to contain the screwworms in the area where the sterile flies are being dropped at present.

The 11th annual swine short course will be held at Texas A&M College April 2, 3, & 4. A breeding program will be explained which could mean more pigs per litter; more pork produced on less feed and a still

higher quality carcass at slaughter time.

A beef cattle field day will be held at the Blue Bonnet Experiment Station at McGregor on March 29th. A demonstration on the selection of meat type steers will conclude the program which will include tips on cow-calf operations and rate of gain and weaning weights of the McGregor cattle.

Lawns are soon going to be on many peoples minds. Start planning now if you want a beautiful lawn. Management can give you a beautiful lawn. Application of fertilizer should be enough to give 2 lbs. of nitrogen per 1000 feet, at about the time the lawn begins to grow. This should be followed with applications at 30 to 40 day intervals of one pound per 1000 sq. feet. When watering, wet ground to a depth of six inches. Several good lawn bulletins can be obtained at my office at the courthouse.
