"GOLD DUST" ARRIVES IN AUSTRALIA

Text of story printed in the Maryborough Chronicle, March 14, in Maryborough, Queensland, Australia.

Pony Express has Another Message:

"Gold Dust," the globe-trotting hobby horse, will resume his travels aboard T.A.A. Fokker Friendship bound for Brisbane at 10 a. m. today.

The mayor (Ald. R. A. Hunter) wrote this message in the diary in "Gold Dust's" feed bag: "Maryborough, Queensland, Mar. 14, H, young Roddy, Congratulations on your 'gee gee,' he certainly has traveled, and it is Maryborough's wish that his tour will help to bring a friendly spirit among all nations he passes through. We hope that he will cause goodwill and teamwork to be maintained for all. Good luck and a happy future, yours sincerely, Bob Hunter (Mayor)." Televised in Brisbane

"Gold Dust" would be on his second visit to Brisbane within a fortnight said Mr. George Bezzant, agent for T.A.A. in Maryborough.

He said that "Gold Dust" was televised in Brisbane before he

went back up the coast to Cairns.

The hobby horse would probably go from Maryborough to Brisbane, to Sidney, Melbourne, Hobart, Adelaide, Alice Springs, Darwin, Perth, Back to Sydney and possibly to New Zealand.

Mr. Bezzant said that many people had taken the opportunity to see "Gold Dust." He said that there was more interest shown by adults than by children.

No organizations had responded to the invitation to send a message to the horse's owner, Roddy Reynolds, Putnam, Texas. However, there would be a brochure of Maryborough and Hervey Bay in the feed bag of "Gold Dust," he added.

The T.A.A. office in Maryborough would make an inscription in the diary, he said.

Another much longer article appeared in this same paper with a picture with this caption, "Captain Arnolds, officer in charge of the flight handing over 'Gold Dust' to Mr. George Bezzant after the plane arrived in Maryborough yesterday. This article gives the history of the Pony Express and relates some of the experiences of 'Gold Dust.'"

I will cite two or three paragraphs only from this article:

"One article in the feed bag will remain in it for the duration of the trip. It is a document from the Speaker of the House of Representatives in Texas which adopted 'Gold Dust.'"

"Maryborough agent for T.A.A. who has charge of 'Gold Dust' until he goes south this afternoon, said yesterday that he would ask the Mayor (Ald. R. A. Hunter) to write a message in the diary.

He said that leaders of other organizations, such as the Boy Scouts, Girl Guides, Apex, Jaycees, Chamber of Commerce, could write messages for inclusion in the diary.

These messages should be lodged in the T.A.A. office not later than 2 p. m. today."
