Clyde Tallback Alton Brannon ran for three touchdowns Friday night at Wylie to lead his Clyde team to a 27-0 blanking of Wylie.

The game, which was the final non-district contest for both teams before entering into league play next week. Clyde takes on potent Albany at Lion Stadium.

The wind hampered both teams in the Friday contest. It was so strong that Wylie punted 45 yards early in the second period. And in the third, with the wind facing the Bulldogs, a punt was blown for a five yard loss.

Brannon's slashes over his own left tackle weren't slowed by the wind though and the lanky tailback romped for 28, 23 and four yards for his three scores.

With Brannon leading the way Clyde scored in all four periods. He opened the game with a 23 yard set and Johnny McCluskey kicked the extra point to send the visitors ahead to stay.

Fullback Edward Ramos picked up the second score in the second period with a 15 yard run. Quarterback Buddy Howell passed to Rick Dennis for the extra points.

In the second half, Brannon scored first on his 28 yard run in the third and in the final period crashed over from the four.

Wylie, now 2-3 for the season hosts Rotan, currently rated No. 2 in Class A state ratings, in next Friday's district opener.

The win boosts Clyde's record to 4-1 for the year.

AUSTIN Tex. — With 12 indictments already returned in the East Texas slant-hole investigation, there are strong side-currents growing out of the East Texas scandals.

Rep. Charles Ballman of Borger and his fellow House investigators sent a preliminary report to Speaker James A. Turman and Gov. Price Daniel. They urged "immediate action" on eight charges in or addition to the criminal laws.

They also proposed that a procedure be set up to replace state officials who become ill and un-

able to handle their duties. This obviously is a reference to Railroad Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson, who has been ill at his home in Amarillo for several months.

A major policy change would be revision of the old "marginal well law" which could be very important to many Texans, particularly in old oil areas.

Present law says that if an oil well cannot make as much as 20 barrels a day, it is a "marginal well" which must be exempt from shutdown days. Thus, a well producing 19 barrels a day

will get an allowable of 570 barrels a month. But a well capable of making 1,000 barrels a day will be held to 160 barrels a month — 20 barrels a day times eight producing days.

Committee recommended that marginal wells be held to the same monthly allowable as a non-marginal well in the same field.

Governor Daniel has been noncommittal on the possibility of calling a special session of the Legislature to act on this and other current problem areas.

**COMMISSION SHAKEUP** — Texas Railroad Commission is under a reorganization study by the Texas Research League. Already changes in procedures are being put into effect.

Commissioners William J. Murray Jr. and Ben Ramsey named a committee of oilmen headed by James E. Russell of Abilene to advise on revision of rules and procedures which most admit had become too cumbersome and slow.

**PADRE AND MADRE** — Land

Commissioner Jerry Sadler continues his battle against creation of the Padre Island National Seashore.

He has charged that oilmen bidding on state school leases in Laguna Madre did not make big cash bonus offers to the state because of passage of the Padre Island bill.

Sadler intends to oppose legislation to authorize sales of state land in Laguna Madre to the U. S. for the recreation area.

He has hired Captain William

C. Russell of Fort Worth, recently retired as director of the Southwest Division of the Coast and Geodetic Survey, to study the area along the Gulf.

Although the so-called "tidelands" law was passed in 1953, there has not been a settlement between Texas and the U. S. as to where the exact boundary lies. Russell, whose life work has been in coastal surveying, will undertake that chore.

It is made doubly hard because the line is supposed to be

three marine leagues off the shore, as it was in 1848 when Texas entered the union. The shoreline has changed considerably in the intervening years.

**BUSINESS PERKS UP** — Texas business activity rose seven per cent in August over July. And eight per cent above that of August, 1961.

Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas found this rosier picture in August, af-

ter two bad months of decline.

**CASH ON HAND** — While there has been lots of talk about the state government being in the red, it really never has been.

On August 31, when the fiscal year ended, the State Treasury had a cash balance of more than \$219,000,000.

Deficits have been recurring in one of the state's 380 or so funds — the General Revenue Fund. But the others always have cash

## A Humble Statement Of Our Position

As humbly as we know how, we state here our stand on the issue of the legalized sale of alcoholic beverages in Baird and in Callahan County so that there may be no question in the minds of our friends on both sides of the issue.

First, let us state that the sale of alcoholic drinks IS NOT, AND NEVER HAS BEEN CONSIDERED A POLITICAL ISSUE. IT IS, and has always been A MORAL AND A SOCIAL ISSUE. We will join in any fight to preserve the right of an individual to vote. . . We shall oppose the sale of alcohol in Baird and Callahan County in any form, in any way and in any location.

We shall oppose the legalizing of IMMORALITY in any form, whether it be the sale of beer, whiskey and wine, gambling, murder or any form of it — WE WILL OPPOSE IT. We feel it is our duty to our families, and to yours, to exert all our power and influence in defeating the legalization of this form of immorality, and we ask you to join us in our fight. . . Do not sign the petition seeking to legalize the sale of all types of alcohol in Baird, is our plea. . . Join us in our stand against this evil. . . There is too much evidence that alcohol is behind the rising crime rate among both adults and juveniles and that it is responsible for the deaths of countless men, women, boys and girls for us to stand idly by without raising our voices in opposition to the legalizing of the sale of such a vile thing.

We fight it with malice toward no one, but we shall continue to fight it with every means at our command.

To those of our friends who are thinking that the legal sale of alcoholic beverages in Baird will bring a more prosperous community, we make the following proposal. First, let us challenge that statement. The sale of alcoholic beverages benefits only the ones who sell it, the one who manufacture it and the ones who distribute it wholesale. . . Precious little of the revenue remains in the community, and that is a high price to pay for the probable heartbreak and possible moral breakdown of the community.

However, to those who are sincere in their beliefs, we offer you the following challenge: let us all join hands in a worthwhile effort to improve the economic stature of Baird. We will meet with you — we will work with you in an effort to bring payrolls to our town. . . IF WE ALL EXERT OUR EFFORTS, IN UNITY, TOWARD A WORTHWHILE MORALLY ACCEPTABLE PROJECT, MUCH CAN BE ACCOMPLISHED TOWARD MAKING BAIRD GROW AND PROSPER.
