Putnam Locality Gets Two New Wildcat Tests

Two new wildcats have been staked near Putnam in northeastern Callahan County.

A planned 2,500 foot rotary wildcat was spotted 1-2 mile north of Putnam. It is Dale H. Dooley of Los Angeles, Calif., No. 1 R. R. Cunningham. Site is 1,230 feet from the north and 350 feet from the west lines of Section 2293, TE&L Survey.

Other test is two miles southwest of Putnam and slated for 2,200 feet with rotary. It is J. B. Thompson, Throckmorton No. 1 Guy Huston. Location is 2,310 feet from the south and 330 feet from the east lines of Section 309, SP Survey.

Two men were arrested near Sierra Blanca about three o'clock Tuesday afternoon and charged with armed robbery and car theft in connection with high-jacking near Baird Monday.

Deputy Sheriff Lee Brown named the pair as Myral Wilson, 21, and Richard Stachowski, 22. Brown and Texas Ranger Jim Riddle went to Sierra Blanca for the prisoners and returned them to Callahan County jail late Wednesday.

More Cow Theft Charges Filed

Two more cattle theft charges have been filed against Tommy Windham, 22, and one additional count against his brother, Hal, 18, both of whom are being held in Callahan County jail. Also arrested and held on two new charges was Edward Rice (Scooter) Lumpkin, 17, of Abilene, whose bond was set at \$2,000.

Sheriff Homer Price returned from Midland late Tuesday with still another, Carl Nix, 19, charged in the same thefts.

The recent counts were brought as a result of cattle allegedly taken from the A. L. McGinnis herd near Oplin on February 21 and February 28.

Callahan County grand jurors are to be called back into session to investigate the new charges. Recall was delayed this week due to the fact that District Judge J. R. Black was in Temple, where he was undergoing surgery. District Judge Floyd Jones, of Breckenridge, who sometimes exchanges benches with Black was also reported ill, suffering from a recent heart attack.

Robert A. Dixon, 26, six foot, Fort Worth brick contractor, was the victim. Enroute to Abilene, he picked up two hitch-hikers on the western edge of Fort Worth.

The men told Dixon they had been working on a pipe line in Oklahoma and were hitchhiking to Arizona. They had a battered suitcase tied with a piece of wire.

About 4:30 p. m., east of Cisco they pulled a '32 automatic, Dixon said. "They told me to pull up to the side of the road. I offered to get out. They said they wanted to sit and talk."

Dixon was made to get into the back seat. Taking the wire from around the suitcase, they tied his hands behind him. The broken suitcase spilled out onto the floorboards, said Dixon.

"They said they had something to do in Oklahoma. They told me they wanted to kill a woman. She rolled them or robbed them of \$1,000," Dixon stated.

The men drove toward Baird in the sandstorm. At Hickman park, they stopped and ordered Dixon out of the car. His hands were bound behind him, they made him lie on the ground under a tree. From his car, the two robbers brought Dixon's light portable spotlight. Using the 10-12 feet of cord, they tied his legs and lifted his feet about a foot off the ground by throwing the spotlight cord over a tree limb.

"They stood around me so nobody could tell what they were doing," Dixon said later. A man walked by the park. (Callahan County officers think possibly the man was Baird City Councilman Bob Neel, who had trot lines set nearby). "If that guy comes any closer I'll kill him," said the younger red-head. The stroller looked at the two bandits, apparently not seeing the gun pointed at him, then he walked away.

The men - and Dixon on his feet, shoved him into his car and drove up several country roads without finding a place to suit them. About three quarters of a mile off the highway, north of Ross Cemetery, the gunmen took Dixon out of the car, put him on the ground and tied his feet with the spotlight cord again.

"They told me they'd return my car as soon as they finished. They said they'd take good care of it, even check my low front tire," recalled Dixon. "I asked them if they'd leave the papers from my billfold in the car pocket. The older man said, 'I'll just take the money and give you back your billfold.' They were already in the car. The older man - 'Shorty' got out of the car, took out the money and put the billfold back in my pocket, then they drove off."

It took 10 minutes to get free, Dixon estimates. Another 20 minutes was spent walking back to the pavement. He was picked up by James Dyer and given a ride into town. Sheriff Homer Price, to whom Dixon immediately reported the robbery, alerted the Texas highway patrol and descriptions and pick-up orders on the two robbers were broadcast throughout the state. Officers in adjoining states were also alerted.

Wilson and Stachowski were taken into custody by sheriff's deputies of Hudspeth County and a Texas Ranger stationed at Sierra Blanca. The pair was spotted by a farmer when they camped on a ranch near Sierra Blanca. He became suspicious and notified the sheriff's office there. Brown said the farmer had not heard about the armed robbery of Dixon at the time.

Wilson and Stachowski did not resist arrest even though they were armed. Brown said a .32 caliber automatic pistol and a double barreled shotgun were taken from them.

Less than an hour later he was stopped by highway patrolmen who questioned him regarding a stolen car. It developed that he had driven away a Pontiac belonging to J. Rupert Jackson, Jr., which is almost identical in appearance to Jerry's. The two cars had been parked not far apart. Everything was straightened out in short order.

166 votes were polled at Clyde with one write-in candidate winning a council seat. He was G. E. Eager who polled 65 write-ins. W. A. Dixon was re-elected with 62 votes and S. D. Branum received 81 votes. Harold Holden, who was up for re-election, lost with a total of 60 votes. Others in the seven-man race for three aldermen posts were L. M. Green, 50 votes, W. L. (Bill) Hampton, 52; E. W. Blue, 17 and W. J. Schweikhard 28.

J. A. Little, another "write-in" candidate, received 59 votes. Interest at Baird was light with there being no opposition to J. E. (Eddie) Bullock for mayor, and Farris Bennett and Harold Miller to councilmen posts. Only 51 votes were tallied. Bullock, a member of the council for several years, succeeds J. T. Lawrence, who did not seek re-election after having served 14 consecutive years, 10 years were as an alderman and the past four as mayor.

In Cross Plains W. D. Smith defeated S. F. Bond for mayor. Smith polled 162 votes and Bond 99. Bond is completing his second consecutive term as mayor, however, he had previously served on the council and as mayor in years past. L. F. Foster polled 225 votes for re-election to his council seat, and Donald Baird won the other vacancy with 154 write-ins.

Most unusual was the situation at Putnam. When no candidates offered themselves for any of the three council posts, present members were declared re-elected by merely agreeing to serve another two years. Fred Cook, mayor, and O. W. Culwell and George Damon, councilmen, were the officials thus chosen. Hold-over members of the city council at Putnam are: F. P. Shackelford, L. A. Williams and

WASHINGTON, D. C. — A Committee of the House of Representatives . . . recently reported that the United States Government owned property around the world valued at \$208 billion. Ordinarily, we conclude that, if an individual or corporation can balance its books, it is solvent. Counting this \$208 billion in property, the Federal Government could easily balance its assets against the public debt. This of course, is only theoretical.

Even supposing the Government could theoretically liquidate its holdings, its values are somewhat in question.

The House Administration Committee, on which I have the honor to serve as Chairman, is trying its best to reduce the tremendous printing bill which the government incurs each year. The printing bill of the United States has been running near \$250 million annually. There are 18 million different government forms in use. It has been found that literally thousands have become obsolete, and some were out of date immediately after they were printed. Every time the Congress passes any new law, or the President issues an Executive Order, there follows hundreds of thousands of forms related to it.

A form for a veteran may want to know whether his wife is left-handed or right, and then it is decided the information is not sufficient and another form is

produced.

In addition to all these forms which are many times harassing to businessmen and others, there are thousands of publications stored in numerous places, which are as useless as anything could be. There are books and publications in storage rooms in the bowels of the Capitol that no one knows what they are or how long they have been there. Some of them are stacked so high that no one knows what is behind them, but yet the Government continues to publish more and add to the volume of useless material.

My Committee is trying to determine just what is absolutely useless and dispose of it, and more than that, we will attempt to reduce the production of these useless publications and materials to the minimum. The Government has the largest printing establishment in the world, and it likely will continue, but there is no need for it to spend \$250 million a year for the purpose. It reminds me of the little boy with the magic salt machine. You remember he turned it on, but did not know how to turn it off, and hence the reason for the salt water in the oceans.

Questions & Answers

Q—I am going to school under the World War II GI Bill. I know that my termination deadline is July 25, 1956. At that time, I figure I will have some unused entitlement left over. Must I lose this entitlement?

A—Yes. Even though you may have unused entitlement, the law provides that you may not train beyond the termination date of July 25, 1956.

Q—I am drawing a VA pension. I have recently received a small inheritance of several shares of stock. Must I include these shares as income, for pension purposes?

A—Your shares of stock need not be considered as income until they are converted into cash. Dividends you receive from the stocks, however, are considered as income.

Q—I applied for disability compensation from VA and my claim was disallowed. I've been told I have one year to appeal, if I wish to do so. Are there any circumstances under which that one-year limit could be limited?

A—No. The law allows veterans only one year to appeal VA decisions.

Q—I am a disabled Korea veteran, eligible for permanent plans of Korean GI insurance. Will I get dividends from this permanent insurance?

A—No. Under the law, dividends may not be paid on Korean GI insurance, regardless of whether it's term or permanent.

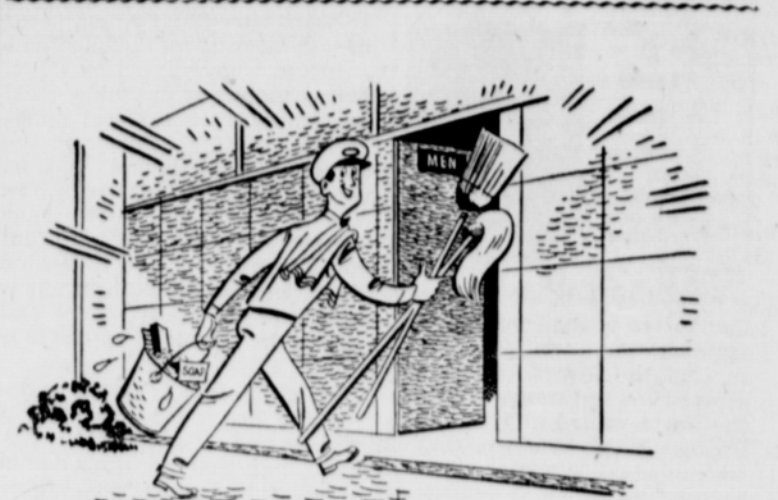
