51 Service Firms Of County Doing \$373,000 Yearly

Receipts of 51 service establishments enumerated in Callahan County in the 1954 Census less amounted to about \$373,000, according to a preliminary report covering trades, published by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. The combined yearly payroll of the county's service establishments was \$73,-000. They reported 35 employees of whom 31 worked fulltime in the pay period ending nearest November 15. Proprietors actively employed in the operation of unincorporated businesses numbered 58.

Establishments providing personal services numbered 19 and reported receipts of \$122,000. Establishments primarily engaged in automotive repairs, parking and other automotive services numbered 16 and had receipts of \$131,000. Establishments listed as "all other services" in the preliminary report numbered 16 and had receipts of \$120,000.

"Personal services" group includes such business as barber and beauty shops, cleaning and dyeing plants, laundries and laundry services, garment alteration and repair services, funeral services, photographic studios, shoe repair shops and shine parlors, as well as other personal services.

"Automotive services" group includes general automobile repair shops, battery service shops, tire repair shops, body repair and paint shops, auto rentals, storage garages, auto laundries, and other miscellaneous automo-

tive services. "All other selected services" group includes business services, miscellaneous repair services, amusement and recreation services, motion pictures, hotels, tourist courts, motels and camps.
