BELLIGERENT BAPTIST.

Rev. S.M. Stewart Quarrels With Brother Clergyman.

FINED AND PLACED IN JAIL

Has Relatives in the City Where He Is Incarcerated, but They Have Done Nothing to Secure His Release From Durance Vile, Neither Has He.

New Albany, Miss., Aug. 24.—Because he attempted to speak at a business meeting of the Baptist church here and when declared out of order became involved in a quarrel with the pastor, Rev. S. M. Stewart, an itinerant preacher who claims Memphis as his home, has been in jail here since Sunday, July 28.

Stewart was fined \$10 and sentenced to ninety days in jail, sixty of which were to be held up on good behavior on a charge of disturbing the peace. He has relatives in New Albany where he has been numerous times, but they have not come to his assistance and the prisoner refuses to make any effort in his own behalf.

Shortly before his trouble at New Albany, Rev. Stewart narrowly escaped a personal difficulty with Rev. Henry P. Hurt, of the Bellevue Boulevard Baptist church, Memphis, over remarks which Stewart says he made to Rev. E. W. Reese of the Lenox Baptist church, Memphis, regarding the New Albany church.

Following religious services at the New Albany Baptist church on Sunday, July 28, a business meeting was called to elect messengers to the Chickasaw association, of which the congregation is a member.

It is said that Rev. Stewart, sitting near the front, attempted to speak to a motion but was declared out of order by the pastor, Rev. E. L. Wesson, and ordered to sit down. When he refused to do so, a motion to adjourn was made and the meeting broke up. It is alleged that after this Stewart invited the pastor, Rev. Wesson, outside to settle the matter. One of the deacons swore out a warrant for Stewart. Rev. Stewart is an "anti-board" Baptist, being strongly opposed to conducting the affairs of the church through the medium of boards of deacons and trustees. The church at New Albany is conducted on the "board" plan. This is said to have been at the bottom of the trouble between Rev. Wesson and Stewart.

Rev. Wesson formerly was pastor of churches at Sardis and Coldwater, Miss., and was editor of the Expositor and Advocate, a Baptist journal published at Memphis.

PALMER'S GRACIOUS ACT.

Has Document Offensive to Mrs. Hayes Taken Down.

Colorado Springs, Colo., Aug. 24.—When Mrs. Jefferson Davis Hayes, daughter of the late president of the Confederacy, learned that members of the fighting Fifteenth Pennsylvania calvary attending the reunion here, had hung upon the walls of the Antlers hotel a copy of an old proclamation offering a reward of \$300,000 for the arrest of her father and other Confederate leaders for alleged complicity in the assassination of President Lincoln, she immediately raised a protest to General Palmer, host of the reunion. Before the protest was received, however, General Palmer heard of the proclamation and ordered it be taken down out of deference to Mrs. Hayes, who is the wife of J. A. Haynes, a banker of Colorado Springs.

HEAD SPLIT OPEN.

Osteopath Physician Killed by Blade of Ax.

Dallas, Aug. 26.—At Arlington Dr. de Shazo, a physician, had his head split open by a blow from an ax. Dan B. Herring came to Dallas and surrendered himself to the sheriff. It is alleged that the terrible tragedy is due to family troubles. The dead man leaves a widow and three children. The doctor had been visiting Mrs. Herring about three weeks. He was forty-five years old. He was asleep, it is alleged, when the fatal blow was struck.

The doctor, who was an osteopath practitioner, resided at Corsicana.

SUN HATCHES CHICKENS.

Weather Was So Hot Mother Hen Not a Necessity.

Holly Springs, Miss., Aug. 26.—Little Walker and Henry Dancy Roberts, sons of N. B. Roberts, having found a hen's nest full of eggs, took the eggs home in a paper bag, which they placed on the sewing machine near a sunny window. After two days, a scratching sound was heard in the bag, and, upon investigation, a little chick was discovered. The weather had been so hot that the warmth of the old mother-hen was not needed.

Headlight Explodes.

Houston, Aug. 27.—The headlight of

an inter-city and Great Northern railway engine exploded near this city Monday. Engineer Cook was thrown out of the cab, a hole cut in his head and his body badly shocked.

Girl Shoots Herself.

Wheeling, Aug. 27.—Miss Alice Berty, who came here from Baltimore to secure employment, shot herself perhaps fatally in the right breast.

Child Drinks Carbolic Acid.

Connellsville, Pa., Aug. 27.—Dorothy Joyce, thirteen months old, drank carbolic acid and soon died.

GOES UP IN BALLOON.

Major Jordan Has Experience Not Soon Forgotten.

Waco, Aug. 26.—Major H. P. Jordan of the Texas National guard had a very exciting experience while in Jamestown several days ago, and one which shook his nerves more than charging a battery would have done. He was out at Balloon park and gave the man operating a big balloon \$1 for the privilege of going up 1,000 feet, this being the limit. Two other young men were with him and when the balloon reached the limit it pulled out the staples and started on upwards, drifting towards the Blue Ridge mountains. Major Jordan with great presence of mind pulled the valve rope, allowing the gas to escape, and thus let the balloon down. He did this several times and landed safely, but the experience was a startling one.

A peculiar accident happened to a fine horse at the city corral. The animal was kicking and playing when it got its foot through the fence nearly five feet from the ground, breaking its right hind leg.

The cottonseed oil mills are now preparing for the year's business. They will be busier a much shorter time than usual, with higher priced seed. The mill products will no doubt be much higher, too.

LABOR DAY.

Governor Urges Texas People to Observe It.

Austin, Aug. 26.—Governor Campbell has issued the Labor day proclamation. The chief executive requests all the citizens of the Lone Star state to appropriately observe the occasion, which this year is Sept. 2, by refraining, as far as possible, from their usual avocations, and joining in making the occasion a happy one throughout the length and breadth of this commonwealth.

DAVIDSON IN MEXICO.

President Diaz Advises Governor That He Appreciates Visit to Him.

Austin, Aug. 26.—The governor received an autograph letter from President Diaz of the republic of Mexico advising the governor of a visit made to the president by Attorney General Davidson, who is now touring Mexico. President Diaz said that he was much gratified at the visit, which was made on Aug. 3.

A new form is being prepared upon which the heads of the various state eleemosynary institutions will be required to make their reports in the future. Heretofore, the heads of these departments reported only once a year, but beginning Sept. 1, they will be required to report once a month. These monthly reports will show the number of patients, inmates or pupils at the various institutions, the amount of salaries paid out, the amount of clothing used, feed consumed and all other information pertaining to the proper management of the particular institution.

HEALTH OFFICER PLEASED.

Gratified at the Great Interest Being Taken in Sanitation.

Austin, Aug. 26.—State Health Officer Brumby expresses himself as being much gratified at the great interest which is being taken in different cities of the state in the "cleaning up" campaign. It will be remembered that a short time ago Dr. Brumby issued a statement urgently requesting the mayors, city councils and city and county health officers to take up the crusade for better sanitary conditions, and this request is being heeded in many of the cities of the state.

Dr. Brumby received a letter from Dr. Armstrong in charge of the dengue fever situation at Brownsville in which the doctor says that the situation continues to improve, there being no new cases.

COMMISSION ENJOINED.

Dallas Saloonists Secure Restraining Order Until Wednesday.

Dallas, Aug. 26.—Saloon men of this city whose licenses have not expired, that were issued previous to the passage of the Baskin-McGregor law, and who were refused new licenses, have secured from Judge Muse of the Forty-fourth district court a temporary restraining order against the mayor and board of commissioners of this city. The case will be heard by Judge Muse Wednesday.

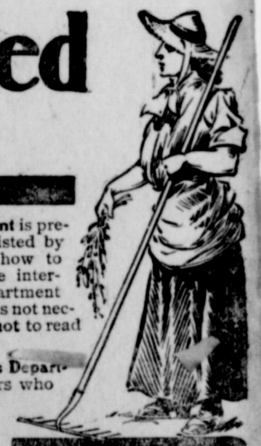

Committees appointed to draft resolu-
tions and to visit Dallas in regard
to a new depot. Now let every man

ward.

A man suspicioned of being a
telegraph messenger, but who claim-
ed he was an employe of a steam
laundry, was mobbed in the principle
streets of Dallas Tuesday. The man
was knocked down repeatedly and
severely beaten by a big burly bully
aged on by a crowd of men. Such
brutal methods will not help the
strikers and if cooler heads don't
control the strikers so as to prevent
such brutal outrages the public will
turn against them. The public as a
rule will sympathize with the
operators in all legitimate efforts to
better their condition, but such acts
as this probably perpetrated by some
brute in human form who is not an
operator, will quickly lose the sym-
pathy of the public which the strikers
so much need to win their fight.

PUBLIC HEALTH.

Dr. S. T. Fraser, County Health
officer, showed us a copy of rules
and regulations relating to the dis-
infection and sanitation of public
buildings, etc. issued by W. M.
Brumby, State Health Officer. The
rules are too lengthy for publication
in THE STAR, and we suggest that
school trustees, hotel and restaurant
keepers, butchers, church officials
send for a copy of these regulations.
The law becomes effective Sept. 1st,
and these rules are issued in con-
formity with the law. The fine for
failing or refusing to comply with
the Rules and Regulations published
by the State Health officer for the
proper sanitation and disinfection of
public buildings of any kind, includ-
ing churches and school buildings, is
not less than \$50, nor more than
\$200, for each offense. The law is
a good one, though it will entail
some expense and hardship to com-
ply with it, but it should be enforced
to the letter. Some school trustees,
we fear, will be about the first to
run afoul of this law, and as one of
you, we warn you to comply with
the law.

Every school house should be
thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned,
floors, walls, ceilings, doors, and
window frames, and disinfected be-
fore school opens. If this is not
done every school trustee is liable to
indictment. Read the law. The
law is just as strict as to church of-
ficials, hotels, meat markets, baker-
ies, etc. as to school trustees, but
being a trustee the editor warns
these officials especially, as they
have charge of the public school
buildings and are responsible for the
health of the school children.

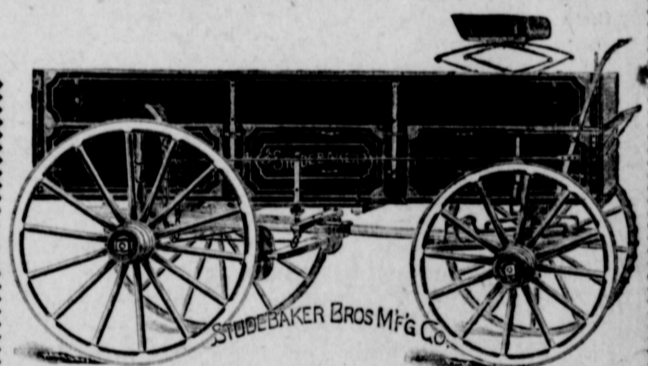
