Four Men Hurt In Oil Rig Blaze Here On Saturday

Four men were burned, two of them critically, in an oil field gas fire at 1:30 a. m. Saturday on the Phillips farm north of Munday.

Critically burned were Kenneth Ensey, 19, who suffered burns over 60 to 65 per cent of his body, and Buddy Berryman, 22, who was burned over 50 to 60 percent of his body. The two other injured men, C. W. Pettit, 21, and Herbert Victory, 38, were not considered in a serious condition. A fifth man, J. W. Payne, 20, of Archer City was uninjured, as he hid behind mud sacks when the fire ignited, and then jumped into the mud pit.

The injured men were taken to the Knox County Hospital and were later transferred to a Wichita Falls hospital for treatment. They were reported improving early this week.

At the time of the accident, the men were working on an Abb Drilling Co. rig on the Phillips farm three miles north of Munday. They had reached a level of 1,600 feet when gas blew out and ignited.

The fire was put out at about 8:30 a. m., after Halliburton Oil Well and Cementing Co. of Rule pumped mud into the hole. A Halliburton crew from Wichita Falls assisted, using dry chemicals and foam.

The Munday Fire Department fought the blaze earlier, but was not able to quench it.

Funeral For Vera Farmer Is Held On Monday

Funeral services for John W. Hollabaugh, 79, resident of the Vera community for the past 42 years, were held at 2:30 p. m. Monday from Harrison Funeral Home in Seymour.

Rev. S. A. Wolfe, pastor of the Methodist Church in Moran, officiated and was assisted by Rev. Ernest McCaughey. Burial was in Vera Cemetery.

Mr. Hollabaugh, who died Sunday morning while visiting in Seymour, was born October 9, 1878, in Waynesboro, Tenn. He came to Texas in 1897, settling in Ellis County.

He was married to Miss Isbelle McBraget in 1900, and they moved to Vera in 1916, where Mr. Hollabaugh spent the remainder of his life in farming. Survivors include his wife; one son, Fred, Arlington, Tex.; five daughters, Mrs. Tessie Actainson, Arlington; Mrs. Bessie Hobbs, Jal, N. M.; Mrs. Lillie Taylor, Maybelle, Tex.; Mrs. Juanita Irby, Wichita Falls; and Mrs. Lois Robertson Dallas; one sister, Mrs. Ermon Oliver, Dallas; eight brothers, Grady, Ed, Ollie, all of Dallas; Roy, Midlothian, Tex.; Willie, Ervin, Tex.; Alton, Waxahachie, Tex.; Robert, Arlington; and Earl, McKinney; and 24 grandchildren and 36 great-grandchildren.

Rev. John Walbe, O. S. B., pastor officiated and burial was in St. Joseph's Cemetery by McCaulley Funeral Home.

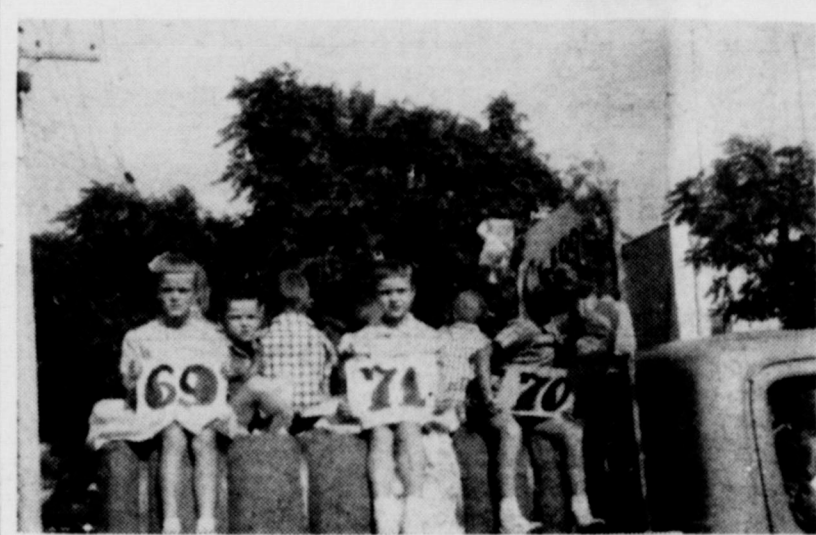
Young Fetsch died Monday night in an Albuquerque, N. M. hospital of injuries he received last Thursday in a construction accident at Albuquerque.

Enraged Negro Fires Shots Into Home, Injures Two, Resists Local Officers

A 29-year-old Negro woman and her 6-month-old daughter are recovering from shotgun wounds received Sunday afternoon when they got in the line of fire of an enraged Negro man. Mrs. Alvin (Ruby May) Adams received wounds in the hands, leg and stomach. The child was shot in the leg and thigh. Mrs. Adams was released from Knox County Hospital on Sunday night, and the child Monday morning.

Charged with assault with intent to murder in connection with the shooting is Clint Burris, 40, a farm laborer. He is being held in county jail at Benjamin under \$2,000 bond.

Burris was subdued by Police Chief J. W. Massey, A. R. Booe and John Brown, assistant chief, with assistance of two others near a downtown store, and Sheriff H. T. Melton and County Attorney Tom Bullington assisted in the investigation. Bullington said the disturbance grew out of an attempt by Burris to borrow \$1 from several men, particularly from Alvin Adams.

Adams, 33, said Burris tried to borrow a dollar from him; he refused; Burris went to his home and got a 12-gauge shotgun and came to the Adams' house.

Adams said Burris fired "seven or eight" shots, and that he (Adams) only had two shells for his .410 gauge shotgun which he also fired at Burris.

He said he and his three older daughters saw Burris coming; they ran into the house, but that the 6-month-old daughter was in the line of fire. Adams' wife was hit when she tried to pull the baby to cover.

After the firing ceased, Adams said, his family took cover in the home of his mother nearby, Mrs. Lulu Adams.

He said Burris still was "walking around the house" trying to find him when Constable Ab Booe, who had been called, approached Burris and tried to "talk him into" surrendering the shotgun. Burris refused and was finally forcibly disarmed.

Burris was treated by a physician here for minor shotgun wounds before he was taken to the county jail at Benjamin.

Moguls To Play Rochester Sat.

The Munday Moguls will officially open the 1958 football season Saturday night, when they meet the Rochester Steers on the local field, and many fans from both towns are expected to be on hand to see their teams in action.

Coaches Hill and Snyder have been giving the Moguls some hard workouts during the past two weeks in preparation for the season, and most of the boys will be in excellent condition for the game.

The Moguls will be without the services of a returning letterman, Gaylon Allred, who broke his leg during a scrimmage session with Rule last Friday night. He will have to wear a cast on the injured leg for about six weeks, it was stated.

Bond Issue Would Assure Adequate Water For Area

Development of the proposed Miller Creek Reservoir which will be made possible by approval of the \$4,800,000 bond issue next Saturday will provide an adequate water supply for Munday and four neighboring towns, directors of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority have explained.

In a fact sheet mailed to voters of Munday last week, information concerning the proposed reservoir, bond issue and water contract was given.

Member towns comprising the authority are Munday, Haskell, Goree, Seymour and Rule. In confirming membership in the Water Authority, residents of the five towns voted 1,078 to 346 in favor of creating the authority,

a majority of over 3 to 1, the board of directors pointed out.

Continuing, the directors explained:

"Our purpose is to assure an adequate water supply for the member cities. Freese & Nichols, our consulting engineers, have revised the program for the five-member Authority, with a dam on Miller Creek on the Harry Portwood Ranch east of Munday. This would create a reservoir with an initial capacity of 25,000 acre feet. Present population estimate of the Authority is 14,036. With an estimated population of 31,700 in the year 2000 A. D., engineers estimate that after a critical drought, such as we have just experienced, we would still have an adequate water

supply in the proposed reservoir.

"At this time, reservoir rights will be acquired to permit raising the dam eight feet, increasing the capacity of our Lake to 40,000 acre feet, or 60%. If the economy of the area supports a population above 31,000 (2 1/2 times our present estimated population) a 60% increase in our water capacity will carry us many years into the future.

"Revised cost estimates, allowing for land rights for increasing the lake from 25,000 acre feet to 40,000 acre feet capacity, adequate reserves and an adequate Emergency Fund, is estimated not to exceed \$4,800,000, which is the amount authorized in the Bond Election. Only the amount necessary to complete the project will be sold.

"Authorization for your City Council to execute a Water Purchase Contract is limited to 30c per 1,000 gallons—that is for water treated, filtered and delivered into your overhead storage tank.

"The amount of taxes you will pay to the Authority is about 60% of the amount you paid to your City for 1957—give or take a little—1959-1966; thereafter decreasing to no tax about 1981. However, oil field flooding will probably eliminate the tax in the immediate future.

"Our financing and engineering study shows that about 90% of the cost of the project will be paid from net operating revenues of the Authority; and that in the early 1980's the Authority will be in a position to lower the 30c per 1,000 gallons purchase price of water to the cities.

"On September 6, 1958, you will vote at the same places you voted for the Confirmation election. There will be two separate elections, 'For The Issuance of Bonds' and 'For The Water Contract'. In order to assure a permanent supply of good water, it is necessary that you vote 'For' BOTH propositions."

Who Can Vote

Eligible to vote in both elections are all qualified electors residing within the City of Munday who own taxable property in the city and who have rendered their property for taxation.

In the event any city defeats either, or both propositions—bond issue and water contract—that city will be out of the Authority and all water rights on Miller Creek will accrue to the Authority's member cities.

1959 Soil Bank Program To Be Outlined Monday

Knox County farmers interested in the 1959 Soil Bank program are reminded that Monday night, Sept. 8, is the date set for a meeting to explain the program. The meeting will be held in the district courtroom at Benjamin, beginning at 8:00 p. m. Mr. Jesse T. Gilpin, manager of the Knox County ASC office, will explain the program and answer any questions relating thereto.

If you are planning to participate in the 1959 Conservation Reserve program, September 26 is the deadline for making initial application at the county ASC office. The average payment for Knox County is 14 dollars per acre.

IT'S TRITE BECAUSE IT'S TRUE

We can't accurately measure the extent of the tax burden by dollar volume alone. We can see it most clearly when related to our earnings.

In 1929, for instance, total federal, state and local taxes came to 10.6 per cent of the gross national product — which is the sum total value of all goods and services we produce. In 1943, with a war on, it was 26.5 per cent. Last year it was 28.1 percent and the trend, undoubtedly, is still upward.

Wars, hot and cold, have played an important part in this depressing onward march of the tax collector. But wars can't be given the sole blame by a long shot. We have adopted the welfare state philosophy to a much greater extent than most of us apparently realize. Wittingly or otherwise, we expect the government to do all manner of things for us that previous generations did for themselves. The solution to just about every problem that comes along is "let the government pass a law, appropriate the money, and solve it."

The enormous cost of welfareism, bad as that is, isn't the worst factor. The most destructive effect is on the character of people. Independence is lost, freedom is lost, self-reliance and self-respect are lost.

To say that this potentially deadly disease won't be cured until the people rise up and demand a change of their government is to say something that has become trite from repetition. And the reason it is trite is because it is absolutely true.

In David Lawrence's view: "What a strange delusion has swept the world, and particularly so many misguided persons in the parliaments of the free peoples, as they enthusiastically urge 'summit' conferences! Is it that somehow, by sitting down under the glare of the bright lights and television, with cameras clicking and thousands of newsmen looking on, some sort of 'deal' can be arranged which supposedly will — as Munich falsely promised — give us 'peace in our times'? What nonsense!"

A Wall Street Journal article points out that some 90,000 people and businesses filed for bankruptcy in the fiscal year that just ended — a jump of 23 percent over the year before. Four out of five bankruptcies are filed by individuals.

REAL SECRET WEAPON

We're paying a great deal of attention lately to our atomic and outer-space race with Russia.

"I hope you and I don't make the mistake of thinking this is strictly a scientists' show, and leave it all to them.

"Because the individual citizen and his personal effort are still going to decide whether the world will be free or slave. We're the real secret weapon in the battle for world power and peace.

"Sometimes, though, I'm afraid we forget this.

"We forget it when we tax profit so excessively we discourage a man from risking his savings to found new businesses or expand existing ones.

"We forget it when we confiscate as taxes so much of what a man earns we destroy his incentive to produce and contribute more.

"We forget it when we demand and get higher wages and shorter working hours, with no thought of producing more.

"We forget it when we fail to share the profits of a business with the productive people who help us make it.

"We forget it when we take our freedom and way of life smugly for granted and fail to work to preserve both.

"Our scientists can create new weapons and new tools for our survival. But these are only the start.

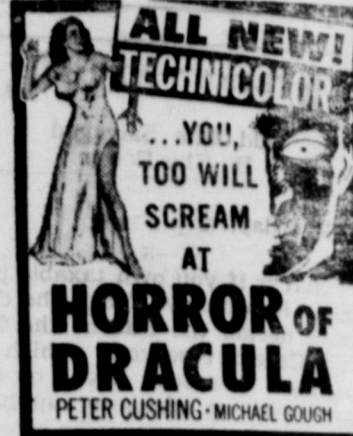

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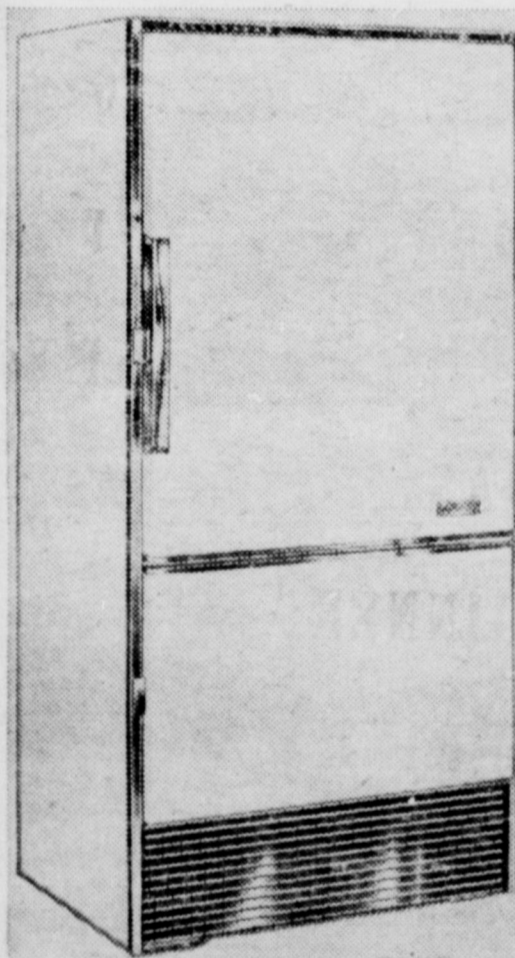

Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

By Roy England, Knox County Agent

County Agents and sheep producers from nine counties met at Benjamin August 26, where Jim Grey, Extension Sheep Specialist, presented a discussion covering all phases of sheep production.

An afternoon session, attended by approximately 30 of the group, met at the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Langford and observed demonstrations on selection, docking, castrating, and age determination in sheep.

Following the demonstrations, Mr. and Mrs. Langford served tea, coffee, and watermelon to the group.

The soil testing laboratory at Seymour reports that now is the slack season for soil testing and they are in a position to give quick service on soil samples. This is a very good time to have that wheat land or winter legume land analyzed and apply the needed fertilizer. The past year farmers throughout this area averaged 12 to 15 bushels more per acre by fertilizing at or before planting time with phosphorus where needed and top dressing with nitrogen in February.

Samples should be carried or mailed to the Soil Testing Laboratory, Seymour, Texas. The fee for testing is one dollar per sample.

Change Made In Telephone Dialing

Effective September 7, 1958, Munday customers will dial "Operator" for all long distance and service calls, according to F. A. Robinette, district manager for General Telephone Company of the Southwest. This new procedure will route all such calls through the Seymour exchange.

Robinette suggested that Munday customers note this change on Page 1 of their directories.

Coincident with the change, the number of circuits over which long distance calls may be carried between Munday and Seymour will be increased by 16% Robinette said. This increase capacity was created by the addition of a carrier system and is designed to take care of expected increase long distance usage for several years, Robinette stated.

Robinette pointed out that the recently completed microwave repeater tower near Munday is a part of a microwave network between Haskell and Seymour over which certain Munday long distance calls will be transmitted. He explained that microwave is a method of transmitting long distance calls via radio beams instead of conventional telephone wires.

The Munday exchange, which now serves approximately 815 telephones, gained over 60 telephones during 1957. Munday is one of 265 exchanges served by General Telephone Company of the Southwest in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana.

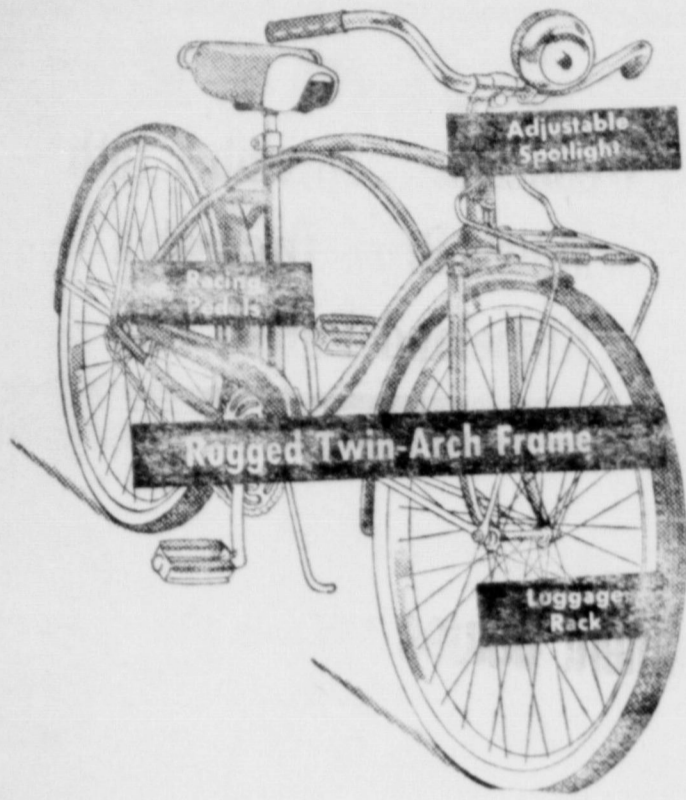

However, the use of water for oil field flooding will probably eliminate the tax entirely in the immediate future.

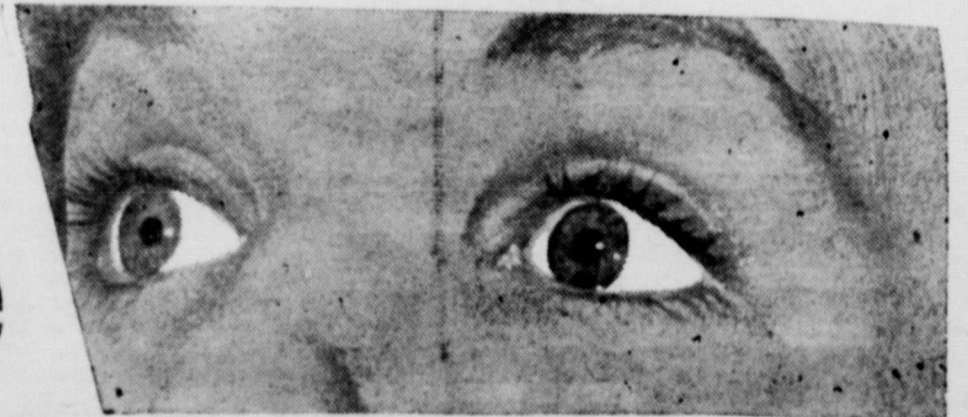

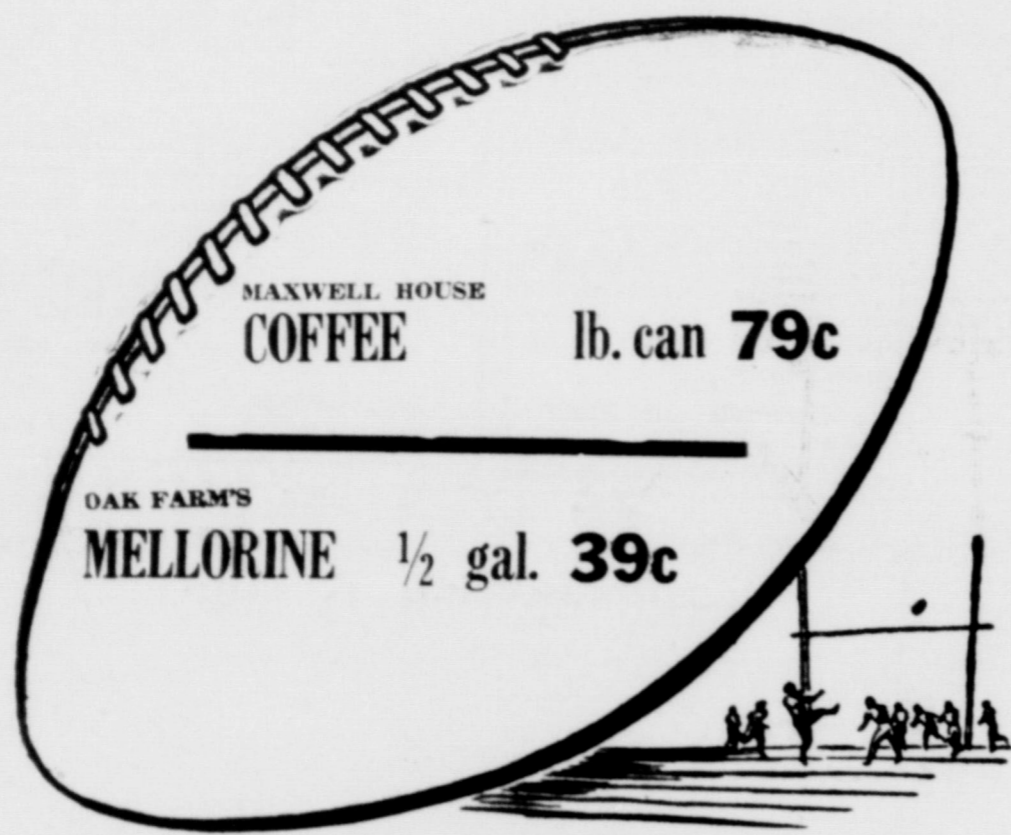
