Legislature Completes Work Adjourned Wed.

The Texas Legislature adjourned Wednesday after a session of twenty-three days in the third special session of the 42nd Legislature after having enacted into law the proposed tax relief measures submitted by Gov. R. S. Sterling in his call for a special session of the legislature.

It was estimated that an aggregate of \$7,000,000 would be saved taxpayers on their levies for the past year by passage of a law providing that the state reimburse counties and road districts amounts spent by them from bond issue proceeds in constructing roads now a part of the state system.

Another law released penalties and interest on delinquent state, county and district taxes provided they are paid by December 31, 1932. The law made it optional with municipalities where they should remit penalties.

The law to reimburse counties and road districts will bring considerable relief to the taxpayers of a Callahan county.

The closing hours of the session were devoted to many "farewell" speeches delivered by "lame duck" members who were not re-nominated in the democratic primaries and others who voluntarily are retiring from legislative work.

The third year Home Economics Girls of Baird High School are sponsoring a Clean-Up Campaign from Saturday October 8th until Saturday Oct., 16th. They are asking the cooperation of every citizen in Baird

With the help of the Baird people these girls intend to improve our town in every way possible. The first step is to clean up, every garbage can, alley, yard, street and everything near our own premises should be cleaned up and kept clean.

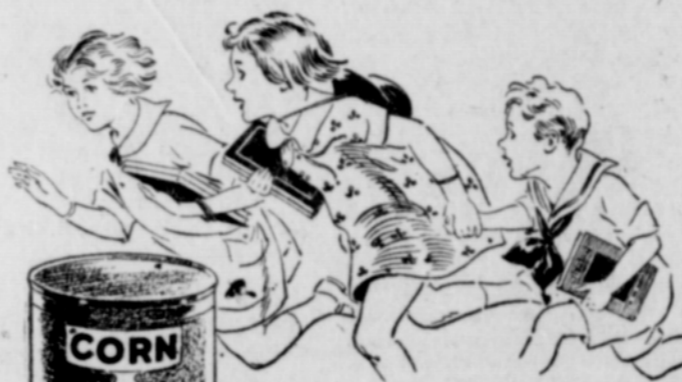
