## Schools Prepare For Storm Weather Alerts

BAIRD — Practice weather alerts and other safety precautions are now being taken at Baird Public Schools, to provide as much safety as possible for students during the spring turbulent weather.

It is requested that prior arrangements be made with school officials if someone other than the parent is to pick up the child. However, if there is a known tornado in our immediate vicinity, we request that parents not try to pick up the child until the all-clear has sounded, because of the danger of being caught in the open.

## HEARING TO DISCONTINUE DEPOT, DECISION IN LATE JUNE

BAIRD — Wallace Nations, Examiner for the Railroad Commission, and Joe Wells, Railroad Section Engineer for the Railroad Commission, conducted a hearing requested by the Texas and Pacific Railroad to determine if the Depot in Baird should be discontinued and make Baird a non-agency station and dismantle the depot building.

R. E. Watson of Dallas, served as attorney for the railroad. Testimony for the railroad was given by J. A. Austin, W. G. Hestes and J. L. Elliott, explaining how Baird would be served and to establish losses claimed

by the Railroad in the amount of approximately \$10,000.00 annually.

J. Rupert Jackson, representing the City of Baird, started opposition testimony by reviewing the history of the T&P relating to Baird and insisting that the depot remain as an active agency in the City. Other local men testifying were Charles Walker, City Councilman, Eddie Konezak and Claud Holley, also Charles Wilson, relief man for the local Agent W. R. Rodman, General Secretary-Treasurer for Transportation - Communication Division 25, of Brotherhood of Railway, Airline and Steamship Clerks, strongly urged the RRC not to make Baird a non-agency point.

J. L. Gibson, member of the United Transportation Union, Brakeman Craft, joined other local people in urging the crew turn-around in Baird to be restored, replacing the run-through, now on trial basis which expires May 15, 1970, and stating the local station would be needed for return of Baird turn-around.

Informal discussions were held regarding retention of the building should permission be granted to dismantle. Mr. Watson did state in the hearing it "would be superior" to rent the building or sell it, rather than tearing it down.

Following the hearing, Mr. Nations explained it will likely be late June before any decision is made on the matter. He will not receive the transcript before late May or early June. After receiving the transcript, Mr. Nations and Mr. Wells will make a full report, which will include their recommendations concerning the request. Copies of the report will be sent the persons actively involved and they have 30 days in which to agree or disagree with the report. The report and recommendations then will be sent to members of the Texas Railroad Commission, who usually take about two weeks to study before acting.

# MUSGROVE USES TRADEMARK IN RE-ELECTION CAMPAIGN

The first appearance this week of the bright green car antenna balls that have become the Burke Musgrove campaign trademark will formally launch Musgrove's re-election campaign in some twenty towns in the 53rd Legislative District, according to a statement from the Musgrove Campaign Committee.

Representative Musgrove, who was re-elected to a second two-year term by the largest vote margin in the history of this legislative district with some eighty percent of the total vote cast, said, "I plan to run another high-level, clean, positive campaign. This campaign policy has proved successful in the past because a positive campaign is appreciated and respected by the voters."

A frequent legislative critic of wasteful state spending and increasing state taxes, Musgrove stated, "I am strongly opposed to the proposed new

state income tax and I will actively oppose the State's venturing into this new area of taxation."

Musgrove said there are fallacies in the year-after-year demands for increasing state taxes. "Our tax structure has a built-in growth factor; for example, as the population grows there are more people paying sales taxes and, likewise, there is increased revenue generated each year from the existing tax structure without the addition of any new taxes."

"Some \$700 million in new revenue was available to be added to the budget for the present fiscal period without any new taxes because of the state's economic growth. But even before an appropriation bill was finally passed during the recent special session to determine what the new revenue would be used for, a \$348 million tax bill was passed and added to the \$700 million al-

ready available in new revenue. This increase of over a billion dollars represented nearly a 25 percent increase in state spending over the prior fiscal period," Musgrove explained. "Several wasteful state spending projects, if corrected, and economy-in-government moves alone would and can generate enough money to take care of legitimate shortages in such areas as welfare."

The campaign committee pointed out that Burke Musgrove was the author of Texas' new drug laws that outlawed LSD and other dangerous drugs. "Our State Representative successfully pushed for expansion and modernization of the narcotic division of the Texas Department of Public Safety, as well as a co-ordinated educational effort on drug abuse by all state departments dealing in one way or another with the drug abuse problem."

"A member of the powerful Redistricting Committee, Musgrove will play a vital role in efforts to preserve our basically rural Legislative and Congressional Districts to prevent their being swallowed up by the big cities when the Committee is required to redraw all districts after this year's federal census (taken each 10 years)" the statement continued.

"Our State Representative also serves on the Education Committee, the important Highways and Roads Committee, the School Districts Committee and the Transportation Committee. The Speaker of the House recently appointed Musgrove to a special Parks and Wildlife

Committee which is to submit to the next session of the legislature a plan whereby Texas can realize its full park, recreational and wildlife management potential."

The Campaign Committee concluded its announcement by

emphasizing the importance of keeping Burke's experience (experience where it counts) and his seniority (he will rank in the top one-third in legislative seniority and experience) working for our district, and does respectfully ask for your vote. "Burke knows his job and does it well, in the best interest of all the people of this district and this state."

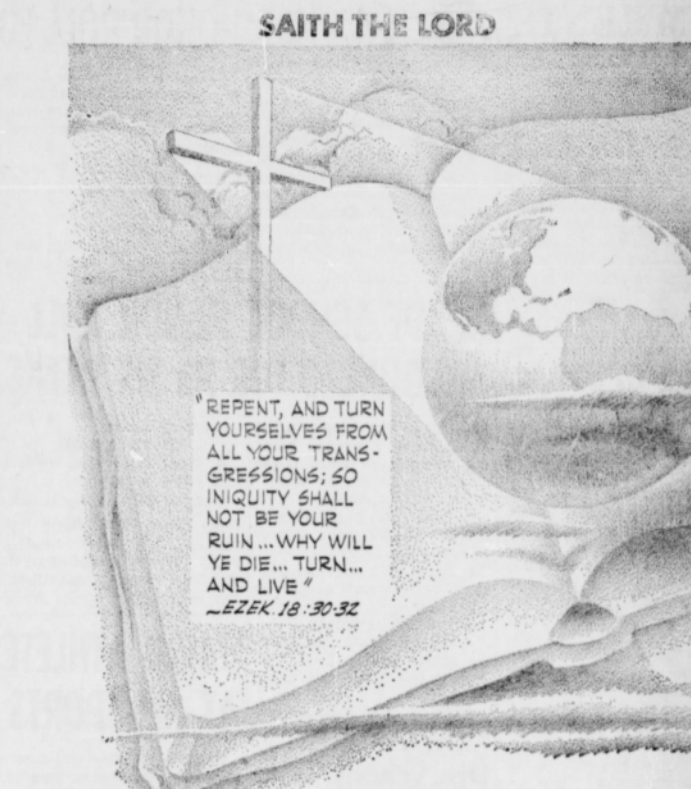

## JUDGE AUSTIN McCLOUD MAKES FORMAL ANNOUNCEMENT

BAIRD — Judge Austin McCloud, of Colorado City, was here April 16, campaigning for election as Chief Justice of the Eastland Court of Civil Appeals. McCloud, accompanied by his wife, Mary Anne, spent a good part of the day visiting with local friends and supporters. Mrs. McCloud, a Colorado City school teacher, has taken a months leave of absence and is campaigning with the Judge.

In an interview, McCloud said that he has visited every county in the District and that he is grateful for the support and interest he has found for his candidacy.

The veteran District Judge added that he has felt particularly honored by the overwhelming support he has received from the lawyers in the 23 county District. In a judicial poll conducted by State Bar of Texas, lawyers in the District voted more than 4 to 1 for Judge McCloud over his opponent. The vote was 225 for McCloud and 48 for his opponent. This preference was emphasized by the vote of lawyers in the home counties of the two candidates. Judge McCloud was favored

more than 2 to 1, in his opponent's home county of Taylor, while in his own home county of Mitchell, it was unanimous for Judge McCloud. Moreover, McCloud has been unanimously endorsed by lawyers of the 32nd Judicial District of Nolan, Fisher and Mitchell counties, where he now serves as District Judge.

"I consider this vote a high honor; and I hope that it indicates confidence on the part of the lawyers of the district, in my ability to provide the judicial leadership necessary for the position of Chief Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals," McCloud said.

His knowledge of this area comes first from his West Texas background, his private practice of law in Colorado City and his six years as 32nd District Court Judge.

Judge McCloud is chairman of the important Law Enforcement Coordinating Board of West Central Texas Council of Governments which is training law enforcement personnel in West and Central Texas with an academy in Abilene and ex-

tensions in Breckenridge and Brownwood. Judge McCloud has served as president of West Texas Girl Scout Council and as an area chairman for the West Texas Rehabilitation Center. He has been president of Mitchell County Heart Association and is currently county chairman for the Salvation Army.

In his years as District Judge, McCloud has the unusual distinction of never having a case reversed by an appellate court. His legal writing have been published on invitation in State and national lawyers and judges journals, and he has been recognized by his fellow judges who elected him to serve on the important Executive Committee of the Judicial Section of the State Bar of Texas. He has been recognized nationally as a judge by being invited to attend the National College of State Trial Judges.

McCloud graduated from Texas Tech and received his law degree from Baylor University. He served in the United States Air Force during the Korean conflict.

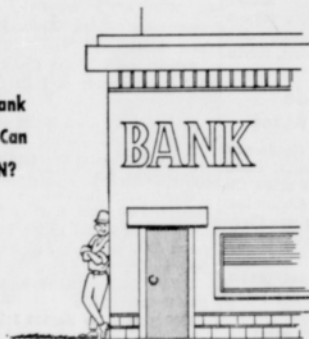

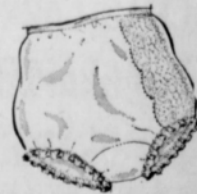

## AFRICAN NATION VISITED BY LOCAL CITIZEN

BAIRD — In January and February the local congregation of the church of Christ, assisted by the congregation in Clyde, sent the local preacher, Joe Wilson, for a one month preaching tour in the nation of Ghana, West Africa. The following is some of the highlights of his trip, along with some observations and impressions about the nation and the people.

Ghana is about the size of our state of Oregon with a population of nearly ten million people. The people are mostly of Negroid stock with a sprinkling of Arabs and Caucasians (mostly British). They are a very friendly and courteous people receptive to the teaching of the Bible. The vast majority live in poverty by American standards, but they are a happy, genteel people.

The economy of the nation is shaky following a hard-fought comeback over the overthrow of Nkrumah in 1965. However, some government social programs are being expedited, and industry is making slow, but steady advances. Imported products (which includes practically all manufactured products) are exorbitantly high. Locally produced goods are extremely reasonable.

Though the people have very little cash and only about half the work force is employed, the people do not go hungry. Locally produced foods are very cheap and many of the foods grow wild. Bananas, pawpaws, plantain, casava root, yams, coconuts, palm nuts, and other edible roots can be gathered in the countryside. These food result in widespread malnutrition because of a lack of proteins, but the people do not go hungry.

As in many under-developed countries the women of Ghana do most of the day-to-day work. They usually gather and prepare the food, take care of household chores and care for

the children. Many of the men who do not have employment and spend their days in visiting around the village, or occasionally exploring and hunting in the jungle.

The southern half of Ghana is largely jungle country, interspersed with small villages built in clearings in the jungle. The jungle presses closely upon the villages. The northern part of Ghana is rolling plains country somewhat like the grassy plains of our own United States. There are not many wild animals in Ghana. What few there are now are on reserves, mostly in the north. There are, though many brilliantly colored beautiful birds.

The typical Ghanaian home is lacking of many of the things we regard as necessities. They have few beds. Children usually sleep on mats on the floor. The houses are built mostly of mud blocks, have tin roofs and no running water or inside toilet facilities. They are built on the compound scheme (something like our haciendas of the southwest, with a patio in the center of the building). Often the compound is inhabited by a family, or a man with a number of wives who dwell in the various rooms of the compound.

Few villages have piped water. The women carry water on their heads from small, dirty streams and deposit it in 50 gallon barrels near the door of the house. It is very unsanitary, but the best they have. Some villages are now getting piped water, and the villagers get their water from a public fountain. Many of the natives take their baths in these public streams or at the public fountains in the villages.

weekends. Daylight missions are flown at an altitude of 500 feet above the terrain while night low level activities are conducted at least 1,000 feet above any obstacle, man made or geographic, within three miles of the prescribed track of the aircraft. Airspeeds will vary from 115 to 290 miles per hour.

All flights are made along specific routes which are approved by the Tactical Air Command, only after coordination with the Federal Aviation Administration and local airport managers. Minimum disturbance of farms, ranches and communities is the primary consideration in selecting low level routes. Towns, local airports, resorts, hatcheries, and stock pens are avoided when planning the routes and will not be overflown by C-130 or C-7A aircraft under any normal circumstances. 516th officials would like to emphasize that, even though training must be conducted at low altitudes and high air speeds in order to be realistic, all possible precautions are taken to prevent disruption of local agriculture and community activities.
