The first appearance this week of the bright green car antenna balls that have become the Burke Musgrove campaign trademark will formally launch Mosgrove's re-election campaign in some twenty towns in the 53rd Legislative District, according to a statement from the Musgrove Campaign Committee.

Representative Musgrove, who was re-elected to a second two-year term by the largest vote margin in the history of this legislative district with some eighty percent of the total vote cast, said, "I plan to run another high-level, clean, positive campaign. This campaign policy has proved successful in the past because a positive campaign is appreciated and respected by the voters."

A frequent legislative critic of wasteful state spending and increasing state taxes, Musgrove stated, "I am strongly opposed to the proposed new state income tax and I will actively oppose the State's venturing into this new area of taxation."






