TOUR TO BE MADE OF PLANT MATERIALS CENTER

BAIRD — Plans are complete for field tour on Baird Independent School District plant materials center between Baird and Clyde on FM 18 (Missile Site) according to Dick Vestal, Vocational Agriculture instructor.

The tour of the center will be held October 1 at 1:00 p.m. The field tour is being held for farmers and ranchers to observe grass plantings, Jon Tate Superintendent of Baird Schools said.

Those to attend tour will see first hand grasses such as Bells Rhodes, Sideoats grama, Sand love, Weeping love, Alkali Sacaton, Klein, Causasian, Kieberg, Old World, King Ranch, Woodward Sand, Little bluestems, Switch, Indian, Eastern gama, Wintergreen harding, Western

wheat, Perla, 'Jose' Tall wheat, Tall fescue, Elymus sabulosus, and Texas winter.

The center was developed in spring of 1970 by Baird ISD, Soil Conservation Service, and Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District to be used for educational purposes.

J. H. Martin, Chairman of Central Colorado SWCD said an election would be held after field tour for district director of Zone 2. Leo Chrane of Dudley is the present director for Zone 2 which is made up of the Callahan County portion of the district. Chrane, who is eligible for reelection, is a Great Plains Conservation Program producer and has two flood control dams on his ranch, according to Martin.

BAIRD BEARS SCALP INDIANS 20-6 IN THRILLER FRIDAY NIGHT

BAIRD — The Baird Bears won their second game of the season Friday night. They defeated the Jim Ned Indians 20-6 at the Bears Den. This was the first victory on the home field in 6 years.

The Bears started quickly on their first possession of the night, they scored in two plays. Quarterback Gary Goble hit tight end Ricky Vestal for a 40 yard gain. On the second play of the game full back Cecil Faircloth slashed over right tackle for 41 yards and a touchdown. Jay Reeves kicked the extra point and the Bears led 7-0. Jim Ned came thundering back and found holes in the Bear defense and the score at half time was 7-6 in favor of Baird.

In the second half the Bears began to click once again and Cecil Faircloth ran for long

yardage on several occasions, plus scoring two more touchdowns. Faircloth gained 232 yards for his nights efforts on 15 carries. Tight end Ricky Vestal caught 4 passes for 109 yards, and the Bears wound up with 365 total offense to 230 for Jim Ned.

On defense, Johnny Robinson and Jim Snyder turned in some key plays along with line backer, Ricky Vestal.

The victory was a happy occasion for the homefolks and became even happier for the players and coaches when it was learned that the injury to defensive end Jim Hatchett was not serious.

SPECIAL HOSPITAL FUND STARTED TO MEET DEFICIENCIES

BAIRD — The following letter was received this week from the Texas State Department of Health in Austin, and was addressed to Doris Harris, Administrator of Callahan County Hospital.

Since so many people have shown concern for the situation at the hospital, we would like to share some of the letter with you.

The Certification and Consultation Division has reviewed the survey conducted of Callahan County Hospital on August

3, 4, and 5, 1970, and a consultation report of our hospital consultant after his visit on August 21, 1970.

We believe we may be able to justify recertification based on this survey, but since our guidelines are becoming more strenuous, we are concerned that under present conditions we may not be able to justify recertification six to twelve months from now, when your resurvey will be due.

This situation is a result of deficiencies found in Condition III (the facility does not provide 24 hour R. N. coverage) and Condition V (Patient room doors are hollow core and do not have a one hour fire rating). The purpose of this letter is to emphasize the urgent importance of immediate improvement and correction of the deficiencies. An effort is being made to acquire additional Registered Nurses to correct that deficiency. The hospital feels that we are fortunate to have only the two deficiencies. Other efforts are being made to secure another doctor, which would be very beneficial to the financial condition of the hospital.

PLANS COMPLETE FOR FIELD DAY AT KNOX CITY

BAIRD — Plans are complete for the field day to be held at the Soil Conservation Service plant materials center at Knox City Wednesday, September 30, according to A. H. Ringhoffer, SCS Range Conservationist, at Baird.

Ringhoffer, said guided tours are planned through the 60-acre center starting at 9:00 a.m. Bus trips will run continually until about 3:00 p.m. He stated there would be a group from Callahan County leaving from the Court House at 8:30 a.m.

To get to the center, Ringhoffer said you go north of Knox City on Highway 283 about 2 miles, then turn left on FM 1292 for 2 1/2 miles. There are signs at both the turn-off and the center, He said.

Grass seed dealers, seed growers, conservation district directors, research workers, wildlife enthusiasts, livestock producers and others interested in the search for better plants are invited to attend. The center serves both Texas and Oklahoma and a large crowd from both states is expected.

Grasses which are attracting wide interest at the center include a desert strain of sideoats grama; a southern strain of sand lovegrass; a western wheatgrass

selected for bottomlands and waterways plantings in west central Texas; a grass called old world bluestem collected from an arid region west of the Mediterranean Sea; and a blue grama selection adapted to the red soils of western Oklahoma and Texas.

A new grass variety, Selection 75 Kleingrass, was certified and released last year as a result of work done at the center in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Other grass strains proven and put into use by SCS include El Reno, Uvalde, and Vaughn Sideoats grama; King Ranch bluestem; green sprangletop; and Grenville switchgrass.

Ringhoffer said SCS plant materials work developed ways to harvest and plant most of the range grasses being planted in Texas and Oklahoma today. Some of the groups who cooperate with SCS in its plant materials work in Texas include Agricultural Research Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas A&M University, Texas Tech University, Prairie View A&M College, Abilene Christian College, U. S. Air Force, U. S. Corps of Engineers, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, an soil and water conservation districts.

BULLDOGS CLOBBER HAMLIN PIED PIPERS 30-14 FRIDAY

CLYDE — Clyde Bulldogs defeated Hamlin 30-14 in Hamlin last Friday night. Endgate Hawk blocked punts in the second and fourth quarters to aid the Bulldog cause. Clyde drove 65 yards in their first series as Gary Barr ran right end for 10 yards and the first touchdown. Barr added 2 more with the same play again.

In the second quarter John Hoffman went off right tackle for the second score. Hamlin had an 88 yard punt return in the third period, then the Bulldogs drove 70 yards for their touchdown. Barr hit left guard for 15 and the touchdown. He repeated the play for 2 points.

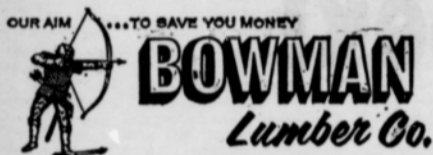
