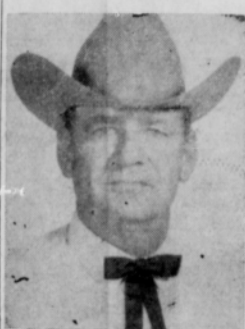

BAIRD — It's election year, and the hats begin to fall into the ring as candidates file and announce for positions in the county. Baird Youngsters Enter 55 Animals At Fort Worth Fat Stock Show

FORT WORTH — The Baird FFA Chapter will have 14 Brahman steers and five Dorset lambs; Clyde FFA Chapter will have 11 steers, one heifer, three carcass steers and nine barrows, and the Callahan County 4-H Club will have five Charolais steers and seven Hereford steers competing in the 76th annual Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show scheduled Jan. 28 through Feb. 6, in Ft. Worth.

Poultry, rabbit and pigeon exhibitors have until Jan. 17 to submit entries, but the entry deadline for cattle, horses,

sheep and swine has passed. Stock Show President-Manager W. R. Watt and other show officials now are busily tabulating the large number of entries.

"Based on entry cards I have seen thus far, our 1972 Stock Show will be one of the best yet," Watt said. "There are high-caliber entries in every category."

Last year, livestock entries totaled 11,240. Premiums plus entry fees this year will reach over \$250,000.

The Stock Show premises to be an added treat for visitors. Watt noted. "We are pleased to have July Lynn back again this year. Her show during the 1971 Rodeo was so well received that we had many requests to bring her back. She will permit an all-new show for rodeo fans in 1972."

July Lynn is a regular at such famous Nevada showplaces as the Flamingo Hotel in Las Vegas and Harrah's Clubs in Reno and Lake Tahoe. Other rodeo attractions include the Shultz Comedy Revue, the darling Wild Horse Race and the Ranch Girls Invitational Barrel Race.

Federal Land Bank of Houston Announces Drop of Interest Rates

Leslie Bryant, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Coleman, announced today that the Federal Land Bank of Houston will reduce the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 7%.

"This reduction will be effective January 1, 1972 on all variable rate loans and affects more than 177 million dollars in volume to more than 5,000 farmers and ranchers," Bryant stated.

The variable rate loan plan which was introduced by the Houston Bank in July, 1969, lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. This is the third time in the past year that the billing rate has been reduced. "Continued improvement in the money market has made this reduction possible and is in line with the Bank's policy of providing farmers and ranchers of Texas credit at the lowest possible cost consistent with sound business practices," Bryant further stated.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term real estate loans throughout Texas. The Bank has over 573 million dollars in volume of loans out-

standing. The local association makes and services loans in Coleman and Callahan Counties. Johnnie I. Henderson of Burkett, President; R. O. Nicholas of Baird, Vice President; and W. R. Hickman Jr., Ralph M. Edens and Hadden Payne round out the five man board.

AUSTIN — A three-judge federal court in San Antonio stunned Texas public officials with a Christmas Eve decision that the state's system of financing public schools is unconstitutional.

The ruling, which Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes called one of the most far-reaching in recent history, triggered a round of new studies and re-directed attention to prior studies of alternative finance formulas.

To make education "a function of the local property tax base" violates constitutional guarantees of equal protection under the laws, the three judges held. Parents and children of Edgewood Independent School District (Bexar County) filed the suit on July 30, 1968.

Allowing each district to set property taxes to raise a portion of instructional costs discriminates against poor districts with low property values and frequently high minority group populations, the court contended.

Judges gave state legislators two years to work out a new system. If lawmakers fail, they warned, the court "will take further steps as may be necessary to implement both the purpose and the spirit of this order."

Some observers feared the ruling would undermine local control of school districts. Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin asked the court to clarify whether the decision meant districts could not continue to pay off their bonds from property taxes.

Gov. Preston Smith said it would be premature to speculate on ultimate effect of the ruling on taxes and educational programs. Some predicted state corporate and personal income taxes would be necessary to pick up a new state cost load estimated to range at least as high as \$500 million a biennium.

Smith called for a team effort by state officials and agencies, local school authorities and the courts to reach a satisfactory solution. The Senate Committee on Occupational Education immediately took up the problem. Texas Research League already is studying the foundation school program, and plans to offer some choices by the end of next year.

Governor said he is considering naming an education task force which will cooperate with other study groups.

State Education Commissioner Dr. J. W. Edgar viewed the present "as another opportunity for the people to design a better educational opportunity for

the children and youth of Texas." He expressed confidence such a plan can be developed which will preserve local school control.

State Board of Education will review the decision at a January 8 meeting. Meanwhile, Martin asked the court whether the ruling permits an appeal.

WELFARE PROBLEMS GROWING — Warning that Texas faces its most difficult welfare problems during the next two years, Governor Smith said drastic assistance cuts may be necessary after next September.

At the same time, the Governor announced appointment of former U. S. Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Wilbur Cohen as a special advisor to help him formulate plans in the area of welfare and child development.

Smith said he will go before the U. S. Senate finance committee next month to renew a plea for complete federalization of welfare program financing.

Current assistance levels can be maintained within the state's \$30 million constitutional ceiling for major categorical welfare programs the rest of this fiscal year. After next September, however, he said average aid to families with dependent children grants may have to be slashed from \$116.66 a month to \$77.

Smith assigned top priority to attacking the growing welfare problem, which he estimated will cost \$325 million next year. He said findings of a new commission on children and youth will be among cornerstones of his message to the 1972 special legislative session.

REDISTRICT SUIT ADVANCES — A three-judge federal court was due to begin trial Monday (Jan. 3) of suits attacking 1971 legislative redistricting.

The consolidated cases were filed in Dallas, Houston, Tyler and San Antonio and transferred to Austin for hearing.

Judges originally named University of Texas law partner George Schatzki a special master to collect evidence and draw conclusions in the cases. However, the order naming Schatzki was rescinded after Attorney General Martin and State Democratic Chairman Roy Orr complained of the professor's former close professional relationship with attorneys and plaintiffs in the cases.

Houston attorney Leon Jaworski will direct the state's defense as a special attorney.

OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

A new form of worm fishing has taken over with those who use the rod and reel to cast little chunks of plastic of wood alongside weed beds in hopes of getting a big old bass.

But there is still the age-old method of catching fish with anglerworms. It's been fish food since the beginning of time and very likely will be as long as fish live and worms grow.

Digging for worms today is slightly different than when many of us were growing up. At that time all we needed was a spading work to turn over mellow dirt in the garden, flower bed or back of the horse trough.

Most fishing worms are raised today in a production process. There isn't much work involved, and it's quite an economic saving to raise your own if you care to fool with them. And if you start raising worms you'll soon find that you may have quite a few fishing friends

DDT BAN ANNOUNCED — DDT will not be allowed for household use in Texas after August 31, under an order issued by Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

White's order follows recommendations of the Pesticide Advisory Committee created by the legislature.

White emphasized it has no bearing on DDT for agriculture and public health uses. About half DDT now used in the state is utilized around the home. After August, registration of DDT for household purposes will not be permitted.

UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS EXTENDED — Extended unemployment compensation benefits will go into effect early in January.

January 10 is the first date claims may be filed for them in Texas. Benefits are payable only to claimants who have exhausted regular benefits. Claimants may receive as much as 50 per cent of total regular unemployment benefits, payable at the same weekly rate as regular benefits. Those covered must not be eligible for regular benefits in any state or territory and must have a benefit year that ends on or after January 2nd.

SHORT SNORTS

who just drop over in hopes of getting a handfull.

Your first need is a bedding box. You can build it as large or as small as you think you need. It should be at least two feet square, larger if possible, and can be made of plywood. Runners, in the form of small wooden strips should be tacked across the bottom of the box. This is to permit ventilation. Each box should also have a number of small holes in the bottom. You can use the same system on these as on flower pots, if you prefer, and make one large hole. In any case, drop a small stone into the hole. This will permit drainage without losing any of the bedding.

Bedding, which takes the place of soil, can be bought at most of the sporting goods stores or mail order houses. It is comparatively inexpensive. However, if you prefer to make your own soil, use equal parts of peat, loam dirt and manure. Clay and sand will get too hard and the worms won't be able to feed.

This box should be placed in a shady place and always kept moist. You can tell when the box needs more moisture by whether the forms are in the bottom or toward the top. If the bedding is only about eight inches deep, it will work better.

Feeding the worms is no big problem. A mixture made of yellow corn meal and coffee grounds, with a little vegetable oil added is ideal. Just sprinkle it on top of the bedding. When it disappears add some more.

Size to which the worms will grow depends upon the stock. If you take big worms from your own garden, then chances are you'll produce some big worms from the bedding box. But if you buy the small red wigglers, don't expect them to get too big.

An ideal way to take these worms fishing is to use a can or container with both ends open. A coffee can or baking powder can with a plastic top is ideal. Cut the bottom out

and use the same type plastic lid there, that came on the top. Of you can use a small shortening can, again utilizing a plastic lid both top and bottom.

In this manner, when you want a worm from the can you just turn it bottom end up and there they are. They always work toward the bottom in these cans.

Raising worms can be interesting and profitable, too. They'll produce fish where nothing else will.

Tire Safety Council Reviews Cold Weather Safety Reminders

WASHINGTON — Kids may get a big "bang" from skidding their feet across the winter ice but for motorists the bang from a skid can be much more serious and unpleasant.

Since it's skid season in many parts of the country the Tire Industry Safety Council suggests its a good time to review prevention and cure techniques.

To prevent skids:

Keep tires properly inflated. To prevent swerving while braking, tire pressures on the same axle must be equal.

Drive more slowly on slippery roads and approach intersections with particular caution.

Never jam on brakes; pump them to avoid locking wheels, which can cause a skid.

If a skid starts:

Take your foot off the gas.

Keep off the brakes; braking only makes the skid worse.

Steer into the skid by turning wheels in the direction in which your rear wheels are sliding.

When the car comes out of the skid, straighten your wheels and pump brakes gently to slow down.

"Snow and studded tires are obviously a good safety measure to minimize the chance of skidding," says Ross R. Ormsby, Chairman of the Tire Industry Safety Council.

"But," he adds, "special tires still can't take the place of a careful driver prepared to cope with the tricky stop and go conditions of cold weather."

To aid proper inflation, a prime factor in preventing skids, tire pressure should be monitored more closely as weather gets colder. For every 10 degree drop in temperature, tire pressure drops approximately one pound.

The Council recommends special caution in planning braking where winter has really taken hold; experience has shown that stopping in glare ice or packed snow can take up to ten times the normal distance on a dry road.

The Council also suggests checking tires for safe tread depth if you live in a temperate climate where snow is intermittent, and haven't switched to snow tires.

When a tire is down to 1-16 inch of tread groove depth is it unsafe, the Council says. This measurement has been adopted as a legal minimum standard in 27 states.
