## Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

**Knox County Vegetables**  
Onion harvest in Knox County is now getting started and it is expected that clipping operations will be completed enough before the end of the week to start the gathering and packing end of the business.

**Potato harvest** is expected to start about June first and continue on for several weeks.

Dr. Clyde Singletary, Extension Vegetable specialist, plans to be in the county June 21 and 22 to help in the harvest of the potato variety test that is being conducted on the James Smith Farm and the potato fertilizer test that is being conducted on the Lonnie Offutt farm.

Last year, the variety test was conducted on the Gene Thompson farm, and had over 150 varieties of potatoes in the test. Outstanding varieties were sent back again this year, and tested again with the addition of several new varieties. The varieties tested last year that were sent back to the Munday area for the test are being tested on a larger scale this year. There are 54 varieties in the test this year.

In the fertilizer test, that was conducted on the B. E. Smith farm last year, there were 11 rates of nitrogen-potash fertilizer applications tested. The test last year showed that no potash is needed in the Munday soils and that the maximum efficiency of the nitrogen was not reached. This year, the fertilizer test is using 11 rates of nitrogen-phosphorus varying from a 0-0-0 to a 200-200-0 pounds of material per acre. The potatoes are tested for yield and specific gravity in both tests.

## Fishermen Pay Fines For Lack of Licenses

Too many fishermen still try to get by without buying a \$2.15 fishing license. As a result, they wind up in court with fines and costs. During April, 138 of the 232 arrests by game wardens for failure to have a fishing license.

There were also numerous hunting violations, including shooting of game out of season. One man was arrested for dynamiting fish. Four were picked up for using a motor boat while intoxicated.

Capt. Sprott also called attention to the requirement of having a life preserver for each occupant of a boat while on the water. This safety factor frequently is overlooked.

In all, the 232 persons paid fines and costs amounting to \$6,388.40 during the month.

## Chips From The Carpenter's Workbench

The church is a divine organization, having Christ as its builder (Matt. 16:18) and head (Eph. 1:22-23). However, a physical organization is necessary for the Lord's church to function. The New Testament church has officers known variously as elders, bishops, overseers, pastors which are charged with the responsibility of overseeing the work of the church in each community (Acts 20:28). Serving under this plurality of overseers are deacons, or servants (Philippians 1:1). Evangelists, or preachers of the gospel, serve under the elders of the local congregation (Eph. 4:11).

Congregations of the church of Christ are bound together only by a common love and faith. There is no scriptural organization higher than the local church and its officers. No individual, organization, or congregation can exercise any authority over other congrega-

tions. Each local church is completely independent, or autonomous in nature. Local congregations are at liberty to cooperate with other congregations of like faith, but no central organization exists to dictate in any way as to the manner in which the work is to be carried out. Churches of Christ have no headquarters representing the 16,000 local congregations now existing here in the United States.

Yet, in spite of the lack of a central organization, there is an amazing unity among churches of Christ. Such is possible because of the aim of churches of Christ everywhere: No book but the Bible. No creed but the Christ. No name but the divine. No plea but the gospel. No aim but to save. In Christ . . . unity. In opinions . . . liberty. In all things . . . charity. Would you join with us in achieving this purpose?

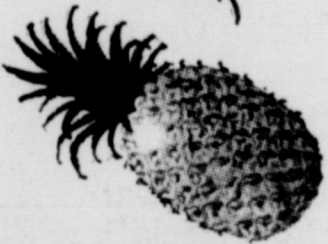

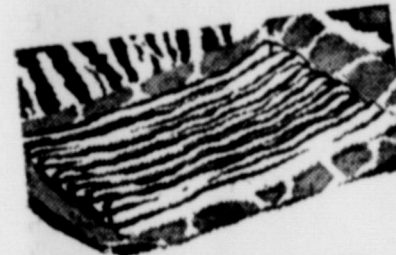

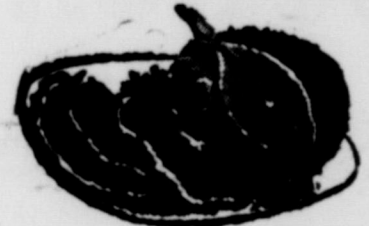

**Dollars And Sense**

Some stimulation sales encourage people to buy during slack seasons.

Shop at the beginning of the sale for the best selection of merchandise.

Have a definite item in mind to avoid aimless bargain hunting. If you don't know what you want, you may not need it. Unnecessary or unsuitable purchases usually represent money wasted.

Examine any purchase carefully in order to know exactly just what you are getting. Whether it is perfect or damaged, you buy the article just as you see it. Sale items are usually not returnable.

Add any costs of cleaning or repairs to the selling price of soiled or damaged merchandise before deciding whether or not the items are good buys.

Inspect seconds or irregulars carefully. Both may be good buys providing flaws or irregulars don't affect the serviceability of the merchandise. Irregulars may have small flaws that keep the item from being perfect but do not hinder the wearing quality. Seconds may have more noticeable and serious flaws or mends but are still usable at a big savings in price.

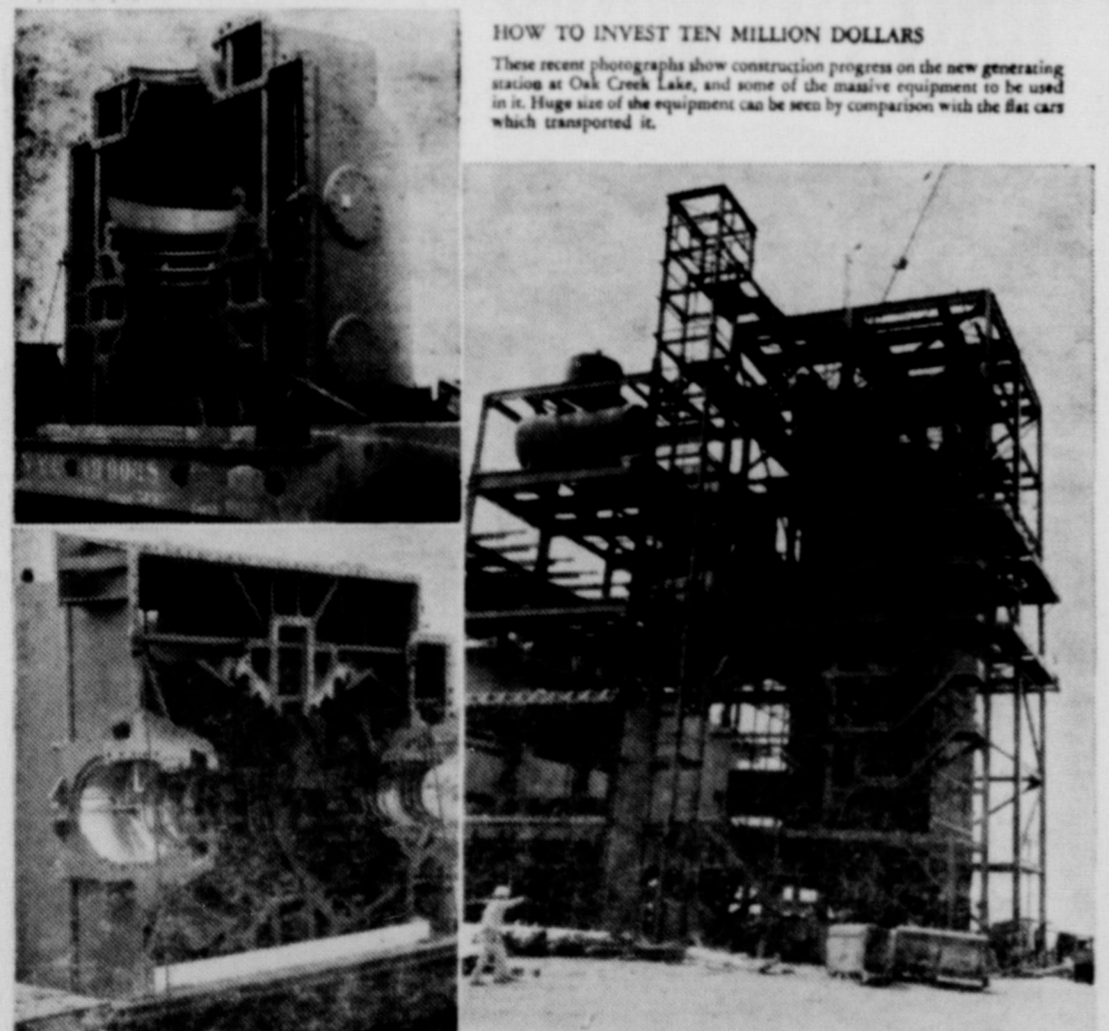
