

Bill Windham, Baird High Student, Accidentally Killed Monday

BAIRD — Our hearts are saddened by the death of Bill Windham, who died Monday at 2 p. m. from a bullet wound he suffered accidentally, while taking practice shooting with a pistol at his parent's ranch 14 miles south of Baird. He was a senior student at Baird High School, and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Windham.

The 17-year-old youth, well-known and well-liked by all, had just recently been selected on the 8A Coaches' All-District first team defense and 2nd team offense of the 1972 District and Bi-District Champion Baird Bears.

The accident occurred at 1:30 p. m. Tuesday. The youth was rushed to Callahan County Hospital by his brother, Dyer Windham and a friend, Brad Goldsmith, and died shortly after arrival. Justice of the Peace Garvin Jones ruled death by accidentally shooting. The bullet entered Windham's body on the lower right side.

Funeral services for young Windham were held Wednesday, Dec. 13, at 2 p. m. in the United First Methodist Church, officiating was the Rev. Delton Fisher, pastor. Burial was in Ross Cemetery under the direction of Godfrey Funeral Home.

Born in Baird on January 14, 1955 and had lived here all his life. He had served as president of his class, runner-up for most handsome boy of the junior class, member of the Future Farmers of America, and an outstanding sportsman on both football and basketball teams.

Survivors include his parents of Baird; three brothers, Richard (Tally) Windham Jr., assistant coach at Clyde High School, Dyer of Baird, and Tom, student at Tarleton State University at Stephenville; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. A. E. Dyer, Sr., of Baird; three nieces,

Wendy and Sarah Windham of Clyde and Kamie Windham of Baird; and one nephew, Jim Dyer Windham Jr. of Baird.

Pallbearers were members of the football team, who are seniors: Pud Jaggars, Danny Vesial, Billy Charles Hatchett, Jay Reeves, Wayne Fielder, Butch Barron, Dickey Greenway, Tommy Neal, Mitchell Atkinson, Brian Hughes, Grabel Rodriguez, and junior student, Mike Tollett.

WINTER ICE STORM BRINGS LARGE AREA TO STAND STILL

BAIRD — This area was also caught by the ice storm and jammed to a standstill Monday night, and hazardous driving conditions prevailed Tuesday morning. A thin coat of ice covered the area, however, by mid-morning the welcome sunshine had melted it away.

Cold weather has been the

order of the day for sometime and the winter season doesn't begin until Dec. 21. The frozen conditions throughout the state made local activity slow, since mail trucks and delivery was a standstill until the ice melted.

Classes were dismissed Tuesday in Baird and Clyde, as were most schools in the area. Numerous wrecks were reported in the area, however no serious injuries were reported.

Icy road conditions were said to be the main reason for an accident involving a U. S. Mail tractor-trailer which occurred on IH-20 one mile west of Clyde about 10:15 a. m. Sunday.

Investigating highway Patrolman Dwain Merritt of Baird said the truck was traveling east when it apparently skidded off the roadway, crossed the median and turned over in the westbound lane.

Patrolman Merritt said the two occupants of the truck, both listing California addresses, received slight injuries but were not hospitalized.

The vehicle itself sustained no apparent damage, Merritt said, and was driven away after being turned back on its wheels.

Weather reports for our area were for more moisture in the form of rain. However, if the freezing conditions prevail, more ice would be our main concern. A low of 19 degrees was our temperature Monday morning at Baird. Winter is indeed here, and conditions are almost unbearable for busy Christmas shoppers.

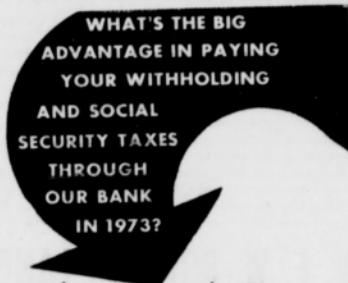

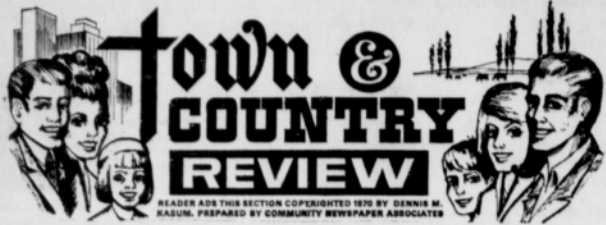

December 31 Deadline for License Permits for Billboard Signs

AUSTIN — Owners of advertising signs - from giant billboard to small signs hanging on fences - along Interstate, U. S. and State highways, have until Dec. 31 to apply for permits under the new Texas Highway Beautification Act.

The act requires that no sign can be erected within 660 feet of an interstate or federal-aid primary highway without a special \$25 outdoor advertising license. An additional \$5 permit is also required for each sign. A license and permit will not be required for (1) directional and other official signs owned by a political subdivision, governmental agency or non-profit historical, service or religious organization, (2) on-premise signs or (3) utility warning signs.

The law, passed and made effective last June 29 to avoid loss of federal road-building aid, will be implemented in stages.

License application, first stage in the process, must be accompanied by a \$2,500 bond for each county in which signs are located up to a \$10,000 maxi-

mum. Permits will be issued for sign in place prior to June 29 whether they conform to the law or not, and these will be allowed to stay in place until programmed for acquisition or removal. New sign must conform to the law before permits are issued.

Those planning to erect new signs or maintain existing signs are advised to contact the departments district office for additional information.

Shoppers Warned Of Yuletide Thieves

DALLAS — Christmas shoppers were warned today to "Lock them up or lose them."

"Every year hundreds of Christmas shoppers in Texas are victimized by thieves who steal Christmas packages from parked cars, and sometimes the car itself," said C. C. Benson, manager of the southwestern division of the National Automobile Theft Bureau.

"Careless shoppers make it easy for the thieves by leaving their packages in clear view in the car, and often don't even bother to lock the car. They evidently believe that thieves take a holiday during Christmas season, but soon find out that thieves instead are at their busiest."

Therefore, the NATB urges Texas motorists to always take these precautions while shopping:

Don't leave packages or other possessions on the seats or the floor of your parked car. Put them in the trunk.

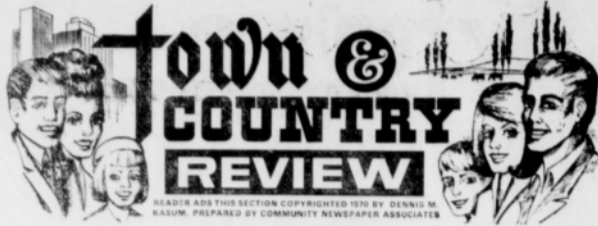

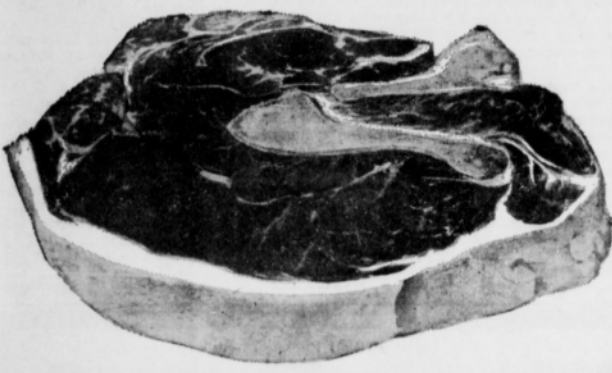
