Odd Bits Salvaged By The Editor

Quite often, a printer or newspaperman gets the idea he's smart enough to compete with Uncle Sam in printing money.

Just Sunday, we read an article about a former newspaperman being charged with possession of \$30,000 worth of counterfeit \$20 bills. In his home were found the printing plates, photographic negatives and about \$250,000 more of the bogus money.

Here's some more of that sales tax propoganda. This week the questions and answers apply to retailers:

Won't this be difficult for me to collect?

Collection of the new tax will impose some additional responsibilities on you and your employees, but similar duties are being handled with no great difficulty by 1,200,000 other retailers in the 35 sales tax states.

How will I collect this tax? By a prescribed bracket system which will tell you how much tax to add to any given sale.

Will I have to keep track of the pennies I collect? No, you will pay the state a flat 2% of your taxable sales.

What is the vendor discount system?

If you pay the State the tax due on your taxable sales within the time it is due—that is before the last day of January, April, July and October, you will be permitted to keep 1% of the tax due to compensate you for your time and trouble and to make sure that the bracket system hasn't cheated you.

Just how do I get the 3% discount?

By the middle of the second month of the quarter, you must estimate and pay a tax for the entire quarter. Let us take an example: You estimate that you will sell \$100,000 worth of taxable goods during January, February and March.

Why was this pre-payment plan put in the law? Because in the first year of the new tax there will be a collection lag. This device, it is estimated, will reduce the amount of collection lag by about \$19 million.

What kind of a form will I file with the State? The Comptroller will devise a form in the very near future. It will probably be simple enough to fit on an IBM card.

Do I have to get a license from the State? Yes, but there is no charge for this permit. If you now pay the state store tax you will automatically receive an application for a sales tax permit.

Joe Gray, 37, well known local grocer and native of Munday, passed away at 2 a.m. Sunday while enroute to the Haskell County Hospital after suffering a heart attack at Paint Creek Lake.

Mr. Gray had gone to the lake Saturday night with relatives, and became ill about 1:30 a.m. Sunday. An ambulance from Holden Funeral Home in Haskell rushed him to the hospital, but he was pronounced dead on arrival.

Born on Monday on November 28, 1923 he married Johnnie Nell Brown of Vera on December 26, 1942. He operated the Joe Gray Grocery and Market in Munday for about ten years.

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. Monday from the Gillespie Baptist Church, of which he was a member, with Rev. Ronnie Skaggs, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. Marvin Burgess of Ballinger, a former pastor at Gillespie.

H. H. Partridge Gins First Bale Of 1961 Cotton Here On Tuesday Morning

H. H. Partridge, one of this area's well known farmers, became a first for the Munday area last Tuesday morning when he brought in the first bale of 1961 cotton to be ginned in Munday.

He arrived at the Farmers Co-op Gins at about 8:30 Tuesday; one of the gin plants was put into action, and after a stop or two the first bale was ginned, tied out and weighed by 10 a.m.

From 2,140 pounds of snapped cotton, Partridge received a 515-pound bale of lint cotton and

around 950 pounds of seed.

The cotton, Stoneville 7 variety, was grown on the farm of Herb's mother, Mrs. Emmett Partridge, 8 miles due west of Munday. Some four or five acres were gone over to gather this bale, but the cotton is now opening rather rapidly.

Partridge estimates that this dry-land field will yield about three-fourths of a bale per acre.

Following the usual custom, the Farmers Co-op Gin ginned this first bale free of charge.

HOME FROM HOSPITAL

Ben Yarbrough, who has been under treatment at the Bethania Hospital in Wichita Falls the past three weeks was able to be brought home last Thursday. He is doing nicely but will have to rest most of the time.

On the night of August 16th, at the Knox City Clinic in Knox City, Texas, a meeting was held which included representatives of the Regional Red Cross Blood Bank in Wichita Falls, members of the County Medical Society, the Administrator of the Knox County Hospital, and the County Chairman of the local Red Cross and the Treasurer of the Local Red Cross, and area representatives from various communities of County for Red Cross.

It was agreed among all those present, unanimously, that Knox County would participate in the regular Red Cross Blood Bank program centered in Wichita Falls.

An interesting film concerning blood donation was shown by Mr. George Clevinger, local Red Cross Chairman of Wichita Falls.

The organization is now complete, being underwritten by the local Knox County Red Cross Chapter, the local County doctors, the hospital board and its administrator, and will be put into immediate effect.

The Red Cross blood-mobile will be in Knox City on Friday, September 15th, for the first visit to obtain a portion of the 315 pints of blood that it is thought will be required for the annual community needs of Knox County.

The blood-mobile will visit Munday and Rhineland at a later date. Full advance publicity will be provided for these blood-mobile visits.

It was decided that Rhineland being nearer the center of the county, and having excellent facilities for a place to draw the blood, it would be ideal to draw donors from the communities of Gilliland, Vera, Benjamin and Truscott, in addition to the Rhineland community.

Mr. Tom West, Chairman of the Knox County Red Cross Chapter, appointed Dr. D. C. Eiland as Chairman of the blood program in Knox County. Dr. Eiland stated that he will be appointing co-chairmen and many assistants.

It was explained at the meeting by Mr. Clevinger that any one could give blood for his aunt or grandmother anywhere in the United States, Canada, Alaska or Hawaii, without having to leave his own community.

It was also explained that certain important blood derivatives are developed after the blood grows out of date for normal human transfusions, and that these derivatives would be furnished by the Red Cross free to the community. These blood products include such things as gamma globulin for liver disease and measles, frozen plasma for hemophilia, and fibrolysin which is useful and in fact a life saving measure for women who suffer premature separation of the after-birth before their babies are born.

Also developed would be serum albumin which would be furnished at the cost of \$10.00 per 100cc. Going retail price for the drug trade on this product is \$65.00 for 100cc.

The hospital will have to pay \$5.00 per pint of blood to help defray the cost of the blood-mobile and the shipping of blood to us, by bus or by airplane, depending on our needs.

The present cost of getting a pint of blood drawn and into the refrigerator is about \$10.00, so this will mean a saving to the patient of at least \$5.00.

In return for this service the Red Cross has asked our County to raise, at its next annual drive, an additional \$500.00 over its usual quota. It was agreed at the meeting that this was a small price to pay for the services offered. Also, it was felt by all those present at the meeting that since we might very well have a national emergency at any time, to have a local supply of (Continued on Last Page)

THE HOUSEWIFE KNOWS BEST

People in the government, as well as out of it, are always seeking a new controls of one kind or another over business, on the theory that this is necessary to protect the public.

So an editorial appearing in the Portland Oregonian is very much in point. It observes: "The U. S. senators who have given themselves the assignment of protecting American housewives against the wiles of packagers and labelers of foodstuffs ought to visit our supermarket.

"The housewife we know best doesn't need a senator to help her. With her beady, little robin eyes missing nothing, she moves from shelf to shelf, hefting packages and studying labels and prices. Click, click, goes her electronic brain, as she discards the odd-sized package with the flamboyant label and tucks another into her cart. . . . She is th eacme of caution and perfection. She is efficiency personified. Shopping is her job, and none knows it better."

This tribute, as any producer or retailer can tell you from hard experience, is thoroughly justified—and its goes for all of the housewife's shopping, not just food alone. She may make an occasional mistake, but she doesn't repeat it—hers is an elephant's memory when it comes to appraising the comparative qualities of competitive products. The concern which produces an inferior product, or the store which stocks and recommends it, is asking for economic oblivion, and that request is usually fulfilled in a hurry. The housewife, roaming the local stores, knows how to make a dollar return a hundred cents worth of value.

Mass production and mass retailing would not have grown as they have by mass trickery of the consumer.

TAKE CARE!

We live in a curious, as well as a grim and unpredictable time.

Relations between this country and the Soviet Union never were more tense! There is a strong feeling that a final showdown over Berlin—a showdown which conceivably could lead to war—will come, this fall or winter.

Yet various kinds of relations and negotiations between the two nations go on. Among them is a meeting to discuss a commercial air treaty.

The American negotiators are really going to have to keep on their toes in this. For the American line which would be permitted to fly to Russia if the negotiations succeed is Pan Ameri-

can World Airways, a private enterprise which must pay its own way and attempt to make some kind of a profit for its 40,000 stockholders.

The Soviet line is Aeroflot, a branch of the Soviet Air Force and a wholly-owned arm of the Soviet government. Profit and costs mean nothing to it. Significantly, the Soviet negotiator is a Soviet Air Force general.

Aeroflot, moreover, is a potent and expanding instrument in the Soviet government's economic offensive against the whole free world. Given a chance, it could present unmeetable competition, because it would have no regard for operating losses.

The American negotiators must, exhaustively, scan every word and comma before committing us to an agreement, if legitimate and vital American interests are to be guaranteed.

BACK DOOR SPENDING

The federal budgets are coming perilously close to the \$100 billion-a-year mark. One reason is what is known as "backdoor spending." This is a procedure by which a federal agency may obtain funds for a project or program without previous or later annual scrutiny by the appropriations committee of Congress.

A current example is found in the housing bills, which carry price-tabs of close to six billion. As the Citizens Public Expenditure Survey points out, this is a type of spending "over which Congress has little or no say—except to pay the bills as they come due." And that amounts to an abandonment of one of the most important duties laid upon Congress by the Constitution.

If there ever was a time when every item of expenditure demanded the closest examination and control, this is it.

Senator Barry Goldwater says: "We should be saying to other nations that we are going to win the cold war rather than we are going to end the cold war."

People-to-People Digest reports that thousands of good American books are currently being collected, packed and shipped to worthy recipients overseas in a series of "Books From America" drives sponsored across the nation by the Workmen's Circle. Other participants include civic and fraternal organizations, along with schools, libraries, churches and many commercial and industrial concerns.

Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

4-H Electric School

There were two boys and two girls that attended the district 4-H Electric Clinic this last week in Vernon. Those attending were Frances Reneau and Jannette Brazell of the Sunset 4-H Club of Munday and Charles McAnear and Charles Dodd of the Benjamin 4-H Club.

The group attended the program which had sessions in the morning on electric brooding and protective equipment. The afternoon was divided and the girls had classes on inside lighting and electric appliances while the boys learned about farmstead lighting and care of electric meters. The program was sponsored by the West Texas Utilities Co.

Soil Samples

About this time each year, many of the farmers in the area begin to think about the planting of fall crops and some also take a soil sample in the preparation for planting fall crops. The past several years when there has been favorable moisture condition, the use of fertilizers has shown to be of great benefit. In the drier years, there has not been such a remarkable difference in the fertilized and non-fertilized fields.

Naturally, it is hard to tell at this time if we will have a favorable fall, winter and spring for the small grains; however, in most cases there is a good "season" in the soil now. Research has shown us that to produce 35 bu. of wheat, we need 42 lbs. of nitrogen, 20 lbs. of phosphorus and 11 lbs. of potassium available for the plant to remove. Most of our soils do not need any potassium; however, many are short in nitrogen and phosphorus.

Soil sampling information can be obtained from the county agent's office or the First National Bank in Munday has available soil sample information sheets and a supply of soil sample bags. Soil samples may be sent to any of the soil testing labs in the state; however, the lab at Seymour is the closest. Last September, the fee on samples was about \$2.00.

Gas Tax Refund

Farmers and ranchers that wish to apply for refund of Federal tax paid on gasoline used on a farm can now do so and have until Oct. 2 to file the claim. Forms are now available in the county agent's office and can be obtained by coming by and picking one up or by writing and asking for the forms. This will include gasoline purchased before July 1, 1961, which you used on a farm after June 30, 1960, and before July 1, 1961, for farming purposes. This also includes gasoline used by other persons on your farm in cultivating the soil or raising or harvesting any agricultural or horticultural commodity.

Do not include gasoline used (1) on the highway, (2) in processing, packaging, freezing, or canning operations; or (3) for personal or nonfarming purposes. Any person should remember that upon request from the District Director, they must be able to support the amount of refund claimed. The law also provides criminal penalties for filing false or fraudulent claims.

Knox Prairie Philosopher Adds His Two-Bits Worth To The Berlin Crisis, But It's Just Inflationary

Editor's note: The Knox Prairie Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Miller Creek discusses the Berlin situation this week, without making much of a dent in it.



Dear editor:
Right when people ought to be enjoying the closing days of summer, all you can hear from them is: What's going to happen over West Berlin and East Berlin?

Why, the newspapers are so full of the Berlin crisis even old-fashioned ax murderers have been crowded to an inside page, and any robber who holds up a bank for only a few thousand dollars can't even get in the paper at all.

But I've been viewing the Berlin situation this way: with so many brains at work on it in every corner of the world, I figure I can be excused from devoting my full time to it, although I'll admit that West Berlin's demand that the United States stop talking and start fighting over its plight has very puzzled it. It hasn't been very many years since the same place was hollering that we ought to stop fighting and start talking.

Now I'm not saying the situation could be any different. It's mighty easy to look back fifteen years and say what we should have done, but I can look out over this Johnson grass farm and list a dozen things it looks like I would have had sense enough to have done fifteen years ago, but there they are still undone. This goes for both the East side of this place as well as the West side.

For example, while one of the problems in Berlin is the ques-

tion of whether you can cross from the East to the West, my problem here is that a cow can cross from either direction and leave the place altogether from all sides if she takes the notion. You might say that on this farm, a cow recognizes no borders and while I could shut the gate, it seems like a waste of time when the fences beyond the gate won't hold cows anyway.

One advantage my cows have over people is that they don't recognize any political philosophies. I've tried dictating to them, but it won't work. Someday Mr. Khrushchev may find out the same thing about people.
